	<b>The Need</b>	<b>Our Work</b>
<b>Education</b>	Only 6 out of 10 high school students will graduate on time.	United Way programs tutor and counsel over 11,000 students to improve test scores and academic grades.
	1 in 4 teens remains unsupervised between 3 pm and 7 pm.	United Way programs served 30,000 youth through sports, mentoring, HIV/STI workshops, social and life skills workshops and quality summer camps.
	One of the signs of the lack of high quality early care and education is that less than 20% of the centers providing that service in Miami-Dade are accredited.	Since its opening in 2007, the United Way Center for Excellence in Early Education, has trained nearly 12,500 early care professionals, educators, college students, business leaders and parents, to increase the overall quality of early care and education services.
<b>Income</b>	The unemployment rate in the State of Florida was as high as 12% as of April, 2010.	United Way programs trained 4,765 individuals with disabilities and placed 3,252 in employment.
	From February, 2009 to January, 2010 the number of properties in foreclosure was 62,065, up 4% from the previous period.	United Way programs provided 4,106 residents with financial education, foreclosure prevention counseling and debt management.
	Locally and nationally people are getting credit cards at earlier ages, living beyond their means, earning less than their potential and wasting money on credit card and bank fees.	Opened in October, 2009, the United Way Center for Financial Stability is a one-stop national pilot model that brings all financial stability resources under one roof to help families reach their long-term financial goals with the help of a financial coach.
<b>Health</b>	The American Cancer Society reports 2,760 women will die this year from breast cancer in the state of Florida.	United Way programs provided cancer education to 30,000 individuals; 4,414 of them received breast and cervical cancer screenings.
	More than 100,000 children under 19 do not have health insurance.	United Way advocated successfully for passage of the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Reauthorization Act of 2009, which expands health insurance eligibility requirements and enrollment opportunities for low and middle income families, allowing many more children to be insured.
	Miami has the highest rate of AIDS cases per 100,000 in the country.	United Way programs tested 2,526 persons for HIV/AIDS. 6% tested positive. 72% of them are provided on-going services.
