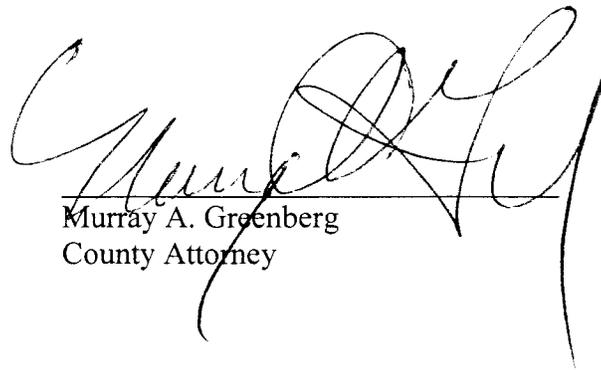

RESOLUTION REQUIRING PHASED REPLACEMENT OF
INCANDESCENT LIGHT BULBS IN COUNTY-OWNED AND
COUNTY-OPERATED BUILDINGS WITH ENERGY STAR
QUALIFIED COMPACT FLUORESCENT LAMPS (CFLs)

WHEREAS, much of the energy used by incandescent light bulbs is wasted in the form of heat; and

WHEREAS, compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) use about 25 percent of the energy of incandescent light bulbs and generate 70 percent less heat than incandescent light bulbs; and

WHEREAS, a 20-watt CFL provides as much light as a 75-watt conventional light bulb, and lasts 13 times longer; and

WHEREAS, about one-fifth of the average U.S. home's electricity costs pays for lighting and thus CFLs, although initially costing more than incandescent light bulbs, will provide significant savings for consumers over time; and

WHEREAS, by 2005 about 100 million CFLs were sold in the U.S. or about 5 percent of the 2-billion-lightbulb market; and

WHEREAS, the increased use of CFLs are an important component in the reduction of energy use and greenhouse gas emissions causing global-warming; and

WHEREAS, Australia's global-warming plan requires the phasing-out of all incandescent light bulbs by 2010 and could cut Australia's greenhouse gas emissions by 4 million tons by 2012 and cut household power bills by up to 66 percent; and

WHEREAS, there is pending legislation in California seeking to phase-out incandescent light bulbs in California by 2012; and

WHEREAS, if every American home replaced just one incandescent light bulb with an Energy Star qualified CFL, enough energy would be saved to light more than 2.5 million homes for a year and prevent greenhouse gases equivalent to the emissions of nearly 800,000 cars; and

WHEREAS, Energy Star is a joint program of the U.S.E.P.A. and U.S. Dept. of Energy to save money and protect the environment through energy efficient products and practices; and

WHEREAS, Energy Star is a voluntary labeling program designed to identify and promote energy-efficient products to reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and

WHEREAS, Energy Star delivers the technical information and tools that organizations and consumers need to choose energy-efficient solutions and best management practices,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. This Board hereby directs that, forthwith and without delay, all incandescent light bulbs in County-owned and County-operated buildings shall be replaced by Energy Star qualified compact fluorescent lamps when an incandescent light bulb burns- out.

The foregoing resolution was sponsored by Commissioner Joe A. Martinez and offered by Commissioner _____, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner _____ and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:

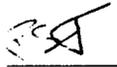
