## **Recommendation**

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners re-appoint the following persons to their second terms as members of the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board (APAB):

- Jorge Abreu to fill the Nursery Industry Seat #2 as recommended by the Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association; and
- Robert Thompson to fill the Farm Labor Seat as recommended by the APAB.

## **Scope**

The Agricultural Practices Advisory Board has a countywide impact.

## **Fiscal Impact/Funding Source**

There is no fiscal impact to the County.

## **Track Record/Monitor**

The Agricultural Practices Advisory Board (APAB) is a County Board whose members are appointed by the BCC. The Metropolitan Division of the Department of Planning and Zoning provides administrative and technical support for the APAB.

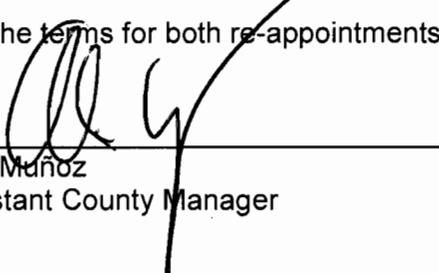
## **Background**

The APAB consists of thirteen members representing a variety of agricultural industries. Section 2-935, Code of Miami-Dade County, requires that the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) fill vacancies occurring on the APAB. By Code, each nominating organization must submit for BCC review a minimum of one nominee for their vacant position(s), the nominee's resume, and the minutes of the organization's meeting at which the nominee was selected. The required documentation for each of the following nominees is attached.

- Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association seat #2  
Mr. Jorge Abreu was selected for re-appointment by the Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association. Mr. Abreu owns a nursery in southwest Miami-Dade County. Mr. Abreu is the current president to the Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association (FNGLA) of south Florida. *The FNGLA recommended the re-appointment of Jorge Abreu at their April 14, 2009 meeting.*
- Farm Labor seat  
Section 2-935(a) of the County Code directs the APAB to propose a nominee to fill a vacant seat if the member organization does not do so within 45 days of the vacancy occurring.

The Coalition of Florida Farmworker Organizations failed to submit a nominee for their vacant seat in the 125 days following the seat becoming vacant in January 2009. According to Mr. Thompson, who is the Chairman of the Coalition, the board members are scattered throughout the State of Florida, and have difficulty meeting on a regular basis to discuss issues such as this re-appointment. Mr. Thompson, whose first term as the Farm Labor representative expired in December 2008, expressed his desire to continue to serve on the APAB. The APAB exercised their authority, as described above, to recommend the re-appointment of Mr. Thompson to fill the vacant seat. *The APAB recommended the re-appointment of Robert Thompson at their May 6, 2009 meeting.*

The terms for both re-appointments will expire on December 31, 2012.

RESOLUTION REAPPOINTING TWO EXISTING MEMBERS  
TO THE AGRICULTURAL PRACTICES ADVISORY BOARD

**WHEREAS**, Sections 2-931 through 2-936 of the Code of Miami-Dade County provide for the creation, composition, terms, purpose, and duties of the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board (APAB); and

**WHEREAS**, a vacancy of the second of two Nursery Industry representative seats exists on the APAB; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Jorge Abreu has completed his first term as a Nursery Industry representative on the APAB and is eligible for a second term; and

**WHEREAS**, a vacancy of the Farm Labor seat exists on the APAB; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Robert Thompson has completed his first term as the Farm Labor representative on the APAB and is eligible for a second term; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 2-935 of the Code of Miami-Dade County directs that the designated organization must provide at least one nominee; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 2-935 of the Code of Miami-Dade County directs the APAB to propose a nominee to fill a vacancy if the member Organization fails to submit a nomination for a replacement member within 45 days of notification of a vacancy; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 2-935 of the Code of Miami-Dade County directs that vacancies on the APAB are to be filled by the Board of County Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS**, the County Manager, and the Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association, recommend that the Board of County Commissioners re-appoint Mr. Jorge Abreu to Nursery Industry seat #2; and

**WHEREAS**, the County Manager, and the APAB in lieu of the Coalition of Florida Farmworker Organizations, recommend that the Board of County Commissioners re-appoint Mr. Robert Thompson to represent the Coalition of Florida Farmworker Organizations in the Farm Labor seat,

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA**, that Mr. Jorge Abreu and Mr. Robert Thompson are hereby re-appointed to the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board for one four-year term to end on December 31, 2012.

**Chair's Report**

Chair James Humble called the May meeting of the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board (APAB) to order at 9:00 am. Mr. Humble informed the APAB that the Wetland Regulation presentation scheduled for the May meeting was rescheduled for the June meeting.

**Coordinators Report**

Steve Foren informed the APAB that it is not a violation of the Sunshine Law if an APAB member or their secretary called other APAB members to remind them to attend the meetings as long as no more than two APAB members are on the phone at any given time.

Mr. Foren stated that the Landscape ordinance was approved by the BCC on May 5, 2009 with no modifications.

The Planning Advisory Board (PAB) heard the Florida Power and Light (FPL) CDMP application on April 27, 2009 and the FPL representatives will be presenting to the APAB shortly.

Mr. Foren also informed the APAB that Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has responded to the APAB's request for background information on the Krome Avenue reconstruction project, and that the response was sent to the APAB members. Mr. Foren also advised the APAB that in addition to sending a letter to the BCC requesting their support against the planned median

on the south end of Krome Avenue, the APAB could also send a letter to Mr. Gus Pego, the FDOT district 6 Secretary.

Mr. Humble informed the APAB that he and Teena Borek met with Commissioner Moss about the Krome Avenue reconstruction project to discuss the issues regarding the Florida City Farmer's Market. He relayed that Commissioner Moss is opposed to the proposed median on Krome Avenue, and agreed that it will restrict truck traffic and affect business around the Farmer's Market.

### **Agricultural Patrol**

Captain Scott Address reported that during the month of April there were about 120 calls for service with 32 arrests five of which were felonies. Most of the crime committed during the month involved nursery thefts. The Agricultural Patrol also made two arrests involving diesel fuel thefts. Captain Address informed the APAB that the Agricultural Patrol is still getting calls regarding re-bar thefts. Captain Address explained that the re-bar is being sold to scrap metal recycling operators and recommended that farmers store the re-bar in a safe and secure location. The Agricultural Patrol is preparing for an increase in avocado thefts during the upcoming avocado season.

### **Agricultural Manager's Report**

Mr. LaPradd was unable to attend this month's meeting due to a BCC adoption hearing for the April 2008 amendment scheduled on the same day.

### **Presentation by Florida Power and Light**

Steve Scroggs introduced himself as a Senior Director of Project Development for Florida Power and Light. FPL is requesting an application to the CDMP to allow borrow pits under special circumstances on specified agricultural lands just east of Homestead Air Reserve Base. The application would allow borrow pits on lands designated for agricultural use lying between the Military Canal (north) and the Florida City (C-103) Canal (south), and between SW 122 Avenue/Homestead Air Reserve Base (west) and roughly SW 107 Avenue (east). About 300 acres of FPL-owned agricultural land would be used for the borrow pit. Mr. Scroggs informed the APAB that the FPL application is consistent with agricultural interests in the region. The application supports establishing a salt-water intrusion barrier near the coast for the benefit of all landholders in the region and does not promote any changes to the current water management practices. The project would only go forward if the Department of Community Affairs, Miami-Dade County, Florida's Power Plant Site Certification, and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission agree that there will be a net benefit supporting long term objectives. The fill from the borrow pits will be used to build a new nuclear power plant that will have a regional benefit. Mr. Scroggs stated it is more economically feasible to extract fill from this location because of its proximity to the proposed construction site. If fill would be purchased from rock miners in the north end of the County, fuel costs for trucking the fill to the construction site would be prohibitive. The nuclear power plant will have an approximate fuel savings of \$114 billion in the first 40 years and these savings will be passed on to the customers of FPL. The construction of the new nuclear power plant will have an economic stimulus of about \$6 billion during construction, \$100 million in annual tax revenue and will create about 4,000 jobs during the 8-year construction period. The new power plant plans to use reclaimed wastewater from the Black Point wastewater plant in southwest Miami-Dade County. FPL plans to pipe about 90 million gallons a day from Black Point and further purify the water on site and use it in its cooling towers. This will support about half of the County's requirement to meet water permit and outfall legislation obligations. The project location and concept was developed with County, State and Federal agencies. The text amendment criteria provides for many means of control for the County. The main restrictions in the text amendment allows for the project to be geographically defined, it must support an ecosystem restoration project, revert the control of the property to the managing agency and specified uses and limits for the use of the fill. The acreage description of the project is 2,264 acres of which 59% is environmental, 28% will not

be affected and only 13% will be used by FPL for the borrow pits. The design would limit the depth of the borrow pits to prevent contact with the salt water-contaminated ground water level and monitoring measures would be put in place to ensure there will be no further saltwater intrusion. After the fill is extracted the land will be conveyed to the appropriate agency for long-term management. Mr. Scroggs stated that the project will have a low environmental impact due to the proximity to the construction site. The pit created will be a valuable addition to a planned ecosystem restoration project and it will provide a buffer against increased saltwater intrusion in to the local aquifers. It will benefit the Agricultural community by preserving the western acreage for agriculture by halting or slowing salt-water intrusion. The proposed borrow pit has no impact on current water management practices in the region and, Mr. Scroggs stated, may act as a draw to the area for agro-tourism and/or eco-tourism.

Martin Motes stated that he does not disagree with FPL building a new nuclear power plant to provide clean energy, but he does disagree with the fact that a borrow pit needs to be dug in this area to build it. He stated that the risk from the nuclear power plant is never zero and if an accident does happen the residents of south Miami-Dade County will bear the entirety of the impacts. Mr. Motes mentioned that all of the savings from the fill issue and the power plant in general will be distributed to the whole customer base of FPL, and to the share holders. This causes an unequal cost-benefit ratio for the local residents. Mr. Motes also asked Mr. Scroggs if the current canals and waterways in the area don't slow salt-water intrusion.

Mr. Scroggs said the there has been only one incident involving a serious accident in a nuclear power plant in the United States, that being Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania, and it did not result in any radiation leak or damage to the surrounding area. Mr. Scroggs addressed Mr. Mote's concern about the potential impact by stating that if the project is not approved by the many review agencies, and does not provide a net environmental benefit, then the project will not move forward. Mr. Scroggs stated that the \$6 billion that will flow to the local economy through the construction of the plant, and the \$100 million in annual tax revenue the County will receive does not warrant Mr. Motes suggestion that the residents of Miami-Dade County will be economically disadvantaged by the project.

John Alger, a landowner in the area of the FPL application, commended FPL for using reclaimed water but is concerned on how the borrow pit will affect his farm. Mr. Alger's main concerns are whether or not the water table in the area will be affected, if the borrow pit will cause salt-water intrusion, and how this use will impact the future use of his property.

Katie Edwards from the Farm Bureau wanted to address some text in the original FPL application. Ms. Edwards stated that FPL is not supporting agriculture when the application stated the following; "without significant human intervention on an annual basis the area is unsuitable for agricultural use". According to Ms. Edwards this statement is the Farm Bureau's underlying concern and if the language is not removed the Farm Bureau will not be supporting the application.

Mr. Scroggs responded that the language quoted by Ms. Edwards will be removed from the application at the first opportunity, but as the application is in the middle of the Amendment Cycle process, it could not be amended at this time.

The APAB had a brief discussion on farming in the application area and came to the conclusion that the application area is suitable of agriculture and can be farmed without significant human intervention on an annual basis.

Teena Borek asked Mr. Scroggs how FPL will get the reclaimed water from Black Point to the new power plant. Mr. Scroggs informed Ms. Borek that FPL will construct a pipeline along FPL's

existing transmissions lines corridor. Ms. Borek informed Mr. Scroggs that she likes the idea and supports using the reclaimed water since farmers cannot do so for health safety reasons.

**Adoption of April 2009 Minutes**

Teena Borek requested a change to the April minutes in the *Adoption of March 2009 Minutes* section. She would like the first sentence in this section to read as follows: Teena Borek would like the March minutes to be reviewed and adjusted to reflect some of the positive discussion the APAB had on agricultural use of endosulfans. John DeMott made a motion to approve the April 2009 minutes with the modification. The motion was seconded by Ms. Borek and passed unanimously.

**New Business**

Mr. Foren reminded the APAB that they had not taken any action in April on whether or not to withdraw the Procurement resolution that they approved in 2008 because it did not have a quorum at the time the issue came up on the agenda. The Procurement resolution requested the BCC to direct the Department of Procurement Management (DPM) to create a preference for local products in County bid contracts. Mr. Humble informed the APAB that DPM would not endorse the APAB's proposal. Mr. Foren explained that DPM would not endorse the resolution because they already have two mechanisms (small business and local vendor) that farmers may utilize to gain a preference when applying for a contract. Mr. Foren commented that DPM's position is based on the fact that it does not get many applications for County bids from the farming community and no one from south Miami-Dade County is taking advantage of the current preferences of small businesses or local vendor status, so they see no need to add another method of gaining a preference. The Board had a brief discussion on this issue and decided not to withdraw the resolution. Staff will forward it to the BCC.

Mr. Foren stated that he sent out the section of Miami-Dade County Code that explained the board member attendance requirements. Mr. Foren noted that the County Code only allows each board member two consecutive unexcused absences, and a total of three unexcused absences in a one-year period. If a board member has more than three unexcused absences in a one-year period, they are no longer considered to be a board member. Also, the APAB must vote to excuse a member from a meeting, it is not automatic, nor may the Chair do it alone. Mr. Foren then asked if the APAB will be excusing Erik Tietig. Larry Caudle stated that Mr. Tietig did not attend this month's meeting because he has the flu. Mr. Foren opined that the wording of the County Code gave a board member an automatic excused absence for medical reasons, so no vote was required by the APAB.

Don Pybas presented awards to two members of the National Weather Service Forecast Office on behalf of Miami-Dade Agricultural Community for their research on weather and its affect on agriculture.

Mr. Foren reminded the board members that the new enabling ordinance, adopted in September 2008, empowers the APAB to appoint someone to fill a vacancy on the Board if the nominating organization does not appoint a nominee within 45 days. Mr. Foren pointed out that Robert Thompson's organization had not nominated an individual within the 45-day period and asked the Board if they would like to nominate someone. The Board decided to reappoint Robert Thompson to represent the Coalition of Florida Farm Workers. John DeMott made a motion to reappoint Robert Thompson the motion was seconded by Ms. Borek and passed unanimously.

**Public Comment**

Mr. Foren informed the APAB that the Biscayne Bay Regional Restoration team rescheduled its meeting on the seasonal drawdown, salt water intrusion and coastal wetlands. The meeting will be

held on May 8, at the NOAA Southeast Fisheries Science Center office on Virginia Key from 10:00 Am to 3:00 PM.
