

RESOLUTION NO. _____

RESOLUTION URGING CONGRESS TO REIMBURSE STATE
AND LOCAL FUNDS ADVANCED FOR THE COMPLETION
OF MIAMI RIVER DREDGING

WHEREAS, in October, 2008, an \$88 million dredging effort to improve water quality and navigation on the Miami River was completed when the last sediment was removed from the Miami River after four years of work by federal, state and local partners; and

WHEREAS, during the dredging process about 750,000 cubic yards of sediment was removed, and pollutants that had long threatened the health of the river were isolated and disposed of safely; and

WHEREAS, dredging restored the river to its federally authorized 15-foot depth; and

WHEREAS, the Miami River had last been dredged in 1935 by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and since then, sediment and debris have built up in the river, impeding shipping traffic around the City of Miami, Florida's fourth largest port; and

WHEREAS, the Miami River dredging project began in October 2004 and was completed within its five-year timeframe; and

WHEREAS, to complete the Miami River dredging project, \$21 million was advanced for the project, including \$15 million by the Florida Legislature; \$3 million by the South Florida Water Management District, and \$3 million by the the Florida Inland Navigational District; and

WHEREAS, these groups are now seeking reimbursements from the federal government for these amounts, per the attached letters,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Urges Congress to reimburse state and local funds advanced for the completion of Miami River dredging.

Section 2. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the two U.S. Senators that represent Florida and the members of the Miami-Dade County Congressional Delegation.

Section 3. Directs the County's federal lobbyists to advocate for the passage of the legislation set forth in Section 1 above, and authorizes and directs the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to include this item in the 2009 and 2010 Federal Legislative Packages.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Commissioner Bruno A. Barreiro. It was offered by Commissioner _____, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner _____ and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:


Dear Chairman Moss:

As you know, there was a \$21 million federal funding shortfall to complete the Miami River Maintenance Dredging/Environmental Clean-Up Project on time and under budget. To help make up that shortfall, the Florida Legislature appropriated an additional \$15 million, beyond its original \$12.64 million appropriation, to support the project. Other supporters of the project also provided funding to help address the shortfall. Although the federal government did not guarantee reimbursement, it is my understanding that Miami-Dade County, as the local project sponsor, is making every effort to obtain reimbursement of the \$21 million from the federal government.

I understand that Congress has appropriated \$10 million toward reimbursement of the \$21 million shortfall, but there is no guarantee at this time that Miami-Dade will obtain the full amount, and that you are requesting reimbursement of the remaining \$11 million in your current federal legislative package for FY10. I support Miami-Dade County's efforts and urge you to continue to make this reimbursement request a "Critical Priority" in your federal legislative package until federal reimbursement of the full \$21 million is secured. In addition, it is important that the County request Congressional report language directing that the \$11 million be used for reimbursement to the entities that assisted in covering the federal funding shortfall.

I appreciate your continued support for cleanup and protection of the Miami River.

Dear Chairman Moss:

As you are aware, a partnership of Miami River Maintenance Dredging/Environmental Clean-Up Project contributors (State, SFWMD and FIND) funded an extra \$21 million in the absence of adequate Congressional appropriations to complete the project on time and under budget. Part of our incentive to advance this extra \$21 million was that Miami-Dade County, serving as the formal local project sponsor, would provide its best efforts to seek reimbursement of the \$21 million reimbursement from the federal government.

We would deeply appreciate the County's Department of Intergovernmental Affairs making the County's federal FY '10 request for \$11 million towards the \$21 million a top priority. In previous Miami-Dade federal legislative packages the Miami River was noted as a "Critical Priority", and we believe it should remain so until the efforts to secure the federal reimbursement are completed. As part of the legislative request, it is important that the County request Congress include special language, with which your staff is familiar, authorizing any appropriated funds to be used for reimbursement purposes.

It was a pleasure meeting with you today. Your continued support and leadership is most appreciated.

Re: Miami River Maintenance Dredging and Environmental Clean Up Project

Dear Chairman Moss:

The Florida Inland Navigational District (FIND) contributed \$9.68 million towards the Miami River Maintenance Dredging/Environmental Clean-Up Project, consisting of the originally pledged \$6.68 million plus an extra \$3 million towards the \$21 million federal funding shortfall to complete the project on time and under budget. FIND understood Miami-Dade County, serving as the formal local project sponsor, would provide its best efforts to seek the \$21 million non-guaranteed reimbursement from the federal government.

I would sincerely appreciate Miami-Dade County making the federal FY '10 requested \$11 million towards the \$21 million non-guaranteed reimbursement a "Critical Priority". In previous Miami-Dade federal legislative packages the Miami River Dredging appropriation requests were noted as a "Critical Priority", and I recommend it remain so until the efforts to secure the federal reimbursement are completed. In addition, I respectfully recommend that Miami-Dade County request report language which directs the FY '10 \$11 million appropriation towards reimbursement of the extra funding provided by the locals to cover the \$21 million federal funding shortfall.
