**Re:** Proposed Draft 2010 State Legislative Agenda

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**RECOMMENDATION**

Transmitted herewith is the Miami-Dade County 2010 Preliminary State Legislative Agenda for your consideration.

**BACKGROUND**

The seven Commission committees have reviewed and made changes to the State Legislative Agenda. These changes are shown as underlined in the draft enclosed.

Pursuant to Resolution 1004-09, sponsored by Commissioner Sosa and adopted by the Board Of County Commissioners on July 21, 2009, attached please find a copy of the 2010 State Agendas for your review. The resolution calls for the Mayor and or his designee to present departmental requests at the different October committee meetings of jurisdiction.

The attached legislative agendas have been approved by the County Manager after meetings between the Office of the Intergovernmental Affairs, the Assistant County Managers, and Department Directors.

A copy of the Resolution 1004-09 has also been attached for your review.



## MIAMI-DADE COUNTY 2010 STATE LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

### CRITICAL PRIORITIES

- **State funding/budget:** *PRESERVE* state funding for County programs and important community programs and *OPPOSE* efforts to cost shift additional financial and programmatic obligations from the state to local governments, in light of the state budget situation and declining state revenues.
- **Jackson Health:** *PRESERVE* current state funding for charity care to Jackson Health System as burdens on Jackson continue to increase as revenue declines.
- **Elderly Services:** *PRESERVE* funding currently received in the area of elderly services, including programs for elderly high-risk meals and homebound elderly and funding for community care and Local Service Providers.
- **TABOR and other restrictions on local revenue:** *OPPOSE* legislation that further restricts local-decision making related to revenue and expenditures.
- **Tri-Rail new dedicated funding source:** *SUPPORT* a new dedicated funding source for Tri-Rail.
- **Early Voting:** *SUPPORT* legislation that would allow for increased local flexibility related to early voting, including hours and sites.



## MIAMI-DADE COUNTY 2010 STATE LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

### GUIDING PRINCIPLES

**Home Rule and Preemption:** *SUPPORT* preservation of local home rule; *OPPOSE* any effort to preempt local authority.

**State Funding, Cost Shifts and Unfunded Mandates:** *SUPPORT* preservation of existing state funding for County programs; and *OPPOSE* any additional cost shifts or unfunded mandates from the state to the County, and any reductions in County revenue, revenue sharing, or funding from the state. *OPPOSE* any measure that would adversely affect County revenues, including in the area of property taxes.

**Protect Previous State Funding:** *SUPPORT* efforts to secure the same level of state funding for County programs as last year.

**Promote Partnerships:** *SUPPORT* partnerships with the state, other counties, municipalities, statewide associations and any other entity that would help to create favorable outcomes for the County.

**AIRPORT & SEAPORT**

**AVIATION**

**25<sup>th</sup> Street Viaduct Infrastructure Project:** *SUPPORT funding request for \$106 million for the 25<sup>th</sup> Street Viaduct, which is designed specifically for the movement of commercial air cargo truck traffic between MIA's west cargo area and SR-826. The viaduct portion of the project is a two-lane elevated roadway straddling the north side of NW 25<sup>th</sup> Street using part of the existing canal right-of-way and the roadway's widened median for the supporting columns. Access to and from the viaduct would be provided at the SR-826 Interchange from NW 25<sup>th</sup> Street. The NW 25<sup>th</sup> Street transportation corridor from the Palmetto Expressway (State Road 826) to Miami International Airport's (MIA) west and north air-cargo handling facilities.*

**Quarter Horse Permit Application and Slots at Miami International Airport:** *SUPPORT approval by the Florida Department of Business & Professional Regulation of the County's permit application for quarter horse racing at Miami International Airport; OPPOSE any effort to preempt or prohibit Miami-Dade County from securing a quarter horse racing permit or slot machines at Miami International Airport.*

**Funding of Capital Projects:** *SUPPORT full funding of Aviation capital projects included in FDOT's 2010/2011 work program.*

**Airport Security Pilot Programs:** *SUPPORT full funding in the area of enhancing security and safety made available through pilot programs.*

**Secure Airports for Florida's Economy Program:** *SUPPORT funding of the Secure Airports for Florida's Economy (SAFE) Program.*

**Aviation Sales-Tax Exemptions:** *MONITOR any legislation related to the repeal of aviation-related sales tax exemptions.*

## SEAPORT

**Seaport Security:** *MONITOR* seaport security legislation, bills, rules, regulations and statewide policies affecting Florida's seaports.

**Florida Ports Council:** *SUPPORT* Florida Ports Council's effort in securing dedicated funding sources for Florida's seaports.

**Transportation Intermodal Issues:** *MONITOR* any legislation, rules, and statewide policy involving transportation intermodal issues including, but not limited to, major transportation improvement projects.

## **BUDGET, PLANNING AND SUSTAINABILITY**

### **AGRICULTURE**

**Creation of the Miami-Dade County Redland Agri-Technology Production Center at the University of Florida/IFAS Tropical Research and Education Center in Homestead:** *SUPPORT* funding in the amount of \$50,000 for a feasibility study

### **DERM**

**Beach Renourishment & Erosion Control:** *MAINTAIN* state funding of beach erosion control activities.

**Inland Protection Trust Fund:** *MAINTAIN* and *RESTORE* full funding from the Inland Protection Trust Fund (IPTF) for the Florida Petroleum Cleanup Program to remediate contaminated sites.

### **FINANCE**

**Homestead Tax Deferral Application Deadline:** *AMEND* Florida Statutes to extend the deadline to file an application to defer taxes from January 31 to March 31.

### **PROCUREMENT**

**Repeal of Section 511:** *SUPPORT* state action requesting that Congress repeal Section 511 of the Tax Increase Prevention and Reconciliation Act of 2005.

### **SUSTAINABILITY**

**Energy:** *SUPPORT* a series of initiatives that would create energy-efficiency and renewable energy.

**Urban Forestry Program:** *SUPPORT* maintaining or increasing state funding for Urban and Community Forestry Programs, including FDOT funding to plant trees on state roads.

## GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

### BUILDING CODE COMPLIANCE

**Florida Building Code/Product Approval Process:** *MONITOR any legislative activity regarding the statewide Florida Building Code and Product Approval Process.*

### CONSUMER SERVICES

**Oppose For-Hire Transportation and Ambulance Preemption:** *OPPOSE any initiative which would impact local regulation of for-hire transportation modes regulated by Miami-Dade County, including any attempts to preempt local regulation governing limousines, SUVs or prearrangement regulations, or transfers and inheritance of taxicab medallions, or ambulance certificates.*

**Oppose Preemption of Towing, Moving, Locksmith, or Motor Vehicle Repair Regulation :** *OPPOSE any legislation which would preempt the County's ability to regulate towing, moving, motor vehicle repair and locksmith companies.*

**NCIC Background Checks for For-Hire Drivers:** *SUPPORT the creation of legislation that would allow county governments to conduct a national background check on all for-hire chauffeurs.*

### ELECTIONS

**Extension of deadline for compliance with ADA Compliant Voting Equipment:** *SUPPORT allowing Supervisors of Elections additional time to comply with the state-mandated equipment conversion from Touchscreen voting machines to paper ballots for voters with disabilities.*

**Modification of Election Audit Rules:** *SUPPORT allowing Supervisors of Elections to audit at least 1% but no more than 2% of randomly selected precincts and/or voting units in a particular election, as opposed to the current requirement of an audit of 1 to 2% of precincts only.*

**Early Voting:** *SUPPORT legislation that would allow for increased local flexibility related to early voting, including hours and sites.*

**Help America Vote Act Funds:** *SUPPORT the reimbursement of funds pursuant to federal law spent by Miami-Dade County to comply with the state-mandated voting equipment conversion to the optical scan voting system and ADA-compliant equipment.*

**Executive Committeeman/Committeewoman Elections:** *SUPPORT the requirement that elections for Committeeman and Committeewoman be conducted by the applicable political party independent of county-conducted elections.*

**Community Development Districts:** *SUPPORT allowing Supervisors of Elections to conduct CDD elections via mail ballot.*

## **GSA**

**County Leases:** *SUPPORT amending Florida Statutes to give counties the authority to enter into lease agreements that have a term that is five years or less without having to competitively bid the space.*

## **SOLID WASTE**

**Renewable Energy:** *SUPPORT the preservation and enhancement of existing initiatives that support the production of “renewable” energy produced at the county’s Resources Recovery Facility from the combustion of municipal solid waste.*

**Illegal Dumping:** *SUPPORT legislation that would provide for increased penalties for illegal dumping, including increasing the penalty for dumping on agriculture lands to a third degree penalty and revoking the drivers license and vehicle registration for those in violation of the Florida Litter Law. (SOLID WASTE)*

**Local Solid Waste Programs Grant Funding:** *SUPPORT reinstating funding generated from waste tire fees for illegal dumping and other solid waste programs on a pro rate basis based on the counties in which the fees are generated.*

**Waste-to-Energy Ash:** *SUPPORT funding request of \$250,000 for the development of new construction materials for the beneficial use waste-to-energy ash.*

## **WATER AND SEWER**

**Central District Wastewater Treatment Plant-HLD Facilities-Phase One:** *SUPPORT funding request of \$3,840,000.00 in order to meet the nutrient reduction requirement by the installation of facilities by 2018 to remove 60 million gallons/day of effluent flow mandated by State law and to consider modifying the Advanced Waste Treatment compliance date to provide additional flexibility in meeting the mandate.*

**Biscayne Aquifer Surface/Groundwater Model Project:** *SUPPORT funding request of \$550,000.00 in order to create a model that will adequately represent surface water flow through the canal network and contain the resolution necessary to address water resource issues at the county scale, including state-mandated water reclamation projects. The model will evaluate the impact of climate change and sea level rise on water resources and resource management for South Florida, thereby contributing directly to the Governor's climate change priorities.*

**Integrated Water, Wastewater, Reclaimed Water Master Plan:** *SUPPORT funding request in the amount of \$265,625, which amounts to 50% of the MDWASD comprehensive master planning to address water, wastewater and reclaimed water needs, the Integrated Water, Wastewater and Reclaimed Water Master Plan. This plan is critical to meeting state requirements.*

**Pump Station Optimization Program (PSOP):** *SUPPORT funding request in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 in order to comply with the requirement that MDWASD must operate its wastewater collection system so that all pumping stations have sufficient capacity to handle wet weather peak flows with the back-up pump out service, as required by State regulations.*

**Water and Wastewater Lines Under Government Cut:** *SUPPORT funding request of \$9,150,000.00 for the implementation of a 60-inch Force Main from Miami Beach to the Central District Wastewater Treatment Plant at Virginia Key and a 20-inch Potable Water Main Under Government Cut. Relocation of the force main will also make possible the installation of a reclaimed water line to deliver reclaimed water to Fisher Island and Miami Beach. The Port of Miami, as the local sponsor of the proposed Miami Harbor (Government Cut) Federal Navigation Project, intends to deepen the navigational channel to a final elevation where the existing pipelines will become exposed and in conflict with channel users, as well as pose environmental risks. As a result of the location conflicts, the replacement pipelines will need to be constructed and placed into service prior to the decommissioning of the existing pipelines. The economic benefits of these improvements will accrue to the regional and statewide economies.*

## HEALTH, PUBLIC SAFETY & INTERGOVERNMENTAL

### CORRECTIONS

**Limited Arrest Authority for Correctional Officers within Jail Detention Facilities:** *SUPPORT amendments to Florida Statutes to allow correctional officers limited arrest authority within county jail detention facilities and their surrounding perimeter.*

### FIRE RESCUE

**False Impersonation:** *AMEND Florida Statutes to prohibit impersonation of firefighters including criminal penalties..*

**Miami-Dade County Anti-Venom Bank:** *SUPPORT funding request in the amount of \$500,000 for the Miami-Dade County Anti-Venom Bank, which provides anti-venom internationally.*

### JACKSON HEALTH SYSTEM

(The items below are copied from Jackson's 2010 Legislative Priorities)

#### Low Income Pool (LIP)

Jackson provides the largest amount of charity care in the state and is the largest provider of IGT for the LIP program. Jackson asks the Legislature to maintain current levels of funding in the LIP program, distributing funds based on the level of charity care and Medicaid volumes safety net hospitals provide. This program is set to expire next year.

#### Medicaid Provider Reimbursement Rates

As the state's largest Medicaid provider, Jackson urges the Legislature to reinstate Medicaid provider reimbursement rates to base levels from 2005-06 and continue funding those programs and services that ensure adequate health access for the poor and needy of the state. The Legislature reduced rates twice last year – Special Session and Regular Session – causing Jackson to lose money on every Medicaid patient it cares for.

#### Children's Ambulatory Pavilion Building



Jackson and the University of Miami are requesting capital funding for a comprehensive children's ambulatory pavilion building.

### **Medicaid Reform and Managed Care Issues**

Legislation passed last year that would allow the Agency for Healthcare Administration (AHCA) to integrate health care services with mental health services for the 56,000 mental health lives Jackson currently cares for. We should continue to monitor the progress of this integration as it will streamline health care services provided to this important population.

Florida's Medicaid Reform Waiver is set to expire next year. This will effectively eliminate the LIP program, and the funding that it provides for the healthcare of Medicaid, underfunded and unfunded populations. We will work closely with AHCA and the Legislature to ensure that this funding is replaced by a program of equal or better quality.

### **Trauma Issues**

Jackson will continue to advocate for additional state funding for trauma centers. Additionally, legislation regarding red light cameras that failed during last session will be pushed again this year. If passed, this legislation will increase fines for running a red light and a portion of those funds will be dedicated for trauma centers.

### **Budget**

Last year, the Legislature allocated an additional \$45 million non-recurring general revenue to Jackson and Shands Health Systems to assist our mission of serving the poor. We are asking the Legislature to similarly appropriate funds to both institutions in **recurring** general revenue funds.

### **Cigarette Tax**

Jackson is prepared to continue looking for ways of gaining revenues from the newly implemented cigarette tax. During the last session, these monies were only granted to educational institutions engaged in cancer research with the remaining monies going towards state general revenues.

### **Graduate Medical Education**

Jackson shifts \$30 million from operating revenues each year to subsidize its residency programs. With only 637 residency slots funded by the federal government, Jackson must fund the other 463 slots. Nearly 40% of Florida's medical students are completing their residencies and become physicians in another state ... leaving Florida with a severe shortage of physicians. Jackson



supports additional funding for existing, unfunded residency slots as well as new residency programs.

## **JUVENILE SERVICES**

**Juvenile Justice:** *SUPPORT* legislation reinstating state responsibility for the cost of pre-disposition juvenile detention and repealing the cost shift of this financial obligation to counties.

## **OFFICE OF COUNTYWIDE HEALTHCARE PLANNING**

**Miami-Dade Blue Premium Assistance Program:** *SUPPORT* funding under the Low Income Pool for premium assistance in the Miami-Dade Blue program.

**Liberty City Clinic Capital Construction:** *SUPPORT* funding in the amount of \$12,810,832 for the construction of a new health facility in Liberty City.

**Florida City Clinic Capital Construction:** *SUPPORT* funding in the amount of \$1,778,480 to construct a facility to replace a trailer currently used as a clinic in Florida City.

**Miami-Dade County Health Department Main Complex:** *SUPPORT* funding in the amount of \$52,366,900 for the construction of a new building for the Children's Medical Services and Refugee Clinics.

## **OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT**

**Emergency Management Preparedness Act Trust Fund Policy Broadening:** *AMEND* Florida Statutes to broaden the base of policies in which the EMPA fee is imposed to include all insurance policies.

**Emergency Management Preparedness Act Trust Fund:** *AMEND* Florida Statutes to restore the EMPA Trust Fund to its original intent as a funding source for local emergency management programs.

## **POLICE**

**Public Resource Accountability and Profiteering Act:** *SUPPORT* creation of criminal liability where public resources are transferred, awarded or granted, then intentionally used improperly or redirected from their intended and authorized use.

## **HOUSING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**

### **COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY**

**Community Services Block Grant Program:** *SUPPORT the dedication of specific state dollars to support federally funded Community Service Block Grant program and the activities of the Community Action Agency.*

### **ELDERLY AFFAIRS**

**Community Care for the Elderly:** *SUPPORT an increase in the allocation of Department of Elder Affairs Community Care for elderly funding in Miami-Dade County.*

**Elderly High-Risk Meals:** *SUPPORT funding request in the amount of \$1,696,000 for the Elderly High-Risk Nutritional Meals.*

**Homebound Elderly:** *SUPPORT funding request in the amount of \$655,890 for Homebound Elderly receiving in-home services.*

**General Revenue Funding:** *SUPPORT increased state funding for the Department of Elder Affairs with an emphasis on Local Service Provider funds.*

### **HOMELESS TRUST**

**GAP Funding:** *SUPPORT \$500,000 funding request to continue GAP Funding Project.*

### **DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**

**Clearinghouse for Not-for-Profit and For-Profit Developers:** *SUPPORT the establishment of a clearinghouse by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation of not-for-profit and for-profit developers and related entities to facilitate joint ventures for affordable rental housing developments.*

**Support Program for Not-for-Profit Affordable Housing Developers:** *SUPPORT creation by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation of a comprehensive, performance-based support program for not-for-profit affordable housing developers that will increase their capacity to address affordable housing issues.*

**Predevelopment Loan Program Matching Grant:** *SUPPORT* creation by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation of a \$25,000 recoverable matching grant within the Predevelopment Loan Program to fund project feasibility expenses. The not-for-profit recipient would provide a \$5,000 match for a total of \$30,000.

## RECREATION, CULTURE & TOURISM

### CULTURAL AFFAIRS

**Increase Statewide Budget Allocation for Cultural Affairs Grants:** *PRESERVE* state funding currently received by Miami-Dade County for Cultural Affairs programs.

### FILM AND ENTERTAINMENT

**Industry Incentive:** *SUPPORT* legislation to fund film and entertainment industry incentives at a higher amount, and *SUPPORT* changing the incentive program from a rebate formula to a multi-year, transferable tax credit.

### LIBRARY

**State Aid to Libraries:** *SUPPORT* increased funding of state aid to libraries.

### PARKS AND RECREATION

**Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program:** *SUPPORT* legislation that would allow an entity to have more than three (3) grants active/open at one time and still be allowed to apply for two (2) new grants per year.

**Florida Forever:** *SUPPORT* increased funding for the Florida Forever purchasing program.

**Land and Water Conservation Fund Program:** *SUPPORT* the recommendations of the Outdoor Resources Review Group, a national advisory group convened to focus on the future needs of our nation for outdoor recreation and conservation of natural resources.

**Cinco de Mayo Park:** *SUPPORT* funding request in the amount of \$760,000 for park which provides facilities for children of immigrant agriculture workers.

**Off-Highway Vehicles:** *SUPPORT* funding request in the amount of \$337,000 for OHV Feasibility Study.

**Tropical Park Equestrian Center:** *SUPPORT* funding request in the amount of \$3,400,000 for a new roof over the warm up ring in the equestrian center, home to the Miami International Agriculture and Cattle Show.

## PUBLIC WORKS

**Intergovernmental Transfers of Title to Roads:** *AMEND Florida Statutes to permit transfers of right-of-way between local governments by deed or by right-of-way transfer map.*

**Venetian Causeway:** *SUPPORT funding for design and construction costs for the complete replacement of the 12 bridges on the Venetian Causeway.*

**Tamiami Canal Swing Bridge:** *SUPPORT funding for design and construction costs to replace the Tamiami Canal Historic Swing Bridge.*

**Advanced Traffic Management System:** *SUPPORT funding to complete the Miami-Dade County Advanced Traffic Management System.*

**Eminent Domain:** *SUPPORT legislation that would allow a local legislative body to approve multiple takings by eminent domain in a single item.*



**RESOLUTION NO. R-1004-09**

**RESOLUTION DIRECTING THE MAYOR OR DESIGNEE TO  
PRESENT DEPARTMENTAL FEDERAL AND STATE  
LEGISLATIVE REQUESTS AT OCTOBER COMMITTEES**

**WHEREAS**, committee meetings for the Florida Legislature's 2010 legislative session will begin in the fall of 2009; and

**WHEREAS**, member of the Florida House are limited to only six bill slots per member, and these bill slots are in high demand; and

**WHEREAS**, bills filed during the fall and early in committee weeks have a far better chance of passage than bills filed later in the process; and

**WHEREAS**, during the 2009 session, Miami-Dade County saw successes with its legislative issues by including some of them in the Florida Association of Counties and Florida League of Cities legislative packages; and

**WHEREAS**, the Florida Association of Counties and Florida League of Cities hold their legislative policy conferences beginning in the fall; and

**WHEREAS**, to best pursue our legislative agenda for the 2010 session, it is important that Miami-Dade County have its legislative agenda in place no later than the end of October, so as to give our issues the best chance of passage,

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:**

**Section 1.** This Board directs the Mayor or Designee to present all departmental legislative requests for the 2010 state legislative session >>and the 2010 federal legislative

package<sup>1</sup> at the October, 2009 committee meetings, including both changes to statutes and appropriations requests. The Mayor or Designee shall present such requests to the applicable committee that has jurisdiction over the department from which the request originated.

**Section 2.** During October committee meetings, committees shall consider such items, prioritize them and recommend items for approval by the full Board in the County's ~~2010 federal and state legislative package~~.

**Section 3.** The Board shall consider, prioritize and approve the ~~2010 federal and state legislative package~~ at the October 20 Board meeting based on committee recommendations. The Board also shall identify no more than eight County departmental priorities ~~for the 2010 federal legislative package and no more than eight County departmental priorities~~ for the 2010 state legislative session, along with guiding principles.
