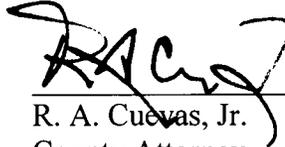

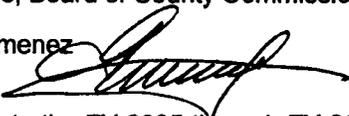

Subject: Amendment to the FY 2005 through FY 2011 Action Plans for CDBG, HOME, HODAG, and ESG Funds

This item was amended at the September 14, 2011 meeting of the Economic Development and Social Services Committee to reduce the recapture of \$45,000 from the Department of Human Services' rehabilitation of the Richmond Heights and West Perrine Senior Center to \$5,000 and eliminate the reallocation of \$40,000 to Neighbors and Neighbors Agency's Farmer's Market. The total recapture and reallocation of prior year Community Development Block Grant funds changes from \$3,978,865.65 to \$3,938,865.65.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) authorize the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to substantially amend the FY 2005 through FY 2011 Action Plans to do the following:

- Recapture and reallocate \$3,938,865.65 of prior year Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), \$2,548,779 of Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and \$2,039,301 of Housing Development Action Grant (HODAG). The detailed recapture and reallocation of the CDBG, HOME, and HODAG funds is indicated in Exhibit 1.
- Amend project scopes for two CDBG funded activities associated with the Elevator Modernization for Elderly Apartments and SFLUM Community Center projects.
- Allocate an additional \$1.954 million in FY 2011 CDBG funds to partially restore funding for economic development activities and address high priority needs of the Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Areas (NRSAs) and \$43,263 in additional FY 2011 Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds. The allocation of additional CDBG and ESG funds is indicated in Exhibit 2.

SCOPE

Exhibit I and Exhibit II provide the Commission District location for the projects recommended for CDBG, HOME, and HODAG funding.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

The recapture and/or reallocation of prior year CDBG, HOME, HODAG, and ESG funds will not have a negative fiscal impact to the County. This item reallocates the same amount of funds recommended for recapture from entities listed in Exhibit 1.

However, the County's FY 2011 CDBG entitlement was higher than approved by the Board when Resolution R-446-11 was adopted. The difference of \$1.954 million is recommended for allocation to certain entities listed in Exhibit 2 that applied through the FY 2011 request for application process and were impacted by the 16 percent reduction in FY 2011 CDBG funding as a result of the balancing of the federal budget.

TRACK RECORD/MONITORING

The Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) monitors all CDBG, HOME, HODAG, and ESG funded activities. Through the review of quarterly progress reports, DHCD will monitor these projects to ensure compliance with federal guidelines and County policies.

The entities being recommended for funding have successful track records for the delivery of products and/or services as specified in their contractual agreements with DHCD. The allocation of funds will enable the

implementing entities to complete their project delivery objectives in a timely manner. For entities that have commenced project development, the supplemental funding will assist them in meeting their objectives and is consistent with the County's policy of *Finishing What We Started*.

BACKGROUND

Funded activities as part of the FY 2011 and prior years Action Plans are monitored throughout the year to ensure agencies are in compliance with federal regulations, such as the progress of each activity towards accomplishing the National Objectives set by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (US HUD). As such, DHCD recommends the recapture of CDBG and HOME funding from activities that: 1) are unable to meet a US HUD National Objective; 2) have been completed and have unexpended balances; and/or 3) have expired contracts. This item reallocates funds to eligible activities that: 1) have demonstrated an existing funding gap; 2) are eligible for funds under the *Finish What We Started* policy; and/or 3) represent high priority public facility improvement needs within NRSAs or other eligible areas within Miami-Dade County.

FY 2006-2010 CDBG FUNDS (\$3,938,865.65)

Staff recommends the recapture of \$3,938,865.65 in CDBG funds as these activities are: 1) completed and the unexpended balances must be recaptured as part of the US HUD required close-out process; or 2) no longer feasible. The CDBG recaptured funds will be reprogrammed to the activities described below:

1. *Black Economic Development Coalition, Inc. dba Tools for Change – Micro Loan Program (\$100,000)*
It is recommended that funds be recaptured from the DHCD Revolving Loan Program and reallocated to the Tools for Change Micro Loan Program to assist small businesses. The activity will create three jobs for low- to moderate-income individuals.
2. *Carrfour Supportive Housing, Inc. – Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program (\$9,000)*
It is recommended that funds be allocated to Carrfour Supportive Housing, Inc. for the administrative expenses associated with the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program.
3. *City of North Miami Beach – Allen Park Recreation Center Improvements (\$172,491)*
It is recommended that funds be allocated to the City of North Miami Beach Allen Park for the completion of renovations to the Allen Park Recreation Center at 1770 NE 162 Street. The Allen Park project was previously allocated \$200,000 in CDBG funds (R-1284-09 and R-980-10) for improvements to the recreational facility comprised of an indoor court, boxing ring, gymnasium, and activity rooms. As a result of the permit inspection process, the original project scope must be amended to address fire, life safety, and Americans with Disability Act regulations. The expanded project scope will include the installation of a lift/elevator, enclosure of an existing internal staircase, enclosure of mezzanine walkway, and the construction of an enclosed two-story emergency staircase on the exterior of the building. These funds will address existing project funding gaps under the *Finish What We Started* policy.
4. *City of Opa-Locka – Segal Park Improvements (\$2,777,475)*
It is recommended that funds be recaptured from various City of Opa-Locka activities including \$2 million from the Sherbondy Park project for reprogramming to Segal Park Improvements. The Sherbondy Park project had environmental clearance issues which prohibited the utilization of CDBG funds.

The Segal Park Facility Improvement project will consist of the demolition and reconstruction of Helen Miller Center located at 2331 NW 143 Street, in the City of Opa-Locka. The project scope must be amended because the existing structure has deficient structural issues. As such, the project scope will change from rehabilitation to the new construction of an expanded Helen Miller Center. The new recreational facility will consist of a 6,000 square-foot two-story building on the eastern portion of Segal Park. The new center will include a community hall, restroom, kitchen facility, office space, operations rooms, computer center, and fitness center. These funds will address existing project funding gaps under the *Finish What We Started* policy.
5. *Lutheran Services Florida, Inc. – Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program (\$10,000)*
It is recommended that CDBG funds be allocated to the Lutheran Services Florida, Inc. for the administrative expenses associated with the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program.

6. Miami-Dade Park and Recreation - Quail Roost Park Improvements (\$200,000)

It is recommended that funds be recaptured including the allocation from the Ben Shavis Park Improvement project (\$191,275), which is no longer feasible, for reallocation to the Quail Roost Park Improvement project located at 11336 Quail Roost Drive. The project is comprised of a new playground with integral shade elements. The Ben Shavis Park improvement project was originally funded with District 9 Commission District Fund and an allocation by the Perrine Community Advisory Committee.

7. Miami-Dade General Services Administration - Historic Hampton House (\$200,000)

It is recommended that funds be allocated for the restoration of the Historic Hampton House located at 424 NW 27 Avenue. The funds will be utilized for architectural, engineering, and other related fees. The facility will be used as a museum and multipurpose facility and is one of the high priorities of the Model City NRSA. These funds will address existing project funding gaps under the *Finish What We Started* policy.

8. Miami-Dade Public Works - Drainage Improvements for Goulds NRSA (\$264,899)

It is recommended that funds be allocated for drainage, sidewalks, and street improvements in the Goulds NRSA. This is one of the high priorities of the Goulds NRSA for FY 2011. The following are areas in the Goulds NRSA which are eligible for drainage improvements:

- South side of SW 217 Street at SE corner of SW 124 Avenue at large vacant lot;
- North side of SW 217 Street at NE corner of SW 124 Avenue at large vacant lot (This closes gap in existing sidewalk from SW 123 Avenue);
- North side of SW 217 Street from SW 122 Avenue to SW 123 Avenue at front of homes and vacant lots;
- North side of SW 218 Street from SW 122 Avenue to SW 123 Avenue;
- North side of SW 218 Street from SW 123 Avenue to SW 124 Avenue;
- East side of SW 124 Avenue from SW 217 Street to SW 218 Street; and/or
- South side of SW 219 Street from SW 123 Avenue to SW 124 Avenue.

9. Miami-Dade Public Works - Richmond Heights Tree Planting Activity (\$5,000)

It is recommended that \$5,000 be recaptured from the Richmond Heights Facility Improvement project (\$45,000) and reallocated for tree planting within the Richmond Heights area. The Richmond Heights Facility Improvement project was funded with the District 9 Commission District Fund allocation.

10. North Dade Community Development Federal Credit Union - North Dade Community Marketing/Awareness Job-Tech-Assst (\$100,000)

It is recommended that funds be allocated to the North Dade Community Development Federal Credit Union for the provision of an economic development, financial education, and technical assistance program for businesses. This activity will create three jobs for low- to moderate-income individuals.

11. Partners For Self Employment, Inc. - Micro Loan Program (\$100,000)

It is recommended that funds be recaptured from the DHCD Revolving Loan Program and reallocated to the Partners for Self Employment Micro Loan Program to assist small businesses. This activity will create three jobs for low- to moderate-income individuals.

FY 2011 CDBG FUNDS (\$1,954,000)

On June 7, 2011, the BCC approved an amendment to the FY 2011 Action Plan reducing CDBG funds to \$14.582 million from \$17.36 million (Resolution R-446-11). The recommendation contained in R-446-11 was based on a communication by US HUD Miami Field Office of an anticipated 16 percent reduction in CDBG funding resulting from the recently approved FY 2011 federal budget. At that time, the County had not received a formal notification of the final FY 2011 award amount, but all communications indicated that all local jurisdictions were going to receive a proportionate 16 percent reduction. The final US HUD FY 2011 CDBG allocation is \$16.537 million (inclusive of \$252,000 in program income) as opposed to \$14.582 million approved through R-446-11.

As a result of the additional funds allocated by US HUD, it is recommended that funding be allocated proportionately to economic development activities, NRSA high priority projects, and 40 percent for activities managed by County departments (see Exhibit II). In a previous agenda item, R-447-11, prior year CDBG

funds were allocated to offset the 2011 CDBG reduction for public infrastructure/capital improvements and housing-related activities. Therefore, this item is only addressing agencies that applied through the FY 2011 RFA for economic development activities as well as the high priority needs of the NRSAs. Approximately 20 percent of the funds (\$391,000) will be allocated proportionately to the agencies that are funded under the administration category. See Exhibit II.

TOTAL CDBG ALLOCATIONS FOR NRSAs

In an effort to continue increased investment in the NRSAs, this item recommends a total allocation of \$3,916,375 (approximately 66 percent of all reallocations) to address the needs in the NRSAs. As requested by the Economic Development and Social Services Committee, the recapture and reallocation recommendation item was provided to the eight CACs for review and comment. No changes were recommended by the Committees.

HOME FUNDS (\$2,548,779.78)

Staff recommends the recapture of \$2,548,779.78 of HOME funds from activities funded from the FY 2005 through FY 2007 and FY 2010 Action Plans. A majority of the activities have been either completed and the unexpended balances must be recaptured as part of the US HUD required close-out process, or are no longer feasible and have not been able to expend funds in a timely manner. It is recommended that funds be reprogrammed to the following activities:

1. Tower Road Gardens, Ltd. – La Joya Apartments (\$1,041,000)
 This project currently has \$1.041 million in HODAG funds but there are issues at the federal level related to the release of HODAG funds. In order for the project to not stall while US HUD looks into the release of HODAG funds, staff is recommending the replacement of the \$1.041 million in HODAG funding with HOME funds. The project scope is comprised of the acquisition, development, and new construction of a 140 unit affordable housing rental community at the NE Corner of SW 268 Street and SW 143 Avenue, Naranja, FL for low- to moderate-income individuals.
2. Mirabella Associates, Ltd. – Mirabella Apartments (\$1,000,000)
 This project currently has \$1 million in HODAG funds and staff recommends replacing the funding with HOME funds. The project scope is comprised of the new construction of a 204 unit multi-family rental project for low- to moderate-income individuals. The parcel is located on the northwestern corner of SW 128 Avenue and SW 252 Terrace, Princeton, FL.
3. City of Hialeah Gardens – Samari Lakes East Condominium Rehabilitation Project (\$507,779.78)
 It is recommended that \$507,779.78 in HOME funds be allocated to continue the Samari Lakes Rehabilitation project at 10000-10090 NW 80 Court, City of Hialeah Gardens, FL for low- to moderate-income residents. These funds will allow the City to assist 16 additional low- to moderate-income homeowners.

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HODAG FUNDS (\$2,039,301.49)

Staff recommends that \$2,039,301.49 in HODAG funds from Tower Road Gardens, Ltd. and Mirabella Associates, Ltd. be reallocated to the HODAG Reserve fund for future allocation. As mentioned previously, the County is unable to expend HODAG funds because US HUD authorization to release the funds is pending. Staff is working diligently with US HUD to resolve the matter.

ESG FUNDS (\$43,263)

The FY 2011 Action Plan estimated ESG revenues at \$750,000, all of which were awarded to Camillus House, Inc. for the operation of the Beckham Hall Emergency Shelter. The actual US HUD allocation for FY 2011 ESG funds is \$793,263, an increase of \$43,263. It is recommended that the additional funding be allocated to Camillus House to support the Beckham Hall Emergency Shelter.

SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENTS

Staff recommends amendments to CDBG project scopes for the following projects:

1. Department of Housing and Community Development - Elevator Modernization for Elderly Apartments (\$600,000)
It is recommended that the scope be expanded for the Elevator Modernization project to also include Riverside Apartment at 950 SW 1st Street (75 elderly units) and the Gibson Plaza Apartment at 3150 Mundy Street (65 elderly units). The project was funded in the FY 2009 Action Plan for the elevator modernization of the Singer Plaza and Little Havana Apartments (\$600,000). The amended scope will allow DHCD to modernize two elevators in the additional Riverside and Gibson Plaza facilities.
2. South Florida Urban Ministries, Inc. – SFLUM Community Center (\$150,000)
It is recommended that the project scope for the South Florida Urban Ministries, Inc. (SFLUM) – Community Center be changed from renovation work to infrastructure improvements needed for the site. The SFLUM Community Center, located in Commission District 2, provides after school, youth development, and financial stability education services for low- and moderate-income children and families. The Board approved a total of \$150,000 for the project through Resolutions R-179-11, R-446-11, and R-447-11 to fund public facility upgrades to the SFLUM Community Center, including the rehabilitation of a currently vacant building located at 11500 NW 12 Avenue to house afterschool and youth development programs for 60 low- to moderate-income persons.

SFLUM was originally advised by the Florida Department of Health that a permit could be obtained subject to the existing on-site septic system. However, since that time, SFLUM was advised that it will be required to convert from its existing septic system and connect to the County's existing sewer line. Given this new requirement and the associated costs, SFLUM has requested a modification to the Project's original scope of work, thereby enabling SFLUM to utilize the \$150,000 originally awarded for building improvements to cover the costs of connecting to the County's existing sewer lines. The specific work will include design, plan development, permitting, sewer connection costs, landscaping, and lawn irrigation systems. SFLUM has indicated that it will utilize other sources of funds to complete the originally proposed building upgrades, while utilizing its \$150,000 CDBG award to address the required connection to the County's sewer system.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING COUNTY MAYOR OR COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO AMEND THE FY 2005 THROUGH FY 2011 ACTION PLANS TO RECAPTURE AND REALLOCATE \$3,938,866 OF PRIOR YEAR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG), \$2,548,779 OF HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS (HOME), \$2,039,301 OF HOUSING DEVELOPMENT ACTION GRANT (HODAG) PROGRAM FUNDS; AMEND PROJECT SCOPES FOR TWO CDBG FUNDED ACTIVITIES INCLUDING ELEVATOR MODERNIZATION FOR ELDERLY APARTMENTS AND SOUTH FLORIDA URBAN MINISTRIES COMMUNITY CENTER PROJECT; ALLOCATE AN ADDITIONAL \$1.954 MILLION OF FY 2011 CDBG FUNDS TO PARTIALLY RESTORE FUNDING FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES AND ADDRESS HIGH PRIORITY NEEDS OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION STRATEGY AREAS, AND \$43,263 IN ADDITIONAL FY 2011 EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT FUNDS; ADDITIONALLY 40 PERCENT OF THE ADDITIONAL CDBG FUNDING WILL BE ALLOCATED TO ACTIVITIES MANAGED BY COUNTY DEPARTMENTS; AUTHORIZING COUNTY MAYOR OR COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE ALL CONTRACTS, AGREEMENTS AND AMENDMENTS NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT THE ABOVE PROGRAMS; AND AUTHORIZING COUNTY MAYOR OR COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO EXERCISE THE CANCELLATION PROVISIONS CONTAINED THEREIN

WHEREAS, this Board desires to accomplish the purposes outlined in the accompanying memorandum, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to amend the FY 2005 through FY 2011 Action Plans to reflect the recapture, reallocation of \$3,938,866 prior year Community Development

Block Grant (CDBG), \$2,548,779 of Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and \$2,039,301 of Housing Development Action Grant (HODAG) funds, as indicated in Exhibit I; authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to amend project scopes for two CDBG funded activities; authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to allocate an additional \$1.954 million in FY 2011 CDBG funds to partially restore funding to economic development activities and address high priority needs of the Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy (NRSAs) and \$43,263 in additional FY 2011 Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds; authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to execute contracts, agreements and amendments, as are required, following approval by the County Attorney's Office and subject to proper execution by the parties; and to exercise the cancellation provisions contained therein.

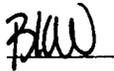

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FRAUD Warning over Medicare scam

Consumer advocates and law-enforcement officials are sounding the alarm about a new phone scam targeting South Florida seniors involving an actress who falsely claims to be Medicare's chief administrator.

Marlene Myerson, of Lake Worth, said she received a phone call from someone claiming to be from Medicare. They said they were sending out new Medicare cards, Myerson said. But when the caller then asked for information about Myerson's bank account number, saying it was required to get the card, she became suspicious and hung up.

A few weeks before Myerson got her call, Kansas City Star columnist C.W. Gusewelle wrote about an almost identical incident in Missouri. Gusewelle's friend's caller not only said her Medicare card being phased out, he warned it would no longer be valid. Bank information was needed, the caller said, to send a replacement.

Millan said it's not uncommon for a Medicare scam to make its way around the country. "Some [plots] are very short-lived," she said. "They'll appear in one state, then pop up few states away, then maybe go away for a year and pop up again."

Chase halts traffic, ends in shooting

The northbound lanes of Interstate 95 from El Portal to near Aventura were closed for at least two hours Thursday night as Miami-Dade detectives chased and then a driver in all began at about 7 p.m. when the Miami-Dade's Tactical Narcotics Team saw a man later identified as Johnny A. Outler, 34, of Hollywood, driving erratically in the area of Northeast 79th Street and Second Avenue, said Roy Harland, a police spokesman.

When detectives stopped Outler's blue Ford Mustang and tried to approach him, he rudely sped up and nearly hit the police officers, a witness said. He sped north on I-95, where he side-swiped an unmarked Miami-Dade police vehicle.

Near Ives Dairy Road he crashed into the outer dividing wall and ran into a wooded area where detectives caught up with him. After police confronted him, an officer shot him in the lower abdomen.

He was taken into custody and brought to a hospital where he remained in stable condition Friday. He was also charged for being a habitual traffic offender. No prior officers were injured.

Schools' turf wars targeted

TALLAHASSEE — A revised proposal to ramp down turf battles among Florida's state universities won approval on Friday from a Panel of Governors' members following the removal of a contentious provision that would have split the 12 schools into eight regions.

The Strategic Planning Committee, though recommended the full board re-write the regulations due to significant changes when it meets next month, backing up final action until November.

Those modifications include scrapping the regional provision.

It would have required schools proposing new academic programs in other regions to seek approval from presidents of local universities.

The new version would require universities to submit plans for all new off-campus programs to State University System Chancellor Frank Whaley.

Any plans, Bragg rejects could be appealed in a special committee of board members.

The planning panel, meeting at the University of Central Florida in Orlando, also approved two related but non-controversial regulations on environmental education and educational work. One of those also was recommended for re-advisement as it, too, was significantly changed.

Whaley said the regulations will "help us better organize the system going forward, while at the same time still allowing for all of the appropriate executive, innovation and opportunity that our system is known for providing."

A working group of board members and university officials Monday had directed officers to re-examine the regional provision and make other changes in the academic coordination regulations.

Florida State University President Eric Narman said in an interview earlier this week that the new version was better, but he still wasn't happy with giving up some of his school's autonomy.

"We've had a state-wide mission freeze," Narman said.

"There's no debate the fact that the 12 universities have a state-wide economic mission."
