Subject: Appointment and Re-appointment of Agricultural Practices Advisory Board
Members.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) take the following actions for appointment and reappointment of Agricultural Practices Advisory Board members:

- A. Appoint William H. Losner to represent the Tropical Fruit Crop Industry (Seat No. 1) as recommended by the Florida Avocado Administrative Committee; and
- B. Reappoint Diego Rodriguez to represent the Tropical Fruit Crop Industry (Seat No. 2) as recommended by the Tropical Fruit Growers of South Florida, Inc.; and
- C. Reappoint Sam S. Accursio to represent the Vegetable Industry (Seat No. 1) as recommended by the Dade County Farm Bureau; and
- D. Reappoint Martin R. Motes, Ph.D., to represent the Redland Citizens Association as recommended by the Redland Citizens Association, Inc.

Scope

The Agricultural Practices Advisory Board has a countywide impact.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

There is no fiscal impact to the County.

Track Record/Monitor

Mark Woerner, Assistant Director in the Department of Regulatory and Economic Resources (RER), oversees staff support of the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board.

Background

The Agricultural Practices Advisory Board consists of thirteen members representing a variety of agricultural industries. Section 2-935, Code of Miami-Dade County, requires that the BCC fill vacancies occurring on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board. By Code, each nominating organization must submit for BCC review a minimum of one nominee for their vacant position(s), the nominee's resume and the minutes of the organization's meeting at which the nominee was selected. The required documentation for each of the following nominees is attached.

- Fruit Crop Industry Representative Seat No. 1

The Florida Avocado Administrative Committee provided a first choice nomination and second choice nomination for the Fruit Crop Industry Seat No. 1. Mr. William Losner was nominated by the Florida Avocado Administrative Committee as their first choice nominee for this appointment. Mr. Losner currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Dade County Farm Bureau. Mr. Losner previously served on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board from 1994 to 1996 and from 2001 to 2008, having served as Vice-Chair of the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board from 2004 to 2006. Mr. Losner has several years of experience in the banking industry as well as several years of community service in Miami-Dade County.

Mr. Gary Dufek was nominated by the Florida Avocado Administrative Committee as their second choice nominee for this appointment. Mr. Dufek is the current Florida Avocado Administrative Committee representative to the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board and his term will expire on December 31, 2012. Mr. Dufek has served as a member of the Citizen's Transportation Advisory Council, Community Council 14, has experience as a realtor, a zoning and tax consultant, and as a property manager and farmer.

- Fruit Crop Industry Representative Seat No. 2

Mr. Diego Rodriguez was nominated by the Tropical Fruit Growers of South Florida, Inc. to serve a second term on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board. Mr. Rodriguez is a third generation shade tobacco farmer. He received his undergraduate degree in agronomy, owns a pine tree farm in Gadsden County, FL, and currently has approximately 600 acres of avocados, mangos, mamey and papaya which his company packs and sells from Florida City.


- Vegetable Industry Representative Seat No. 1

Mr. Sam Accursio is currently one of two vegetable industry representatives on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board and has been nominated by the Dade County Farm Bureau to a second term. Mr. Accursio is the owner and operator of Sam S. Accursio and Sons Farms, a vegetable farm which produces squash, beans and pickles. Mr. Accursio has served on the Board of Directors of the Dade County Farm Bureau, and has been a member of the Miami-Dade County Cooperative Extension Service's Vegetable Advisory Committee, the Florida Fruit & Vegetable Association, and the Florida Nursery, Growers & Landscape Association.

- Redland Citizens Association Representative

Dr. Martin Motes was nominated by the Redland Citizens Association to serve a second term on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board. Dr. Motes is the founder and owner of Motes Orchids located in The Redland. Dr. Motes has undergraduate and graduate degrees in English, and has several years of experience in horticulture. Dr. Motes has served as an editor, chairman, instructor and international consultant, and has an extensive list of publications primarily regarding Orchids.

The terms for the appointment and re-appointments begin on January 1, 2013 and will expire on December 31, 2016.

WHEREAS, Section 2-933 of the Code of Miami-Dade County specifically provides for the designated organizations to recommend at least one nominee; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Diego Rodriguez completed his first term as the Fruit Crop Industry Representative No. 2 on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board and is eligible for a second term; and

WHEREAS, the Tropical Fruit Growers of South Florida, Inc. has recommended Mr. Diego Rodriguez to a second term as the Fruit Crop Industry Representative No. 2 on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Martin R. Motes, Ph.D. completed his first term as the Redland Citizens Association Representative on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board and is eligible for a second term; and

WHEREAS, the Redland Citizens Association, Inc. has recommended Mr. Martin R. Motes, Ph.D. to a second term as the Redland Citizens Association Representative on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Sam S. Accursio completed his first term as the Vegetable Industry Representative No. 1 on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board and is eligible for a second term; and

WHEREAS, the Dade County Farm Bureau has recommended Mr. Sam S. Accursio to a second term as the Vegetable Industry Representative No. 1 on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Avocado Administrative Committee has recommended Mr. William H. Losner as their first choice nominee and Mr. Gary J. Dufek as their second choice nominee to serve as the Tropical Fruit Crops Industry Representative No. 1 on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, Section 2-935 of the Code of Miami-Dade County directs that vacancies on the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board shall be filled by the Board of County Commissioners,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that with respect to the Agricultural Practices Advisory Board, Mr. Diego Rodriguez is hereby reappointed for a second term to the Fruit Crop Industry Representative No. 2 seat; Mr. Martin R. Motes, Ph.D. is hereby reappointed for a second term to the Redland Citizens Association Representative seat; Mr. Sam Accursio is hereby reappointed for a second term to the Vegetable Industry Representative No. 1 seat; and Mr. William Losner is hereby appointed to the Tropical Fruit Crops Industry Representative No. 1 seat. Each individual listed above is hereby appointed to serve one four-year term beginning on January 1, 2013 and ending on December 31, 2016.

Tuesday, Sept 4, 2012

Butler called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m.

All guests were welcomed.

State Tax Advisory Committee: Jim Pierce met with committee and reported on FB polices, sales tax, Ag taxes. Bob Epling thanked Jim Pierce for his time and efforts serving on the FFB Tax Committee.

Ag Patrol: Capt. Rasmussen reported on the activity of the summer months. He reminded everyone to send in their watch order requests.

County Ag Manager: Charles LaPradd reported on the 2012/2013 County Budget. Agriculture is included in the budget proposal. Storm Water Utility Fee/Exempt for Agriculture/ Ag with residence is not exempt. County Attorney is reviewing. USDR program is still going. Specialty Crop grant of \$30,000 is an item added to budget proposal. Community grassroots effort needed if it is to be approved.

Extension Director: Teresa Olyzk, announced that there will be a public hearing on Sept 6, 2012 for public comments. Evaluation after Tropical Storm Isaac, USDA, FSA and County reported no major damage. Workshop for Farm Labor Supervisors will be held at Extension on Sept 11. CEU's will be offered. All pesticide applicators (Landscape) need to be certified by January 1, 2014. Courses will be held at the Extension. Notify FNGLA organization, Green Industry BMP's.

Bylaws Committee: Kelvin Moreno, Chairman gave a power point presentation that was viewed by BOD. EC Committee reviewed the Bylaws draft and ratified the bylaws draft and presented to the BOB. Discussion ensued.

Bill Losner moved that the Bylaws committee's ratifications are adopted as presented. Larry Dunagan seconded. Discussion ensued. Teena Borek discussed (non-voting members). After discussion motion on the floor remained to approve. Motion carried unanimously.

The Bylaws will change the procedure for elections this year. The reason is that with the Bylaws revision all the board members were assigned either a 1 or 2 year term by the drawing of straws, commencing this upcoming year starting with the annual meeting.

Bylaws are ratified by the Board of Directors effective immediately.

Debbie Brady provided the Treasurer's report and Budget 2012/2013 that was approved by Executive Committee and included the board packet. Budget amended to include salary increases for Staff in 2012. Bill Losner moved to approve the Treasurer's report and Budget 2012/2013. David Kaplan seconded. Motion carried.

Debbie Brady and George Butler presented the board with a letter of resignation from Jessica Borek. Mrs. Borek resigned her office of treasurer and board position. Letter attached.

Debbie Brady presented the secretary's report as emailed. Larry Dunagan moved to approve. Motion carried.

Ray Timmons announced that membership quota needs to be 100% by September 30.

Peter Schnebly provided the PAC Committee report. The committee suggestions for contributions were discussed and approved. Report attached. Florida Farm Bureau will be contacted with committee suggestions for contributions for candidates around the state. Report attached.

Tom Reider reported on the Marketing and Public Relations Committee: An article written by Tom was published and posted to our website highlighting South Dade Agriculture. He is working with Florida Trend Magazine on an article to be published in November 2012. South Beach Food & Wine Festival has requested our organization sponsor in the event February 2013. The Women's Committee will assist with the event if the proposal request is accepted. The proposal is for in-kind sponsorship of local produce.

Farm Family of the Year: Nominations from the EC Committee is to honor The Joseph LaRocca Family. Teena Borek moved to accept the nominee. Robert Moehling seconded. All in Favor. Motion carried.

Annual Meeting: After discussion the annual meeting date is set for Tuesday, October 30, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. at Redland Golf & Country Club.

Florida Farm Bureau sent a packet of information delivered by Bob Richardson on the conversion of Dade County Farm Bureau, LAA to Dade County Farm Bureau, Incorporation.

Bill Losner moved to proceed with the conversion with the assistance of Florida Farm Bureau. Kelvin Moreno seconded. The vote was unanimous and approved. Debbie Brady will contact FFB, Bob Richardson and complete the documentation, by December 1, 2012.

Miami Dade County Ag Practices Board: Dade County Farm Bureau's seat on this board is up for reappointment. Currently Sam Accursio serves and this committee. Mr. Accursio was chosen by the

Board of Directors to be the nominee for our position on this board. Debbie Brady will contact Mr. Mark Woerner, AICP Assistant Director, Miami Dade County with a letter from President George Butler.


Roundtable Discussion:

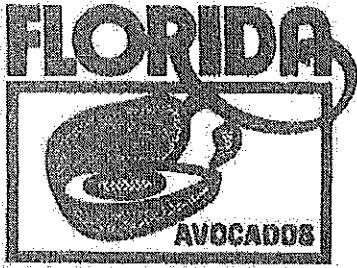

The Vice-Chairman welcomed the Committee members and guests.

The September monthly minutes was presented for approval. A motion was made by Ms. Krome and seconded by Mr. Losner to accept the minutes as presented. The vote on the motion was unanimous.

The September financial statement was submitted for approval. A motion was made by Mr. Losner and seconded by Ms. Krome to accept the September financial statement as presented. The vote on the motion was unanimous.

AG PATROL REPORT

Lt. DiBernardo began the Ag. Patrol report by giving an update on the arrest and recovery statistics for the previous month. Lt. DiBernardo encouraged those present to secure their equipment and to "tag" or "mark" it with a number or symbol to help ID stolen goods. Lt. DiBernardo ended her report by stating that if members of the Committee are unable to reach an Ag Patrol officer to report a theft, to please call "911" to report the crime. She continued that the report would be forwarded to her office and would be followed up on. She stated that because of the way officers in the Ag Patrol unit were scheduled - circumstances kept them from answering every call. After a brief question and answer session, the Ag. Patrol report was completed.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS - NONEMANAGER REPORT

The Vice-Chairman requested that the Manager, Mr. Flinn give his report. The Manager began his report by stating that Miami-Dade County had requested that the appointment of Mr. Bill Losner and the alternate, Mr. Gary Dufek, to the Ag Practices Board be recorded in the Avocado Committee monthly minutes for documentation. These persons will attend meetings, not as representatives of the Avocado Committee, and report areas of concern to the avocado industry to the Committee.

Mr. Flinn continued with his report by informing the Committee that he had completed the test for the Choquette variety for maturity and date on 24 oz. fruit for this season with favorable results. He continued that he would repeat the testing next season to add to the data needed to make changes to the maturity schedule. This concluded the **Manager's Report.**

OLD BUSINESS

The Vice-Chairman requested the Manager present the old business from last month's meeting. The Manager reminded the Committee that at the last meeting an issue concerning the packing and shipping of #2 fruit out of the production area would be tabled until this meeting.

The Vice-Chairman opened the floor for further discussion on this matter. The Manager stated that the issues at the last meeting were: 1) if regulations were changed, would the Florida avocado industry be able to compete with off shore fruit; 2) that US Comb fruit sent to markets in the larger cities on the east coast be underpriced because of over shipment of #2 fruit; and, 3) the flooding of markets with #2 fruit impacting sales of Florida avocado in all markets.

Several Committee members voiced their opinions on this issue. The majority of those speaking felt that quality of fruit was the number one issue. They continued that the reputation of the Florida avocado industry had been established over many years and the shipping of #2 fruit lowered that standard. The Committee members also stated that the lower prices of #2 fruit impacted the pricing for all Florida avocados. They felt that shipping US Comb fruit out of the production area would cause all fruit being shipped, whether off shore or domestic, to meet a higher standard.

The Vice-Chairman inquired if the Committee was ready to call the motion. The Committee members stated they were ready to make a motion. A motion was made by Mr. Brooks and seconded by Ms. Krome to change the minimum grade from a US #2 to a US Combination for fruit grown in the production area shipped to destinations outside the production area. The minimum grade for fruit shipped to destinations within the production area would continue to be US #2. This change is not intended to be applied to avocados being imported into the United States. The Manager, Mr. Flinn, took a "voice" vote of the Committee members seated for this meeting. The results of the "voice" vote were nine in favor of the motion and one against. The motion passed. This concluded the **Old Business** of the agenda.

NEW BUSINESS

The Vice-Chairman introduced Mr. Stewart Swanson, Team Leader for the Best Management Practices for Water Quality/Quantity, University of Florida, to give his presentation.

Mr. Swanson thanked the Committee for the opportunity to give an overview of the Best Management Practices for the most effective and practical means for maintaining or improving water quality.

He continued that BMP's typically are implemented in combination to prevent, reduce or treat pollutant discharges. This program promotes BMP's for specialty fruit and nut crop operations in Florida. These practiced are designated primarily to protect water quality, but

some of the BMP's will also have water conservation benefits. Mr. Swanson continued that this program is voluntary with no fees for the program.

Mr. Swanson distributed his business card and left several booklets giving detailed information about the BMP's for Florida Specialty Fruit and Nut Crops. For more information, please contact Mr. Swanson at stew@ufl.edu. After a brief question and answer session, Mr. Swanson concluded his presentation.

The Vice-Chairman introduced Mr. David Boas, CPA, and requested he give his report. Mr. Boas stated that he had completed the annual financial audit for the 2011/2012 season on behalf of the Avocado Administrative Committee. Mr. Boas continued that he had followed the standard audit procedures and had also adhered to those standards set by the USDA Yellow Book Audit. Mr. Boas stated that he found the Avocado Committee's financial records to be presented in a concise and organized fashion, and that the checks and cross checks were found to be correct and without error. Mr. Boas commended the staff for their careful and detailed keeping of the records for the Avocado Committee. With no questions of Mr. Boas, his report was concluded. The Vice-Chairman thanked Mr. Boas for his assistance in compiling the annual financial report of the Avocado Committee and his attendance at the meeting. This concluded the **New Business** portion of the agenda.

With no other business to be discussed, the meeting of the Avocado Committee was adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting Notes

August 9, 2012

Present

This was the first meeting back at the Cooperative Extension building. Our thanks go out to TREC and Jonathan for allowing TFGSF to hold its monthly meetings at the TREC location for these last few years.

New Business

Ag Patrol report

Sgt. Garcia reported that the Ag Patrol unit received 120 calls in July compared. Twenty four of those calls resulted in arrest, ten of which were felonies – mostly trespassing, two individuals for battery. There have been a lot of thefts of mango, many at the Lyons grove. Dr. Lyons has a perimeter alarm system and this has resulted in the increase of these cases. Several growers asked for more information on these alarm systems, and the Sgt. said he would send us information. (This system is from Elite Security Alarms at 1-888-809-5266).

They are finding a new pattern of theft of Kubota tractors and side-by-sides; eight vehicles in two weeks. This pattern has been seen elsewhere in the state.

Sgt. Garcia informed us that the Florida Division of Forestry has removed the power of arrest from Metro Dade PD for burning. Now all enforcement of burn piles and permitting will be enforced by Div of Forestry. There has been a lot of abuse of burn piles to avoid tipping fees.

Commercial Growers Forum

Harry thanked Jonathan for coming out to his grove to address the problem he has been having with the Sri Lanka beetle. This beetle is a big problem in Palm Beach County land is mostly found in the marl soils of Dade County. Hosts are mango, lychee, longan, citrus and others. Use Biovector (a beneficial nematode) to control the larval stage.

There was a discussion on the effects on plants of various pests.

Growers should be careful when applying oil sprays in high heat due to the chance of burning leaves.

Steve has used Neem oil on his organic farm to effectively treat bark scale.

Secretary report

The July minutes were distributed. No objections. Minutes accepted.

Treasurers Report

The financials were presented. No objections or comments. Accepted.

Avocado, LWD, & Red Bay Ambrosia beetle update

Jonathan reports that they have identified 27 finds of Laurel Wilt disease and possibly more on adjacent trees. This is among 6-7 groves.

Jonathan advises when scouting your trees to:

1. Recognize symptoms (wilted, or dead leaves)
2. Look for beetle holes in trunk and on branches
3. Take samples and have identified

There are three fungicides that will control the disease. USDA and TREC have duplicated avocado trees in the plant collections n and are sending them to Hawaii.

Researchers are continuing to look for effective ways to control this pest and disease. They are looking at:

- stickers that will prolong the life of the insecticides
- repellents
- trap and kill systems

They have found nothing yet to attract the specific beetle. They are investigating new barriers such as white wash and stickers.

Jonathan again stresses that early detection and suppression are the best methods to deal with this pests and disease. Keep trees healthy, as unhealthy trees attract other ambrosia beetles. There is evidence that other ambrosia beetles may also carry the disease.

Ag Manager Repot

Charles could not attend the meeting. He ask Louise to report the following for him"

1. Remind growers that voting is August 14, 2012
2. There will be a Mayors meeting on August 23.
3. The FSA is reviewing the NAP claims from the loss of fruit due to the warm winter. The State office is auditing the Florida City office.
4. There has been money awarded for avocado research through the Specialty Crop grant

Ag Practices

Diego told the group of the Ag Practices discussion on the following topics:

1. Natural Forest Communities – The committee continues to convince the County to tax property owners of lands that are designated as natural Forest Communities at the lowest tax rate possible as the property owners cannot use that land for agriculture.
2. Wetlands – State and Federal regulations exempt agriculture lands from wetlands designation.
3. Potable Water Sources – the Committee is trying to resolve the conflict between County and State regulations regarding testing for *E. coli* to obtain water permits.

Louise told the group she has been contacted by the County that Diego's term on the Ag Practices Board is up in December. She was told that she would be contacted by someone from the County with more details to reappoint Diego or to nominate a new person. Louise said in the past the County requires that our minutes reflect the nomination of the representative.

Motion: Harry – move to reappoint Diego as the TFGSF Ag Practices representative.

2nd: Louise

Vote – unanimous

Motion carries.

Louise will take care of the paperwork when it arrives.

Pest Update

Jonathan suggests using insecticidal soaps to control White Flies. Use oils when it is not so hot.

Meetings & conferences

None new to report.

Update on Imported Lychees

Steve said he had received calls from State and Federal officials. Steve restated his concerns:

- Imported lychees are arriving into the US that have been sprayed with sulfites, which is illegal
- They have received reports of brightly colored lychees arriving in California – an indication of treated fruit
- These ports are Long Beach, Oakland, Seattle and Vancouver

The FDA had misunderstood Steve previous call and believed that the problem was of importation of treated fruit coming into Florida, not the West coast of the US. They would alert the USDA inspectors, but also conceded that there are very few inspectors at the posts. They have a list of previous violators.

Diego added that there is funding now to train inspectors at the border in Florida and California.

Last Minute Items

Steve said that since there have been no comments received from the membership of the new bylaws, to let the minutes reflect the bylaws have been accepted.

Meeting adjourned at 7:15 pm.



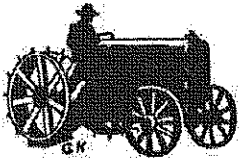


