



Subject: Executive Summary for the FY 2013 – 2017 Consolidated Plan - FY 2013 Action Plan
Funding Recommendations

Miami-Dade County (the County) was required to submit its Consolidated Plan (the Plan), FY 2013 Action Plan (annual update), to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (U.S. HUD), by November 15, 2012, in accordance with U.S. HUD's Consolidated Submissions for Community Planning and Development programs. However, U.S. HUD approved an extension to February 4, 2013. The County has requested an additional extension beyond the February 4, 2013 deadline which is pending approval by U.S. HUD. Public Housing and Community Development (PHCD) began preparations for the development of the Plan by issuing a Consolidated Request for Applications (RFA) immediately following the September 6, 2012 Board of County Commissioners approval of the FY 2013 - 2017 Consolidated Plan and Policy for expenditure of FY 2013 funds. Completion of the Plan requires the collection of Commissioner District Fund allocations however, this process is still pending. There was also additional review of housing applications due to issues associated with the terms of the loans.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

This item seeks approval from the Board on the following:

1. Approve and authorize submission of the FY 2013 Annual Action Plan to US HUD;
2. Approve funding recommendations identified in Exhibit I for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program activities;
3. Authorize the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to allocate CDBG and HOME program income funds to projects also identified in Exhibit I.
4. Approve allocation of HOME funds for rental assistance and rehabilitation of a homeless facility to the Community Action and Human Services Department and Homeless Trust, respectively; and
5. Authorize the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to execute conditional loan commitments, contracts, agreements, and loan documents necessary to fulfill the purpose of this resolution.

SUMMARY

Miami-Dade County is committed to continuing to serve the low- and moderate-income residents and neighborhoods throughout the County and achieving the U.S. HUD National Objective. The County continues to work with its community development partners to enhance its programs and to better meet the public service, economic development, historic preservation, housing, and capital improvement needs of low- and moderate-income residents and neighborhoods. Attachment D to this memorandum presents detailed discussions and tables on programs and activities that will benefit from the award of FY 2013 funding sources.

Subject: FY 2013 – 2017 Consolidated Plan - FY 2013 Action Plan Funding Recommendations

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the FY 2013 Action Plan, the annual update to the FY2013-2017 Consolidated Plan, and the FY 2013 Funding Recommendations as identified in Exhibit I for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to allocate CDBG and HOME program income funds to projects also identified in Exhibit I.

It is recommended that the Board approve the allocation of HOME funds to the Community Action Human Services Department (CAHSD) and the Homeless Trust (HT), respectively for rental assistance and rehabilitation of a homeless facility. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to submit the FY 2013 Action Plan to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (U.S. HUD), which requires an additional extension beyond the February 4, 2013 deadline approved by U.S. HUD (Attachment A), and to execute all conditional commitments, contracts, agreements and amendments necessary to implement the FY 2013 Action Plan, with an effective date of January 1, 2013, for CDBG, HOME, and ESG funding.

SCOPE

Exhibit I includes the proposed funding recommendations for the FY 2013 Action Plan and the Commission District location the recommended agencies propose to serve.

PURPOSE OF THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN AND ACTION PLAN

Miami-Dade County is required to submit a Consolidated Plan to US HUD in accordance with the Consolidated Submissions for Community Planning and Development programs (24 CFR Parts 91.1 through 91.600). Public Housing and Community Development Department (PHCD), which is Miami-Dade County's lead agency for the coordination of the Consolidated Plan, follows the rule to submit a single consolidated submission for the planning and application aspects of the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs.

The annual Action Plan summarizes the allocation of funds to federal and non-federal projects to address priority need activities that achieve the U.S. HUD National Objective of benefiting low-to moderate-income areas, families, and/or individuals. The annual Action Plan summarizes the activities to be undertaken, the US HUD National Objective to be achieved, the geographic distribution of activities, homeless and special needs activities, and other actions taken to address the objectives of the Consolidated Plan. In addition, the Action Plan is updated throughout the program year as funds are reprogrammed by the Board.

CHALLENGES OF THE 2013 ACTION PLAN

One of the primary challenges faced by Miami-Dade County in the past year has been the failure to comply with U.S. HUD's 1.5 CDBG expenditure ratio. Under the provisions of CDBG regulation 24 CFR 570.902, a timeliness test is conducted annually, 60 days prior to the end of the program year. A grantee is considered timely if the balance in the line of credit does not exceed 1.5 times the annual grant. U.S. HUD measures Miami-Dade County's expenditure ratio on November 2nd of each year.

On November 16, 2012, the County received correspondence from U.S. HUD advising that the line of credit had a balance of 2.8 times its annual grant, amounting to \$29,698,842. Accordingly, the County was advised that it was non-compliant with the timeliness standard, and is under corrective action for failure to meet the U.S. HUD timeliness ratio. The County must achieve U.S. HUD's 1.5 expenditure ratio (\$15,904,315 as of November 2, 2012) by November 2, 2013 to avoid a reduction in its FY 2014 CDBG award. The potential reduction amount will not be known until the November 2, 2013 measurement date.

As part of its corrective action strategy, the County is requiring agencies with performance and/or compliance issues to resolve them as a condition of future awards. Actual award of FY 2013 CDBG funds shall be contingent upon a favorable resolution of all pending performance and/or compliance issues. The County's corrective action plan includes the option of only funding shovel ready housing development projects. The FY 2013 Consolidated RFA process included a requirement for all housing development projects to undergo an independent preliminary feasibility review (PFR). Projects and activities that demonstrate an immediate readiness to proceed will continue to be prioritized as well as prioritization for agencies that have demonstrated the organizational capacity to complete their activities in a timely manner. Some of the measures we are exploring to expedite expenditure of funds and achieving compliance with the timeliness ratio include:

- Changing the entitlement year from a January - December calendar cycle to an October - September fiscal year cycle (if federal regulations permit).
- Seeking an expedited governance process for CDBG funds that would allow for shorter time to implement contracts.

Additionally, the County is assessing all projects that are significantly behind their initial completion date to determine if projects can move forward or if the funds should be recaptured. We have been reviewing all of our projects to determine the cause of any delays. The County continues to work with participating jurisdictions on their delayed projects, legislative process and other governance issues. A number of projects experienced procurement delays which were addressed and are now ready to move forward. In addition, we are currently working with U.S. HUD's contractor who has begun a comprehensive technical assistance strategy to enhance our processes and results.

This Action Plan also renews the County's commitment to utilize its annual federal awards in a manner that will result in significant and sustainable redevelopment efforts in low- to moderate-income communities. Consistent with this renewed commitment, this Action Plan seeks to prioritize critical capital improvements, housing needs, and services in the County's Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Areas (NRSAs) and eligible block groups. Under this Action Plan, strong consideration was also given to projects and activities that scored highest in their respective categories. In most cases, these projects and activities achieved significant leveraging of the County's federal funds, met an underserved need, demonstrated a readiness to proceed, and are being implemented by seasoned, experienced agencies and developers with the capacity to achieve the national objective, adhere to federal reporting requirements, and successfully manage the completion of the activity. In addition, for Home Investment Partnerships funds allocated toward the construction or rehabilitation of affordable housing, the County will not enter into a funding contract with the developer until the developer provides to the County written financing commitments covering the project's entire development cost. Following the Board approval of the funding commitments recommended in Exhibit I, the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee will

issue a conditional loan commitment of Home Investment Partnerships funds toward the development of the project. This conditional loan commitment will require numerous milestones to be met by the Developer prior to the County entering into a funding contract and will expire within six months unless renewed by the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee. The conditional loan commitment is attached to this resolution as Attachment B.

FY 2013-2017 CONSOLIDATED PLANNING PROCESS POLICIES

On September 6, 2012, the Board approved the FY 2013-2017 Consolidated Plan through Resolution No. R-692-12. The FY 2013-2017 Consolidated Plan is the strategic plan intended for implementation in the FY 2013 Consolidated Request for Application (RFA) process.

The FY 2013 Action Plan was developed with participation from the Community Advisory Committees (CACs), community residents, and both the public and private sectors. This plan reflects the input gathered from neighborhood meetings, community-based organizations (CBOs), community development corporations (CDCs), municipalities, and County departments.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS

U.S. HUD regulations require the County to hold a minimum of two public hearings at different stages of the Planning Process. The first public hearing allows for input from citizens on housing and community development needs. On September 6, 2012, the first required public hearing was held before the Board to obtain public comments about the FY 2013-2017 Consolidated Plan that formed the basis for the FY 2013 Action Plan recommendations. The second public hearing, which is intended to obtain public comments about the FY 2013 Action Plan funding recommendations, is scheduled for February 11, 2013 at which time the proposed FY 2013 Action Plan will be considered by the Housing and Social Services Committee (HSSC).

U.S. HUD requires that the FY 2013 Action Plan be made available for public comments for 30 calendar days prior to the final adoption of the funding recommendations by the Board. On December 20, 2012, the County issued a public notice informing the public of the availability of the FY 2013 Action Plan funding recommendations through a notice published in *The Miami Herald* and posting the notice via PHCD's website and to the CACs. A revised notice of public comment period was advertised in the Friday, January 11, 2013 issue of the Miami Herald. The 30 day public comment period for the FY 2013 Action Plan recommendations is from January 20, 2013 through February 18, 2013.

To ensure participation PHCD and the Community Action and Human Services Department (CAHS) held 62 public community meetings, workshops, and training events from January 10, 2012 - December 12, 2012 to increase program awareness, monitor performance of ongoing activities, and to identify priorities in the Commission districts, Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Areas and eligible block groups. Attachment C to this document identifies the meeting dates and locations.

In addition, PHCD conducted two (2) technical assistance workshops before the issuance of the Consolidated Request for Applications (RFA) in conjunction with Training and Development Associates, Inc., a U.S. HUD consultant. The purpose of these technical assistance workshops were to build organizational capacity and help organizations better compete for funding. Post issuance of the RFA, PHCD conducted technical assistance workshops for entities that were interested in applying for funding. Concurrent with the Selection Committee review and scoring process, Training and Development Associates, Inc. conducted a random threshold review of applications submitted for federal funding as a quality control check of the selection committee's scoring process and to ensure the committee adhered to the federal rules.

FY 2013 FUNDING SOURCES

In previous years recommendations presented to the Board for approval included federal funded programs, CDBG, HOME, ESG, and the state-funded Documentary Stamp Surtax (Surtax) program. It is important to note that the issuance of the County's FY 2013 RFA included federal and state funding sources to prevent duplication of funding and/or funding an activity in excess of its actual needs. The FY 2013 Action Plan federal funding recommendations are being presented in a bifurcated fashion because inclusion of federal and state funding recommendations in one agenda item would have subjected Surtax funded activities to a thirty day public comment period that only pertains to federally funded projects. A combined recommendation would have greatly jeopardized the County's ability to benefit from the award of nine percent (9%) Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTCs) for preservation of public housing developments through extensive rehabilitation. Table 1 below summarizes only those federal funding sources that were available in the FY 2013 Action Plan:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

On July 3, 2012, the Board approved Resolution No. R-596-12 directing the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to allocate CDBG funds to NRSAs. Additionally, the Board directed the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to target CDBG funds to NRSAs by doing the following with respect to the forty percent (40%) allocation of CDBG funds not allocated to County Departments or the administration of the program:

- A minimum of fifty percent (50%) of CDBG funds must be utilized for economic development activities;
- Any allocation to Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department and Public Works and Waste Management Department or other infrastructure projects must go to NRSAs and not exceed more than fifty percent (50%) of the total project cost with exception for CDBG funds awarded to any infrastructure project that has been previously approved by the NRSA Community Advisory Committee as part of that NRSA's Strategic Plan shall not be subject to the fifty percent (50%) limitation; and
- Any allocation of CDBG funds recommended for infrastructure projects outside of the NRSAs must be approved by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board and the CDBG allocation may not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of total project cost.

Funding Recommendations to County Departments for CDBG Funds

Miami-Dade County departments are recommended to receive \$4,244,000, or forty percent (40%), of the estimated FY 2013 CDBG allocation to undertake activities that benefit low-to-moderate income residents in the NRSAs and eligible block groups, as reflected in Table 2.

HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)

On May 8, 2012, the U.S. HUD issued CPD Notice 12-007 which provides operating guidance for implementing the FY 2012 HOME Appropriation Requirements. The Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act of 2012 (P.L. 112-55) imposed new requirements on projects that received HOME funds for FY 2012 and subsequent years. The purpose of these requirements is to improve project and developer selection by participating jurisdictions and to ensure that there is adequate market demand for the prospective HOME projects.

The following summarizes significant changes in the HOME program that were implemented in FY 2012 and how these changes will impact both the County's administration of its HOME program funds as well as an agency's organizational structure and project implementation strategies:

1. The County must repay any HOME funds invested in projects that are not completed within four (4) years of the commitment date.
2. The County may only commit HOME funds to a project after it has underwritten the project, assessed the developer capacity and fiscal soundness of the developer being funded, and examined the market conditions to ensure that there is demonstrated market demand for the HOME project.
3. The County must convert any HOME homeownership unit that has not been sold to an eligible homebuyer within six months of construction completion to a HOME-assisted rental unit.
4. The County may only provide HOME funds for development activities to Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs) that have demonstrated that they have staff with development experience. As a CHDO, the entity must demonstrate the requisite staff, fiscal, and real estate development capacity to carry out the proposed project.

The FY 2013 HOME program funding available is estimated at \$8.3 million. The HOME program provides funds for permanent and construction loans, homeless housing and related assistance, to assist very low- and low-to-moderate income families to purchase or rent affordable housing units. It should be noted that, due to existing for-sale housing market conditions, the FY 2013 Action Plan does not propose the funding of new homeownership construction activities, consistent with FY 2011 and FY 2012. PHCD procured the underwriting firm Seltzer Management Group, Inc. of Panama City Beach, Florida to conduct preliminary feasibility reviews of proposals submitted for housing activities. For projects recommended for funding, final funding approval shall be conditioned upon a *full feasibility and underwriting analysis*, which will be completed prior to financial closing and the release of funds.

Funding Recommendations to County Departments for HOME Funds

Table 3 summarizes the County departments recommended for FY 2013 HOME funds for rehabilitation of facilities to continue housing and services to the homeless and for rental assistance projects:

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)

As reflected in Table 4, a total of \$1,300,000 of FY 2013 ESG funds is available for allocation. PHCD recommends Citrus Health Network, Inc. receive \$550,000 for their Housing Assistance Network of Dade (HAND) program and Camillus House, Inc. receive \$750,000 for the operations of the Beckham Hall Emergency Shelter facility.

PROJECTS NOT RECOMMENDED FOR FUNDING

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

In an effort to effectively utilize funds, several agencies were not recommended for funding because the principals of the agency have been previously approved for activities that are now liabilities to Miami-Dade County. Liability activities are projects awarded federal funds in prior years for which Miami-Dade County may be subject to repayment to HUD for one or more of the following reasons: 1) agency spent awarded funds and failed to meet the national objective and/or proof of beneficiaries, or 2) agency has performance issues and lacks capacity to successfully draw funds, 3) agency has open investigative

issues, and 4) principals applied under new business entity names, but have unresolved past performance and repayment issues for old failed projects.

These activities are clearly identified and footnoted in Exhibit I, and reflect the entities that have pending compliance issues with PHCD. If funds are allocated via Commission District Funds, the actual award of funds shall be contingent upon a favorable resolution of all pending compliance issues. The following agencies have existing liability issues and concerns:



RESOLUTION APPROVING THE FY 2013 ACTION PLAN FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS AND UPDATES TO THE FY 2013-2017 CONSOLIDATED PLAN; AUTHORIZING THE FILING WITH THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT (U.S. HUD) MIAMI-DADE COUNTY'S FY 2013 ACTION PLAN WITH PROJECTED USES OF FUNDS FOR FY 2013 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG), HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS (HOME), THE EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT (ESG) PROGRAMS AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) PROGRAM INCOME AND HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM INCOME FUNDS

WHEREAS, this Board desires to accomplish the purposes outlined in the accompanying memorandum, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

Section 1. The Board ratifies and adopts the matters set forth in the foregoing recitals and in the accompanying justification memorandum.

Section 2. The Board authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to file with U.S. HUD updates to the Miami-Dade County FY 2013-2017 Consolidated Plan and the FY 2013 Action Plan describing the allocation of funds for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs to include program income for CDBG and HOME. The Board further authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to make future non-substantial modifications to the FY 2013 Action Plan and the FY 2013-2017 Consolidated Plan, including

but not limited to changing the national objective to be achieved by a particular project, upon a determination that such non-substantial modifications are in the best interest of the County.

Section 3. All funding awards and conditional loan commitments set forth herein are contingent upon the availability of funding from the funding source or program and the recipient agency complying with the conditions set forth in this resolution and the justification memorandum. For all funding awards and conditional loan commitments made herein, the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee is authorized to shift funding between agencies without exceeding the total award amount to that activity and to shift funds for each program among activities of the same agency or related entity engaged in the same project or activity as described herein without exceeding the total amount allocated. For loans to be used for the construction or rehabilitation of affordable housing, the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee is authorized to execute the Conditional Loan Commitment attached herein as Attachment B and to exercise the rights conferred therein. For all funding awards and, where applicable, conditional loan commitments made herein, the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee is authorized to execute all conditional loan commitments, standard shell contracts, standard shell loan documents, amendments and other agreements necessary to fulfill the purposes of this resolution. The Board further authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee, upon a determination that such actions are in the best interest of the County, to subordinate and/or modify the terms of contracts, agreements, amendments and loan documents and to exercise the termination, waiver, acceleration, or other provisions set forth therein.

Section 4. The Board waives the requirements of Resolution R-692-12 to the extent that it requires that agencies participate in the Request for Application process.



This is in response to the County's request dated October 31, 2012 on the above subject matter.

Based on the information provided, the Department is hereby granting an extension to the County's fiscal year (FY) 2013 Action Plan submission date to February 4, 2013.

The County must ensure that its citizens are notified and are provided an opportunity to comment on the plan. We also caution the County on the impact that delays in the submission of the Action Plan may have on the administration of HUD's programs.

We are pleased to advise you that on December 18, 2012, the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) approved a Conditional Loan Commitment for development activity at the above-listed property (the "Property"). This Conditional Loan Commitment is made based upon the application submitted by Borrower in response to, for HOME funds, the Miami-Dade County Consolidated Request for Applications for FY 2013 Funding – Housing Application, Book Two or, for Surtax funds, the Miami-Dade County Consolidated Request for Applications for FY 2013 Funding – Documentary Stamp Surtax Funding, Book Three (the "RFA") and is subject to the following terms and conditions:

Loan Amount: The loan amount of not-to-exceed \$_____ is the amount approved by the BCC in Resolution No. R-1063-12 and includes all terms and conditions of such BCC approval, including project scope, activity type and, for federal funds, national objective to be achieved (the "Loan"). The loan amount may be decreased as determined by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, based on the information and documentation provided by Developer .

Conditions: The Loan is conditioned upon the terms, conditions and requirements set forth below (the "Conditions"). The County shall not issue a final unconditional loan commitment, enter into a funding contract, close on the Loan or disburse the Loan funds until all the Conditions are met.

Collateral: Upon satisfaction of the Conditions, Miami-Dade County (County) and Borrower will enter into a funding contract and loan agreement. The Loan shall be evidenced by a promissory note and secured by a construction/permanent mortgage with assignment of leases and rents, a collateral assignment of leases and rents, a collateral assignment of construction documents, a rental regulatory agreement (where applicable), and any other security or collateral as deemed appropriate by the Mayor or Mayor's designee, in his or her sole discretion, with approval of the County Attorney's Office. Borrower shall additionally be required to provide the County with an environmental indemnification agreement, a UCC-1, title affidavit, partnership affidavit (if applicable), corporate resolution approving the loan documents, opinion of counsel, certification of borrower to borrower's counsel, and title policy making the County an insured. The Collateral shall be determined based upon financial feasibility and subsidy layering underwriting to be performed by County staff in an internal process and by an

independent underwriter and paid for by Borrower ("Underwriting") following review of a current title search. Additional forms of security may be required if liens, encumbrances, restrictions or covenants exist on the Property which the Mayor or Mayor's designee determines, in his or her sole discretion, threaten the County's Collateral. The Mayor or Mayor's designee shall determine, in his or her sole discretion and in consultation with the County Attorney's Office, whether the Collateral provided by Borrower is sufficient to close and disburse the Loan.

Interest Rate: Loan terms, including the interest rate, are those set forth in the RFA, on page 19 for HOME funds or page 9 for Surtax funds, as modified prior to closing by the Mayor or Mayor's designee in accordance with the results of Underwriting.

Repayable: There will be no penalty for prepayment of the Loan (payment of Loan balance before the end of the repayment term). Repayment terms are those set forth in the RFA, on page 19 for HOME funds or page 9 for Surtax funds, as modified prior to closing by the Mayor or Mayor's designee in accordance with the results of Underwriting. The prepayment of any Loan shall not affect the term of affordability set forth in the Rental Regulatory Agreement or in any of the other Loan Documents.

Term: The Loan will be for the period of time set forth in the RFA, on page 19 for HOME funds or page 9 for Surtax funds, as it may be modified prior to closing by the Mayor or Mayor's designee in accordance with the results of Underwriting.

Conditions:

1. Underwriting, as explained above, shall include financial feasibility review, subsidy layering review, and credit review. Underwriting is performed to protect the County's scarce affordable housing funds and is performed to ensure that the Project has sufficient financing to be completed timely and that the Project is not over-subsidized, meaning the Loan is not needed or the Loan Amount is too high. The County reserves the right to reduce the Loan Amount subject to Underwriting. The County further reserves the right to refuse to issue a final, unconditional loan commitment to Borrower or to enter into a contract for the Loan or to close on the Loan in the event that Underwriting determines that the project is financially unfeasible or otherwise is unfeasible. The costs of Underwriting are to be paid by Borrower.
2. Borrower must prove control of the Property through purchase or lease, as evidenced by a deed or lease and recorded memorandum of lease in Borrower's name. Absence of any threat of foreclosure, taking by eminent domain, or pending bankruptcy are additionally required.
3. Borrower must provide the County with written financing commitments showing committed financing for the entire Development Cost of the Project, including any gaps between the Loan and the overall costs to develop the Project. The Development Cost of the Project means the total cost of completing the entire Project, from acquisition to the issuance of Certificate of Occupancy, including but not limited to the costs for acquisition, design and planning, zoning and variances, financing costs, legal costs, construction, and permitting. In the event of a dispute as to what amount constitutes the

actual Development Cost, Borrower and County will use the amount determined by Underwriting to be the Development Cost.

4. Conformance of the Project design with the application submitted in the RFA, unless changes are approved by the Mayor or Mayor's designee.
5. Complete plans and specifications of the Project.
6. Payment and performance bond in the amount of the entire construction budget or otherwise in conformance with applicable law. Where a payment and performance bond is not required by law, the Mayor or Mayor's designee may alternatively accept – at the Mayor or Mayor's designee's sole discretion – a letter of credit in an amount acceptable to the Mayor or Mayor's designee.
7. Appraisal of the Property showing that the value of the Project and Property, when completed, exceeds the total amount of debt from all sources to be secured by the Project, unless waived by the Mayor or Mayor's designee.
8. A Phase I environmental report requiring no further action.
9. Such other conditions which are customary and reasonable for a loan of this nature, such as adhering to all Federal, State and local regulations, ordinances, codes and standards.
10. Meeting all requirements of the [[HOME]] [[Surtax]] program.

This Conditional Loan Commitment **will expire in six (6) months** if not extended by Miami-Dade County. An extension of this Conditional Loan Commitment must be signed by the Mayor or Mayor's Designee to be valid. If the loan does not close prior to the expiration or extension of this Conditional Loan Commitment, the funds will be subject to recapture and allocated to other projects.

This Conditional Loan Commitment is not assignable. This Conditional Loan Commitment is the sole and complete agreement between the parties as to the terms of the Loan described herein. The terms of this Conditional Loan Commitment may only be changed in writing in a document signed by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee. No representations, written or verbal, of Miami-Dade County employees, or others purporting to act on behalf of Miami-Dade County, may change the terms of this Commitment.

Miami-Dade County wishes to thank you for your proposal and the opportunity to provide financing for this development, and we look forward to closing this transaction.

ATTACHMENT D

FY 2013 ACTION PLAN

This attachment to the FY 2013 Action Plan funding recommendations provides supplemental information and the details of: a) the RFA process and, b) activities and tables which demonstrate how the funding sources included in the Action Plan are proposed to be utilized.

Requests for Applications and Evaluations

Once the BCC approved the FY 2013-2017 Five-Year Consolidated Plan, applications for funding were solicited through the consolidated Request for Applications (RFA) process. PHCD received RFA funding requests for CDBG, HOME, and ESG totaling \$49.65 million, which included \$25.3 for CDBG; \$23 million for HOME; and, \$1.34 million for ESG. The FY 2013 RFA was made available for a 21-day period starting September 21, 2012 and applications were due by October 12, 2012. The public was advised of the application process through a notice in *The Miami Herald* and posting of the notice via PHCD's website. In addition, notification was mailed directly to all currently funded agencies. Prior to the start of the FY 2013 RFA process, PHCD staff offered two CDBG and HOME Capacity-building Training workshops on Wednesday, August 22, 2012 and Thursday, August 23, 2012 entitled Successfully Accessing HUD Funds to Serve the Community. The workshops were facilitated by Training & Development Associates, Inc. (TDA) and were designed for both new applicants and existing awardees seeking to enhance their knowledge of the CDBG and HOME regulations and reporting requirements. DRAFT RFA booklets for community development programs were available for a 10-day period public comment period from September 7 to September 17, 2012. A Developer's Roundtable meeting was held on September 19, 2012. During the three-week RFA application process, PHCD, in conjunction with the Miami-Dade Homeless Trust (HT), convened two technical assistance workshops on September 25, 2012 and September 27, 2012, as well as provided technical assistance to agencies that requested. PHCD also provided agencies with a Question & Answer 7-day period from September 21 to September 28, 2012.

FY 2013 Evaluation Committee

In accordance with prior policies and practices, PHCD established six (6) RFA Evaluation Committees that were responsible for reviewing, evaluating, and scoring each application under the following categories: Housing; Economic Development; Homeless; Public Facilities/Capital Improvements; Public Services; and Surtax. This year's evaluation process involved representatives from the NRSAs, as well as staff from PHCD and other County Departments. Engagement of NRSA representatives afforded members of impacted communities an opportunity for critical input in the evaluation and scoring process. The final rating scores and ranking of the applications were assigned based on the following criteria:

- **Organizational Capacity** - Fiscally sound agencies and organizations that have the skills and experience needed to carry out the proposed activity.
- **Priority Need** - Activities that meet a high priority need as identified by residents in the County's Consolidated Plan.
- **Geographic Location** - Priority is given to activities located in NRSAs and eligible block groups.
- **Finishing What We Started** - Ongoing capital improvement and housing projects that were previously funded and currently have a funding gap.
- **Leveraging** - Activities with demonstrated funding commitments from non-County sources, such as private bank financing, foundation and corporate grants, State funding, and equity from the syndication of tax credits.

Additionally, for all housing activities requesting HOME funds, priority was given to projects that met the preliminary underwriting feasibility review as conducted by Seltzer Management Group, Inc. New construction projects for homeownership were not recommended for funding unless they represented activities being undertaken by nonprofit Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs) that received prior funding under the HOME CHDO program.

Administration

The proposed allocation of \$2,122,200 for Administration represents 20 percent of the total projected CDBG FY 2013 entitlement of \$10,611,000.

Economic Development

Total funding in the amount of \$3,773,762, including \$473,762 in CDF allocations for Economic Development activities, is recommended for economic development activities, which includes funding for the Business Incubator Assistance Program, technical assistance to businesses, microenterprise lending, and other eligible special economic development activities. A total of 32 applications were received in this category, of which 20 Economic Development activities are recommended for funding, including activities recommended for an allocation of CDF funds.

Public Facilities/Capital Improvements

A total of \$6,129,878 is recommended for public facilities/capital improvement activities, including \$722,878 in CDF allocations for Public Facilities/Capital Improvement activities in certain commission districts. This includes funding for public park upgrades and improvements; infrastructure and capital improvement projects in participating municipalities; and major capital improvements in the NRSAs and Eligible Block Groups (EBGs).

Public Services

A total of \$1,345,712 is recommended for public service activities, or 13 percent of the CDBG funding. The County may allocate up to a maximum of 15% of its annual CDBG allocation toward public Service activities. The CDBG program allows the use of grant funds for a wide range of Public Service activities, including, but not limited to, employment services, crime prevention, child care, health services, and substance abuse services.

Housing

A total of \$429,000 is recommended for housing-related activities to the Miami-Dade Department of Regulatory and Economic Resources (RER) to identify and remove housing code enforcement violations in multi-district CDBG Eligible Block Groups and NRSAs.

Summary of Funding to NRSAs

Total funding recommended in the amount of \$4,680,500 is recommended for high priority projects and activities in the NRSAs. This represents 36 percent of total recommended FY 2013 CDBG funding. Below is a chart identifying the activities slated for the County's NRSAs:

Commission Allocations

Each Commission District allocates CDBG funds to eligible projects, programs, and activities in their respective districts or county-wide. Based on available FY 2013 CDBG funding, each Commissioner has \$130,181 in FY 2013 CDBG funds to allocate to worthy projects and activities in their respective districts. This represents a total of \$1,692,353, or 12% of the FY 2013 CDBG recommendations.

Activities in Entitlement Cities

Based on US HUD's "metropolitan significance" criteria in recommending funding for activities in Entitlement cities, staff was especially mindful of US HUD's Final Rule issued on November 1995, which stated that CDBG funds may assist an activity outside the jurisdiction of the grantee, but only to the extent the grantee determines that such activity is necessary to further the purposes of the Housing and Community Development Act, the recipient's community development objectives, and that reasonable benefit from the activity will accrue to the residents of the jurisdiction of the grantee. Simply stated, Miami-Dade County may support activities in other entitlement communities, but only to the extent that such activity also benefits residents of the County's primary unincorporated target area, thereby demonstrating metropolitan significance. Entitlement cities include the City of Miami, City of Miami Beach, City of North Miami, City of Hialeah, City of Homestead and the City of Miami

Gardens. Similar to entitlement cities, those cities that receive State of Florida Small Cities CDBG Program funds must also meet the metropolitan significance standard and be consistent with the County's high priority needs. As such, staff will continue to evaluate projects funded in other Entitlement cities to ensure that those activities also benefit the County's primary unincorporated target area.

Scott names five to university board

The governor, who opposes new tuition increases, chose five like-minded people for the Board of Governors.

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Gov. Rick Scott reshaped the state university governing board Thursday, stacking it with five like-minded Republicans whom he expects to heed his opposition to new tuition increases.

Overnight, the 17-member Board of Governors became a clearer extension of Scott's philosophy that raising tuition is too big a burden for middle-class families.

Scott has made opposition to higher university tuition a line-in-the-sand issue as he embarks on a quest for reelection in 2014.

"I'm going to appoint people who believe the way I do, that we've got to look at every way we can to figure out how to keep tuition as low as possible," Scott said in a recent interview.

Most of the appointees received seven-year terms, meaning they will be setting higher education policy ac-

A native Floridian, she is a graduate of the University of North Carolina and Duke University law school. She said UNC's in-state tuition was very low when she attended in the 1980s, a time when the school's reputa-

tion for excellence grew.

"I don't think there's a direct correlation between the amount of tuition and the quality of education you get," she said.

Tuition at Florida's 12 state universities has risen steadily in recent years, but remains on average among the lowest in the nation. University presidents have cited a decline in state support — including a \$300 million cut in funding last year — that they say coupled with low tuition, has made it harder to compete against other states to hire top academic talent.

The university presidents last month promised they would not seek new tuition hikes if the Legislature allo-

cates \$18 million more based on a series of performance goals.

The new members can begin serving immediately, and the board's next meeting is Jan. 16-17 in Gainesville. All of the appointees require state Senate confirmation.

Scott, who appoints 14 of the Board of Governors' 17 members, left has one opening to fill. Still unresolved is the seat held by Norman Thipp '74, a Fort Lauderdale lawyer and the only one of four lame-duck board members who sought a new term.

Scott's choices include three men from Naples, where he has a home, and the son of one of his biggest campaign contributors. They are:

- Harry Wayne Huizenga Jr., of Delray Beach, president of Ryboychik Boat Co. and Huizenga Holdings, the firm founded by his father, former Miami Dolphins owner H. Wayne Huizenga. The elder Huizenga in May gave \$250,000 to the governor's reelection campaign in addition to \$200,000 in 2010.

- Ned Lautenbach, 68, of Naples, retired partner in a New York equity firm and for 30 years before that an IBM executive who holds an MBA from Harvard. Lautenbach and his wife, Cindy, were members of Scott's inaugural committee and donated \$25,000, the maximum allowed; he also gave \$15,000 to Scott's reelection committee. Let's Get to Work, in April in addition to \$40,000 to the Republican Party. Lautenbach's term is for six years because he is filing the unexpired term of a former board member.

- Wendy Sartory Link, 48, of Palm Beach Gardens, an attorney and managing partner of Ackerman, Link & Sartory and chair of the Florida Healthy Kids Corp.

- Edward Morton, 65, of Naples, a former healthcare executive with NCH Healthcare Systems. He has a master's degree from Florida Gulf Coast University and an MBA from the University of Miami.

- Alan Levine, 45, of Naples, senior vice president of Hospital Management Services and a former secretary of health for Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal. Levine, who once worked in Pasco County for the hospital chain Scott founded, holds a bachelor's and two master's degrees from the University of Florida, where he serves as a trustee.

Levine last year voted in favor of a 9 percent tuition hike for UF students, and said that tuition there has been a "bargain" in Florida. But from now on, he will follow Scott's lead, he said.

"The governor made it very clear to me. He does not want to see tuition go up," said Levine, who has a child at UF. "He's the governor. It would be inappropriate for me to veer very far from that."

commission members and Mayor Tomás Regalado expressed support for the initiative, and City Manager Johnny Martinez said he would draft a detailed plan for recruiting and hiring new officers.

The additional personnel would boost the city's ranks to 1,244 sworn officers, and better align Miami's ratio of police to residents with cities like Baltimore, Atlanta and Memphis.

"If we are ever going to become the great city that we claim we are going to become, we need to do at a minimum what Philadelphia does," Sarnoff said, noting that Philadelphia employs 4.3 officers for every 1,000 citizens, compared to the 2.6 officers for every 1,000 citizens in Miami.

To get to that level, Sarnoff wants to add 300 officers over the next three years.

Sarnoff said there were 71 arrests during last year's festival, and raised concern that Miami must adhere to special guidelines from the Department of Justice when recruiting new officers.

Public safety also factored into the debate about Ultra, which had been approved for the second weekend by the Bayfront Park Management Trust, but not had a nod from the commission.

Barreiro said he rented the space from MCM, and that MCM officials worked alongside his campaign staff.

Last month, Robertson reversed course and recommended the contract go to FHP Tectonics. The commission signed off on the recommendation Thursday, but agreed that the rules governing local preference ought to be revisited.

- Description of all activities that will be undertaken in FY 2013 to address priority needs
- Geographic distribution of unmet housing assistance
- Homeless and other special needs activities
- Other housing initiatives that will be undertaken in FY 2013 to foster and maintain affordable housing, public housing improvements and resident activities, remove barriers to affordable housing, reduce the number of households with incomes below the poverty line, develop institutional structures, address obstacles to meeting underserved needs and enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service grants.

The Action Plan includes the following funding sources:

- CDBG: \$13,800,553 allocated to Public Facilities/Capital Improvements, Economic Development, Public Services, Administration and Historic Preservation.
- HOME: \$6,555,427 allocated to rental housing, home ownership rehabilitation, homeless housing, and tenant-based rental assistance.
- ESG: \$1,410,000 allocated to emergency shelter, homeless prevention, short and medium-term rental assistance and services, rapid re-housing of homeless people and participation.
