RESOLUTION NO. _____

RESOLUTION URGING CONGRESS AND THE FLORIDA
LEGISLATURE TO PASS "EQUAL PAY" LAWS DESIGNED
TO EQUALIZE PAY DISPARITIES BETWEEN MEN AND
WOMEN

WHEREAS, women today make up nearly half of the nation's workforce, yet still earn just 77 cents to every dollar earned by men nationally; and

WHEREAS, African-American women in Florida earn just 62 cents to every dollar a man earns; and

WHEREAS, Hispanic women in Florida earn just 58 cents for every dollar a man earns; and

WHEREAS, a woman with a college degree will earn \$1.2 million less than a man with a similar level of education over the course of her career; and

WHEREAS, this Board believes that gender should not determine the amount an employee is paid and further, that hard work should be compensated fairly; and

WHEREAS, fair pay strengthens the financial security of families, leads to more investment in children's futures, and eases future retirement costs; and

WHEREAS, bills have been filed in Congress in recent years, such as the Paycheck Fairness Act, S. 2199 by Senator Barbara A. Mikulski (D – Maryland) and H.R. 377 by Representative Rosa DeLauro (D – Connecticut), which would impose more stringent penalties for equal pay violations and prohibit employers from penalizing workers who inquire about workplace wage issues, but these bills have failed to pass Congress; and

WHEREAS, bills have also been filed for consideration by the Florida Legislature; and

WHEREAS, during the 2014 state legislative session, Senator Arthenia Joyner (D-Tampa) filed SB 206 and Representative Janet Cruz (D-Tampa) filed HB 163, which would have required the state to collect and make public information about women's pay, but these bills did not pass; and

WHEREAS, this Board has long believed that equal work deserves equal pay and has sought to educate the public about these principles; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2013, this Board adopted Resolution No. R-459-13, which commemorated the 50th Anniversary of the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and declared the 10th day of June, beginning June 10, 2013, and each year thereafter, as "Equal Pay Act of 1963 Day" in Miami-Dade County; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. R-459-13 also:

1. Declared the County's adherence to the principles and ideals of the Equal Pay Act of 1963, declared the County's recognition of the significant contributions women have made to this Country's labor force and urged the public and private sector to recognize the full value of women's skills and significant contributions to the labor force; and
2. Urged the County Mayor and the public and private sector to ensure that their respective pay practices adhere to said principles; and
3. Declared the County's intent to promote equal pay for women throughout the County, and urged the County Mayor and the public and private sector to educate our community about pay inequity; and

WHEREAS, this Board would like to build upon the principles and aspirations of Resolution No. R-459-13 and urge Congress and the Florida Legislature to pass legislation designed to adhere to the principle of "equal pay for equal work",

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Urges Congress and the Florida Legislature to enact legislation to address continuing disparities in pay between men and women.

Section 2. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the Members of the Florida Congressional Delegation, U.S. Senator Barbara A. Mikulski, U.S. Representative Rosa DeLauro, Florida's Governor, Senate President, House Speaker, the Chair and Members of the Miami-Dade State Legislative Delegation, State Senator Arthenia Joyner, and State Representative Janet Cruz.

Section 3. Directs the County's federal and state lobbyists to advocate for the passage of legislation set forth in Section 1, and authorizes and directs the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to amend the 2014 Federal and State Legislative Packages to include this item and to include this item in the 2015 Federal and State Legislative Packages when they are presented to the Board.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Chairwoman Rebeca Sosa. It was offered by Commissioner _____, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner _____ and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:
