	RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS		

RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO ENACT S. 3873, THE GEORGE FLOYD AND WALTER SCOTT NOTIFICATION ACT, OR SIMILAR LEGISLATION THAT WOULD REQUIRE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES TO REPORT THE USE OF LETHAL FORCE

WHEREAS, the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, Minnesota, who died after being handcuffed and pinned to the ground by a police officer during an arrest, has reignited a national conversation about policing, community relationships, and the necessity and propriety of use of force in the context of police action; and

WHEREAS, sworn police officers are given a significant amount of authority and responsibility, and the potential for abuse of that authority should not be ignored; and

WHEREAS, data surrounding uses of lethal force by law enforcement agencies would increase transparency and may help foster and promote trust between officers and the public; and

WHEREAS, United States Senator Tim Scott (R – South Carolina) has introduced Senate Bill 3873 (S. 3873), entitled the George Floyd and Walter Scott Notification Act (Act), for consideration during the 116th Congress; and

WHEREAS, similar legislation was first introduced by Senator Scott for consideration during the 114th Congress, following the murder of Walter Scott in South Carolina, and was reintroduced as Senate Bill 1610 (S. 1610) for consideration during the 115th Congress; and

WHEREAS, the Act would require every state that receives certain federal grants to report, on an annual basis, information to the Attorney General regarding any discharge of a firearm by a law enforcement officer that results in the death of a civilian; and

WHEREAS, a state's failure to comply with the reporting requirement would subject that state and its law enforcement agencies to a reduction in federal funding that would otherwise be allocated to the state; and

WHEREAS, the Act would further require that the Attorney General publish and make available to the public, every year, a report containing the data reported to the Attorney General under the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act would promote transparency and accountability among law enforcement agencies, while also providing data needed to create lasting solutions; and

WHEREAS, this Board supports the enactment of S. 3873, the George Floyd and Walter Scott Notification Act, or similar legislation that would require law enforcement agencies to report the use of lethal force,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Urges the United States Congress to enact S. 3873, the George Floyd and Walter Scott Notification Act, or similar legislation that would require law enforcement agencies to report the use of lethal force.

Section 2. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to United States Senator Tim Scott and the members of the Florida Congressional Delegation.

Section 3. Directs the County's federal lobbyists to advocate for the legislative action set forth in section 1 above, and authorizes and directs the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to amend the 2020 Federal Legislative Package to include this item.
