



RESOLUTION NO. R-1392-09

RESOLUTION URGING CONGRESS TO PASS LEGISLATION ADDRESSING IMPORTED CHINESE DRYWALL; URGING THE FLORIDA LEGISLATURE TO CREATE AND FUND A STATE PROGRAM TO ASSIST HOMEOWNERS IN ADDRESSING CHINESE DRYWALL IN FLORIDA; DIRECTING THE MAYOR OR DESIGNEE TO PREPARE A REPORT RELATED TO THE PREVALENCE OF CHINESE DRYWALL IN MIAMI-DADE COUNTY AND RELATED ISSUES FACING MIAMI-DADE HOMEOWNERS

WHEREAS, in 2006 and 2007, more than 550 million pounds of drywall and associated building materials were imported from China to the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, around half this drywall was imported from China to the State of Florida, enough to build approximately 36,000 homes; and

WHEREAS, media reports indicate that drywall imported from China was also used in homes in no fewer than 11 other states, including Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, and Virginia; and

WHEREAS, cases of Chinese drywall have been reported in Miami-Dade County; and

WHEREAS, testing by Florida officials found that drywall imported from China contains potentially hazardous levels of strontium sulfide, which, when exposed to moisture and humidity, can release hydrogen sulfide into the air; and

WHEREAS, emissions from drywall imported from China have caused substantial safety hazards in homes containing such drywall, including corrosion in electrical wiring, which can result in a fire hazard, failure of air conditioning units, and the failure of other household electrical products; and

WHEREAS, preliminary testing shows that the drywall may also be responsible for certain health hazards; and

WHEREAS, legislation has been filed in Congress to address the Chinese drywall issue, including S. 739 and S. Res. 91, both by Senators Bill Nelson and Mary Landrieu, and H.R. 1977 by Representative Robert Wexler; and

WHEREAS, this legislation would initiate a formal proceeding to investigate drywall imported from China from 2004 through 2007; prohibit further importation of drywall and associated building products from China; order a recall of hazardous Chinese drywall; and seek civil penalties against the drywall manufacturers in China that produced or distributed hazardous drywall and their U.S. subsidiaries to cover the cost of the recall effort and associated remediation; and

WHEREAS, the Louisiana Legislature passed legislation earlier this year authorizing the use of \$5 million in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds and other federal and state funds to identify and remediate Chinese drywall used as Louisiana was rebuilding from recent hurricanes; and

WHEREAS, Florida Senator Bill Nelson recently sent a letter to Florida's legislative leadership urging them to pass legislation setting up and funding a program similar to that in Louisiana to address Chinese drywall in Florida, a copy of which is attached; and

>>WHEREAS, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds could also be pursued to address Chinese drywall problems; and<<¹

WHEREAS, in addition to federal and state legislation, local efforts should be undertaken where possible to assist homeowners facing issues related to Chinese drywall,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Urges Congress to pass legislation addressing imported Chinese drywall.

Section 2. Urges Congress to pass S. 739, S. Res. 91, H.R. 1977 or similar legislation.

Section 3. Urges the Florida Legislature to pass legislation setting up and funding a state program address Chinese drywall in Florida using >>Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds,<< Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds and other federal and state funds, to the extent such funds can be used without diverting them from existing programs.

Section 4. Directs the Mayor or designee to prepare a report related to the prevalence of Chinese drywall in Miami-Dade County and related issues facing Miami-Dade homeowners, and to present such report along with recommendations for addressing the issue of Chinese drywall to the Board within the next 90 days.

Section 5. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the two U.S. Senators that represent Florida, the members of the Miami-Dade County Congressional Delegation, the Governor of Florida, the Florida Senate President, Florida House Speaker and the Chair and Members of the Miami-Dade State Legislative Delegation.

Section 6. Directs the County's federal lobbyists to advocate for the passage of the legislation set forth in Sections 1, 2 and 3 above, and authorizes and directs the Office of

Intergovernmental Affairs to include this item in the 2009 and 2010 Federal Legislative Packages and the 2010 State Legislative Package.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Commissioner Rebeca Sosa and the Co-Sponsor is Commissionner Audrey M. Edmonson. It was offered by Commissioner

Audrey M. Edmonson , who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Barbara J. Jordan and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:

Summary

This resolution urges Congress to pass legislation addressing Imported Chinese drywall and directs the Mayor or his designee to prepare a report related to the prevalence of Chinese drywall in Miami-Dade County.

Background and Relevant Legislation

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Agency for Toxic Substance and Disease Registry (ATSDR), and numerous state departments of health have been working together to investigate and analyze how Chinese-made drywall entered the country, where it was used, what is in it, and what impact it may have on human health and corrosion of electrical and fire safety components.

CPSC has received about 1,897 reports from residents in 30 states, the District of Columbia, Louisiana, Virginia, and Puerto Rico who believe their health symptoms or the corrosion of certain metal components in their homes are related to the presence of drywall produced in China.

Affected consumers largely report that their homes were built in 2006 to 2007, when an unprecedented increase in new construction occurred in part due to the hurricanes of 2004 and 2005.¹

A group of senators from states mentioned above is seeking a Senate resolution to urge banks and mortgage lenders to offer homeowners some relief. Sens. Nelson and LeMieux from Florida; Mary

Landrieu and David Vitter of Louisiana; and Mark Warner and Jim Webb of Virginia introduced the resolution.²

A new bill now before Congress, *the Foreign Manufacturers Legal Accountability Act of 2009* (S. 1606)³ would require foreign manufacturers that export to the U.S. to:

- Agree to abide by U.S. law and be held accountable by state and federal courts; and
- Have an “agent” in at least one state where the company does business that would accept the service of legal papers for any lawsuits or regulatory claims.

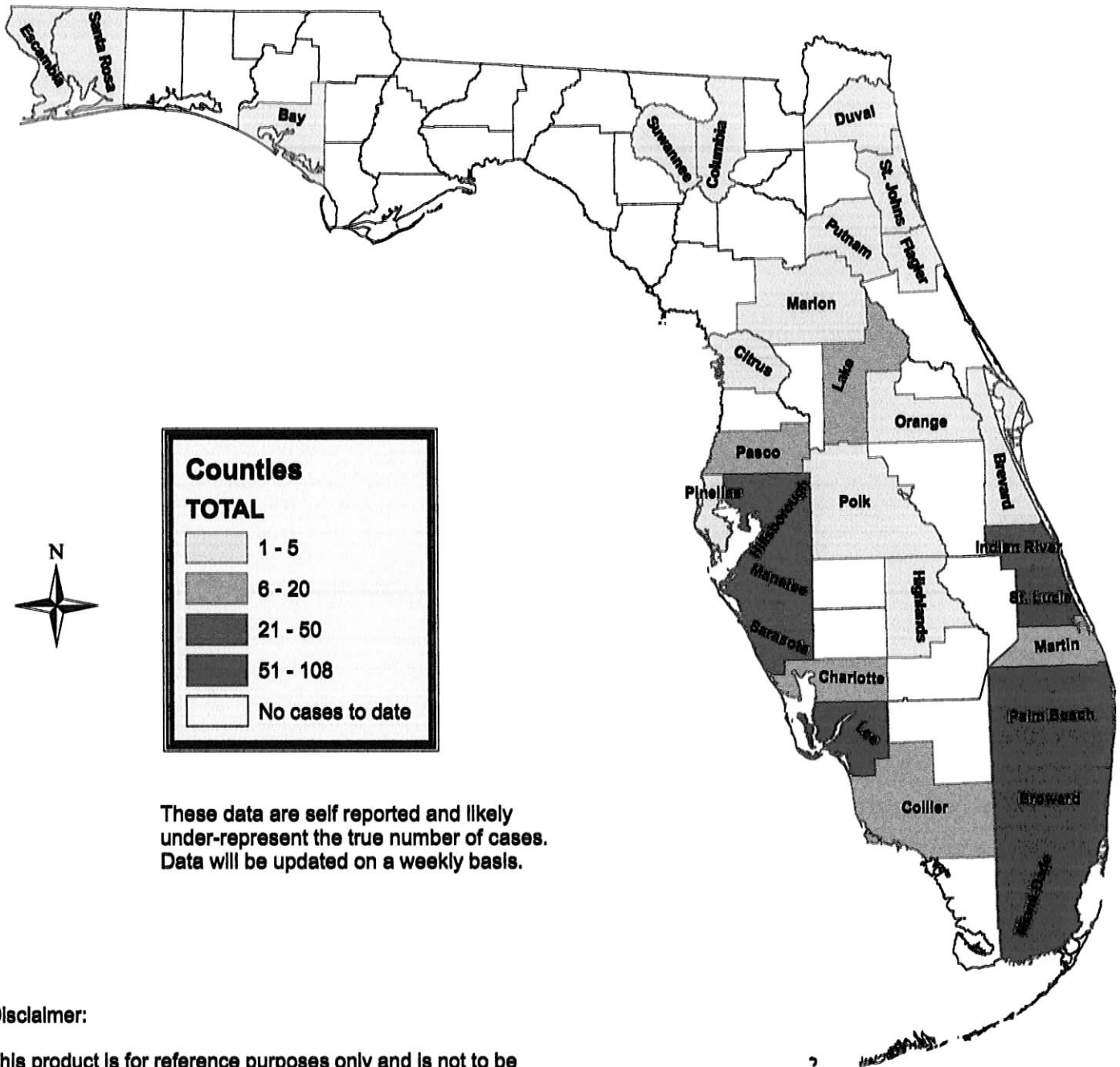

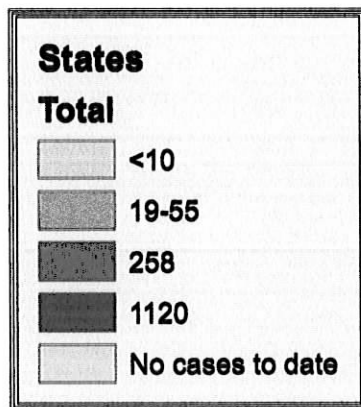
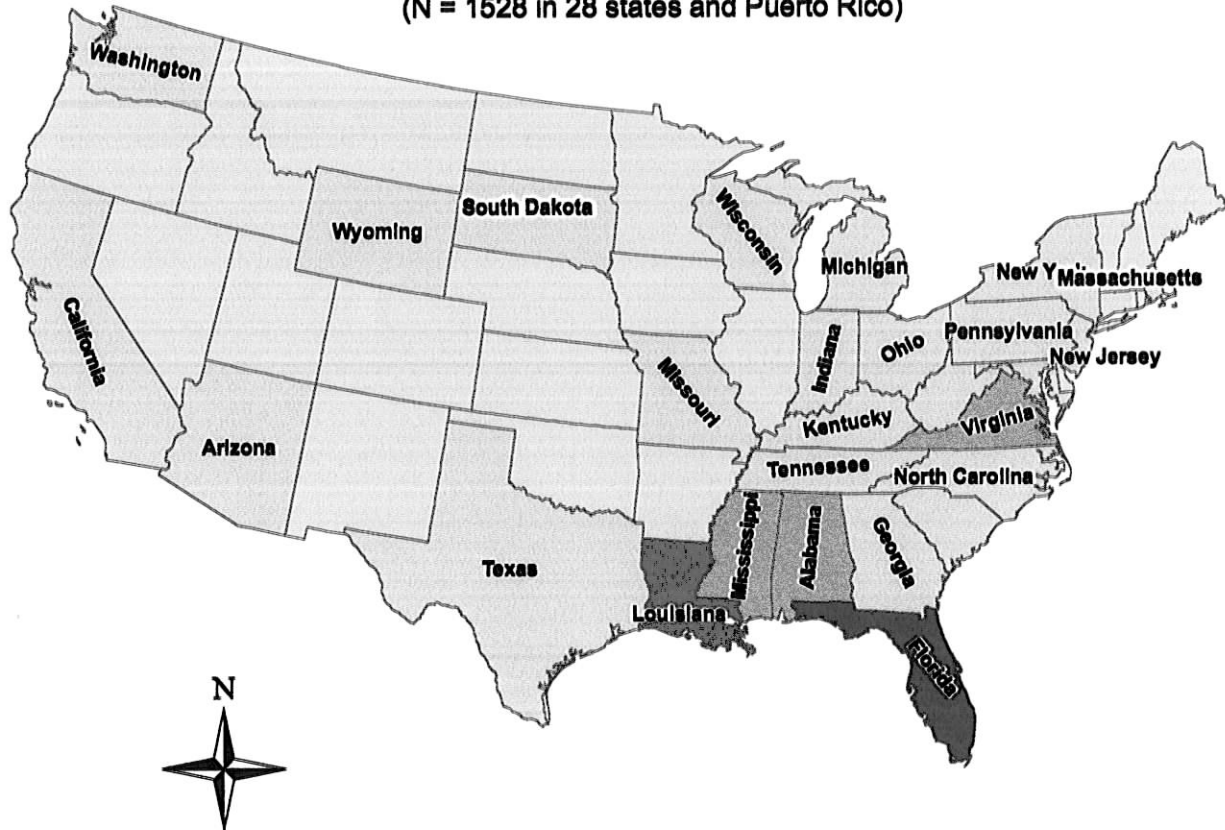


Reports of Drywall "Cases" Meeting FL-DOH's Case Definition
