

Subject: Ratification of the Biscayne Trail Segment C Grant Application to the Transportation Enhancement Grant Program

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board adopt the attached resolution ratifying the submission of a grant application to the Transportation Enhancement Grant Program for \$1,000,000 in funding to support the engineering, design and construction of the Biscayne Trail Segment C Project. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to receive and expend funds and execute contracts and amendments as required.

Scope

The project site is located between Military Canal (SW 300 Street) and North Canal (SW 328 Street) in Commission District 9. This project will have a countywide impact.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

This grant will contribute \$1,000,000 towards the total project cost of \$2,236,389. The grant match of \$1,236,389 is available from Building Better Communities, General Obligation Bond (BBC-GOB) Project No. 51, Site No. 73452, South Dade Greenway and Trail, Commission District 9, with an allocation of \$1,650,000.

Track Record/Monitor

The grant will be administered by Miami-Dade County Park and Recreation Department (MDPR), Grants Administrator, Greg Pessolano. MDPR has received over \$1.1 million in grant funds from the Transportation Enhancement Grant Program within the last five (5) years.

Background

The Transportation Enhancement Grant Program is an element of the Federal Highway Administration, Surface Transportation Program that provides funds for the development of "non-traditional" transportation projects including the provision of facilities for pedestrians and bicycles. This project will connect three County parks, two County marinas and one national park. It will greatly improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians by providing a paved shared-use non-motorized trail.

Ratification of this application is necessary because there was insufficient time to seek Board approval prior to the application deadline. Match funding for the grant was identified in late February. The application deadline was March 5, 2010.

1. Qualifying Enhancement Activities

Provision of facilities for pedestrians and bicycles

2. Project Description

a) Type of work being proposed:

Engineering and Final Plans Preparation Work

Construction and Construction Engineering and Inspection Activities

b) Describe how the proposed project is related to the intermodal transportation system by either function, proximity or impact.

This project is an important part of the 194 mile South Dade Greenway Network master plan. Biscayne Trail Segment C will connect to the existing Biscayne Trail Segments A and B which in turn connects to the existing Old Cutler Trail, Commodore Trail and Rickenbacker Trail. This connection will allow the public to travel uninterrupted nearly 36 miles from Bill Baggs State Park to Biscayne National Park. In addition, this project will improve intermodal transportation linkage by providing a connection to Metrobus Route 287 off SW 87 Ave. which is equipped with bicycle racks. More specifically, this project will connect to the proposed Black Creek Trail Segment A (currently under design) and the existing Biscayne Trail Segment B near Black Point Park and Marina, as well as the proposed Princeton Trail near the junction of L-31E Canal and Princeton (C-102 Canal), via the currently funded portion of Biscayne Trail Segment C. Other future proposed connections on the unfunded portion of Biscayne Trail Segment C include the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway northern route near the junction of L-31E Canal and Mowry (C-103) Canal, and Biscayne Trail Segment D and the southern route of the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway near the junction of L-31E Canal and North Canal (SW 328 St.).

c) Where is the project located?

This project is located in southeast unincorporated Miami-Dade County between Military Canal (theoretical SW 300 St.) and North Canal (SW 328 St.) along the east side of L-31E Canal (**Attachment #1**). Project length is approximately 2.3 miles and includes:

- 1) 1.8 mile main trail between Military Canal (theoretical SW 300 St.) and North Canal (SW 328 St.)
- 2) 1 mile spur trail along Princeton (C-102) Canal from the L-31E Canal to Biscayne Bay
- 3) 1/2 mile spur trail along Mowry (C-103) Canal from the L-31E Canal to Biscayne Bay

d) Summarize any special characteristics of project. Provide typical section drawings.

This project will connect three County Parks, two County marinas and one National Park. It will greatly improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians by providing the only paved shared-use trail non-motorized means of north-south access to the southern terminus point. At present there is no way to cycle or walk from population centers north of Black Point Park and Marina to Biscayne National Park other than taking narrow paved farm roads that can be dangerous when farm implements use the road, or unpaved canal levees that are presently not ADA accessible. In addition, this project will provide mobility enhancement for those with limited transportation options. With no public transit options available to Biscayne National Park and some of the more remote County parks, this project is critical for the mobility needs of disadvantaged groups or those who cannot or choose not to drive. This project will improve the community quality of life by providing additional opportunities for bicycle riding and hiking. The reduction in vehicle miles traveled will in turn help with a reduction in vehicle emissions and provide increased public health by providing exercise to meet recommended physical activity levels. By investing in a transportation system that also offers the option of cycling and walking, the mobility needs can be met while also reducing oil dependence, greenhouse gas emissions and obesity rates.

An equestrian trail is proposed on the lower levee and a shared-use trail is proposed on the upper levee (**Attachment #2**) of the L-31E Canal berm, which is the highest elevation in the coastal area. Funding will be used to finish the design and construction of a shared-use trail from Military Canal to North Canal along the east side of L-31E Canal (**Attachment #3**). In addition spur trails and amenities are proposed near Biscayne Bay along Princeton (C-102) Canal and Mowry (C-103) Canal. The waters of the L-31E Canal, Princeton (C-102) Canal and Mowry (C-103) Canal are designated as Outstanding Florida Waters due to the close proximity and direct connection to Biscayne National Park and offer opportunities for viewing federally endangered species such as manatees. This project will provide critical access to Biscayne Bay, one of the world's most beautiful bodies of water and a defining feature of south Florida. It will provide easy, affordable, and safe physical access to the Bay and canoe and kayak paddling trails and spectacular Bay views. There will be opportunities for viewing unique natural features and ecosystems including mangrove forests and wetlands. The Mowry (C-103) Canal overlook at Biscayne Bay will serve as a platform for visitors to experience scenic views of the Bay, the canal and appealing coastal elements (**Attachment #4**). This project will utilize consistent design principles pertaining to the construction of standard shelter and ramp, approach path, and the provisioning of bike racks and a trash receptacle, with a simple sub structure and support features. The height of the shelter slab will maximize panoramic views of the Bay. The planned equestrian trail located on the lower levee between the shared-use trail and the L-31E Canal will offer tranquil horse rides and splendid views of the landscape, the flora and the waters of the Canal.

e) Describe the project's existing right of way ownerships.

The right-of-way within the L-31E Canal, the Princeton (C-102) Canal, and the Mowry (C-103) Canal corridor is owned by the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD). The total canal right-of-way varies in width on the L-31E canal from approximately 210 to 185 feet wide with the canal itself being approximately 40 feet wide. Total canal right-of-way on Princeton (C-102) Canal is approximately 200 feet wide with the canal itself being about 72 feet wide. Total right-of-way on Mowry (C-103) Canal is 235 feet wide with the canal itself about 124 feet wide.

- f) Describe any proposed right-of-way acquisition, including expected matching fund source, limitations on fund use or availability, and who will acquire and retain ownership of proposed right-of-way.

No right-of-way acquisition is needed. MDPH will request a Notice General Permit or modification of existing right-of-way permit to build a portion of the project within the SFWMD canal right-of-way.

- g) Describe any related project work phases that are already complete or currently underway.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) issued a Programmatic Categorical Exclusion for Design on March 1, 2009. Once this project is ready for LAP construction funding approval, design plans will be reviewed and environmental certification for construction will be issued. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) approved the Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study Class of Action determination memo for a Programmatic Categorical Exclusion on February 16, 2010. A Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study project development summary report by Marlin Engineering, Inc. was completed on February 1, 2009, which included a summary of commitments and recommendations, introduction, existing conditions, corridor analysis, traffic, design criteria, alternative alignments design, preliminary design analysis and conclusions and recommendations. In other related work, URS Corporation finished 100% construction documents for Biscayne Trail Bridge B (junction of L-31E Canal and North Canal) on December 14, 2009, which will connect Biscayne Trail Segment C with Biscayne Trail Segment D; this bridge project is currently under Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) LAP construction checklist review process. Marlin Engineering also finished a Biscayne Trail Bridge B Location Analysis report on November 6, 2009 to help determine location of the bridge. Gladding-Jackson completed a recreation master plan of the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway in March 2007 that included a portion of Biscayne Trail Segment C.

3. Project Implementation Information

- a) Describe the proposed method of performing and administering each work phase of the project.

All Engineering and Final Plans Preparation work and Construction Engineering and Inspection Activities work will be done through a consultant. MDPH Project Management Division will manage the scoping, consultant selection, design and permitting phases. MDPH Planning and Development Division and Capital Programs Division will manage the bidding phase and construction phase. MDPH is a Local Agency Program (LAP) certified entity and has experience working on multiple LAP projects.

- b) Describe any public (and private, if applicable) support of the proposed project. (Examples include: written endorsement, formal declaration, resolution, financial donations or other appropriate means).

Biscayne National Park prepared a letter of support for this project on March 3, 2010. The City of Homestead prepared a letter of support for this project on February 25, 2010. This project was well received during the September 16, 2009 Biscayne Trail Segments C and D PD&E study open house. In addition, support received at the June 22, 2006 Biscayne-Everglades Greenway Community Workshop No. 1 elicited unanimous public support for the project. Over 70% of respondents agreed that the project would enhance bicycling, walking, wildlife viewing, signage/trail-markers, shade/cover and trailhead/parking and over 90% of respondents agreed that the project would provide recreational opportunities. Resolution by the Greater Homestead / Florida City Chamber of Commerce was adopted May 19, 2005 in support of the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway project (**attached**). Endorsement of the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway project is also an endorsement of Biscayne Trail Segment C, since a portion of Segment C is on the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway. The City of Homestead Chamber of Commerce passed a resolution stating that the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway will offer a unique transportation alternative, increase tourism and economic opportunity, while enhancing the quality of life of residents May 19, 2005 (**attached**). This project ties into the South Dade Greenways Network (SDGN) Master Plan which was adopted by several municipalities and organizations including Florida City on September 9, 1994, the Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) on July 28, 1994, and the Citizens Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) on June 19, 1994. Draft Resolution for Miami Dade County (**Attachment 5**) and other resolutions and letters of support for the SDGN master plan are **attached**.

- c) Describe the proposed ownership and maintenance responsibilities for the project when it is complete.

The land within the L-31E Canal, Princeton (C-102) Canal and Mowry (C-103) Canal right-of-way is owned by the SFWMD. MDPR will request a Notice General Permit or modification of existing Right-of-Way Occupancy permit which will allow landscaping and improvements within right-of-way. Typical MDPR maintenance for existing similar-type trails includes sweeping and mowing the grass 26 times per year, including trash removal via a pick-stick (tool with a pointed end to pierce trash). Each MDPR cycle consists of litter removal, mowing, weed-eating / edging, tree trimming up to 10' and blowing pathways clear.

- d) Describe source of matching funds and any restrictions on availability.

The source of matching funds is Building Better Communities-General Obligation (GOB) bonds. Currently, one stream of funding is available for Biscayne Trail C and D: \$1,650,000 is programmed in District 9 for FY 2008-2013. There is a restriction on soft costs that currently limits expenditures to 17% of total bond proceeds allocated to the project for soft costs (planning services, design services and project administration costs).

- e) Other specific implementation information that should be considered.

MDPR received \$290,000 in Phase 28 (Project Development and Environment - PD&E) funds for Biscayne Trail Segments C and D (FM 251265-1) programmed in FY 05-06 and \$510,000 in Phase 38 (Design) funds programmed in FY 09-10, and \$1,745,000 in Phase 58 (Construction) funds programmed in FY 11-12. In addition, MDPR received FDOT approval of a LAP PD&E extension request for Biscayne Trail Segments C and D PD&E study from December 31, 2009 to June 30, 2010, to allow time for FHWA review and approval.

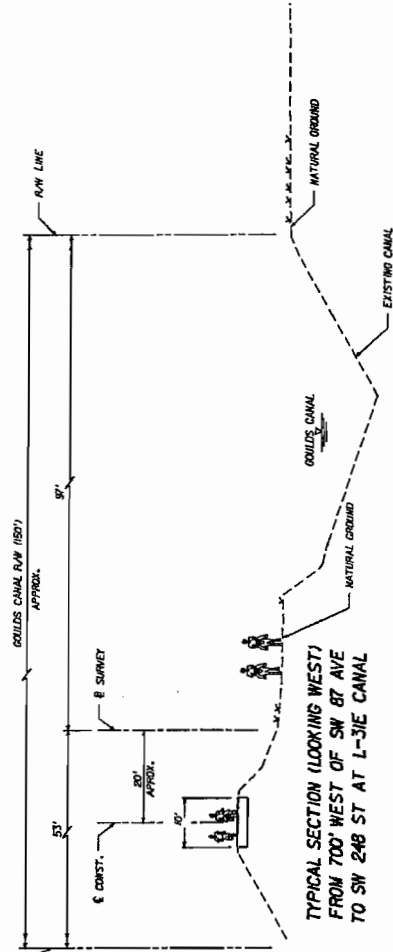

(Military Canal to North Canal)

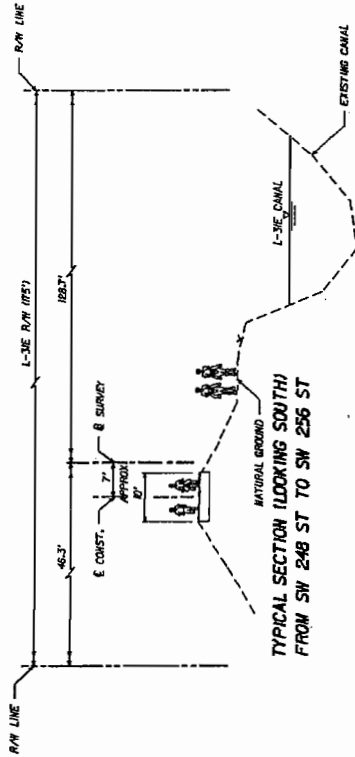




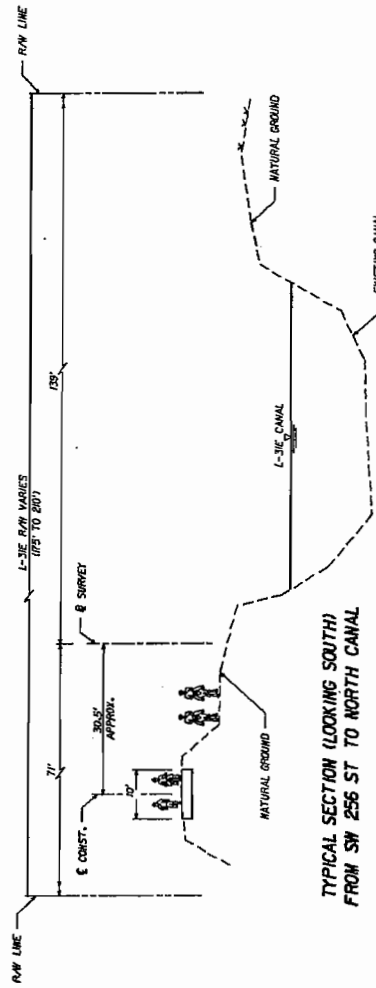
TYPICAL SECTION (LOOKING SOUTH)

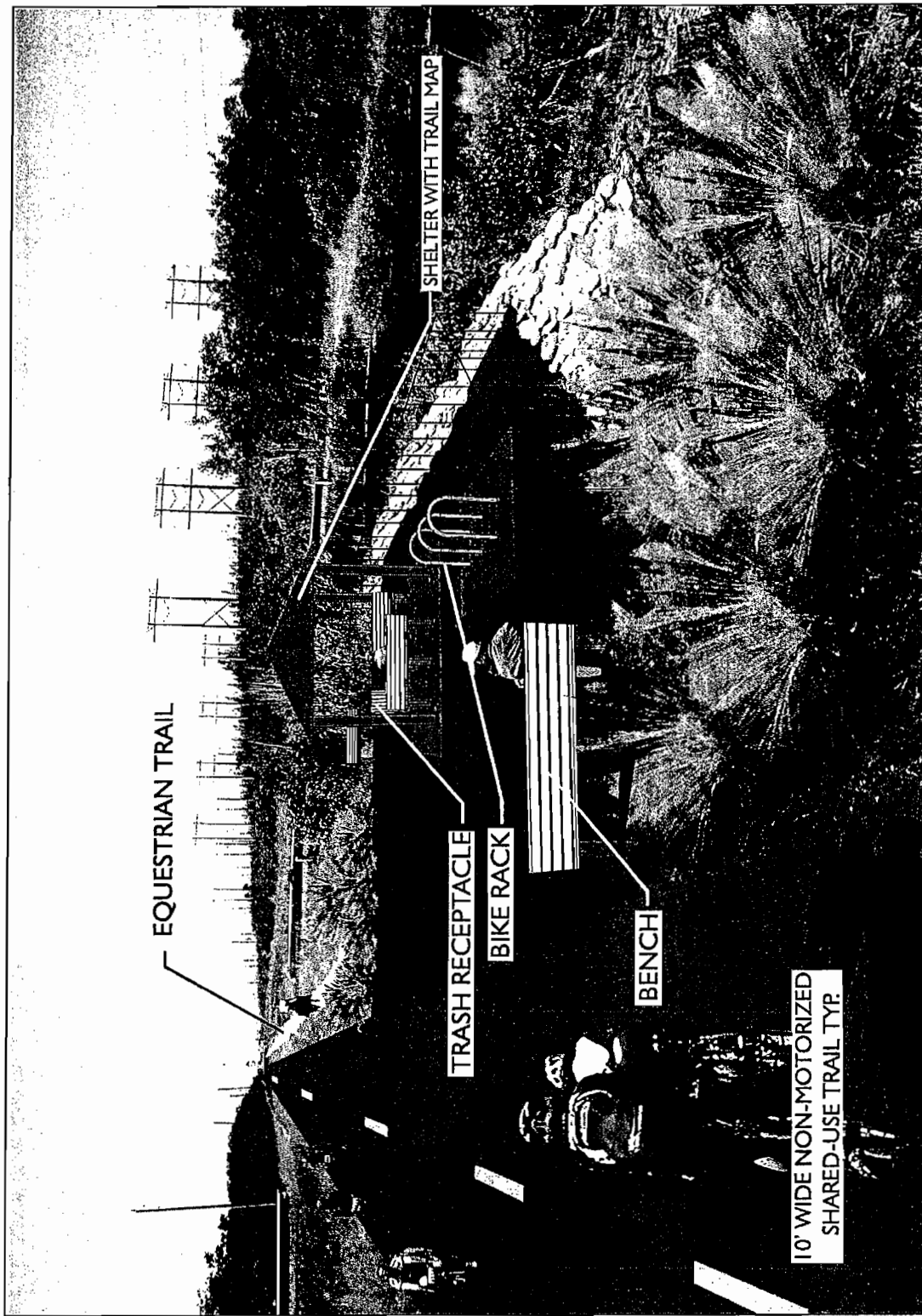

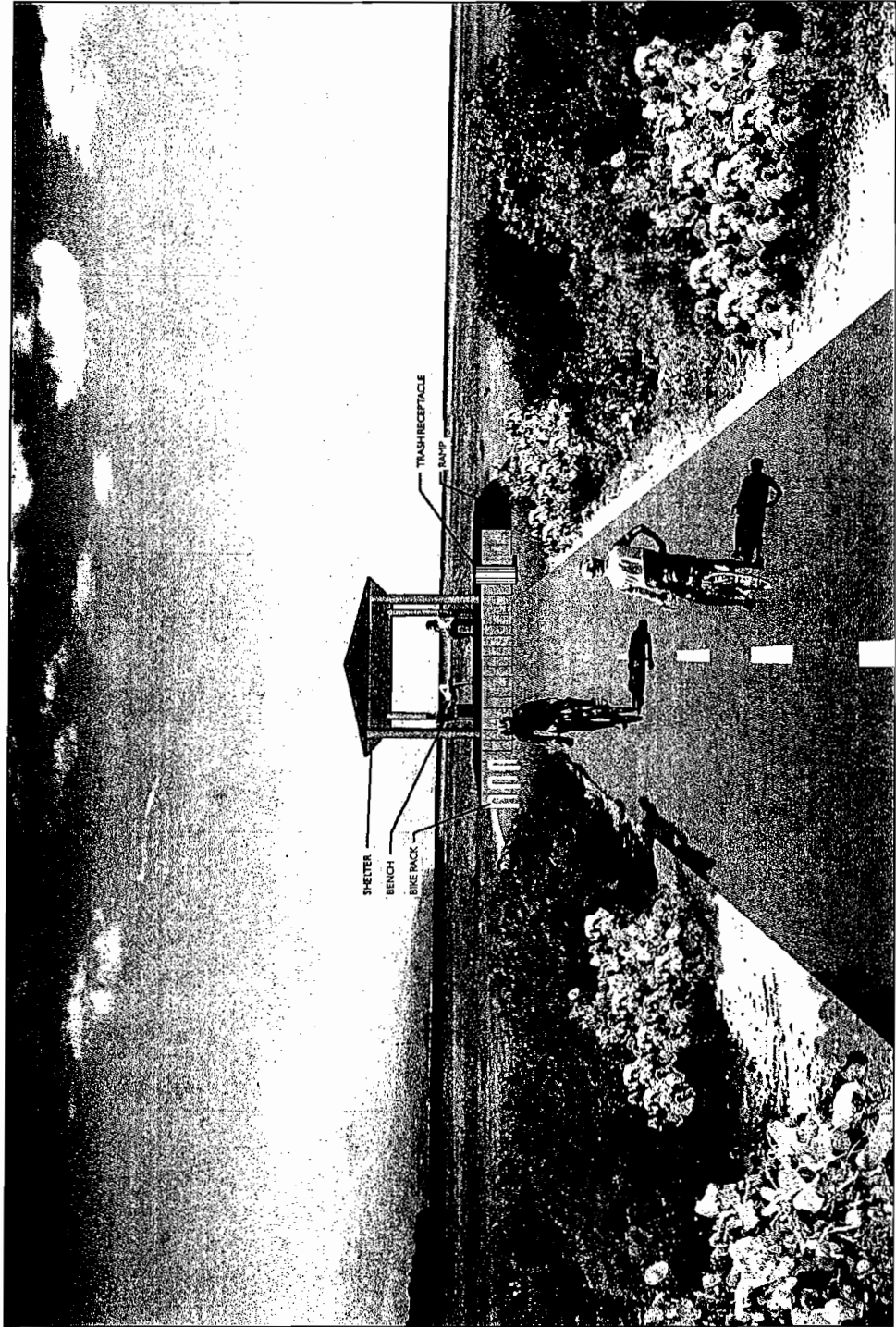

I am writing on behalf of Everglades National Park in support of the Miami-Dade County Park and Recreation Department's Transportation Enhancement Program application for Segment C of the Biscayne Trail in South Miami-Dade County.

This trail segment is part of the eastern portion of the Biscayne-Everglades Greenway, a multi-agency project involving community organizations and all levels of government including Everglades National Park. Our organization has been working closely with the Miami Dade County Park and Recreation Department and others to create a greenway connecting the unique resources of South Miami-Dade County and fulfill the vision described in the South Dade Greenways Network Master Plan. SECTION 1. That the South Dade Greenway Network Plan is hereby recommended for approval in the funded section of the TIP.


