Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) award competitive contracts and legacy contracts, and approve extension and additional expenditure authority to previously Board-approved contracts and prequalification pools. The total funding requested for the items listed below and described in more detail in the accompanying attachments is \$31,642,000.

Section 1 – Competitive Contract Awards

The items included in this section will award competitive contracts to the recommended vendors for the purchase of goods and services. The total spending authority requested is \$10,560,000.

Item 1.1 – Paper-Based Disposable Trays: Awards a contract for the purchase of various types of disposable trays used by Miami-Dade Corrections and Rehabilitation. The amount requested for the five-year term is \$4,461,000.

Item 1.2 – Video and Miscellaneous Services for Leachate Pipe System: Awards a contract for the purchase of video inspection services of the landfill leachate transmission system and under-drain piping for landfills managed by Public Works and Waste Management (PWWM). The amount requested for the five-year term is \$2,038,000.

Item 1.3 – Transportation Services: Awards a contract for motor coach and rentals to provide transportation services for various County departments. The amount requested for the five-year term is \$4,061,000.

Section 2 – Legacy Contract Awards

The items included in this section will award legacy contracts to the recommended vendors for purchase of goods and services. The total spending authority requested is \$5,554,000.

Item 2.1 – Automated Vehicle Identification Software System, Licenses, Maintenance and Support Services: Awards a legacy contract to Transcore LP for the purchase of an automated vehicle identification system for the Aviation Department. The amount requested for the initial five-year term is \$1,915,000. If the County exercises the two, five-year options-to-renew, the cumulative value will be \$2,929,000.

Item 2.2 – Airport Noise Operating Management System, Maintenance, and Support Services: Awards a legacy contract to Bruel & Kjaer EMS Inc, for the purchase of software and hardware maintenance support services for the Aviation Department. The amount requested for the initial five-year term is \$875,000. If the County exercises the two, five-year options-to-renew, the cumulative value will be \$2,625,000.

Section 3 – Additional Expenditure Authority and/or Term Extension

The items included in this section will increase expenditure authority and/or extend term for prequalification pools and contracts for the purchase of goods and services. The additional expenditure authority is for various goods and services allowed under the original terms and conditions of these contracts, but for which the funding necessary requires Board authorization. The total additional spending authority requested is \$15,528,000.

Item 3.1 – Milk, Dairy Products and Fruit Drinks: Extends this contract for an additional six months so various County departments may continue to purchase milk, dairy products and fruit drinks. No additional funding is required.

Item 3.2 – PlantCML Software License and Support Service: The Information Technology Department is requesting additional expenditure authority of up to \$298,000 to support the existing Reverse 311 System.

Item 3.3 – Truck Scales Purchase, Repair & Maintenance – Prequalification Pool: PWWM is requesting additional expenditure authority of up to \$1,600,000 to purchase onboard scales for PWWM's transfer station heavy equipment fleet.

Item 3.4 – Liquid Level Controllers – Prequalification Pool: Extends this pool for an additional five years and \$2,270,000 in expenditure authority so the Water and Sewer Department (WASD) may continue to purchase parts, components, units and services for liquid level controller systems.

Item 3.5 – Embossers, Stamps and Marking Products – Prequalification Pool: Extends this pool contract for an additional five years and \$232,000 in expenditure authority so that various County departments can continue to purchase various stamps and marking products.

Item 3.6 – Automotive Vehicles – Prequalification Pool: Extends this pool contract for an additional five years and \$875,000 in expenditure authority so that the Internal Services Department may continue to purchase vehicles on an as-needed basis for various County departments.

Item 3.7 – Fire Rescue Replacement Equipment – Prequalification Pool: Extends this pool contract for an additional five years and \$6,059,000 in expenditure authority so that the Aviation and Fire Rescue departments may continue to purchase fire rescue replacement equipment an as-needed basis.

Item 3.8 – Mobile Material Handling Equipment – Prequalification Pool: Requests an additional \$1,194,000 in expenditure authority so that WASD and PWWM may continue to purchase mobile material handling equipment an as-needed basis.

Item 3.9 – Hurricane Shutters Furnish/Install/Repair – Prequalification Pool: Community Action and Human Services is requesting additional expenditure authority of up to \$3,000,000 to use grant funding for the provision of hurricane shutters to eligible County residents.

Scope

The scope of the actions in this item is countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The allocations and funding sources, by department, is listed in the attached items.

The contract amounts and departmental allocations represent the maximum spending authority based on past utilization. This action does not guarantee that the total contract amount/value will be expended by the department. Funding will be expended only if the department's budget can support the expenditures approved in its annual budget adopted by the Board.

Track Record/Monitor

There are no known performance/compliance issues with the vendors recommended for award in the attached items. Each department's contract manager is reflected in the individual items.

Delegated Authority

If the items in Section 1 and 2 of this package are approved, the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee will have the authority to exercise, in their discretion, subsequent options-to-renew periods and extend contracts for purchase of goods and services in accordance with the terms and conditions of each contract.

Upon approval of items 3.3 through 3.9 of Section 3, the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee will have the authority to solicit pricing and award contracts up to an aggregate contract amount of the allocation authorized by the Board. Additionally, the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee may add qualified vendors to the pool at any time during the term of the contract, subject to bi-annual ratification by the Board. The County Mayor or County Mayor's designee will also have the authority to exercise, at their discretion, contract modifications, options-to-renew, and other extensions in accordance with the terms and conditions of the pool contracts.



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AWARD OF COMPETITIVE CONTRACTS IN A TOTAL AMOUNT UP TO \$10,560,000.00, AWARD OF LEGACY CONTRACTS IN A TOTAL AMOUNT UP TO \$5,554,000.00, AND AUTHORIZING ADDITIONAL TIME AND EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY IN A TOTAL AMOUNT UP TO \$15,528,000.00 FOR VARIOUS CONTRACTS FOR THE PURCHASE OF GOODS AND SERVICES

WHEREAS, the County Mayor recommends to this Board to authorize additional expenditure authority for the purchase of goods and services,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

Section 1. This Board authorizes award of competitively established contracts as set forth in items 1.1, 1.2, and 1.3 of the incorporated memorandum in a total amount up to \$10,560,000.00.

Section 2. This Board authorizes award of legacy contracts as set forth in items 2.1 and 2.2 of the incorporated memorandum in a total amount up to \$5,554,000.00.

Section 3. This Board authorizes additional expenditure authority and or time as set forth in items 3.1 through 3.9 of the incorporated memorandum in an amount up to \$15,528,000.00 for the purchase of goods and services.

Section 4. This Board authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to conduct spot bids, award subsequent contracts, and add vendors to the pool at

any time, subject to ratification by the Board on a bi-annual basis, for the pools set forth in items 3.3 through 3.9 of the incorporated memorandum.

Section 5. This Board authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to execute contracts for the items approved herein and exercise contract modifications, options-to-renew, any cancellation provisions, and any other rights contained therein in accordance with the terms and conditions of such contracts.





Subject: Recommendation for Approval to Award: Paper-Based Disposable Trays



Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve award of *Contract No. 9160-0/18, Paper-Based Disposable Trays* to the vendors listed below for the purchase of various types of trays by Miami-Dade Corrections and Rehabilitation (MDCR). The solicitation has two groups: Group I - Paper-Based Dual Oven-able Trays for hot meals and Group II - Fiber Trays for cold snacks and lunch meals. As part of Group I, the awarded vendor will also be providing Oliver 1908 Automatic Heat Seal Lidding Machines, at no cost to the County, to seal each tray with protective film. Vendor is also responsible for all maintenance and service to the Oliver 1908 Automatic Heat Seal Lidding Machines.

In 2008, the Board directed MDCR to conduct a feasibility study to determine whether it was cost-effective to replace plastic food trays with recyclable trays. During this time, MDCR had been researching possible alternative meal delivery systems and identified paper-based trays, produced from recycled materials and fully recyclable, as an economical alternative as well as fully compatible with the food warming equipment utilized by MDCR.

MDCR has been transitioning correctional facilities to this paper-based disposable tray meal delivery system to serve meals to the inmate population. Three of the four correctional facilities currently use this meal delivery system: Pre-Trial Detention Center, Training and Treatment Center, and Turner Guilford Knight Correctional Facility. The Metro West facility will also be transitioning to this meal delivery system as part of this contract.

Scope

The impact of this item is countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact and Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the five-year term of this contract is \$4,461,000, of which \$3,459,000 is for purchases under Group I and \$1,002,000 is for purchases under Group II. The current contract is for two years and six months and valued at \$951,000. The overall increase in allocation is attributable to various factors, including an expanded contract scope to include fiber trays for cold snacks and lunch meals, and increased usage as additional correctional facilities have begun using these trays during the current contract term.

The method of award is to the two responsive and responsible Bidders, by group, as primary and secondary vendors, offering the lowest aggregate price per group. Only one bid was received for Group I, thus there is no secondary vendor for this group.



Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve award of *Contract No. 7313-0/18, Video and Miscellaneous Services for Leachate Pipe Systems* to Envirowaste Services Group, Inc. as primary vendor and Jetclean America, LLC, as secondary vendor. The awarded vendors will provide video inspection services of the landfill leachate transmission system and under-drain piping for landfills managed by Public Works and Waste Management (PWWM). The landfills to be serviced include the North Dade and South Dade Landfills, and the Resources Recovery Facility.

The two recommended firms will provide all labor, materials, tools, equipment, transportation, licenses and incidentals necessary to perform the required services in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations (i.e. Occupational Safety and Health Administration).

Scope

The impact of this item is countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact and Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the five-year term is \$2,038,000. The proposed allocation is based on anticipated usage and is budgeted as follows:

There is no current contract in place because the awarded vendor on the previous contract, 7313-1/16, was terminated for default as they were not able to provide the proper equipment required to perform the essential services required by the County under the contract.



Subject: Recommendation for Approval to Award: Contract No. 9749-0/18, Transportation Services

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the award of *Contract No. 9749-0/18, Transportation Services*. This contract is being awarded to the vendors listed below in three separate Groups, as follows:

- Group 1 – Motor Coach Rentals;
- Group 2 – School Bus Rentals; and
- Group 3 – Prequalification Pool for Transportation Services.

The primary users of this contract will be PortMiami and the Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces (PROS) departments. PortMiami utilizes these services to transfer cruise passengers between parking lots and terminals at the port. PROS uses transportation services during the annual Sony Open Tennis Tournament at the Crandon Park Tennis Center, as well as to transport children participating in vacation camps throughout the year. The remaining departments use these services on an as-needed basis, such as special events and meetings. Contract services include rental of full-size and mini-buses, motor coaches, school buses and vans.

Scope

The impact of this item is countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the five-year term is \$4,061,000. This is a consolidation of three contracts with a combined total allocation of \$3,026,000 for three years and six months. The allocations are budgeted as follows:

If this item is approved, the County Mayor or County Mayor’s designee will have the authority to exercise, at their discretion, contract modifications, and other extensions in accordance with the terms and conditions of the contract. Additionally, upon approval, a pool of pre-qualified vendors for Group 3 will be established to participate in spot market competitions. The County Mayor or the County Mayor’s designee will have the authority to solicit pricing and award contracts up to an aggregate contract amount of the allocation authorized by the Board. Additionally, the County Mayor or the County Mayor’s designee may add qualified vendors to the pool at any time during the contract term, subject to ratification by the Board on a bi-annual basis.

Vendor(s) Recommended for Award

An Invitation to Bid was issued under full and open competition on April 9, 2013. The award consists of three groups: Group 1 - Motor Coach Rentals; Group 2 - School Bus Rentals; Group 3 - Establishment of a Pre-qualified pool of vendors to provide transportation services, including the annual tennis tournament for PROS. The method of award for Groups 1 and 2 is to the two lowest-priced responsive and responsible bidders, on a group-by-group basis. The method of award for Group 3 is to prequalify all responsive and responsible vendors meeting the minimum qualifications set forth in this solicitation. Pre-qualified bidders will participate in future spot market competitions. Twelve proposals were received in response to the solicitation.





Subject: Recommendation for Approval to Award a Legacy Purchase: Automated Vehicle Identification Software System, Licenses, Maintenance and Support Services



Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve a legacy award of contract L9757-2/28 *Automated Vehicle Identification (AVI) System* to Transcore LP to procure an AVI Software System (AVI System) inclusive of all required software licenses, hardware, implementation services, training and software maintenance support services to be utilized by the Aviation Department.

The AVI System will provide the Aviation Department with the ability to monitor, track and collect revenue for commercial vehicles entering and exiting Miami International Airport (MIA). The AVI System is comprised of both software and hardware readers that collectively provide a Ground Transportation Management System. The AVI System includes Commercial Vehicle Management software that is specifically designed for airports to track and control movement of commercial vehicles within the airport and to perform tag administration, vehicle access control, and tracking. The AVI System uses technology that captures signals emitted by Sunpass transponders (tags) assigned to drivers and are captured automatically by driving lane devices. The tag readers store a variety of vehicle charges including trips dwell time, violation, and circuit fees and in turn generates statistics, billing, and revenue reports based on company permit number and vehicles tags.

The existing AVI System (Existing System) was purchased from Durasys in 1996. The Existing System has reached the end of its useful life and is no longer supported. The Aviation Department is losing revenue due to the Existing System not operating properly. The new AVI System offered by Transcore is compatible with the existing Durasys readers, and will allow the Aviation Department to migrate to the upgraded Existing System one area at a time, and avoid operational impacts. Additionally, the new AVI System will seamlessly avoid interference with the new Sunpass Parking System already in place throughout MIA. Transcore LP is the proprietary owner and developer of the AVI Ground Transportation Tracking System, and is the sole provider of the required software licenses, transponders, readers, and maintenance support services.

Scope

The impact of this item is not countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the initial five-year term is \$1,915,000. If the County exercises the two, five-year options to renew, the cumulative value will be \$2,929,000. The proposed contract amount is based on anticipated usage and needs over the next five years. As a result of negotiations, the County achieved a savings of approximately \$82,000 compared to the initial price proposal.



Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve award of legacy contract L7293-2/28 *Airport Noise Operating Management System* to Bruel & Kjaer EMS Inc. for purchase of software and hardware maintenance support services for the Aviation Department.

The Airport Noise Operating Management System (ANOMS) provides the Aircraft Noise and Environmental Planning Division within the Aviation Department the ability to gather and process flight path and aircraft altitude data. ANOMS was procured by the Aviation Department in 1998, and awarded to Bruel & Kjaer EMS Inc. (formerly known as Harris Miller, Miller, & Hanson, Inc.). The Aviation Department uses ANOMS to support daily operations as it provides staff the ability to track and identify flights, monitor and analyze all departures and pending arrivals at all County-managed airports. The data obtained from ANOMS is used to verify airport arrivals and runway management for the Environmental Assessments for the Flight Information Display System.

ANOMS has permanent noise monitors installed throughout Miami-Dade communities surrounding various airports to adequately address citizen's aircraft noise complaints. ANOMS identifies the plane's altitude and noise levels over the homes and detects discrete noise events based on flight track geometry and motion relative to runway ends and type of operation. ANOMS is used to match citizen reports of unusually loud operations to the specific aircraft that generated the disturbance. This information helps Aviation Department staff follow up with individual pilots as well as analyze, implement, and monitor noise abatement procedures. The Airport Noise Mitigation staff transcribes each noise complaint into the System and each complaint is reviewed and researched to establish what further action is necessary. This information is then logged at the end of each month into the monthly noise complaint log.

Bruel & Kjaer EMS Inc. is the sole proprietor of the ANOMS software, hardware, and required software and hardware maintenance support services.

Scope

The impact of this item is not countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the initial five-year term is \$875,000. If the County exercises the two, five-year options to renew, the cumulative value will be \$2,625,000. The long term replacement contract has been negotiated to provide the Aviation Department with a fixed-fee schedule for all required software and hardware maintenance support fees throughout the initial contract term as well as all available options to renew. As a result of negotiations, staff achieved a savings of \$93,180 from the initial proposal submitted over the first term. The current contract has a total allocation of \$760,000 for four years. The proposed contract amount is based on anticipated usage over the next five years.



Contract Description and Reason for Change:
 Authorization is requested for additional expenditure authority so Public Works Waste Management (PWWM) and Water and Sewer Department (WASD) may procure additional mobile material handling equipment through this prequalification pool.

WASD's increase in expenditure authority will allow for the purchase of a 50-ton low boy trailer, a 100' man lift, a diesel pneumatic forklift and a pneumatic lift for an estimated total of \$309,000 to support operations. PWWM anticipates purchasing various types of equipment, including water pumps, portable light towers, portable air compressors, riding lawn mowers, and trailers. In addition, PWWM conducted a pilot program that entailed the use of utility vehicles at its landfills, thus replacing more expensive light equipment. The pilot program proved to be cost effective and PWWM will purchase one utility vehicle through this contract. The additional allocation request of \$885,000 will allow PWWM to purchase the equipment and vehicle for its operational needs.
