RESOLUTION NO. R-152-15

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING SB 248, HB 57, OR SIMILAR LEGISLATION THAT WOULD REQUIRE UNIFORMED PATROL OFFICERS IN FLORIDA TO BE EQUIPPED WITH POLICE BODY CAMERAS WHILE PERFORMING THEIR DUTIES, PROVIDED THAT THE STATE FUNDS THIS INITIATIVE

**WHEREAS**, Senate Bill 248 (“SB 248”) and House Bill 57 (“HB 57”), both entitled the “Police and Citizen Protection Act,” have been filed for consideration during the 2015 session of the Florida Legislature by Senator Chris Smith (D – Fort Lauderdale) and Representative Shevrin D. “Shev” Jones (D – West Park), respectively; and

**WHEREAS**, SB 248 and HB 57 would require all uniformed Florida law enforcement officers primarily assigned to patrol duties to be equipped with police body cameras while performing their duties; and

**WHEREAS**, SB 248 and HB 57 would also require uniformed patrol officers to use their police body cameras to record activities that occur during motor vehicle stops or other law enforcement actions taken during the course of official duties; and

**WHEREAS**, if uniformed patrol officers are required to wear police body cameras, it could provide benefits to both the law enforcement community and the public that it serves; and

**WHEREAS**, if uniformed patrol officers are required to wear police body cameras, some of the perceived benefits include, among others, the following:

- Body-worn cameras may increase transparency and the public’s view of police legitimacy;
- Body-worn cameras may have a civilizing effect, resulting in improved behavior among both police officers and the public;

- Body-worn cameras may have evidentiary benefits that expedite resolution of public complaints or lawsuits and that improve evidence for arrest and prosecution; and
- Body-worn cameras may provide opportunities for police training; and

**WHEREAS**, even though the abovementioned benefits are important, there will be a significant cost to implementing the requirement that all uniformed patrol officers be equipped with police body cameras; and

**WHEREAS**, separate to any requirements by the state, the County's Fiscal Year 2014-15 budget includes \$1 million for the purchase of police body cameras and related equipment to outfit a select number of Miami-Dade Police officers with the devices; and

**WHEREAS**, even though the County will be equipping some of its officers with police body cameras, SB 248 and HB 57 would require all uniformed patrol officers to be outfitted with such devices, which would greatly increase the cost to the County; and

**WHEREAS**, if the state is going to require all uniformed patrol officers to be equipped with police body cameras, the state should provide funding for the initiative; and

**WHEREAS**, this Board wishes to support SB 248, HB 57, or similar legislation that would require uniformed patrol officers to wear police body cameras, provided that the state funds the initiative,

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA**, that this Board:

**Section 1.** Supports SB 248, HB 57, or similar legislation that would require uniformed patrol officers in Florida to be equipped with police body cameras while performing their duties, provided that the state funds this initiative and provided that the legislation preserves local control over protocols associated with requiring officers to wear police body cameras.

**Section 2.** Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit certified copies of this resolution to the Governor, the Senate President, the House Speaker, and the Chair and Members of the Miami-Dade State Legislative Delegation, Senator Chris Smith, and Representative Shevrin D. "Shev" Jones.

**Section 3.** Directs the County's state lobbyists to advocate for the passage of the legislation described in Section 1 above, and authorizes and directs the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to amend the 2015 state legislative package to include this item.

The Co-Prime Sponsors of the foregoing resolution are Commissioner Sally Heyman and Chairman Jean Monestime and the Co-Sponsor is Commissioner Audrey M. Edmonson. It was offered by Commissioner **Rebeca Sosa**, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner **Sally A. Heyman** and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:
