Subject: Resolution Authorizing Submittal of a Grant Application to the Florida Department of Transportation Highway Beautification Council Grant Program for \$100,000.00 in Grant Funds with a County Match of \$67,188.00 for a Beautification Project on State Road A1A at the Gateway to Haulover Beach Park and Marina

Resolution No. R-687-15

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) authorize the Mayor or County Mayor's designee to apply to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Highway Beautification Council Grant Program for a grant of \$100,000.00 with matching County funds of \$67,188.00 to plant trees and beautify the gateway through Haulover Beach Park and Marina along State Road A1A. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to receive and expend funds and execute grant agreements, amendments and other documents as required by the grant upon review and final approval by the County Attorney's Office.

Scope

Haulover Beach Park and Marina is located at 10800 Collins Avenue, Miami, in Commission District 4, represented by Commissioner Sally A. Heyman.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The total cost of the project is \$167,188:00. If awarded, the grant will provide funds of \$100,000.00, with a County match of \$67,188.00, provided by project 20, Haulover Park – Building Better Communities Bond Program. Enhanced maintenance will be performed by the staff of Haulover Park, beginning in FY 2016-17 at the cost of \$4,800.00 annually for quarterly pruning and upkeep, with funding from Haulover Park index code PREHAU438731.

Track Record/Monitor

Grants Administrator, Joanne Menoher Case, will manage and monitor the grant funds.

Background

The State of Florida Department of Transportation Highway Beautification Council Grant Program, established in Section 339.2405, Florida Statutes, allows for the application for grants up to \$101,700.00. The Miami-Dade Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department (PROS) is partnering with Neat Streets Miami, formerly known as Community Image Advisory Board (CIAB), to enhance the aesthetics along this priority corridor.

State Road A1A is a major north-south Florida State Road and as Collins Avenue intersects Haulover Park and Marina, connecting Bal Harbour to Sunny Isles. Project elements will include landscape design, installation, and maintenance. The landscape plan will include site preparation, tree and native ground cover planting, and urban streetscape improvements.

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


The grant application (Exhibit 1) is due by October 1, 2015, and is required to be accompanied by an adopted resolution. If awarded the grant term will be from February 2016 to February 2017.





SR A1A Haulover





PROS recommends removing the Royals in the median to eliminate the conflict with the overhead utilities.




Currently, different Palm species line SR A1A. Furthermore, utilities on the eastern side of the corridor limit what can be planted in the swale.

3. PROJECT NARRATIVE

Haulover Beach Park and Marina is an iconic park in the Northern part of Miami-Dade County that the public has enjoyed since 1940. Likewise, State Route A1A (SR A1A) is a Florida icon—the eastern most north-south corridor running along the Atlantic Ocean. This proposal is about celebrating and unifying these icons through aesthetic improvements to the public rights-of-way. Miami-Dade County is a subtropical paradise with beautiful and picturesque vistas. Tourism is a vital industry for the economic health of South Florida, with 14 million tourists visiting Miami-Dade County in 2014. The Miami-Dade Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department (PROS) proposes a beautification of SR A1A to highlight one of the busiest beaches in the County. By planting new trees and sustainable vegetation along the medians that connect the bayside with the beachfront, the County and the state can showcase their commitment to safety, the environment and aesthetics. Furthermore, with an intentional design of the public right-of-way, the County will unify this park, add much needed aesthetic elements to the corridor and create a unique landscaping brand that highlights the natural features of the beach.

The State of Florida Highway Beautification Program offers an opportunity for Miami-Dade County and Neat Streets Miami to form a collaborative partnership to apply for a grant of \$100,000 for the SR A1A beautification project. If awarded the grant by the state, the funding will be matched by \$167,188 from Miami-Dade County, and will advance PROS' Master Plan for Haulover Park. This portion of SR A1A serves as the front door to the County's iconic park and is befitting of landscaping that represents its significance in the region.

Currently, this particular stretch of SR A1A is rather bleak and easy to drive by without noticing remarkable features. It is in stark contrast to the lush, green and stately landscaping provided by the Village of Bal Harbour to the south, and the maintained landscaping provided by Sunny Isles Beach to the north. Accentuating the disarray, several of the palms in the median are growing into existing overhead utilities, with fronds weighing the wires down in certain places.

This first proposed phase of median and swale improvements will be concentrated on the southern end of Haulover Beach Park and Marina, where the beautification project will focus on the median and limited swale areas along the 6-lane roadway. Project elements will include the relocation of the Royal Palms conflict with the overhead wires; plantings of appropriate-sized palms; and the use of xeriscaping, native species with high wind resistance to keep the maintenance requirements low and to minimize extreme weather-related damage. The Beautification Project will consist mostly of palms with an understory of native grasses and vines, where space and sight distance constraints allow. The ground cover would be low and increase in height only within areas that are outside of the clear sight zones. This treatment would add order and formalize an otherwise disorganized median landscape—it will offer natural cues to SR A1A travelers that they have arrived to the seaside paradise that is Haulover Beach Park.

This beautification project will allow Miami-Dade County and Neat Streets Miami to enhance, beautify, and showcase the major state roadway connecting Haulover Beach, Bal Harbour and Sunny Isles. Considering approximately 40-50,000 motorists driving through this corridor daily and thousands of cyclists riding through on a weekly basis, the return on investment is great—with resulting reductions in carbon dioxide, improved air quality, reduction of stormwater runoff and enhanced aesthetics. Furthermore, by instilling order to the landscaping, motorists will begin to respect the no-loading and unloading signs along SR A1A, eliminating a safety hazard for fellow motorists and cyclists heading northbound and reinforcing the Park's and FDOT's mutual desire for beach goers to use tunnels running below the highway. Finally, by approaching this beautification in phases, the Miami-Dade PROS can learn, adjust accordingly and apply best practices as it incrementally moves northward with beautification investments.

5. DESCRIPTIONS OF EVALUATION ATTRIBUTES

1. **Aesthetic value:** This project will result in a large visual impact due to the introduction of an intentional design in the median, incorporating palms, and ground covers. By creating a gateway, the plantings will significantly add to the safety and aesthetic value of this area and preserve our scenic resources. This project corridor is unique in that it is the only unincorporated section of SR A1A in Miami-Dade, thus it has lacked an identity for years. This signature corridor will benefit from thoughtful landscaping improvements that create a coastal identity for Park visitors and passersby to enjoy and complements the existing surroundings. The project will combine creative landscaping and design with low water, simple care, and constant color, resulting in a bold conservation statement that will help frame the community's most distinctive features.
2. **Level of local support:** The Miami-Dade County Highway Beautification Grant Initiative will target SR A1A, a major state highway in Miami-Dade County that connects the oceanside with the bayside. The target corridor between Haulover Cut Bridge and Sunny Isles is a critical link for adjacent communities to experience public access to the beach and marina. For years, several non-profits have contributed to the tree canopy in Haulover Park. Furthermore, adjacent businesses have long invested in sponsoring the activation of open spaces inside Haulover Beach Park and Marina. The beautification project's plan is the Park's first opportunity to educate passersby of the importance of coastal resiliency. With the use of native ground covers, we can reinforce the need to bolster our oceanfront resources, while making the area more attractive to visitors and businesses.
3. **Cost effectiveness.** As a fellow government agency responsible for roadside maintenance, PROS shares FDOT's commitment to efficiently using resources and providing taxpayers a strong return on investment. Using native ground covers, PROS will employ inexpensive methods to greatly enhance the appearance of the roadway. In areas that can be planted, PROS will select proper plant materials, which will satisfy FDOT requirements for sight visibility, have low maintenance needs, and have visual characteristics complementary of the park and the community. Almost all of the ground cover can be grown to a full, mature size, without continual shaping. Furthermore, by removing the existing Royals, PROS will be saving FDOT future challenges caused by the conflicts with the overhead utilities. We will utilize PROS staff to enhance the existing maintenance of the medians. PROS has a Maintenance of Traffic (MOT) training instructor on staff that will ensure our employees operate safely and comply with FDOT/FHWA regulations.
4. **Feasibility of installation and maintenance.** The design of this project is feasible in terms of both installation and maintenance. Since the project is located in a harsh street environment, we will incorporate practical design concepts and xeriscaping principles. To contain the sand, this proposal also includes installation of a top layer of rock in the areas closest to the curbing. The plant species including palms shall be wind tolerant and require limited maintenance. All of the plants have been chosen for their low water demands. However, to ensure a successful, sustainable investment, PROS will provide enhanced maintenance of the landscaping.
5. **Environmental Benefits: Contribution to improvement of environmental conditions, including litter prevention, erosion control, visual screening and noise abatement.** During the high season, the traffic to and from Haulover Beach Park and Marina can be grueling. While PROS is implementing internal circulation improvements to address some of the vehicular congestion, (and thereby reducing auto emissions), planting additional vegetation on the medians and swales will increase air quality, reduce storm water runoff and decrease noise pollution. Additionally, closely planted vegetation will keep trash from settling on the grass, as it currently does. Using native ground cover will also help reduce motorists loading and unloading in inappropriate areas along northbound SR A1A. Generally, erosion is not a significant issue within the project site due to existing curb and gutter in the median. However, some of the swales along this portion of SR A1A lack curb and gutter—especially along the eastern side. Though the right-of-way available for planting is limited in some areas, vegetation will be added to absorb some noise pollution.

6. **Right Plant Right Place: Florida Friendly Landscaping Use of Florida native wildflowers and diversity of other native, hybrid native or noninvasive plant species.** The design for this project strives to "tell a story" that is representative of a Florida lifestyle. PROS intends to replace tall Royals with Palms that are appropriate for the area. Furthermore PROS will reuse the native Florida Royal Palms within the park so as to ensure a minimal loss of vegetation. Native ground covers, such as Sea Oates will also be used extensively in the larger planting areas. Finally, native Rail Road Vine will be planted to add some color in the bullnoses.
7. **Emphasis on low maintenance and water conservation.** In addition to the aesthetic enhancements, low maintenance is one of the major considerations contributing to the success of this project. All of the proposed plant materials have characteristics that will reduce maintenance activities. The palms that will be selected will only require periodic trimming. Almost all of the understory vegetation was selected because it does not call for constant trimming and shaping, and because it is hardy and drought tolerant. Currently, FDOT's contractors must cut the grass along the medians throughout the year and navigate the mowers between chaotically placed palms. With the proposed design, this inconvenience would no longer be an issue.
8. **Waste Reduction Use of recycled materials such as mulch, reuse water, or solid yard waste compost.** The County's intent for this project is to protect, preserve, maintain and enhance the area's natural beauty. This project will use recycled mulch whenever feasible. Furthermore, as previously mentioned, PROS is committed to relocating the Royal Palms in its Park after they are removed from the median. By adding to the existing vegetation, this proposal will result in reduced storm water runoff. However, PROS will consult the Water and Sewer Department to identify methods of capturing the remaining storm water runoff to be used for watering the median, when necessary.
9. **Forethought and Planning Contribution to an area wide or regional beautification plan.** In 2012, PROS released Master Plan for Haulover's 320 acres, spanning both sides of SR A1A. Since then, it has been working incrementally toward implementation. The beautification of the 1.5 miles of medians and swales abutting the park will complete a critical element of the Master Plan. Furthermore, Neat Streets Miami has spent nearly 15 years focused on the maintenance and beautification of transportation corridors and gateways. Because this portion of SR A1A has long served as the missing link of the beautiful seaside experience of driving along SR A1A, the completion of this beautification project would Miami-Dade's beach communities.
10. **Value to the community.** For approximately 70 years, Haulover Beach Park and Marina has sat as a literal and metaphorical island. Since 1997, it has represented the last piece of unincorporated Miami-Dade County along SR A1A. However, when motorists, cyclists and walkers encounter this stretch of A1A, they do not experience the pride the County feels about this park. Rather, they see lack luster medians and a mixed planting palate that appears to have no design. For the communities to the north and south, the current landscaping does not represent a Gateway, rather it is a means to an end. In contrast, Haulover Park is repeatedly cited by tourists and residents as a world-class destination. It is the winner of multiple Trip Advisor Awards. By upgrading the existing landscaping in the medians and swale along SR A1A, PROS and FDOT can elevate the corridor so that is befitting the iconic beachfront park that welcomes more than 800,000 annual visitors—the site of Miami-Dade's first swim-in, home to thousands of photo and film shoots, events, boat launches and celebrations. In addition to an enhanced driving experience, this proposed transportation gateway, beautification project will position the County to better promote South Florida's economic interest as a tourist destination and as a beautiful community. Haulover's neighbors will also feel the benefits as the aesthetics of the public right of way improves to more accurately portray the environmentally sensitive coastal community. In summary, the community will benefit from this proposed project as a result of the following outcomes:
 - ✓ A celebrated gateway between two beach communities.
 - ✓ Cleaner air and ground water near the critical area of the beach.
 - ✓ Reduction in glare, heat, air pollution and dust generated by traffic on SR A1A.
 - ✓ Improved aesthetics of the medians, unifying the beach and bay sides.
 - ✓ An emphasis on the importance of conservation in our vulnerable beachfront communities.
 - ✓ A new front door to Haulover Beach Park and Marina
 - ✓ Formality in the streetscape that will discourage dangerous motorists behavior.






