ORDINANCE APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE COUNTYWIDE GENERAL FUND BUDGET FOR MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA. FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING OCTOBER 1, 2015 AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2016; PROVIDING A SHORT TITLE; INCORPORATING THE FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 PROPOSED BUDGET AS AMENDED: APPROPRIATING ALL BUDGETED REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES; AUTHORIZING THE INVESTMENT OF COUNTY FUNDS IN THE TIME WARRANTS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY; AUTHORIZING THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS AS CASH ADVANCES PENDING RECEIPT OF TAXES OR OTHER REVENUES: AUTHORIZING DEPOSIT OF INTEREST EARNED TO THE GENERAL FUND; RATIFYING AND APPROVING IMPLEMENTING ORDERS AND OTHER ACTIONS OF THE BOARD WHICH SET FEES, RATES, AND CHARGES. AUTHORIZING FEES, RATES, AND **CHARGES** CONSISTENT WITH APPROPRIATIONS, AND PROVIDING FOR THEIR AMENDMENT: AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OR MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE CERTAIN FUNDING AGREEMENTS; WAIVING FOR FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 PROVISIONS OF SECTIONS 2-1799(e) AND 2-1799(f)1 OF THE CODE OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA ("CODE"), RELATED TO THE DISPOSITION OF UNEXPENDED BUDGET MAYORAL OFFICE **FUNDS** AND UNALLOCATED CARRYOVER FUNDING IN THE COUNTYWIDE GENERAL FUND BUDGET; AMENDING, WAIVING OR RESCINDING, IF NECESSARY, VARIOUS CHAPTERS OF THE CODE OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, APPLICABLE IMPLEMENTING ORDERS AND OTHER LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS TO CONFORM SUCH ENACTMENTS TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 ADOPTED BUDGET; WAIVING FOR FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 SECTION 2-1605 OF THE CODE RELATED TO **FINANCIAL** SUPPORT OF **SPORTS** THE COMMISSION: SUPERSEDING CONFLICTING PROVISIONS OF PRIOR LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS IN CONFLICT; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY, EXCLUSION FROM THE CODE AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE

BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Fiscal Year 2015-16 Miami-Dade County Countywide Budget Ordinance."

Section 2. Pursuant to Section 5.03(B) of the Home Rule Charter, the County Mayor has recommended a proposed budget for Miami-Dade County, Florida, for the fiscal year commencing October 1, 2015. Said proposed budget document as submitted to the Board of

County Commissioners ("Board") is incorporated herein by reference and is amended to include:

(a) all of the applicable changes contained in this ordinance; (b) the changes contained in the September 3, 2015 memorandum entitled "Information for First Budget Hearing – FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget", and (c) the applicable changes contained in the September 17, 2015 memorandum entitled "Information for Second Budget Hearing – FY 2015-16" as further amended by the changes read in the record by the Director of the Office of Management and Budget at the second budget hearing to: (i) include an allocation of \$300,000 from the Reserve for Future Services to the Office of Resilience in the Regulatory and Economic Resources Department; and (ii) clarify the total fiscal year 2015-16 community-based organization funding allocation to the Alliance for Aging, Inc. and to Farm Share, Inc. shall be \$220,000 and \$660,000, respectively, in recognition that they are exempted from the competitive process for prospective community-based organization funding, which changes are noted on the version attached hereto.

The Countywide General Fund budget, including the five-year financial plan Section 3. contained therein, as amended as set forth in this ordinance, is hereby approved and adopted. and the budgeted revenues and expenditures therein are hereby appropriated. Department expenditure allocations established by the County Mayor as revised and summarized in the attached budget are adopted as limitations of all expenditures, except as hereinafter provided, and appropriations have been hereby provided for outstanding indebtedness for the payment of vouchers that have been incurred in the current or prior year, but are not expected to be paid until the commencement of the new fiscal year. Receipts from sources not anticipated in the attached budget may be appropriated and expended by ordinance duly enacted by the Board in accordance with Section 129.06(2)(d), Florida Statutes, and Section 1.02(A) of the Miami-Dade County Home Rule Charter. Adjustments within the same fund to departmental appropriations made in the attached budget may be approved from time to time by motion duly adopted by the Board in accordance with Section 129.06(2)(a), Florida Statutes, and Ordinance No. 07-45, as amended. The Director of the Office of Management and Budget is authorized to approve adjustments to expenditure code allocations within the limit of the departmental or other appropriations made in the attached budget. All adjustments made in accordance with this ordinance are approved and ratified.

Section 4. Pursuant to the authority of Chapter 8015, Special Acts of Florida, 1919, which authorizes the Board to borrow money and to issue time warrants, and pursuant to the authority of Section 129.02(5), Florida Statutes, which permits funds of the County to be invested in securities of the federal government and of the local governments in Florida, or both, the Finance Director is hereby authorized to invest these monies in the time warrants of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

Section 5. As provided in Section 5.03(C) of the Home Rule Charter, the Board hereby authorizes the transfer of any portion of the earnings or balance of the several funds, other than sinking funds for obligations not yet retired, to the general funds of the County, provided that such transfer be deemed a cash advance to meet operating and other expenses approved by the Board, and that all such advances shall be reimbursed before the end of the fiscal year upon receipt of adequate tax or other appropriate revenues. Provided, however, that this section in no way limits or restricts the power of the Board to transfer any unencumbered appropriation balance, or any portion thereof, from one department, fund or agency to another as provided by law pursuant to Section 5.03(C) of the Home Rule Charter.

Section 6. The Finance Director, pursuant to Section 5.03(C) of the Home Rule Charter, is hereby authorized to deposit to the accounts of the General Fund any interest on deposits earned or accrued to the benefit of any trust funds, revolving accounts, working capital reserves or other funds held in trust by Miami-Dade County, unless specifically prohibited from doing so by trust or other agreements.

Section 7. The provisions of Section 2-1799(e) of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida, requiring that unexpended funds in Mayoral office budget be designated as reserves at the end of the fiscal year in which the funds were unexpended and added to the Mayoral office budget in the following fiscal year, are waived to permit the use of funds unexpended as of September 30, 2015 from the Mayoral office budget as Fiscal Year 2014-15 General Fund

carryover for appropriation to the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Adopted Budget as approved by the Board. The provisions of Section 2-1799(f)1 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida, requiring that 50 percent of the unallocated carryover funds in the Countywide general fund budget be allocated to the Capital Outlay Reserve fund in the fiscal year following the fiscal year the funds were identified to support County services, are waived for Fiscal Year 2015-16 to permit the use of carryover funds in the Countywide general fund budget that remain unallocated as of September 30, 2015 for appropriation to the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Adopted Budget as approved by the Board.

Section 8. All Implementing Orders, as amended hereby, other actions of the Board setting fees, rates, and charges, and fees, rates, and charges consistent with appropriations adopted herein, are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved, and may be amended by resolution adopted by the Board during the fiscal year.

Section 9. The Mayor or the Mayor's designee is hereby authorized to execute agreements for funding allocations for community-based organizations approved in this ordinance as a result of a request for proposal or other formal selection process or individual allocations approved by the Board in the form approved by the County Attorney.

Section 10. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida, or any resolution or Implementing Order to the contrary, non-profit entities awarded grants of County monies from prior years' Elected Officials Discretionary Reserve or County Services Reserve or Commission office funds shall not be required to complete affidavits of compliance with the various policies or requirements applicable to entities contracting or transacting business with the County.

Section 11. The provisions of Section 2-1605 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida, that provide for financial support to the Sports Commission by including the amount of \$250,000 in the official Miami-Dade County budget each year, unless otherwise directed by the Board of County Commissioners, shall be waived for Fiscal Year 2015-16.

Section 12. Unless otherwise prohibited by law, this ordinance shall supersede all enactments of this Board including, but not limited to, ordinances, resolutions, implementing

orders, regulations, rules, and provisions of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida in conflict

herewith; provided, however, nothing in this ordinance shall amend or supersede the

requirements of Ordinance No. 07-45, as amended.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or provision of this ordinance is Section 13.

held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such invalidity.

Section 14. The provisions of this ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after

the date of enactment unless vetoed by the Mayor, and if vetoed, shall become effective only

upon an override by this Board. In the event all or any particular component of this ordinance are

vetoed, the remaining components, if any, shall become effective ten (10) days after the date of

enactment and the components vetoed shall become effective only upon override by this Board.

It is the intention of the Board and it is hereby ordained that the provisions Section 15.

of this ordinance shall be excluded from the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

Information for First Budget Hearing - F 2015-16 Proposed Budget

This information has been prepared to accompany the FY 2015-16 Budget Ordinances for your consideration at the first budget hearing on September 3, 2015. This document details all adjustments identified since the submittal of the Proposed Budget on July 7, 2015.

The attached ordinances have been adjusted for technical changes, corrections of scriveners' errors, corrections of appropriation posting errors, and current estimates of grants. Cash carryover for proprietary funds has been adjusted where appropriate. Amendments to or waiver of various code requirements and/or resolutions are recommended, including waiver of Section 2-1799 (e) to allow unexpended funds from the budget of the Office of the Mayor to revert to the General Fund carryover, Section 2-1799(f)1 related to the disposition of unallocated carryover funding in the Countywide and Unincorporated Municipal Service Area (UMSA) budgets, Section 8-12(c) related to building permit fee when work begins prior to obtaining the permit, and Section 29-7 (G) relating to the use of Documentary Stamp Surtax. The recommended operating budget adjustments detailed below increases the total operating budget by \$1.364 million.

As part of this year's budget development process, we worked closely with the Strategic Planning and Government Operations Committee and provided budget and strategic planning information as requested. As required under Ordinance 07-45, we held two Revenue Estimating Conferences and, pursuant to Ordinance 11-45, convened eight public meetings to discuss the budget with the community, all of which were publicly-noticed, as referenced in the July 29, 2015 memorandum to the Board of County Commissioners (the Board). Between the first and second budget hearings, my staff and I will continue to work with you and the Office of the Commission Auditor on further refinements to the budget and additional adjustments, if any, will be incorporated as part of the information that will be provided to the Board for the second budget hearing on September 17, 2015.

OPERATING BUDGET

Homeless Trust

Subsequent to the release of the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget, on July 31, 2015, the Miami-Dade County Homeless Trust Board approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City of Miami, the County, and the Homeless Trust to provide no fewer than an additional 150 beds with wraparound services for Miami's street homeless. The agreement stated that the City of Miami will purchase at least 75 beds at Camillus House and the Homeless Trust will procure a minimum of 75 beds through a competitive bid process. The MOU becomes effective October 1, 2015. The new beds to be procured by the Homeless Trust are estimated to cost \$700,000. The Homeless Trust will also need to spend an additional \$908,000 in FY 2015-16 to provide for necessary repairs at the two Homeless Assistance Centers. These expenditures will be funded by improved carryover into FY 2015-16 (\$220,000), a transfer from the operational reserves of \$480,000, and a transfer from the capital reserves of \$908,000.

Miami-Dade Police (MDPD)

The Town of Cutler Bay has requested the deletion of one Police Station Specialist and the addition of one Police Officer. Funding for these position changes are provided by the contracting entity (\$50,000). MDPD will also be adding a Criminalist 1 position, to be funded by the 2015 DNA Capacity Enhancement and Backlog Reduction Grant (\$85,000).

Public Works and Waste Management

The FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget assumed an increase in revenue associated with an estimated 1.5 percent consumer price index (CPI) growth. Actual CPI for the period was a -0.1 percent reduction, which requires an overall reduction of 1.6 percent for disposal charges from the Proposed Budget. An adjustment of \$1.906 million in revenues will be offset by a corresponding reduction in budgeted reserves. The reduction in disposal charges also affects the cost of collections operations. Collections operations expenses will be decreased by \$746,000 and reserves increased by that same amount.

Miami-Dade Transit (MDT)

After further review of the current year expenditures, it is anticipated that MDT will save at least \$3 million in various operating expenses, when compared to the previous projections which were used to develop the Proposed Budget. The additional projected savings will provide carryover into FY 2015-16 to support the operating budget and allow the transfer from the People's Transportation Plan (PTP) Surtax to be reduced by the same amount.

Human Resources

To address the case back-log associated with Equal Opportunity and Human Rights Commission complaints, two Investigator positions (\$176,000) will be added to the Human Resources Department. In addition, the Proposed Budget included an allocation of \$500,000 for mid-level management training. An adjustment is being made to transfer \$77,000 of this funding to the Human Resources Department to fund a position to assist with employee training functions performed countywide.

I am creating an Employee Recognition Fund from revenues budgeted in County departments for merit, longevity bonus, premium pay, and flex benefits specific to executive staff under the Mayor's purview in the job classifications of Deputy Mayors, Department Directors, Deputy Directors, Associate Directors, and Assistant Directors that was included in the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget (\$993,000). I will use this fund to restore benefits and recognize outstanding performance for employees under my purview in these classifications. The funding for the employees under the General Fund will be \$335,000, the Fire District \$39,000, the Library District \$12,000, and the remaining proprietary funds \$607,000.

General Government

After receiving the final information regarding the property tax roll, the payment to Miami Beach for the South Point Interlocal Agreement was calculated to be \$385,000 less than what was included in the Proposed Budget. After funding the positions required for the Human Resources Department described above, the remaining general fund balance that has not been allocated will be added to the Future Services Enhancement Reserve (\$209,000), leaving a balance of \$1.215 million.

PROMOTIONAL FUNDING

Attachments A and B are the reports on Airport and Seaport promotional funds as required by Administrative Order 7-32. The Port of Miami is revising the promotional fund recommended allocations by adding an allocation to the Florida Perishables Coalition (\$20,000), America's Cargo Logistics (\$20,000), and Miami Children's Museum (\$20,000) and reducing the allocations to Cargo and Cruise Marketing Program by \$50,000 to \$290,000 and the Florida Trade Zone by \$10,000 to \$15,000. The total promotional fund allocation included in the Proposed Budget remains the same at \$1.055 million.

Community-based Organizations (CBOs) and Cultural Programs

Attachment C reflects the CBO funding allocations for continuation funding through the end of April 2016, to bridge these contracts to the completion of the new solicitation process monitored by the Office of Management and Budget. Attachment D reflects cultural programs monitored by Department of Cultural Affairs.

CAPITAL BUDGET/CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CIP) UPDATES

Fire Rescue

Subsequent to the release of the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget and Multi-Year Capital Plan, the Department's Sweetwater Station 29 project (Project #P5410, \$1.5 million), originally planned as a temporary relocation project due to the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) widening of SW 107 Avenue, has changed to the construction of a new facility. The street widening project required that the County sell a portion of the land in front of Station 29 and as a result substantial renovations would need to be made to the facility. In lieu of making those renovations to the existing facility, the Department will demolish the 40-year old structure and construct a new two-story facility. It is recommended that \$3 million of the 2006 Sunshine State Financing proceeds be reallocated from the Fire Rescue Station Renovation project (Project #P374900, \$4.5 million) to cover the cost of the new construction. This funding is available due to changes in the plans for the North Bay Village station (Station 27).

Building Better Communities General Obligation Bond Program (BBC GOB)

On June 2, 2015, the Board adopted Resolution R-468-15 and R-469-15, approving significant modifications to the Oak Grove Park project, as well as the Haitian Community Center to be built on that site. Project #P117400 - Acquire or Construct Future Multi-Purpose Facilities \$2.6 million was decreased from BBC GOB Financing in future years and reallocated to Project #P935350 - New Haitian Community Center and Project #P938870 Arcola Lakes Park was decreased by \$300,000 in BBC GOB Financing and reallocated to Project #P935510 Oak Grove Park.

Public Works and Waste Management

Subsequent to the release of the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget and Multi-Year Capital Plan, revenue projections were corrected to reflect a \$1.796 million dollar reduction in projected Secondary Gas Tax revenues and an increase of \$452,000 in available Capital Improvement Local Option Gas Tax (CILOGT). Project #P1640 - Improvements to South Miami Avenue from SE 5 Street to SE 15 Road, Project #P606270 - Pavement Markings Contract, Project #P607680 - Road and Bridge Emergency Repairs/Improvements/Painting, Project #6031831 - Railroad Crossing Improvements, Project #P6030281 - Guardrail Safety Improvements, and Project #P6050231 - Bridge Repair and Painting will all have a portion of activities anticipated for FY 2015-16 deferred to the following fiscal year.

Funding from the general allocations of Road Impact Fee (RIF) projects include Project #P606110 - Traffic Control Devices-Signalization Road Impact Fee District 4, Project #P604610 - Resurfacing Arterial Streets Road Impact Fee District 4, Project #P609310 - Improvements to Intersections in Road Impact Fee District 4 and additional RIF District 4 funding identified subsequent to the release of the Proposed Budget will be used to advance Project #605060 - Improvements on SW 142 Avenue from SW 26 Street to SW 8 Street. Additional RIF funding in Districts 1 and 2 has been allocated to Project #939080 Ludlam Bike Path in FY 2016-17 and FY 2017-18. Similar to RIF funding for the Underline project, in order for this project to access this source, a traffic study will have to be completed indicating the investment improves capacity for the area.

Lastly, to reflect an updated project schedule, a cash flow revision was made to Project #P608290 - Construction of Old Cutler Road Bridge Over C-100 Canal advancing \$210,000 to FY 2015-16 in BBC GOB Financing to begin the planning and design of upgrading the bridge. Attachment E reflects the changes described above.

RECOMMENDED FEE ADJUSTMENTS

The Self-Supporting Budget Ordinance (Agenda Item I) includes the proposed fee changes included in the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget. Fee adjustments include charges for Aviation (rental and other charges), Fire Rescue (fire prevention fees), Internal Services (parking fees), Library (service fees), Medical Examiner (various fees), Port of Miami (contractual adjustments), Public Housing and Community Development (loan processing fees), Public Works and Waste Management (commercial disposal fees adjusted down by the consumer price index, per ordinance), Regulatory and Economic Resources (various fees), and Water and Sewer (various fees). The fee schedules have all been included as reflected in the revenues of the Proposed Budget.

PAY PLAN

Attached to Agenda Item I is the Pay Plan which contains the rates of pay for all non-bargaining unit and bargaining unit employees. The Pay Plan includes the addition of new classifications, the abolition of obsolete classifications, and occupational code and title changes. The pay rates reflected in the Pay Plan will be administered in accordance with the provisions of the Living Wage Ordinance 99-44 and the terms and conditions of the applicable bargaining unit agreements.

POSITION ADJUSTMENTS

In some instances, the above recommendations and correction of errors will adjust the number of positions in the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget, as well as adjustments for the elimination of the unfunded vacancies reflected in the table below and in the tables of organizations attached (Attachment F). The adjustments included in this memorandum increase the total number of recommended positions by five to 26,178. This is 751 positions more than authorized in FY 2014-15.

MIAMI-DADE AVIATION DEPARTMENT PROMOTIONAL FUNDS RECOMMENDED EXPENDITURES Fiscal Year 2015-16

The Budget Ordinance also includes recommendations for Aviation Department Promotional Fund Expenditures totaling \$172,500. As the date of the approved events/program approaches, the Aviation Department will obtain the documentation required by A.O.7-32 from each entity for review by the Aviation Department and the County Attorney's Office prior to disbursement of funds, and in accordance to the following recommendations.

1. Miami-Dade County Aviation Department (MDAD)

Event: Inaugurals for new airlines & routes

Amount recommended: \$15,000

The Aviation Department will co-host inaugural ceremonies for and with new airlines commencing service and with incumbent airlines commencing new routes.

2. Miami-Dade County Aviation Department (MDAD)

Event: Community Outreach Programs Amount recommended: \$52,500

MDAD, in accordance with FAA guidelines, will utilize airport revenues in support of community activities as long as such expenditures are directly and substantially related to the operations of Miami International Airport and MDAD's General Aviation airports. Activities include, among others, Africando, The Florida Chamber's International Days in Tallahassee, The Beacon's Council's Sand in My Shoes Event and Annual Report Event, the Miami-Dade Chamber of Commerce events, the Florida Customs Brokers & Forwarders Association general monthly meeting sponsorship and Board Installation Event, the Greater Miami Convention & Visitors Bureau Annual Report Event, and the World Trade Center's World Trade Month Events and International Trade Achievement Awards. These expenditures will be documented and reviewed on a case-by-case basis to ensure compliance with FAA guidelines.

3. Airport Minority Advisory Council (AMAC)

Event: Annual Airport Business Diversity Conference

Amount recommended: \$5,000

The AMAC promotes the full participation of minority and women-owned businesses in airport contracts and promotes the employment of minorities and women in the airport industry. On a yearly basis, MDAD pledges \$5,000 to the AMAC to sponsor their Annual Airport Business Diversity Conference. This sponsorship entitles MDAD to free conference registrations, a half page ad in the conference's journal, and an exhibit booth. The AMAC annual conference is co-sponsored by the FAA and has become one of the largest aviation conferences in the United States. The event brings together businesses, aviation professionals, government officials and individuals from around the country to discuss a variety of subjects ranging from how to do business at airports to public policy issues impacting the entire aviation industry.

4. Miami-Dade County

Event: Miami-Dade County Days in Tallahassee 2015

Amount recommended: \$2,500

Miami-Dade Days provides a unique opportunity for participants, including local officials and community leaders to discuss legislative priorities affecting Miami International Airport with state legislators in an informal setting.

5. Florida Airports Council (FAC)

Events: FAC State Legislative Summit, FAC Federal Legislative Summit, FAC Annual Conference

Amount recommended: \$8,000

MDAD will co-sponsor during the FAC State and Federal Summits, as well as the Annual Conference, at which the Department will be represented by its Office of Governmental Affairs and the Departmental liaison to FAC.

6. Miami-Dade County Aviation Department (Airside Operations)
Event: FAA Meetings for FY 2014-15

Amount recommended: \$5,000

Airport safety assessment with FAA, airlines, and Chief Pilots; Runway Safety Action Team/FAA meetings with airlines and Chiefs Pilots; FAA drills/meetings reference required drills to meet MIA's 139 Certification as a Commercial Airport; AAAE Trainings regarding required FAA drills to meet MIA's 139 Certification as a Commercial Airport.

7. U.S. Dept. of Commerce's Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA)
Event: National Minority Enterprise Development Conference (MEDWeek)
Amount recommended: \$4,500

MEDWeek is South Florida's annual Business Opportunity Conference & Matchmaker Expo for Small, Minority, Women and Veteran-owned businesses, government agencies, and corporations. The conference is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Commerce. MDAD has been a participant from its inception to network with other minority-owned and operated enterprises and to showcase and discuss minority business opportunities at MDAD.

8. Miami-Dade County Aviation Department

Event: Survival Fire Drill

Amount recommended: \$5,000

The survival drill is conducted by The Fire Department of Miami-Dade County Aviation Department to review safety practices.

9. Foundation for Democracy in Africa (FDA) Event: U.S. Africa Air Transportation Summit Amount recommended: \$25,000

Miami is poised to be the gateway to the U.S. for Africa for air service development in conjunction with the FDA and as such, the major economic beneficiary from related future growth. Through the summit, Miami-Dade Aviation Department will continue to promote air service and cargo trade between the two continents via Miami International Airport.

10. World Trade Center Miami

Event: Air Cargo Americas International Congress and Exhibition Amount recommended: \$50,000

Air Cargo Americas is a biennial forum for aviation executives to exchange views, develop strategies to enhance the growth of the air cargo industry in the Americas, and showcase the latest products and technologies. MDAD will co-host the trade event in November 2015.

In summary, these events will provide Miami-Dade County's Aviation Department an excellent opportunity to showcase and promote Miami International Airport and its General Aviation airports. All promotional funds recipients will be required to comply with the requirements of Administrative Order 7-32 governing the expenditure of Miami-Dade County Aviation Department promotional funds, and with the Federal Aviation Administration's guidelines.

Seaport Promotional Fund Recommended Expenditures FY 2015-16

As incorporated in Administrative Order 7-32 are recommendations for Seaport Promotional Fund expenditures totaling \$1,055,000 to support the following maritime industry related events. These funds will be transferred to the appropriate entities pursuant to execution of standard agreements approved by the County Attorney's Office. Expenditures of such funds shall be spent in accordance with the budgets submitted as part of the standard agreements. In some instances, the funds will be spent directly by the County as set forth below.

1. Greater Miami Convention and Visitors Bureau (GMCVB)

Event title:

Promotional Program

Amount recommended:

\$ 100,000

This funding has been allocated towards promoting several key programs including (1) a Cruise Miami program to increase the number of pre- and post- stays in Miami-Dade County for cruise passengers. These funds include an allocation towards Cruise Familiarization events/tours (FAMs) for travel agents in partnership with the GMCVB and cruise lines, cruise/tourism trade shows, collateral material, trade shows, etc.; (2) sponsorship of the "Where the Worlds Meet" advertising campaign, a marketing initiative in partnership with the GMCVB, the Beacon Council, American Airlines, and the Aviation Department, among others; and (3) developing and producing marketing campaigns/ads for the Port's cruise and cargo business.

2. Latin Chamber of Commerce (CAMACOL)

Event title:

Hemispheric Congress

Amount recommended:

\$ 50,000

The Hemispheric Congress is considered one of the most successful conduits for interaction among the business communities of the Americas. Several programs designed to enhance trade relations in the hemisphere have been developed as a result of the conference. These include a hemispheric network for dissemination of commercial information; the Inter-American Economic Commission, headquartered in Miami-Dade County; Sanchez-to-Sanchez-to-Smith, which links Latin American and Caribbean Basin executives with Hispanic manufacturers in Miami-Dade, Florida and the United States; training programs designed to strengthen entrepreneurial skills; and the Inter-American Business Matchmakers, which links Miami-Dade and Florida manufacturers with buyers from the region, thereby increasing export sales to Latin America and the Caribbean. The support of Miami-Dade County will again enable the Congress to strengthen multi-lateral trade, and develop markets for our products. This event benefits Miami-Dade County by promoting trade to strengthen our local economy.

3. Florida International University

Event title:

Inter-American Conference of Mayors

Amount recommended:

\$ 35,000

The aim of this conference is to strengthen democracy in the hemisphere by creating opportunities for discussion among local leaders and those interested in local government. It

provides a forum for discussion of common issues and varied experiences, which enables participants and communities to learn from one another. The event benefits our community by showcasing Miami-Dade County and its authorities as key resources in strengthening local government throughout the Americas.

4. Cruise Shipping Miami Trade Show & Conference

Event title:

Conference, Trade Show, FCCA Gala Dinner, and related events

Amount recommended:

\$ 60,000

The Cruise Shipping Miami Trade Show & Conference (formerly named Seatrade Cruise Shipping) is the premier annual convention in the cruise industry. It is attended regularly by over 10,000 participants, including more than 1,800 cruise line owners and operators from 66 cruise line companies. Miami-Dade County was chosen as the convention site based on its reputation as "Cruise Capital of the World," and there is no single cruise event in the world from which PortMiami and the County can receive more exposure. Funds for this event will be spent on conference registration, trade show set-up, promotional materials, the FCCA Gala Dinner, and related events.

5. PortMiami Promotional Events and Customer Appreciation Activities

Event title:

Miscellaneous Services Related to Preparation for Promotional

Events and Customer Appreciation Activities

Amount recommended:

\$ 35,000

Throughout the year, promotional events/activities arise where the PortMiami elects to participate as a sponsor or host site. These events provide Miami-Dade County an excellent opportunity to showcase its seaport facilities for both cargo operations and passenger accommodations as hemispheric hubs for international trade and tourism. The Port will host customers at such events either on-Port or at off-Port locations.

6. World Trade Center Miami

Event title:

Sea Cargo Americas Trade Show & Congress; Trade Related/Business Development Cooperation; and Florida World

Trade Month

Amount recommended:

\$ 50,000

Sea Cargo Americas Trade Show & Congress continues to provide a forum for executives in the air/sea cargo industries to exchange views on global trade and enhance growth of the industries in the Western Hemisphere. The event will be combined with Air Cargo Americas with an expected attendance by more than 5,000 participants. The trade show component showcases the latest topics, products and technology utilized in these ever evolving and competitive areas. The above funding will also be utilized to support the Florida World Trade Month and its various activities. Additionally, World Trade Center Miami staff and/or contracted in-country representatives will assist the Port throughout the year in market share/trade development efforts.

7. Florida Chamber of Commerce

Event title:

Various Activities to Support Port Objectives/Membership

Amount recommended:

\$ 5,000

Established in 1916 as Florida's first statewide business advocacy organization, the Florida Chamber of Commerce is the state's largest federation of employers, chambers of commerce and associations, representing more than 139,000 employers. The Chamber works within all branches of government to effect those changes set forth in the annual Florida Business Agenda, and

which are seen as critical to the continued improvement of Florida's business environment. The Florida Chamber of Commerce is a major supporter of the maritime industry and specifically critical PortMiami initiatives, including the deep dredge.

8. American Association of Port Authorities (AAPA) Latin American Ports Delegation

Event title:

Annual Congress

Amount recommended:

\$ 20,000

This AAPA annual convention provides the opportunity to address and discuss common issues facing ports in Latin America and PortMiami. Expected discussions include the impact of the Panama Canal, vessel sizes, general economic business, importation/exportation of perishable products grown in Latin America, port financing and maritime security and training. The conference and trade show provide a forum for the exchange of ideas and experiences as well as a venue for port representatives, operators, service providers and maritime industry leaders.

9. Rail/Intermodal Marketing Program

Promotional Program

Amount recommended:

\$ 50,000

On-dock rail is critical to Miami's competitive advantage in container shipping. This program, in conjunction with the rail, intermodal, and/or distribution centers and partners will promote industry and customer awareness of the Port's assets. Funds will be allocated towards ad placements, trade shows, event sponsorships, etc. When co-marketing with rail partners, funding allocations will be matched.

10. Cargo & Cruise Marketing Program

Promotional Program

Amount recommended:

\$ 290,000

This funding will go towards developing strategic campaigns over multiple communication platforms in support of the Port's cargo and cruise business. The program will include intermodal, trade and logistics marketing efforts, as well as cruise marketing efforts, in conjunction with the Ports' cruise and cargo customers.

11. Foreign Trade Zone

Event title:

Promotional Program

Amount recommended:

\$15,000

Funds will go towards researching, marketing and conducting trade events/seminars. Events will focus on the benefits of Free Trade Agreements and may comprise of in-country decision makers, one-on-one meetings with shippers, manufactures, Customs/Government officials, logistic companies, custom brokers, and other service providers. Leading export and import commodities between countries will be identified, as well as solutions to address trade barriers and facilitate movement of goods.

12. American Association of Port Authorities

Annual Convention

Amount recommended

\$220,000

PortMiami will be the host the AAPA Annual Convention, AAPAs largest membership gathering which rotates annually to different port communities. Funds for this event will be

spent on conference advertising, website development, registration, social activities, translation services, marketing/conference materials, ground transportation, hotel services and other conference related functions.

13. Florida Customs Brokers & Forwarders Association

Event Title:

Promotional Program

Amount Recommended:

\$40,000

The Florida Customs Brokers & Forwarders Association, Inc was founded in 1960 by a handful of Miami brokers & forwarders. FCBF has since grown into the most influential and active representative body of the Florida freight forwarding and customs brokerage community. Through its numerous committees of volunteer professionals, the FCBF represents our industry on matters that directly affect the trade arena. It has been the commitment of FCBF to foster communications between the trade community and the federal agencies in order to expand Florida's trading communities at the local, state, and national level. FCBF seeks to maximize the ability of the State of Florida to effectively compete for international trade resources and to minimize the barriers for its members.

 - o Air Boat Activity

Incentive Program

The Port Incentive Program is based on the volume of a shipping line's qualifying containers in a given fiscal year for which the Port receives both full and timely payment of TEU wharfage and dockage charges as listed on Exhibit A attached to the Port's three terminal operating contracts and payment of all due Port gantry crane rental and other fees set forth in Tariff Item 560 or per the terms of the applicable terminal operating contract, as use of the Port's gantry cranes and prior payment of all Port fees and charges are express requirements and eligibility conditions of this incentive program. For qualifying containers that meet all listed incentive program eligibility conditions and criteria, there are five (5) incentive categories which are subject to an overall \$35.00 per container incentive cap, excluding the super-container category:

Volume in Containers – For qualifying and eligible containers meeting all incentive program conditions and criteria in a fiscal year, this column sets forth the tiers that define thresholds for incentives to be paid to the shipping line. The volume is calculated on a per eligible container basis, full or empty, regardless of size, provided each eligible container uses the Port's gantry cranes, and provided all wharfage, dockage and gantry crane fees arising from or relating to such containers are timely paid to the Port. As the tiers escalate, the rebates within that tier are paid back to the first container of eligible volume within that tier. The volume in containers excludes all transshipments.

<u>Line Incentive – This incentive is paid directly to the shipping line based on the performance met by that stand alone carrier's own eligible container throughput, but excluding third party cargo, unless otherwise specified during the open enrollment process and agreed upon by the Port Director.</u>

VSA Incentive – This incentive is paid directly to the shipping line carrying eligible containers loaded to or from PortMiami based on the performance of the applicable FMC registered VSA service or alliance. This incentive is intended to reward the performance

of the FMC registered VSA or alliance and does not include slot-chartered cargo. By example, if a line brings 15,000 containers to PortMiami and its VSA partners bring in a total of another 15,000 containers in the same fiscal year, then for purposes of calculating the VSA rebate tier level, these throughputs would be aggregated (15,000 + 15,000 = 30,000) and the VSA partners would be eligible to seek the second tier VSA rebate level (20,001 – 40,000) at \$5.00 per eligible container loaded to or discharged from a particular VSA partner line's vessel calling PortMiami in a fiscal year. For avoidance of doubt, no more than one VSA rebate per eligible container.

Volume Commitment Incentive – This incentive is paid directly to the shipping line in exchange for an annual written volume commitment. In order to receive this incentive, the shipping line must be within 10 percent to the negative or 5 percent to the positive of the stated container goal. There will be an allowable one-time downward change (request needs to be in writing) to this commitment and one upward change per year to accommodate additional growth guarantees.

<u>Latin America/Caribbean Incentive – If an eligible container comes from or is destined to Latin America/Caribbean, there will be a \$10 per container incentive paid directly to the shipping line. Latin America is defined as Mexico, Central, and South America.</u>

Overall Incentive Cap – Notwithstanding the above, under no circumstances may any qualifying and eligible container be entitled to any incentive or incentives that exceed (in aggregate) \$35 per container, excluding only the number of a shipping line's qualifying and eligible container moves above 100,000 in a fiscal year.

<u>Super container – The super container incentive is paid on each container beginning on container 100,001 from the same shipping line and is excluded from the \$35.00 cap that is imposed on all other incentives.</u>

Eligibility:

There will be an 'Open Enrollment' period of one month beginning October 1st, to November 1st, where the shipping line is required to submit a written opt-in notice to the Port, signed by a representative authorized to bind the Shipping Line, signifying that the Line elects to opt-in to this incentive program. Past the Open Enrollment period, it will be up to the Port Director to grant enrollment to a shipping line that still wishes to opt-in the incentive program. In addition to the shipping line's opt-in letter, the Line is required to submit a container goal for the year in order to qualify for the volume incentive commitment portion of the rebates. For shipping lines that opted into this program as part of PortMiami's Temporary Emergency Change to Tariff dated January 15, 2015, the provisions set forth in that memorandum will remain in effect for fiscal year 2015-16 only to the extent such provisions are consistent with the terms of this Tariff item.

Ground transportation companies are required to register all drivers with the Permit Section. This will include a list of the drivers and a copy of their valid driver's license. Any and all changes must be reported immediately. Failure to do so may result in the cancellation of the Port of Miami permit. Drivers for ground transportation companies are no longer required to obtain a port identification card unless the driver is to access a secured and restricted area. In these cases, a Port ID will still be required.

Prearranged ground transportation companies are required to register and install transponders in all vehicles working at the Port of Miami. Any and all changes made to their respective fleets are to be reported immediately as they occur. All vehicle registration and installation of transponders are to be made by appointment through the Seaport's Permit Section. Failure to report, register, or install a transponder any vehicle operating at the Port will result in the cancellation of the permit and the initial processing fee and annual permit fee shall be required for reinstatement.

Ground Transportation Greeter Area and Signs

Pre-arranged ground transportation greeters must have a valid Port of Miami identification card while working at the cruise terminals. Greeters are to stand at a pre-approved waiting area, designated by PortMiami, no more than two greeters per company per terminal. Greeters must use proper and professional signs in greeting their clients, which cannot be made of paper, cardboard, or any other type of disposable material. Greeters are only allowed to greet their company clients and will not sell or attempt to sell on-demand transportation services. Violators are subject to all rules and regulations set forth in this Tariff.

Ground Transportation Vehicle Staging Lot

Ground transportation vehicles identified as, but not limited to, vans, sedans, limousines, and minibuses, are to stage in the allocated Ground Transportation Lot. Vehicles are to remain inside the lot until called upon by the pre-arranged ground transportation greeters for immediate pick up of their passengers with reservations. Ground transportation vehicles are not to circle the Port of Miami as they wait for passengers to exit the terminal. Violators are subject to all rules and regulations set forth in this Tariff.

- First time; warning plus a \$100 administrative fee.
- Second Time: warning plus a \$250 administrative fee.
- Third time; \$1,000 administrative fee, inability to access Port facilities and revocation of permit and unable to work at the Port of Miami.

For companies without a valid Port of Miami permit:

• Warning plus a \$1,000 administrative fee.

SCHEDULE OF FEES FOR PERMITS FOR PUBLIC WORKS CONSTRUCTION AND OTHER PUBLIC WORKS RELATED ITEMS

AUTHORITY:

The Miami-Dade County Home Rule Charter, including among others, Sections 1.01 and 2.02A; and Sections 2-100; 2-103.2; 2-103.16; 33E-9; 33E-10; and 8CC-10 of the Code of Miami-Dade County.

SUPERSEDES:

This Implementing Order (IO) supersedes IO 4-41, ordered February 2, 2010 September 19, 2013 and effective February 2, 2010 October 1, 2013.

POLICY:

This Implementing order establishes a schedule of fees for the limited use of public rights of way and to cover the costs to the Public Works and Waste Management Department of plan reviews and for processing permits and inspection services. These may relate to for design review and approval where there is public works construction and or where there isfor paving and drainage construction, or other construction activity on public rights-of-way and/or on private property. and nNo permit(s) shall be issued until the appropriate fee(s) is are paid. Design Review (DR) fees are to be charged for plan and engineering reviews by the department which may not result in a permit or approval. These fees along with rereview fees are to be collected upfront. DR reviews are valid for one (1) year offrom approval. and pPlans must be reviewed again after that one (1) year period time—has expired.

PROCEDURE:

The administration of this Implementing Order is designated to the Director of the Miami-Dade County Public Works and Waste Management Department, who shall be responsible for the collection of fees and the delivery of required services pursuant to Section 2-100 relating to the powers and duties of the Public Works and Waste Management Department. Every two years, or earlier if need be, the Director of the Miami-Dade County Public Works and Waste Management Department shall review all fees in terms of costs and recommend necessary changes to the County Mayor through this Implementing Order procedure.

FEE SCHEDULE:

The fee schedule adopted by this Implementing Order is attached to and made a part hereof. In accordance with Section 2-3 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, this official fee schedule is also filed with the Clerk of the Board of County Commissioners. Fees that are charged by the Public Works and Waste Management Department shall be the same as those listed in the official fee schedule on file with the Clerk of the County Commission.

This memorandum accompanies the FY 2015-16 Budget Ordinances for your consideration at the Second Budget Hearing on September 17, 2015. This document provides information requested and recommendations for other adjustments for Board consideration. The total of all changes approved at the first budget hearing and included in this memorandum is \$1.714 million and represents 0.04 percent of the total operating budget.

During the First Budget Hearing on September 3, 2015, the BCC approved the tentative millage rates I proposed: Countywide 4.6669, Unincorporated Municipal Services Area 1.9283, Fire Rescue Service District 2.4207, and Library System 0.284 mills. These rates cannot be increased. At these millage rates, the Proposed Budget is funded and the adjustments included in this memorandum may be supported.

RESILIENT COMMUNITIES

At the first budget hearing, a number of speakers came forward during the public hearing to discuss concerns related to climate change, sea level rise, and sustainability. Many of the speakers felt that the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget did not adequately address issues regarding the sustainability of community. I have always believed that we need to go further than address sustainability issues related to the effects of climate change and sea level rise. My vision is to make Miami-Dade County a resilient community.

Resilience is more than erecting walls and other infrastructure to combat sea level rise. Resilience is about anticipating risks, assessing your ability to limit impact, and developing plans to respond through adaptation and growth in the face of turbulent change. A resilient community minimizes the impact of change by building a strong community on many levels. Resilient Communities for America identifies four (4) paths to build a resilient community:

- 1. Prepare for climate change and extreme weather
- 2. Expand renewables and energy efficiency
- 3. Renew and strengthen infrastructure
- 4. Strengthen the local economy.

The FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget includes elements supporting each of these paths and the following information is provided to illustrate what has already been included in the budget and what I recommend you consider including as part of your approval of the final budget.

Address Impacts of Climate Change

Anticipating future impacts of sea level rise and mitigating them is a complex and difficult long-term challenge for this community that my administration has been approaching in a thorough and systematic manner. Information and technology available for forecasting the impacts of climate change continue to evolve, and the County's approach must therefore be flexible and adaptive as well in order to ensure that the most effective and cost efficient investments are made. Even before the concepts of climate change

and sea level rise entered the modern lexicon, the County was actively investing in two important programs that are critical to our preparedness for sea level rise, storm surge, and extreme events. The venerable Environmentally Endangered Lands (EEL) and Beach Renourishment programs have both long provided numerous environmental, social, and economic benefits to our community and are now also recognized as key strategies for mitigating the impacts of sea level rise on our community. These programs will continue to be funded and legislative efforts to maintain and increase contributions from the state and federal governments for such programs will continue to be prioritized in the County's annual legislative package. In addition, we continue our long-standing commitment to maintaining and improving the County's drainage system in the face of these new challenges. The Stormwater Master Plan, Local Mitigation Strategy, and stronger building codes are also very important programs that have helped our community become more resilient to the threats posed by climate change and sea level rise for many years.

At your September 16, 2015 Board of County Commissioners meeting, you will consider a significant modification to the Building Better Communities General Obligation Bond Program to reallocate \$10 million from the Purchase of Development Rights project to the Beach Erosion Mitigation and Renourishment project. Making this funding available for beach renourishment now allows us to draw down between \$20 million and \$40 million in state and federal funding to address beach erosion in our coastal communities. The Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) remains a critical need for our agricultural economy and the item you consider includes a plan to restore funding to that program over five year beginning in FY 2019-20. Furthermore, I recommend the addition of one position (\$75,000 from the Reserve for Future Services) in the Regulatory and Economic Resources Department (RER) to assist our Agricultural Manager in proceeding with the remaining balance of the PDR program and supporting other critical initiatives for the agricultural community.

Our community's geographic and socio-economic circumstances require that the County plan for "resiliency." The creation of RER as a part of my reorganization in 2012 was the first recognition by this County that many diverse elements of services we provide must be coordinated to provide for a resilient community. It is my plan to further expand the role of the current Office of Sustainability and restructure it into the County's Office of Resilience. As a function in RER, this Office will report directly to my Deputy Mayor, Jack Osterholt, and work with all departments and other jurisdictions addressing these issues. This Fall we will be applying to the 100 Resilient Cities Program which is being sponsored by the Rockefeller Foundation. The very broad ranging requirements of this application address community preparedness and resiliency beyond the issue of climate change, and the County will bring together in its application a variety of initiatives undertaken in recent years such as prioritization of transportation and economic development programs that will make this community sustainable on multiple fronts over the coming years. This Office will initially be augmented by one position to service as the Resiliency Officer for Miami-Dade County (FY 2015-16 allocation of \$75,000 from the Reserve for Future Services) but will likely grow as grant funding becomes available to support community-wide coordination.

Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency

For many years, the County has been assessing ways in which we can decrease our carbon footprint in our operations, as well as provide means for our residents to do the same. Our website, http://www.miamidade.gov/green/home.asp, provides information regarding the many events and initiatives available to our residents. We offer recycling programs, have an energy efficiency campaign, and expedite the review process for commercial, industrial and residential "green" building-certified projects. Our Comprehensive Development Master Plan (CDMP) and Parks and Open Space Master Plan encourage sustainable and green development.

Miami-Dade County also has other many initiatives and programs to foster a more ecologically, economically and socially sensitive local government and the global environment as a whole. These include Miami-Dade's Sustainable Buildings Program which promotes the green design, construction and

operation of buildings that are developed, constructed and managed by the County; implementation of energy performance contracts in several departments; installation of LED bulbs at traffic lights throughout the county; purchasing hybrid vehicles for our fleet, and our Resources Recovery Plant. We are also looking at options for the use of compressed natural gas and other alternative fuels for our vehicles.

We support a number of programs in the community, including Adopt a Tree, Baynanza, the Artificial Reef Program, and the EEL program mentioned above to promote environmental awareness and promote a sustainable community. After the amendments at the first budget hearing, the Budget includes \$3 million each in funding for The Underline and Ludlam Trail development. I am also recommending at this time that we enhance the \$500,000 allocation included in the Proposed Budget for tree canopy replacement to \$650,000 in order to purchase additional trees (\$50,000) and fund a tree study (\$100,000) from the Reserve for Future Services.

Community Action and Human Services was awarded an additional \$160,000 for the Residential Construction Mitigation Program to provide storm mitigation to include roofing, shutters, impact glass, and doors to an additional ten (10) homes. The total amount of this contract will be increased from \$233,000 to \$393,000.

In order to make the vehicle purchases scheduled for Miami-Dade Police, Corrections and Rehabilitation, and Animal Services, an expenditure project will be included in the Capital Budget for \$17 million. We will be purchasing 536 vehicles to continue to replace our current aging and inefficient fleet.

Renew and Strengthen Infrastructure

As you are aware, our Water and Sewer Department (WASD) has been engaged in assessing and planning for potential sea level rise impacts since 2006 and has actively incorporated a vulnerability analysis and hardening strategies as part of its multi-billion dollar capital improvement plan over the next ten years. This includes over \$9 million spent since 2007 on data collection, salt front monitoring and updating the salt front line, and more than \$2.5 million spent since 2008 to develop sophisticated ground water models to forecast salt water intrusion and to simulate storm surge and flooding resulting from sea level rise and more intense rainfall under extreme event conditions. Moreover, in just the past year, an additional \$600,000 has been invested to assess the impact of sea level rise, storm surge, flooding and wind under the Ocean Outfall Legislation Contract. This includes a risk-based cost-benefit analysis of facility hardening and design flood elevations, and draft design guides for existing and future-planned Water and Sewer infrastructure. The resulting elevation and facility hardening criteria will be applied to the design and construction of all Water and Sewer projects in the future. The current estimate for the added design and construction cost to make Consent Decree and Ocean Outfall projects resistant to climate change impacts is approximately \$55 million over the next 10 years. These projects represent \$6.6 billion of the Department's \$13.5 billion long-term capital plan. Over the next year, additional modeling and work will be done to forecast salt water intrusion that could threaten water supply wellfields and to more accurately identify areas more vulnerable to flooding. Information from these numerous analyses will be used to inform other Departments and jurisdictions as they evaluate the resiliency of their existing and proposed capital assets to assist in preparing these assets for current and future projected impacts.

To be truly resilient, we need to address more than just the potential impacts of sea level rise. We need to upgrade and protect current infrastructure and implement innovative technologies to optimize performance and reduce costs. Over the last two years, eMerge Americas has created a phenomenon in South Florida. At the 2015 conference more than 10,000 people attended from 50 countries and 500 companies. They participated in programs such as the Government Innovation Forum which I hosted and which brought together top government officials and business leaders to explore emerging technologies and their impact on communities; the Women, Innovation & Technology Summit which showcased women who are transforming businesses; and the Start Up Showcase, which joined more

than 100 innovative startups from around the world with strategic investors with the goal of creating partnerships for future development. eMerge brought both tourist traffic and new industry to South Florida. To continue the County's support of this initiative, I am allocating \$250,000 from the FY 2014-15 budget of the Office of the Mayor to fund the 2016 event.

One of the goals highlighted in the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget is to improve mobility for our residents and visitors throughout the County. In order to accomplish a more fluid, responsive, coordinated transportation system there are certain functions within the Miami-Dade Transit, Public Works and Waste Management, and RER departments that are being carefully examined to determine the right organizational structure of a new County Department of Transportation. The new department will be responsible for reviewing all of the transportation components of our County government, working closely with external agencies that provide transportation services in this community, both locally and regionally, in order to more aggressively address the needs of our growing community. Any budgetary adjustments required as a result of the reorganization will be included as part of the mid-year budget amendment.

Subsequent to the release of the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget, I directed the Public Works Waste Management (PWWM) Department to continue its in-depth review of the Special Taxing District (STD) functions to ensure services are being provided in an efficient and effective manner with the goal of reducing the impact of to the residents within the various districts. A management working group was convened to review the financial structure of the various districts and to provide organizational recommendations regarding the division's operations. Based on the analysis of the group, four (4) positions will be eliminated and a number of existing positions be reclassified to positions that better align with the current demands of services, generating a savings of \$555,000. As a result of the work performed by PWWM Staff and the Management Working Group and the Board's approval of the revised rates for all the STDs during the September 1, 2015 Board of County Commissioners Meeting, the PWWM budget for STDs will be reduced by \$1.472 million.

The Construction Permitting and Building Code Division of the Department of Regulatory and Economic Resources recently implemented an operational restructuring of its Building Code Enforcement and Prior to the restructuring, Building Code Inspectors and Neighborhood Compliance functions. Neighborhood Compliance Officers were reporting through different work units. However, since March 2015, all field enforcement staff has been placed under a single leadership. This change has allowed for a more effective team approach to enforcement that will eliminate enforcement duplication and increase productivity. The reorganization also will allow for case referrals that combine neighborhood compliance and Building Code issues, includes the reassessment of enforcement territories to balance workload among officers, and creates a Special Projects Team to assume responsibility for special assignments and enforcement sweeps that in the past kept individual officers from addressing their existing caseloads. Six (6) Compliance Officers were promoted to newly established Compliance Officer 2 positions, which has allowed for increased field supervision and more effective management of complex cases. These promotions created intermediate supervisors that are more readily available to officers for consultation on cases requiring a higher level of knowledge and expertise for resolution. The Division has already observed an increase in productivity measured by the daily activities that are being reported, although five months of data is insufficient to assess the full impact. RER will continue to monitor the performance of the Division over the coming months. As the Division becomes more effective and productive, enforcement revenue is anticipated to increase, allowing for the progressive establishment and recruitment of additional field positions as necessary.

Strengthen the Local Economy

Critically important elements of a resilient community are its economic stability and sustainability. Since being elected in June 2011, I have been working on initiatives to attract and retain business and encourage a more diversified economy that can respond to a downturn by developing jobs, encouraging new and minority businesses, providing for training for our future workforce, and supporting the local agricultural industry.

The 2015 Disparity Study submitted by Mason Tillman, Ltd. found statistically significant underutilization of contractors representing certain minority groups. In order to address the findings of the study, analysis is being done, focused on resources required to implement recommendations such as targeted outreach efforts to increase availability in underutilized trade, commodities, and demographic areas; providing bonding and loan assistance to small businesses; facilitating timely review of certification applications in order to increase and retain an available pool of certified small businesses for participation on County contracts; providing reporting mechanisms that would detail each department's performance in meeting Small Business Program goals; increase monitoring of projects to ensure compliance with small business measures; and strengthening penalties in order to deter non-compliance.

Improvement of the County's contract data collection and management is a recommendation that was already underway by the administration. The FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget already includes funding for a software program that will provide a robust, web-based solution to streamline the collection of contract, payment, and payroll data countywide. The software will provide the ability to track all award, subcontractor and payment data that can be used to communicate any disparities at the department level. An analysis of positions and other resources required for implementation is being conducted and will require a budget adjustment mid-year to be funded from a reserve in place to address resource needs.

In the FY 2014-15 mid-year budget supplemental, \$1 million was allocated to CareerSource South Florida for the 2015 Summer Youth Employment Program. Since the allocation was made part way through the summer, the full funding was not utilized. I recommend the unspent funding (\$700,000) remain with CareerSource South Florida and be used to augment the \$1 million already allocated for the 2016 Summer Youth Employment Program.

I also recommend that in addition to the eleven (11) parks already identified for implementation of a sports development program, North Glade Park be included which, expands the reach of this initiative to provide sports development and employment opportunities for children in high-crime areas with a lack of access to parks programming (\$120,000). I also recommend that \$100,000 be allocated to the 5000 Role Models of Excellence Project. Presently, the 5000 Role Models of Excellence Project services 101 schools, within Miami-Dade County Public Schools, (32 elementary, 34 middle/K-8, and all senior high schools). It has more than 8,000 participants, over 6,000 volunteers, and continues to grow. Both of these allocations would be made from the Reserve for Future Services.

Many members of our community are held back from contributing all that they can through employment opportunities because they are not naturalized citizens. It is estimated that if only half of the currently eligible residents in Miami-Dade County became citizens, \$2.5 billion to \$3.2 billion could be added to our local economy over the next five years. In response to R-595-15 sponsored by Commissioner Levine Cava, my staff has been working with private sector funders to coordinate Miami-Dade County's application to be designated as a participating community of "Cities for Citizenship." The County will be making facilities available for this effort and I will fund one year of support for one of three positions necessary for the initiative from the FY 2014-15 budget of the Office of the Mayor (\$50,000). This position will be used to coordinate citizenship clinics by partnering with local organizations to assist with naturalization efforts countywide.

To attract new residents to our community, we must have vibrant opportunities for cultural and recreational activities. Just last month, the Carver Theater at the 7th Avenue Transit Village was completed. The M Ensemble Company, our community's preeminent Black theater company, will be the resident company of the new theater, presenting its annual season, in partnership with Fantasy Theatre Factory, who will manage the facility located on NW 7th Avenue and 62nd Street. An operating agreement between the County and these non-profit performing arts organizations, governing the operations and conveying \$379,000 to support facility operations, will be brought to the Board for review and approval. The Cuban Museum will inaugurate its new venue at 1200 Coral Way at the beginning of 2016. In order to support operations of this facility, partially funded by Building Better Communities General Obligation Bond dollars, until the organization can achieve accreditation and begin receiving significant grants, I recommend allocating \$100,000 for FY 2015-16. Both allocations are available from unused Convention Development Tax funding allocated to County-operated facilities in FY 2014-15. I also recommend allocating an additional \$100,000 to the Miami International Agriculture and Cattle Show and \$25,000 to the 2016 Miami Marathon from the Reserve for Future Services.

It is vital to our community that we continue to support our most vulnerable citizens. Subsequent to the release of the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget, the Community Action and Human Services Department was notified of an additional award of \$1 million for the Early Head Start Program specific to the Partners for Better Outcome Program. This funding will be used to improve existing early childhood centers up to Early Head Start Standards. Such improvements include outdoor equipment, computers for teachers and developmentally appropriate furniture and equipment for children, the development of a STEM curriculum for infants and toddlers as well as staff development; building repairs and playground surfacing, and tuition for Miami Dade College to ensure teachers and caregivers meet the requisite credentials.

Attachment A is the revised list of FY 2015-16 Proposed Funding for Community-Based Organizations that updates and corrects the legal names for some of the organizations, adds back two (2) organizations that were inadvertently omitted from the previous listing, and has been recalculated to reflect a prorated nine (9) months of continuation funding through June 30, 2016. Based on significant input and interest expressed during town hall and other community meetings regarding the new competitive CBO process and related solicitation, we have extended the time for CBOs and the public to review and comment on the draft solicitation documents that are posted online at http://www.miamidade.gov/grants/community-based-organizations-rfp.asp. This extension will cause a slight delay in the proposed timeline and the Request for Proposals process and solicitation documents will come back to the Board for consideration in October rather than September as previously indicated in the tentative timeline for the process. Based on these changes to the timeline it is now anticipated that new contracts that result from the solicitation process will have an effective start date of July 1, 2016.

As segments of our population age, the availability of facilities and programs providing services to seniors becomes more critical. Staff of PROS and CAHSD will be working on a plan to develop a senior center and outreach facility in the northwest Dade area. I am also recommending that the annual allocation to the Alliance for Aging, Inc. be restored to its previous amount of \$220,000 to provide matching funds to draw federal grant moneys to support services for our seniors (\$53,000 from the Reserve for Future Services).

The FY 2014-15 Adopted Budget included outsourcing the non-residential treatment services program "Treatment Alternative to Street Crimes" (TASC). However, after completing the solicitation process and working with the judiciary, the Department was able to reorganize the program to meet the Court's needs, as well as provide service at cost substantially less than private providers. The Department will add six (6) Rehabilitative Services Counselor 2 positions (\$580,000) and two (2) Rehabilitative Services Supervisor positions (\$215,000) to reinstate the program from attrition savings (\$195,000) and the funding allocated for contracting these services with private providers (\$600,000).

Our resilient community needs to be a safe community. We continue to identify sources of funding to supplement our public safety needs. The Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) received additional Victims of Crime Act grant funding (\$98,000) to fund one (1) full-time and one (1) part-time Victim Advocate Position to further support the function of the Robbery Bureau. MDPD will also be adding a Criminalist 1 position, to be funded by the 2015 DNA Capacity Enhancement and Backlog Reduction Grant (\$85,000).

The balance of the Reserve for Future Service (\$517,000) will be reserved for repairs and renovations necessary as a result of the fire incident in the Stephen P. Clark Center on September 5, 2015.

PROPOSED FEES

The Port of Miami inadvertently recommended the removal of language on page 29 of Implementing Order (IO) No. 4-4 specific to crane time guarantees. Attachment B corrects the error to keep the original language in the IO. In addition, the Library IO No. 4-97 needs to be corrected to reflect the rental session time for Laptop, MacBook, Tablets, and accessories from 1 to 2 hours. Attachment C reflects the correct rental information.

POSITION ADJUSTMENTS

In some instances, the above recommendations will adjust the number of positions in the FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget, as reflected the tables of organization attached (Attachment D). The adjustments included in this memorandum and correction of errors increase the total number of recommended positions by 8 to 26,185. This is 758 positions more than authorized in FY 2014-15. Position increases are recommended to ameliorate overtime (Corrections and Rehabilitation and Miami-Dade Transit), to support enhanced service (Miami-Dade Fire Rescue, Water and Sewer, Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces, Library, and Community Action and Human Services) and to provide critical internal support (Internal Services, Finance, Aviation, and other departments).
