Subject: Retroactive Authorization of ASD Application for Petco Grant Funds In the Amount of \$90,000.00 for Programs that Support the County's Trap, Neuter, and Release Program

Resolution No. R-452-16

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) retroactively authorize the Miami-Dade County (County) Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to apply for, receive and expend grant funds in the amount of \$90,000.00 from the Petco Foundation for programs that support the County's Trap, Neuter, and Release Program, which helps save the lives of community cats and shelter pets. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee to exercise and execute such contracts, agreements, Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) as may be necessary to further the purposes described in the funding requests after review by the County Attorney's Office as to form and legal sufficiency.

SCOPE

Led by the Miami-Dade County Animal Services Department (ASD), these grant funds will be used to support the County's Trap, Neuter, and Release Program, including implementing the Community Action Targeted Trapping Initiative (CATTI), which is an ASD effort aimed at recruiting, training, and assisting volunteer trappers. Grant funds will be used to purchase trapping equipment, medical and surgical supplies, cover the costs associated with training an expanding number of local volunteers in trapping and releasing community cats, as well as costs associated with marketing and promoting the program to recruit and expand the number of volunteers Countywide.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

As reflected in the attached award letter (Exhibit 1), ASD will receive a one (1) year allocation of grant funds totaling \$90,000.00 to use towards the purchase of trapping equipment and training of local volunteers recruited Countywide. Project funds will offset start-up and operational costs, and the grant does not require matching funds. The authorization to apply for, receive, and expend grant monies shall not in any way alter the ASD's budget for the applicable time period. This is a project that ASD is currently implementing and will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the County.

TRACK RECORD/MONITOR

ASD has a successful history of managing private sector grant funds and will coordinate project implementation and management. ASD will monitor and process the disbursement and expenditure of grant funds, and manage programmatic and fiscal reporting in accordance with an agreed upon schedule by ASD and Petco Foundation. The ASD staff responsible for monitoring this resolution and grant monies is Sandy Acosta Cox, Grants Coordinator.

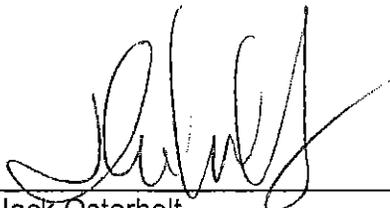
BACKGROUND

ASD continues to expand its outreach programs into the community. In this effort, ASD has partnered with various local resident volunteers dedicated to managing community cats in a responsible and humane manner utilizing the trap, neuter, and return (TNR) program as the focal point of their approach.

The County has an estimated 300,000 to 400,000 community cat population based on industry formulas for calculating free-roaming cat populations. Currently, ASD offers spay/neuter surgeries for community cats at its main facility and recently opened Homestead Clinic in partnership with the City of Homestead. In addition to ASD's mobile spay/neuter clinic events. As ASD expands its outreach throughout the community, it is increasingly able to manage an interested and engaged community of local trappers wanting to capitalize on our efforts.

By partnering with local resident volunteers, not only will ASD be able to pinpoint concentrations of community cats within specific areas, but also increase the number of animals sterilized through TNR. All cats trapped, sterilized, and returned through the CATTI program will also be vaccinated and ear tipped.

ASD's primary purpose for this grant request is its targeted TNR efforts. At the moment, ASD possesses 100 traps 20% of which are provided to volunteer trappers; the rest are available to the public with a \$50 refundable deposit. To support TNR efforts, ASD is requesting \$48,121.00. Additional traps will allow ASD to increase its stock to better address the demand throughout the County. Grant funds would purchase 280 new

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traps (40 per TNR Volunteer Team), at a cost of \$89.00 per trap, coming to \$24,920.00. These will be purchased in thirds, ensuring that as volunteers are recruited the stock of traps can support them. They will keep a strict inventory and ensure traps are properly maintained. Likewise, factored into this cost is the food used in traps, which typically consists of sardines, canned tuna, and/or wet cat food. At an average cost of \$1.50 p/lbs. and an estimated at 8 lbs. of food for every trapping event, the cost estimate is \$3,456.00. With increasing trapping events as volunteers join our efforts, ASD expects to conduct 150 trapping events in 12 months. Grant funds will also fund producing durable metal signs for each trap, informing residents of the program, including its sponsorship through Petco, and warning residents to keep from tampering with trapped cats and stating the program objectives. Each metal sign is estimated at \$20.00; 280 signs comes to a cost of \$5,600.00. Additionally, ASD proposes to reimburse volunteers for their mileage given the expansive area they are willing to cover. ASD has rigorous protocols for acceptable mileage as already established in County administrative procedures and it will be tightly monitored by ASD's Grants Coordinator, ensuring against any potential abuse and compliance with grant guidelines, objectives, and County regulations. Currently, the County's rate for mileage reimbursement is \$0.58 per mile. At the start of the program volunteer teams will be covering multiple County districts, and eventually concentrate on one or two strategic districts per team as we increase the number of TNR Volunteers. Capped at 60 miles per month, per volunteer, ASD estimates total reimbursable miles will be 24,600, making for a \$14,145.00 cost.

The secondary purpose for this grant request is training and education, requesting \$5,073.00. An initial one day Training of Trainers (TOT) will be conducted at ASD for staff and existing volunteers. Initial travel costs are estimated at \$500 for a roundtrip flight to Miami for one trainer. Utilizing established GSA rates, 3 days of lodging at \$203 and \$66 a day for meals and incidental expenses comes to a total of \$698.00. And additional \$500 a day for two days will be set aside for training fees; one day will go towards covering the cost of the TOT, and the other will cover conference calls for Quarterly Review Sessions with key staff and volunteers to review program outcomes. Additionally, ASD will vet established volunteer leaders to have them lead quarterly New Volunteer Trapper Trainings for new recruits. A line item for refreshments at \$25.00 per event has been made for each of the 9 meetings mentioned leading to a \$225.00 cost. Furthermore, at each New Volunteer Trapper Training, new volunteer will be given tools to assist them in identifying themselves as trained trappers, as they interact with residents. They will be provided with logged and numbered identification cards, as well as t-shirts stating "Volunteer Trapper" with both the County and Petco Foundation logo. The costs of these, respectively, for 75 volunteers are \$525 for ID cards and \$2,625 for t-shirts.

The third purpose specified by ASD is for marketing a public awareness campaign addressing the misinformation around feral cats and promoting an opportunity to volunteer and make a difference in the lives of hundreds of animals. This effort will total \$8,988.00, and carry a significant in-kind and added-value contribution from ASD. A specific volunteer trapper campaign will be developed and space secured in key news outlets throughout the County. Ads will circulate through the Miami Herald's Neighbors Section three times, at a cost of \$1,546 each totaling \$4,638.00. Likewise, lobby posters will be produced and circulated amongst various Miami-Dade County facilities to educate the general public and promote volunteerism, estimated at \$150.00 each, costing \$1,200.00 for eight. Similarly, flyers would be produced and distributed at various County facilities AND local businesses in targeted communities. The cost of producing an estimated 6,300 flyers is \$3,150.00. ASD's media department will promote the campaign through local community newspapers and TV stations with which it already has an established relationship, an ASD contribution estimated at \$15,900.00. ASD will also cover the cost of paid social media pushes, at \$600, and utilize marketing opportunities available to it at no cost, such as e-newsletters to 26,000 County employees.

Use of Investment*

How will your organization utilize the investment made by the Petco Foundation, if granted?

It is estimated that Miami-Dade County has a feral cat population of 300,000 to 400,000. As part of Miami-Dade County Animal Services Department (ASD) efforts to raise its live release rate and transform into a No Kill Shelter, a TNR program was begun in 2013. As ASD executed the program, two issues became

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increasingly evident; a lack of community awareness as to the impact and value of such programs, and infrastructure of community advocates capable of meeting the demand.

TNR is a growing concept within the animal welfare sector, but one that remains rather nebulous to the general public. The lack of knowledge amongst the community-at-large regarding this tactic leads to misinformation about feral cats, prompting many to assume that sheltering and/or euthanizing is the only solution. This also leads to a failure by many to see the opportunity to volunteer and have an impact on the life of hundreds of animals. ASD is committed to becoming a No Kill Shelter, and has carried out a transformative change over the last 4 years raising its overall live release rate from 51% in 2011 to 89% this past July. The live release rate of cats has dramatically increased from 25% in 2011, to 65% in 2013 as TNR began at ASD, to a current 89%. Incorporating TNR into our daily functions has been instrumental in achieving this milestone; moving forward with our existing program and ramping it up to its full potential are a priority, and one that we hope to partner with the Petco Foundation on.

Miami-Dade County Animal Services Department (ASD) has created a TNR program that is scalable, and through this grant request aspires to expand it. Given the infrastructure already available at ASD, a clinic with 6 veterinarians trained in high-volume spay neuter surgeries, ready rescue partners, and over 500 registered foster parents, an expanded volunteer bench of trappers would have an immense and lasting impact in the community. A grant from the Petco Foundation would allow ASD to invest in volunteer services not readily possible through traditional government funding. While TNR is a methodology ASD is working to support with greater staffed resources, community involvement is key in making this a lasting and vital approach to animal control as per ASD's government mandate. Maintaining and growing that external support and involvement is detrimental to advocating for TNR as a means to reducing free-roaming cat populations and preventing animal cruelty.

Currently, ASD counts on a limited number of staff, who handle multiple shelter responsibilities, and a team of 8 volunteers in trapping community cats throughout the County. Both, the third largest in terms of land area and most populous county in the State of Florida, Miami-Dade County expands over 1,946 square miles and holds a population of 2,496,435. Divided up into 13 Commission Districts, the area is a daunting task for committed volunteers and staff to tackle. However, 8,259 cats were trapped through their efforts in 2014, with roughly 700 of those brought in by volunteers. Through this proposed project, ASD anticipates being able to gather 3,000 additional feral cats to process through ASD's TNR program, providing them with wellness care and S/N surgeries. At an estimated cost rate of \$30 per surgery and \$20 for vaccines, the estimated 3,000 feral cats projected will yield an ASD contribution of \$90,000.00 in surgeries and \$60,000.00 in vaccines, totaling \$150,000.00.

The costs proposed are associated with the two major objectives of ASD's grant request: 1) building up the stock of supplies and volunteer resources available with which to conduct trapping, and 2) improve public awareness as to the benefits of TNR. This will be achieved in a three-prong approach that builds up tangible resources, training and capacity, and awareness. A timeline of program activities and implementation of resources, and a budget have been uploaded along with this application.

TANGIBLE RESOURCES. Currently, ASD possesses 100 TNR traps of which only 20% are available to volunteer trappers. An investment in traps would allow ASD to properly equip TNR Volunteer Teams with 40 traps each. The program will grow teams, covering strategic targeted areas in multiple County Commission Districts, and eventually assigning 1-2 Districts to each of the 7 teams by program end. Alongside this expense, would be the cost of food.

Traps also serve as a visible example to the community of the efforts being made to control free-roaming cat populations in a humane and effective way. Currently, ASD traps have no signage and without specific instructions or information regarding the outcome of trapped cats, ASD has found animals mistreated, abused, or released by resident who happen upon them. By marking each trap with a durable metal sign, clearly displaying the Miami-Dade County and Petco logo, ASD will promote the partnership and investment of both entities in this effort and convey the assurance of a humane outcome for the entrapped animal (a sample sign has been uploaded along with this application).

Lastly, factored into the immediate costs of an effective TNR program is a means of reimbursing volunteers for mileage. In order to prevent volunteer burn-out and offset a potential disincentive given the expansive amount of territory these individuals are willing to cover, ASD requests that this expense be granted. Given the need to rely on the existing good faith efforts already afforded ASD by local volunteers, taking whatever steps to preserve and recognize their efforts help solidify a lasting and sustainable volunteer structure.

TRAINING. ASD will vet and select an expert TNR trainer to conduct a one day Training of Trainers (TOT) for volunteers and key staff; assistance and guidance from the Petco Foundation would also be welcome. The training should provide technical know-how and messaging on TNR, and how to work with local officials and institutions to promote these efforts. Training will also discuss recruitment and retention of volunteers, review techniques for successful TNR, and best practices used. The same trainer selected for this will also hold Quarterly Review Sessions (QRS) with key volunteers and staff to review trends, issues, and concerns, as well as identify lessons learned and best practices.

After this training, ASD and existing volunteers will recruit additional volunteers, as well as start to identify strategic areas to begin trapping County-wide. As the number of volunteers begins to grow, teams will be assigned different areas of the County to cover (please see the uploaded project timeline and TNR volunteer team assignment schedule). This gradual growth in volunteers and teams will allow for new recruits to partner with experienced trappers to start, receiving a New Volunteer Trapper Training, and eventually be able to participate, if need be, in Quarterly Review Sessions. New Volunteer Trapper Trainings will cover trapping tactics, best practices identified during TOT, as well as pertinent local ordinances that may be applicable. New Volunteer Trappers will also receive logged and numbered identification cards, as well as clearly labeled t-shirts, identifying them as volunteer trappers for Miami-Dade County. We anticipate this will assist volunteer trappers in working in the field and answering resident questions regarding their activities and work.

ASD anticipates beginning with 1 experienced volunteer team and expanding throughout the program, reaching 7 teams of an estimated 10 members each by month 10. The last remaining months will monitor program sustainability by evaluating volunteer retention and trapping events held, and assessing what resources would be needed to further support a targeted County-wide TNR Volunteer Program. By the end of the project, ASD anticipates having gathered 3,000 cats through TNR efforts (an estimated 50% success rate per trapping event), providing them with wellness care, vaccines, and S/N surgeries. Additionally, it hopes to have secured 75 additional volunteers and a stock of 364 traps to continue building TNR efforts throughout the County.

MARKETING. Hand in hand with recruiting and training volunteers, comes an expansive awareness raising campaign. ASD is at the forefront of this lack of community consciousness, as it responds to cases of neglect and abuse, and works daily to control free-roaming cat populations. A TNR volunteer specific campaign will be developed and promoted by ASD's in-house media and marketing department through its established social media accounts, and press releases to local news. ASD has a relationship with the Miami Herald which issues a community specific insert in its weekend editions. Ad space will be purchased in these circulars as communities are targeted by TNR volunteers. In addition, ASD will work with local journalists to feature efforts within local communities, particularly volunteer efforts and the benefits of TNR as a humane approach to handling feral cats.

ASD will maximize cost benefits by strategizing with the County's media office to secure strategic placement and opportunities to offset costs, such as e-newsletters to 26,000 County employees. Additionally, ASD staff will also reach out to the community through other agencies, such as Parks and Recreation or Miami-Dade County Public Schools and local town and city officials within the County boundaries. Offices with high foot traffic will be specifically targeted. For these efforts, ASD will produce 8 lobby posters that can be easily displayed featuring information on TNR, volunteering, and trapping, and promoting this as a Petco Foundation sponsored project. Furthermore, flyers or palm cards containing the same information will be

distributed or made available. Similarly, TNR Volunteer Teams will be allotted a set amount of these to distribute in the communities being targeted for trapping.

As ASD's TNR program grows into new County Districts, ASD personnel will work with local animal welfare advocates to reach out to local officials in the various cities incorporated within Miami-Dade County's jurisdiction to promote TNR, raise awareness, and secure support for such efforts. All efforts on this will be promoted as a Petco Foundation sponsored program. Furthermore, ASD will promote the Petco Foundation's investment by branding all mentions of the proposed project's activities via social media, press releases, shelter signage, outdoor storage shed, flyers, palm cards, lobby posters, or other promotional materials with the Petco Foundation logo and any mandatory media requirements issued by the Petco Foundation upon award. Additionally, Petco's investment will be recognized in the field immediately, as all intervention activities will display the Petco Foundation logo. Traps and TNR Volunteer Team t-shirts and identification cards will bear the Petco Foundation logo. Lastly, upon award, ASD will prepare a legislative agenda item to be presented by Miami-Dade County Mayor, Carlos A. Gimenez, before the Board of County Commissioners for passage. This is an opportunity for ASD Director, Alex Muñoz to present the project as well as recognize ASD's existing collaboration with Petco through in-store adoptions.

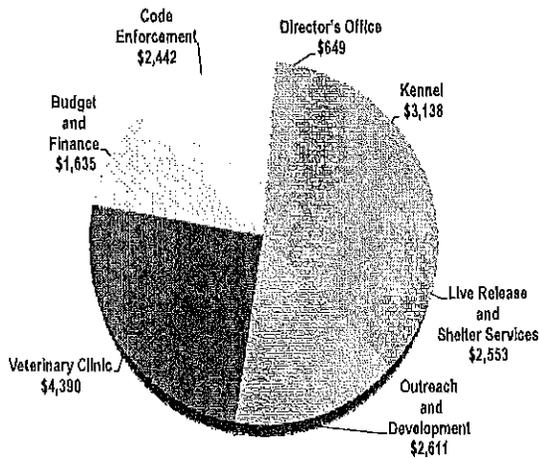

Animal Services

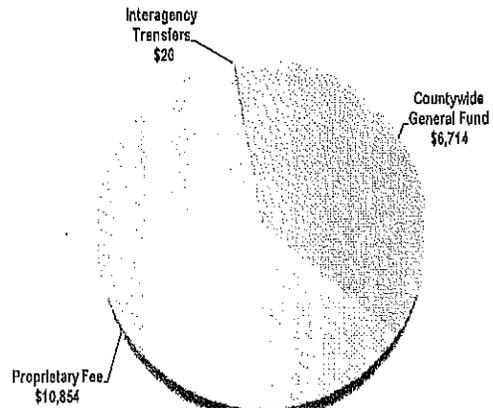
As part of the Neighborhood and Infrastructure strategic area, Miami-Dade County Animal Services is charged with ensuring public safety, saving animal lives, and operating the only public shelter in Miami-Dade County. Key responsibilities include promoting animal adoption and pet reunification with their owners; licensing pets; meeting rabies vaccination requirements for both dogs and cats; protecting the public from dangerous dogs; investigating animal cruelty cases; picking up strays, deceased, and injured animals from the public right of way; enforcing the provisions in Chapter 5 of the Code of Miami-Dade County and Chapter 828 of the Florida Statutes; and conducting humane education services. The Animal Services shelter opens to the public seven days a week for adoptions, rescue, lost and found, microchipping, licensing, and vaccinations. Additionally, the Department offers low-cost spay/neuter services to Miami-Dade County residents.

(dollars in thousands)

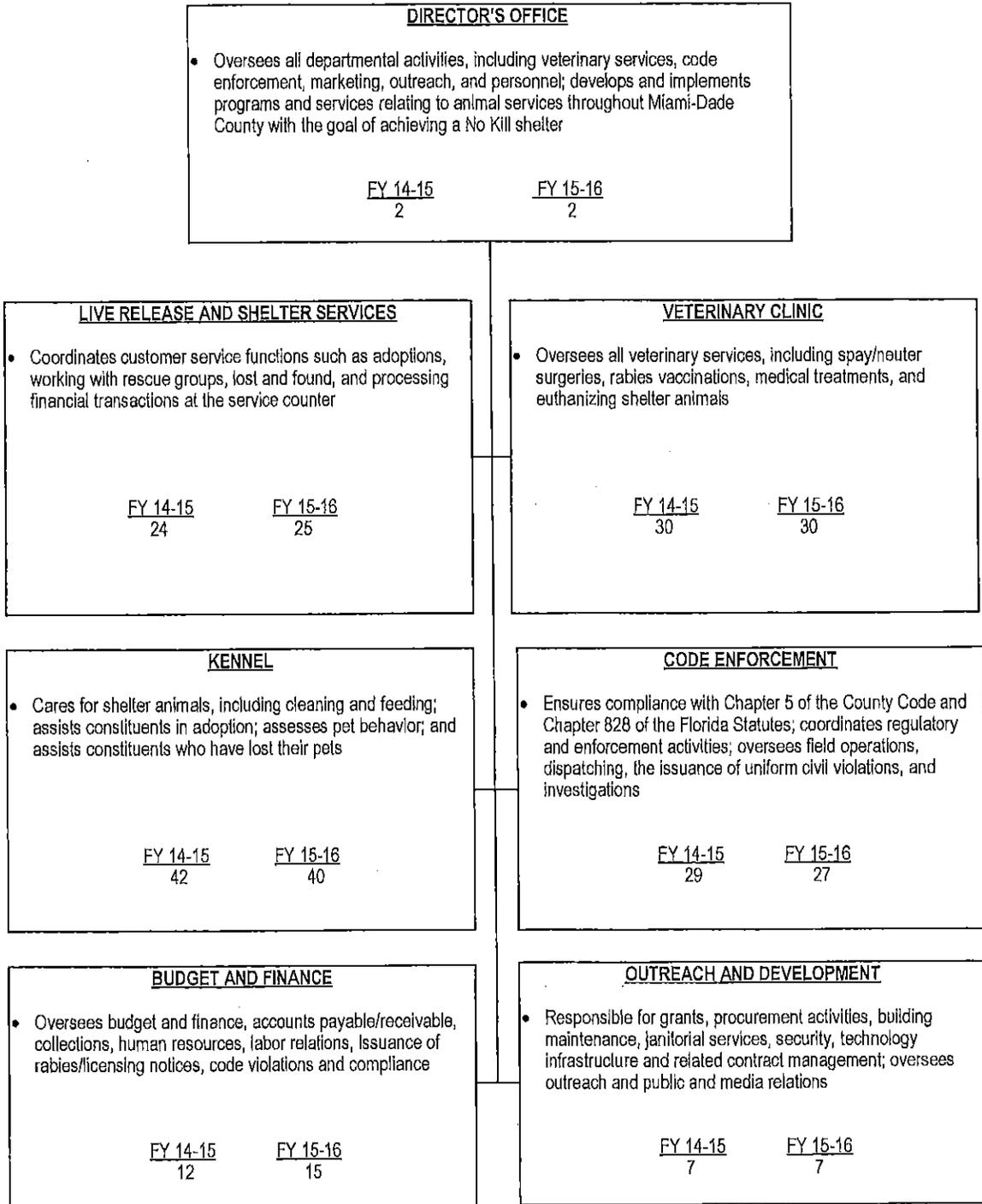


Revenues by Source

DIVISION: DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

The Director's Office oversees all operational, administrative, and policy functions of the Department in order to ensure the health and welfare of cats and dogs, by enforcing the sections of the Miami-Dade County Code and Florida Statutes that address animal care and maximize the animal live release rate.

- Develops departmental strategy and policy
- Manages performance of divisions and develops annual business plan
- Oversees implementation of No-Kill plan funded by the voter approved initiative
- Supports the Animal Services Foundation
- Oversees the creation of a new animal shelter
- Seeks alternative funding sources and fosters partnerships with other organizations to maximize resources

DIVISION COMMENTS

- On August 22, 2014, the Department held its groundbreaking ceremony at the future site of the new shelter, located at 3651 NW 79 Avenue, in the City of Dorai; the site occupies 5.04 acres and includes an existing building that is undergoing extensive renovations and structural retrofitting; the new facility is 70,000 square feet, nearly double the size of the current shelter, and will enhance the adoption process, provide best practice animal housing and a climate controlled facility helpful in controlling disease often brought in by stray pets exhibiting no symptoms; expanded surgical facilities will allow for greater efficiency and increased spay/neuter surgeries; and is anticipated to open during the second quarter of FY 2015-16

DIVISION: LIVE RELEASE AND SHELTER SERVICES

The Live Release and Shelter Services Division oversees the live savings program, provides counter and telephone services to customers, and coordinates community and special events with the goal of increasing the live release rates of shelter animals.

- Facilitates and processes pet adoptions
- Coordinates animal transfers to rescue groups
- Provides lost and found pet services
- Handles data entry and financial transactions for the rabies and microchip clinic
- Manages hundreds of community adoption events

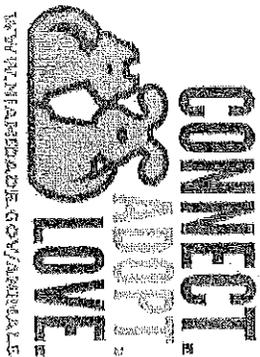

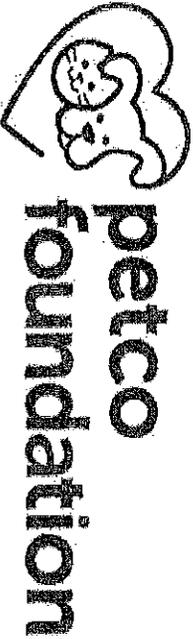

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Community Cats

Feral and free roaming cats can be found in almost every community throughout South Florida. Many of these cats have been abandoned by their owners or are simply the offspring of free roaming cats in the area. Community cats are extremely resourceful and adept at selecting habitats in which their basic needs of food, water and shelter are easily met. Efforts to control cat populations through eradication are not successful and contribute largely to the 2.7 million adoptable animals euthanized in U.S. shelters annually. The most widely accepted and humane method of controlling feral and community cat populations is through TNR.



What is TNR?

TNR or trap-neuter-return is an effective and humane method used to stabilize community cat populations. Over time the stabilized population declines resulting in the humane reduction in free roaming cat populations. Through TNR feral and community cats are trapped, spayed or neutered, vaccinated against rabies, eartipped to provide visual confirmation that they have been sterilized and returned to their community. Healthy community cats are eligible candidates for TNR; cats that are injured or diseased are not released back to their outdoor homes in the community.

Nuisance Concerns

TNR not only benefits communities by eliminating the birth of kittens and stabilizing the population, it also greatly reduces common nuisance behaviors. Nuisance mating behaviors including roaming, fighting, spraying and yowling are greatly reduced and often eliminated entirely through community TNR programs.

Get Involved

The Community TNR Program is available free of charge to residents of Miami-Dade County. Resources are available to individuals in need of assistance with trapping for the purpose of TNR. Cats may be presented for TNR at the Animal Services Department seven days a week between the hours of 7:00am and 4:00pm, no appointment is required.

Volunteers are welcome and encouraged to take part in this lifesaving Community TNR Program.
