Subject: Resolution Retroactively Authorizing the County Mayor or the County Mayor's Designee to Apply for, Receive, and Expend \$211,200.00 in Grant Funds from the Florida Department of Health to Mitigate the Spread of the Zika virus in Miami-Dade County

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the attached resolution authorizing the Miami-Dade County (County) Mayor or County Mayor's designee to retroactively apply for, receive, and expend approximately \$211,200.00 (\$105,600.00 for the months of June and July 2016) in funds from the Florida Department of Health (DOH), Statement of Work (SOW), to provide domestic mosquito control services in response to the public health emergency declared by Florida Governor Rick Scott, Executive Order Number 16-29, to mitigate the spread of the Zika virus in the County. This item requires retroactive approval since the County's Department of Solid Waste Management has already been awarded these funds and the two (2) month grant performance period commenced on June 1, 2016.

Additionally, this Board authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to apply for, receive, and expend additional funds, should they become available from the State of Florida during Fiscal Years 2015-16 and 2016-17.

SCOPE

The grant will provide countywide services.

DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

The County Mayor or County Mayor's designee is authorized to receive and expend grant funds and execute related documents to implement the grant program, which may be required by grant guidelines or to further the purpose described in the funding request.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

This grant will provide \$211,200.00 in grant funding from the State of Florida for the months of June and July 2016.

TRACK RECORD/MONITOR

The grant award will be monitored by Lee Casey, Division Director of the Technical Services and Environmental Affairs Division within the Department of Solid Waste Management.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting of February 17, 2016, the Board approved Resolution R-170-16 urging both the United States Congress and the Florida Legislature to allocate funding to combat the spread of the Zika virus in Miami-Dade. At the beginning of April, 2016, the Florida DOH the County requested a letter from the County outlining our funding needs for the County's mosquito control program, as reflected in Exhibit "A."

The Department of Solid Waste Management was notified by the FDOH that the County had been awarded a SOW (SOW15-254) as provided in Exhibit "B," in the amount of \$105,600.00 for the month of June 2016 to provide mosquito control services to mitigate the spread of the Zika virus in the County. (The funds are only for the month of June 2016 and will be used to respond to notifications from the DOH of known mosquito bites and known high risk areas.)

Additionally, the County received notification that it had been awarded another SOW (SOW15-260) provided in Exhibit "C," in the amount of \$105,600.00 for use during the month of July 2016 to continue to mitigate the spread of the Zika virus. (The funds are only for the month of July 2016 and will be used to respond to notifications from the DOH of known mosquito bites and known high risk areas.)

RESOLUTION RETROACTIVELY AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY MAYOR OR THE COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO APPLY FOR, RECEIVE AND EXPEND UP TO \$211,200.00 IN GRANT FUNDS FROM THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO PROVIDE DOMESTIC MOSQUITO CONTROL SERVICES; AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY MAYOR OR COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO APPLY FOR, RECEIVE AND EXPEND ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR DOMESTIC MOSQUITO CONTROL SERVICES SHOULD THEY BECOME AVAILABLE FROM THE STATE OF FLORIDA DURING FISCAL YEARS 2015-16 AND 2016-17

WHEREAS, this Board desires to accomplish the purposes outlined in the accompanying memorandum, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Retroactively authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to apply for, receive, and expend up to \$211,200.00 in grant funds from the Florida Department of Health, to provide domestic mosquito control services in response to the public health emergency declared by Florida Governor Rick Scott, Executive Order Number 16-29, to mitigate the spread of the Zika virus in Miami-Dade County.

Section 2. This Board hereby authorizes the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to apply for, receive and expend additional funds should they become available for domestic mosquito control services from the State of Florida during fiscal years 2015-16 and 2016-17.

The foregoing resolution was offered by Commissioner **Dennis C. Moss** who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner **Rebeca Sosa** and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:

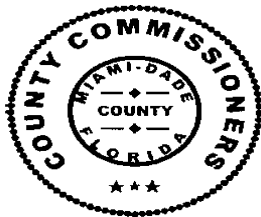

Dear Governor Scott:

As the Mayor of Miami-Dade County and on behalf of our 2.7 million residents, thank you for considering additional funds for local governments regarding mosquito control activities. The County's Mosquito Control Section, managed by the Department of Solid Waste Management, continues to be aggressive in its efforts to control the *Aedes aegypti* mosquito, which transmits the Zika virus and other mosquito-borne illnesses by eliminating its breeding habitat. While there are no locally acquired cases of the virus, the mosquito control program is working proactively to control mosquito larvae and eliminate adult mosquito populations through surveillance and monitoring.

Through coordinated efforts with the County's Intergovernmental Affairs staff, my administration is aggressively seeking state and/or federal funding that may become available to local governments for mosquito control activities. Attached is the letter we submitted to the Florida Department of Health outlining our additional needs. I would also like to make it clear that I am committed to making additional County funds available to further enhance mosquito control services.

I am proud to say that the Mosquito Control Section's program has a very successful history of fighting the spread of mosquito-transmitted diseases such as West Nile Virus, Dengue Fever, and Chikungunya. I am confident that, with your help, we will be equally successful in our efforts to prevent the spread of the Zika virus locally.

We will continue to protect the health and safety of Miami-Dade County residents and our many tourists. I am available to discuss this request at your convenience and thank you for your consideration.

Dear Dr. Rivera:

As you know, Governor Rick Scott issued an Executive Order declaring a public health emergency in Miami-Dade County and three other Florida counties with cases of the Zika virus. With Miami-Dade County's year-round growing season, monsoon climate, and tropical foliage, the County is particularly vulnerable during high mosquito breeding. The Governor's Executive Order acknowledges that, although the reported cases of the Zika virus are travel-related thus far, the Aedes mosquito which transmits this disease is common throughout Florida. Governor Scott has indicated that it is both necessary and appropriate to take action to ensure that the Zika virus remains controlled. With your assistance, Miami-Dade County can increase its efforts to continue to protect the public health and safety of its residents.

Miami-Dade County has an established mosquito control program that operates countywide and includes public education, inspections staff, and spray operations in all municipalities within the County. The mission of the program is to provide effective and timely control of the mosquito population to prevent public nuisance and reduce the spread of mosquito-borne diseases. Miami-Dade County has been working diligently and is committed to minimizing the potential for the Zika virus to develop a foothold within our borders. Our program has successfully managed multiple outbreaks of disease in the past, but additional funding will assist our Department of Solid Waste Management, which houses the County's Mosquito Control program, in implementing the following enhanced three-pronged approach:

- Increase inspections to identify and treat mosquito breeding areas;
- Revise the Miami-Dade County Code to allow for speedier access to mosquito breeding areas located on private property during a declared health emergency; and
- Expand public education programs to include a trilingual campaign (English/Spanish/Creole) with direct mailings, radio spots, advertisements on TV and social media platforms, billboards, and print ads in local newspapers.

The total additional cost for this enhanced program is an estimated \$1,415,700, with a portion of the funds being utilized for a public education campaign, "Drain and Cover," along with contracting costs for private sector inspectors and seasonal employees to supplement the in-house capabilities of the Mosquito Control Division. The proposed budget for this program is summarized below:



- Marketing, Outreach, Education (statewide campaigns underway, additional assistance can be requested through the County Health Departments if needed).
