



This is in response to your inquiry received JANUARY 11, 1999, requesting a copy of the letter which granted tax exempt status to the above named organization.

Our records show that the organization was granted exemption from Federal Income Tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code effective FEBRUARY, 1942.

We have also determined that the organization is not a private foundation because it is described in section 509(a)(2).

Donors may deduct contributions to you under section 170 of the Code.

As of January 1, 1984, you are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more you pay to each of your employees during a calendar year. You are not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

You are required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax, only if your gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. However, if you received a Form 990 package in the mail, please file the return even if you do not exceed the gross receipts test. If you are not required to file, simply attach the label provided, check the box in the heading to indicate that your annual gross receipts are normally \$25,000 or less, and sign the return.

A copy of our letter certifying the status of the organization is not available, however, this letter may be used to verify your tax-exempt status.

Because this letter could help resolve any questions about your exempt status, it should be kept in your permanent records.

Program Goals and Overview

The separation of children from their parents either through the dependency or family court system is a traumatic experience. This separation leads to severed birth connections, and feelings of hopelessness and despair. The primary hope of these children is that they will be reunified with their parents. Ongoing interaction between child and parent, barring serious threat of harm or egregious abuse, is statutorily mandated and court ordered; however barriers often prevent visitation from occurring as required. These barriers generally include problems with transportation, case overloads, inadequate visitation sites, inadequate visit supervision, and the lack of positive support. It is the goal of the Cathedral House Visitation Center to assist community based care providers with minimizing and eliminating these barriers, while providing quality supervised visitation.

We meet these goals by providing the following services:

- Supervised visits in a safe, non-adversarial environment where parents and children share quality time.
- Visits are supervised by Masters and Bachelor level professionals who work directly with the community based provider(s) to identify needs that are to be addressed before reunification.
- Parent child interaction is assessed and monitored by frequent visitation.
- Visitation is pre-arranged and transportation is provided.
- Visits are also made to schools and providers to assess progress/compliance of children and parents.

I expect this to be a successful and productive mission for Miami-Dade County. This Fair is one of the most important ones in the Hemisphere. The cattle associations of Brazil have clearly expressed their desire to help our projected Fair in May 2008.

We believe the Department of Business Development should not be merged with the Department of Procurement Management.

Over the years, the Board of County Commissioners has mandated extraordinary powers and resources to the Department of Business Development in order to advocate on behalf of the small business community and the working poor.

No other jurisdiction prioritizes the enforcement of their small business programs like Miami-Dade County. No program is effective if it is not enforced. One can suspect that this consolidation will only dilute the department's ability to objectively and without coercion apply small business goals and monitor the application and utilization of those goals.

Some county departments continually circumvent this Board's mandates for inclusion by developing scopes of work that purposefully create artificial barriers that limit or completely preclude small business participation. Advocacy on behalf of the firms that are affected by these practices will be lost or diluted under the Manager's consolidation plan.

Where and when possible, the Department of Business Development has intervened to ensure a more fair process is established so as to guarantee small business participation and utilization.

Both departments have different core missions and as such, there is an inherent conflict of interest that exists by merging DBD with a department that emphasizes speed, and a concept of "best value" that usually means utilizing large national firms and "sole source" as opposed to creating opportunities for local small and minority owned businesses. Any perception of objectivity will be erased by this merger.

The share of contracts that go to blacks in particular has continually eroded over the last five years. This model of procurement will only worsen this trend.

- Construction:
 - Black male participation has decreased from 7.5% (\$124,537,098) to 1.8% (\$46,214,326)
 - Black female participation has decreased from .1% (\$1,947,187) to .064% (\$1,608,080)
- A&E:
 - Black male participation has decreased from 6.9% (\$52,302,799) to 2.2% (\$7,519,550)
 - Black female participation has decreased from .3% (\$2,524,500) to .22% (\$780,000)
- Goods and Services: (\$ values for this category were not captured)
 - Black male participation has decreased from 3.5% to 1.2%
 - Black female participation has decreased from .9% to .4%

While the Board has emphasized its desire to see participation goals adhered to and enforced, the administration has demonstrated a continued unwillingness or lack of effort to promote an environment that promotes inclusion.

Miami's social and political history is unique and unlike any other jurisdiction in the United States. Here, the Board of County Commissioners have insisted, as a matter of policy, that its small business programs be comprehensively monitored and aggressively enforced in order to ensure that workers are paid a living wage and that contractors pay their subcontractors fairly and pursuant to their contractual obligations.

We feel consolidation only dilutes this intent.

Prior to 1997 DBD administered Miami-Dade County ordinances by reviewing and recommending minority measures on County contracts. Subsequent to court challenges to the minority ordinances, Miami-Dade County approved ordinances (Ordinance Nos. 97-52, 01-103, and 05-29) which now requires the review and recommendation of small business measures on County contracts.

Using the contracts in the DBD database, a comparative analysis of minority and women participation as prime contractors during the last four years of the previous programs (January 1, 1993 through June 30, 1997) and minority and women participation in the current small business programs (July 1, 1997 through December 31, 2005) was prepared. Findings are outlined below.
