Report: *Assistant County Attorney Christian read the foregoing proposed resolution into the record.*

Commissioner Jordan, visiting Commissioner and sponsor of the foregoing resolution, provided a brief overview of the foregoing proposed resolution. She noted the police department had experienced challenges with recruitment and retention of qualified officers. Commissioner Jordan advised she requested the Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) to research the reason for these challenges and prepare a report of the findings, which resulted in the foregoing proposed resolution.

Mr. J.D. Patterson, Assistant Director, MDPD, stated the intent of the foregoing proposed resolution was to offer incentives that attracted qualified officers and encouraged referrals by current police officers in an effort to address the department's recruitment/retention issues. He described research methods used by MDPD for determining the best approach to this problem. Mr. Patterson requested Section 3 of this resolution be deleted since the recruitment tools were of a higher priority at this time.

Commissioner Jordan asked that the foregoing proposed resolution be amended to include language in Section 3, directing the County Manager to identify additional resources, including the use of current mobile units for neighborhood recruitment.

*Commissioner Sosa expressed concern with this request being presented after the budget had been finalized and questioned how a hiring bonus would affect employees who had served the department for years. She suggested increasing the salaries of current employees to make MDPD competitive with other municipalities, rather than offering hiring bonuses. 3:27 **Commissioner Sosa asked Assistant County Manager Hudak to provide her with a report listing each County*

department that awarded bonuses to employees, identifying the recipients' levels of employment, reasons for the bonus, amounts awarded per year, and whether the bonus was in addition to the cost of living increase.**

In response to Commissioner Gimenez' inquiry as to whether the Administration recommended approval of this resolution, Ms. Hudak advised she had received a copy of this item yesterday (11/27) and would review it and prepare a recommendation before it was presented before the full Commission for approval.

Responding to Commissioner Gimenez' question regarding the funding source for the hiring bonuses, Mr. Patterson stated he did not think these funds were not a part of the normal budget.

Ms. Hudak noted funds were not currently budgeted for this purpose; however, if the foregoing resolution directing the County Manager to identify the funding source was approved, the Administration would accommodate this request.

Commissioner Jordan indicated she received an email from MDPD identifying \$130,000 as the cost for retrofitting the bus, and the information related to the bonuses was included in that report prepared by MDPD. She pointed out that other local police departments were offering significant bonuses and higher salaries, which enticed trained officers to leave the County. Commissioner Jordan emphasized the importance of retaining the officers once the County had invested in training them.

Commissioner Gimenez noted hiring bonuses would attract officers, but would not necessarily retain them. He explained that officers could still seek employment with other departments after serving a year and obtaining the bonuses. He noted the way to retain officers was to pay as much as the other police departments. Commissioner Gimenez recommended a proposal providing that newly hired police officers, with experience, begin at a higher pay step, be presented to the union representatives .

Commissioner Jordan asked that the foregoing proposed item be deferred.

Commissioner Souto asked Assistant County Attorney Christian to place a discussion item

regarding the Miami-Dade Police Department, on the December 4, 2007 County Commission meeting agenda.

There being no further questions or comments, the committee proceeded to vote on the motion to defer.

Report: *Assistant County Attorney Christian read the foregoing proposed resolution into the record.*

Mr. Chris Mazzella, Miami-Dade Inspector General, appeared and provided a summary of the proposed interlocal agreement between the County and the School Board of Miami-Dade County for the provision of inspector general services through the Office of the Miami-Dade County Inspector General (IG).

Chairman Agustin Barrera, School Board of Miami-Dade County, appeared before the committee and provided a brief overview of the School Board's Inspector General's Office. He noted this project was initiated approximately three (3) years ago.

Chairman Barrera highlighted points in the discussion process that led to the proposed interlocal agreement and explained the proposed organizational structure. He stated there would be no cost to the County, pointing out that the School Board would gain the benefit of the County's Inspector General's experience.

Mr. Mazzella advised that his first priority would be to ensure the jurisdiction, responsibilities, functions, and authority of the School Board's IG office would not differ from that of the County. He noted he anticipated some County resources would be directed to the School Board initially, for the supervision and management of the School Board's IG office. He further noted the cost of the investigators would be absorbed by the School Board and pointed out that the IG staff would consist of School Board employees. Mr. Mazzella advised the cost for the IG's services would be reimbursed to the County, with an additional fee, currently being negotiated, for overhead expenses. Mr. Mazzella commented on the

indemnification and legal representation clause and noted any fees incurred for this purpose would be covered by the School Board. He explained that the agreement was flexible and could be easily amended, to address budget, operations, and facility location issues within a 90-day period. He expressed confidence that this initiative would be successful.

Mr. Mazzella confirmed Commissioner Sosa's point of clarification that the County's OIG staff would remain with the County and the School Board's OIG staff would work only for the School Board.

In response to concerns expressed by Commissioners Sosa and Souto, that the added responsibility would impact the IG's ability to fulfill his obligation to the County, Mr. Mazzella expressed confidence in being able to handle the added responsibilities successfully.

In response to Commissioner Gimenez' inquiry regarding the budget, Mr. Mazzella explained that the School Board's budget for the OIG would be a separate account that the County would draw down on. Regarding separation of County and School Board staff, Mr. Mazzella noted the probability that some County OIG staff would initially work at the School Board's OIG.

Commissioner Gimenez asked that the foregoing proposed resolution be amended to include the language "Miami-Dade County" under Section 10- "INDEMNIFICATION AND LEGAL REPRESENTATION of the OIG and OIG STAFF" with respect to the School Board's hold harmless clause.

Chairman Moss recognized Vice Chairwoman Perla Tabares Hantman and member Ana Rivas Logan of the School Board of Miami-Dade County, and invited them to express their comments.

Ms. Perla Tabares Hantman, Vice Chairwoman, School Board of Miami-Dade County spoke in support of this resolution and expressed hope for a successful outcome.

Report: *Hearing no objection, Agenda Item 3A Substitute was heard simultaneously with Agenda Item 3B.*

Assistant County Attorney Christian read the foregoing proposed ordinances into the record.

Dr. Sara Pizana, Director, Animal Services Department, advised the purpose of the rewrite of Chapter 5 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, was to resolve discrepancies within the code to be consistent with Chapter 33 of the Code, which pertained to zoning, and to coincide with several State Statutes. She noted a major addition was the Anti-Tethering Law. Dr. Pizano acknowledged all parties participating in the rewrite process and provided a PowerPoint presentation detailing the proposed changes and highlighting important issues.

Assistant County Attorney Dennis Kerbel clarified for the record that the hold time pertaining to the confiscation clause, was changed from ten (10) days to five (5) business days. In response to Commissioner Sosa's question regarding changes to the Pit Bull regulation, he advised the sections pertaining to Pit Bulls were not included in the titles and no action could be taken regarding Pit Bulls through these items.

Chairman Moss opened the public hearing and the following individuals appeared:

Mr. Robert Reeves, 2620 N.W. 55th Court, Ft. Lauderdale, spoke in opposition to the ban on Pit Bulls;

Ms. Dahlia Canes, 7370 Big Cypress Court, Miami Lakes, spoke in opposition to the ban on Pit Bulls;

Chairman Moss reminded speakers that no changes to the Breed Specific Legislation (BSL)

were proposed in the foregoing proposed ordinance, therefore no action would be taken regarding that issue.

Ms. Odalys Hayes, 18505 S.W. 197th Avenue, Miami, requested the rewrite of Chapter five be tables;

There being no other individual(s) to appear in connection with these ordinances, Chairman Moss closed the public hearing and requested staff to respond to the major concerns presented by today's speakers. He emphasized that the BSL issue was not being considered today, and asked staff to focus their response on the other issues expressed.

Assistant County Attorney Kerbel provided the following response:

- "responsible party" definition already existed in the code; tweaked slightly for comprehension;*
- citing property owners rather than animal owners already existed as enforcement method in Sec. 1-5;*
- the Ohio Supreme Court reversed the Court of Appeals ruling and upheld the Pit Bull Ordinance;*
- and*
- the BSL was not applicable to service dogs.*

Dr. Pizano concurred that most of the proposed revisions in these ordinances were merely a tweaking of provisions already provided in the code. She questioned the opposition to the proposed revision for "hobby breeders" since it increased the number of litters permitted.

Commissioner Sosa stated she had several concerns regarding this matter, and suggested these ordinances be forwarded to the BCC without recommendation, for further review and discussion by the full Board.

There being no further questions or comments, the committee forwarded the foregoing proposed ordinances to the BCC without a recommendation.

POLICE SHOOTINGS

Report: *Chairman Moss stated he requested the foregoing report be placed on today's agenda to begin examining the police-related shootings in the community. He noted this would allow the Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) the opportunity to share as much information, as possible, regarding these incidents, with the understanding that these were ongoing investigations.*

Mr. James "Jim" Loftus, Assistant Director Investigative Services, MDPD, provided a brief overview of police related shootings during the past last two years, highlighting the following:

- In 2005: there were nine cases involving the MDPD, during which ten citizens were shot (4 White; 6 Black), and no officers were shot during that year;*
- In 2006: there were 17 cases involving the MDPD; during which 18 citizens were shot (10 White; 8 Black), and two officers were shot during that year;*
- In 2007, to date there have been nine police shooting cases through MDPD, during which 14 citizens were shot (8 White; 6 Black), and six officers were shot—one fatally; and*
- In June 2007, due to increased robberies, 36 people from the Robbery Intervention Detail (RID), was? augmented with 24 additional people and supervisors, were trained and RID certified to combat robberies in the community.*

Mr. Loftus provided a detailed account of two recent police shooting incidents that occurred on October 25th and November 12th. Mr. Loftus explained the investigative process regarding police-related shootings, and advised that any contact or injury during a police shooting (i.e. civilian or police officer injured), would initiate an investigation by MDPD's Homicide Bureau. He advised that cases with no contact, were investigated by the Internal Affairs (IA), adding that the IA also monitored investigations done by the Homicide Bureau. Mr. Loftus stated the State Attorneys' Office was also involved from the onset, monitoring the investigations. He noted that

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following this process, the State Attorney's Office would review the case to determine any criminality and issue a comstat memorandum, followed by administrative adjustments, as needed, within the department.

Discussion ensued among committee members and Mr. Loftus regarding the Constat system, distribution of tasers to officers, and accountability of those in appointed positions.

There being no further questions and comments, the committee accepted the foregoing report.

Report: *Assistant County Manager Alina Hudak read the foregoing proposed report into the record and recognized the Director of Office of Emergency Management as the presenter of the foregoing report.*

Mr. Douglas Bass, Director, Department of Emergency Management, appeared before the committee and provided a progress report regarding the County's wireless emergency notification system. He noted during the first six (6) months of the system's operations, approximately 18,000 subscribers had signed up to receive the notification. Mr. Bass explained that subscribers could sign up to receive emergency notification on any wireless communication device, at no cost, by visiting the department's website. He advised of efforts to target enrollment of university students, and noted the system had been expanded to St. Thomas and Florida Memorial Universities, as well as Miami-Dade College. Mr. Bass noted Florida International University was awaiting administrative approval to begin testing the system's implementation. He also provided information about the NOAA Weather Radio System in place through a partnership with the National Weather Service. Mr. Bass advised that this system had been upgraded to provide notification of all hazards, including amber alerts.

In response to Commissioner Sosa's question regarding the Reverse 911 Telecommunication system, Mr. Bass noted the 911 and 311 Call Centers had access to the Reverse 911 system. He explained that this system only utilized land lines and was designed for regional use, not countywide notification.

Report: *Commissioner Jordan, as visiting Commissioner, introduced the foregoing report concerning the Violence Intervention Project (VIP) and provided a brief historical overview of the large number of homicides within the Black community, particularly those involving young people. Commissioner Jordan advised that the Children's Trust provided \$3 million annually to address the rise in violent crimes in six (6) targeted areas. She noted the County Commission approved \$1 million for the Violence Intervention Project to address the remaining funding gap remained, and announced that a successful Kick Off for the VIP was launched in June 2007, at Bicentennial Park in Downtown Miami.*

Assistant County Manager Irene Taylor-Wooten asked Ms. Wanda Finnie, Juvenile Assistance Center (JAC), to present the foregoing report. She noted this report addressed the issue of violence in the community with the following major areas highlighted: awareness, activism, and access.

Ms. Wanda Finnie, Special Projects Administrator, Juvenile Services Department, advised that the foregoing report provided the VIP's action plan for Commission review and approval. She stated a strong public outreach campaign would be utilized and would reach massive amounts of children through radio and newspaper media. Ms. Taylor-Wooten noted she learned through conversations with the children, that they were interested in creating a movement which would allow them to become involved in initiatives addressing the violence that affected them. She spoke on different approaches being explored to ensure the success of this program, emphasizing the importance of listening to input from the children. Ms. Taylor-Wooten requested the \$1 million approved by the Commission for the VIP program, be released and extended to a long-term basis.

Discussion ensued among Commission members and staff regarding the underlying causes for

increased violence in the community; the most effective method to address this issue; and the appropriate use of the approved funding.

Ms. Taylor-Wooten advised that the funding would be used to provide methods of communicating with the youth in an effort to identify the core problems. She stated once identified, the plethora of available providers would be utilized to provide the resources necessary to address those problems.

There being no further questions or comments, the committee accepted the foregoing report as presented.
