**Subject:** Feasibility of Constructing Barriers, Fences or Walls Separating County Parks From  
Adjacent Private Property - Directive 132092

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At the December 3, 2013 Board of County Commissioners (Board) meeting, the Board approved Resolution No. R-1014-13 (Attachment 1) sponsored by Senator Javier D. Souto directing the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to identify the County parks abutting or adjacent to private property that have experienced increased nuisance or criminal activity as a result of a park's location near private property. In conducting the feasibility study, the County Mayor or Mayor's designee is to recommend aesthetic standards for the fences or walls proposed to be constructed (i.e., avoiding chain link fences unless covered by shrubbery) so as to protect the appearance of the park and surrounding area.

This report summarizes: 1) the feasibility of constructing barriers between a County park and nearby private property; 2) the identification of funding sources for any barriers to be constructed between a County park and nearby private property; and 3) alternate means of securing County parks from nearby private property.

## **1) FEASIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING BARRIERS - PARKS AND NEARBY PRIVATE PROPERTY**

The Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department (PROS) reviewed all 260 parks and determined that there were no persistent or chronic instances of a park that has experienced increased nuisance or criminal activity as a result of the park's location near private property. When a problem does develop, additional resources are focused on the individual parcel of private property. PROS regularly reviews police and security reports and has support from code enforcement, as necessary. At an estimated \$50 per linear foot depending on site conditions, walls are expensive to build and maintain; barriers that might meet the aesthetic standards of the County are likely to be at an additional expense to the cost of a basic wall. The deterrent value of a wall as a barrier to nuisance and criminal activity is not a given and it should be noted that walls and landscaped fences can obstruct views of criminal activity and walls also provide opportunities for additional undesirable activity, such as graffiti.

### Criminal Activity on or Adjacent to County Parks

PROS and MDPD work closely together to report, monitor and respond to criminal activity in or adjacent to County parks. PROS receives a regular report of crimes in parks from MDPD, a sample report is listed (Attachment 2). These reports were studied to identify if any County parks have experienced increases in nuisance or criminal activity as a result of a park's location near private property. PROS reviewed the reports, and after also reviewing its Security Division's records did not find any increased activity based on a park location adjacent to private property. Working together with MDPD, PROS uses these reports in directing resources to parks.

PROS and MDPD have several ongoing initiatives and plans for reducing criminal activity. At the November 18, 2013 Cultural Affairs and Recreation Committee meeting, PROS Director Jack Kardys presented a report on the PROS Security Plan (Attachment 3), and MDPD Deputy

Director Juan J. Perez spoke on MDPD's efforts to keep County parks safe. The attached Security Plan lists PROS's efforts to address criminal activity in and around parks.

These include:

- Police Presence in County Parks
- Video Surveillance Cameras in County Parks
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)
- PROS Security Division - park officers patrolling parks
- Park Watch Program

The Security Plan lists 43 parks that were identified and prioritized for security cameras and lighting needs based on CPTED recommendations. Although there is currently no identified funding, cameras and lighting will be installed in the future at these parks as part of a planned capital improvement project if sufficient funds are available. CPTED is based on the theory that proper design and effective use of the built environment can reduce crime, reduce the fear of crime, and improve the quality of life. The targeted areas for implementation are parks and facilities known for youth activities and in public housing near parks. CPTED seeks to keep open visual corridors and not block views for enforcement purposes.

#### Nuisance or Criminal Activity – Available County Resources and Plan

The activities and initiatives listed in this section of the report are proactive approaches and an alternate means that the County has in securing PROS's parks from nearby private property without the construction of barriers, fences or walls. These proactive approaches are favored over constructing barriers, fences, and walls except where warranted in response to persistent, ongoing and dangerous activity adjacent to a County park that cannot be controlled through the continued and combined enforcement efforts of PROS, Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) and Regulatory and Economic Resources (RER). While this is an option, there are no areas currently identified that warrant this approach.

PROS works closely with MDPD and RER's Neighborhood Compliance and Building Code enforcement sections to ensure that the adjacent property owners are maintaining their property in accordance with all applicable County Code requirements. Sections 19-2, 21-30.1, and 2-98.4 of the County Code provide a means for PROS to safeguard County parks from nuisance or criminal activity occurring adjacent to park property.

#### 1. Section 19-2 of the County Code - Maintaining Property

Property owners are required to provide reasonable and effective control of excessive growth and accumulation of weeds, and other certain plant life so as to not cause infestation by rodents and feral animals, the breeding of mosquitoes and vermin, or to threaten or endanger the public health, or otherwise adversely affect the welfare of adjacent property or occupants. Accumulation of garbage and trash in violation of Chapter 15, Miami-Dade County Code, requires reasonable and effective controls to protect the public health, safety and welfare of the community.

#### 2. Section 2-98.4 of the County Code – Nuisance Abatement

The Public Nuisance Abatement Ordinance approved by the Board found and declared that any places or premises which are used as the site of the unlawful sale or delivery of controlled substances, prostitution, youth and street gang activity, gambling, illegal sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages, or lewd or lascivious behavior, may be a public nuisance that adversely affects the public health, safety, morals, and welfare. The Board

also found that abating the public nuisance which results from said criminal activity is necessary to improve the quality of life of the residents of Miami-Dade County and that said abatement will safeguard the public health, safety, and welfare.

PROS staff including park managers, park security officers, and facility maintenance and grounds maintenance crews are instructed to report instances of illegal dumping, graffiti, criminal or nuisance activity, and other Code violations on or adjacent to a County park or County maintained rights-of-way as they perform their daily work duties. These reports are monitored by PROS' operations, security, and maintenance management staff. Work orders are created to remove graffiti and repair damage from criminal or nuisance activity as funding allows, code enforcement is notified for illegal dumping and nuisance activity and MDPD is notified of any criminal activity.

3. Section 21-30.01 of the County Code - Graffiti

Property owners are responsible for maintaining their residential property or common area graffiti free, including walls and fences that are visible from the public right-of-way. Property owners must remove graffiti from commercial buildings, vehicles, trash dumpsters, and other commercial property.

Aesthetic Standards and the Open Space Master Plan

The Open Space Master Plan (OSMP) was adopted by the Board in 2008 under Resolution No. R-171-08 and is a broad policy framework and vision document that guides the development and stewardship of parks and conservation of open space into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. It envisions a system that connects communities through parks, public spaces, natural and cultural areas, greenways, water trails, and streets. This provides a framework for a more livable and sustainable community.

The goal of the OSMP is to ensure the development of a great park system comprised of the public realm that improves the overall quality of life for all residents and visitors. The OSMP has aesthetic standards that direct park development so that the surrounding neighborhoods' aesthetic character and historical and cultural traditions are maintained. Should PROS determine that a barrier, fence or wall is needed to abate nuisance or criminal activity, the guiding principles of the OSMP will be incorporated into the design and construction of these structures. One of the fundamental design principles in the OSMP is that "Eyes on Parks," or designing neighborhoods with residences facing parks, helps prevent crime in parks through citizen oversight.

**2) IDENTIFY FUNDING SOURCES FOR CONSTRUCTION OF BARRIERS**

PROS does not have funding available at this time for construction of barriers, fences or walls in parks. Building Better Communities General Obligation Bond (BBC-GOB) funding may be available as part of an already approved park capital development project or as part of local BBC-GOB funds; however, this would be a last resort after all other County enforcement methods are unsuccessful. It should be noted that BBC-GOB funds are designated for specific parks and the need for a wall or barrier would need to coincide with one of these parks. The cost for a typical six foot high wall is \$50 per linear foot, including design, permitting, and construction costs.

### **3) ALTERNATE MEANS OF SECURING COUNTY PARKS FROM NEARBY PRIVATE PROPERTY**

Where security beyond the two rail wood fence warrants, PROS uses steel fencing, i.e. at marinas and pools. It is the fundamental policy of PROS to maintain an open aesthetic and access to neighborhood, community and regional parks with posted hours and gates where needed. PROS has standards for steel fencing, shown in the attached photos (Attachment 4).

#### Conclusion

Considering existing enforcement authority within the County Code, CPTED standards, the Open Space Master Plan, and PROS's design standards, PROS does not recommend constructing walls or other types of barriers on park property. These are costly to construct, and once built are subject to ongoing expense for graffiti removal and maintenance. PROS is committed to working with its partner County Departments in proactively securing park facilities from nuisance or criminal activity through existing enforcement tools and methods available and avoiding the need to construct barriers, fences, and walls separating parks from the surrounding neighborhoods.

RESOLUTION NO. R-1014-13

RESOLUTION DIRECTING THE COUNTY MAYOR OR  
MAYOR'S DESIGNEE, WITHIN NINETY DAYS, TO STUDY  
THE FEASIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING FENCES OR  
WALLS SEPARATING COUNTY PARKS FROM ADJACENT  
PRIVATE PROPERTY

**WHEREAS**, Miami-Dade County has 260 parks throughout the County, comprising 12,825 acres of park land; and

**WHEREAS**, some of the County's parks abut or are adjacent to private property; and

**WHEREAS**, the proximity of some parks to private property has contributed to an increased level of crime in County parks; and

**WHEREAS**, this Board desires to study the feasibility of constructing fences or walls around certain County parks to reduce or eliminate crime or nuisances generated by neighboring private property,

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA**, that this Board:

**Section 1.** Directs the County Mayor or Mayor's designee to, within ninety (90) days, identify the County parks abutting or adjacent to private property that have experienced increased criminal or nuisance activity as a result of the parks' location near private property.

**Section 2.** For each park identified, the County Mayor or Mayor's designee shall: (1) study the feasibility of constructing barriers between the County park and the nearby private property; (2) identify funding sources for any barriers to be constructed between the County park and nearby private property; and (3) suggest alternate means of securing County parks from nearby private property. In conducting its feasibility study, the County Mayor or Mayor's

designee shall recommend aesthetic standards for the fences or walls proposed to be constructed (i.e., avoiding chain link fences unless covered by shrubbery) so as to protect the appearance of the park and surrounding area.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Senator Javier D. Souto. It was offered by Commissioner **Lynda Bell**, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner **Esteban L. Bovo, Jr.** and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:

# ATTACHMENT 3

## SECURITY PLAN MIAMI-DADE PARKS, RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES DEPARTMENT November 18, 2013 Cultural Affairs and Recreation Committee Report on Security Measures in Parks

- On June 3, 2013 at the Cultural Affairs and Recreation Committee meeting, the Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department (PROS) security measures were reported (Attachment A). This is an update to that report.

Mayor's Joint Roundtable on Youth Safety

- Mayor Carlos A. Gimenez, working with Miami-Dade County Public Schools Superintendent Alberto M. Carvalho, issued the *Joint Roundtable on Youth Safety Community Action Plan (Action Plan)* on March 13, 2013. The *Joint Roundtable* led by four targeted Working Groups, identified ways to leverage collective resources, encourage and increase community engagement, and ensure the safety of the community's youth, in schools, parks and neighborhoods.
- Deputy Director of the Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) Juan J. Perez was a Co-chair of the Out-of-School Youth Safety Working Group, and PROS worked with MDPD at the four Working Group meetings along with other municipal leaders, police representatives, and CBO groups to propose recommendations for the Action Plan. As a result of the collective work of the participants, recommendations were vetted and ranked. Those that were deemed feasible and determined to have the greatest impact are reflected in the Action Plan.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

- One recommendation was for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) – identify **cameras/lighting** needs based on CPTED recommendations. CPTED is based on the theory the proper design and effective use of the built environment can reduce crime, reduce the fear of crime, and improve the quality of life. The targeted areas for implementation are parks and facilities known for youth activities, and in public housing near parks.
- Attachment B shows the 43 parks identified and prioritized for CPTED.
- Other Roundtable recommendations from the Out-of-School Working Group include:

### Park Hours of Operation

As part of the CEPTED Review, PROS' operating hours were revised and include Rule 13, Closing of Parks, as PROS Policy. Rule 13 is part of Chapter 26 of the Miami-Dade County Code of Ordinances entitled Park and Recreation Department Rules and Regulations. Rule 13 is listed as Attachment C and park hours of operation are listed in Attachment D.

### Security Cameras

- The PROS security camera policy is that video cameras shall not be positioned in areas where there is a reasonable expectation of personal privacy such as restrooms or changing rooms. The video security cameras will be positioned to record only those areas specified, and will complement other measures to maintain a safe and secure environment in compliance with PROS rules and regulations. The images produced by the security camera systems shall only be used for the identification of a person or persons responsible for violations, criminal activity, and to assist law enforcement agencies in accordance with applicable local, state and federal laws.
- PROS is working with IBM in coordination with the Miami-Dade Information Technology Department (ITD) on a pilot project for installation of security cameras at Goulds Park and Gwen Cherry Park. Using up to 39 high quality video cameras covering both indoor and outdoor strategic locations in Goulds Park, IBM will use IBM video analytics and face match technology for forensic search and face capture to generate alerts for many different crime detection/prevention and public safety scenarios. PROS Park Security Division staff is working with MDPD on a pilot project for placement of security cameras in selected parks. The Helping Emergency Responders Operate (HERO) program's aim is to improve situational awareness by allowing first responders to access camera feeds in real time while responding to an incident. The IBM engineering team conducted a second site visit at Goulds Park on October 15 and 16 to validate that the design will provide facial recognition a part of the security camera operation. This is considered a pilot or first phase project to test the technology and develop proof that it will work. IBM is currently focusing on Goulds Park for the "proof of technology" testing. Once that is done they will present a recommendation to ITD in more detail. IBM is scheduled to revisit Goulds for further testing with the video cameras for face recognition. There is no price estimate at this time. Once testing is complete at Goulds Park, ITD anticipates receiving a projected price from IBM on this first phase.
- ITD and IBM completed one more time the walk-thru at the two parks to see the best location to place the cameras with the engineering team from IBM to run the face recognition and to have the analytics data, the team of IBM and the ITD team agreed on where to install the

cameras. The face recognition is a challenge for IBM, four different distances were tested to determine the optimum location. IBM has the data recorded and now that will design the system.

- PROS currently has limited video surveillance cameras at three Regional parks: Crandon Park, Haulover Park, and Tropical Park. The Crandon and Haulover Park cameras currently monitor toll operations, and the Haulover Park cameras also provide coverage of the marina. Cameras are installed at the Goulds Park Community Center, the Gwen Cherry YET Center, Southridge Park, and the Women’s Park. PROS has cameras installed at the point-of-sales areas of the following golf courses: Brier Bay, Country Club of Miami, Crandon, Greynolds, and Palmetto. Zoo Miami has cameras at various locations. PROS has three portable Flashcam Cameras that are installed in high vandalism/trespassing areas to photograph individuals and activities occurring on parks after hours. The Flashcams are located at Francisco Human Rights Park, Westwood Park and North Trail Park.
- In 2012 at Commissioners suggestion, PROS developed a plan of action for identifying funding for the installation/use of security cameras in 13 regional park facilities. GOB funding availability for regional park security camera installation is:

- The estimate to light the walkways at Westbrook Park is \$271,000 (\$205,000 for the outer loop and \$66,000 for the inner loop). The estimate to light walkways in Commission District 10 parks (including parking and access roads which are required by code when you light walkways in a park that has parking and access roads) is \$4.9 million.
- For the thirteen Regional Parks, it is recommended that they be equipped with video surveillance cameras and alarm systems in the park office area, parking lot areas, maintenance yard areas, and other high value, high traffic areas, and that the cameras be phased in as funding becomes available. It is recommended that the maintenance and servicing this equipment will be done by ISD Security Management alarm unit staff.
- Due to the size of the Regional Parks (Amelia Earhart Park, 515 acres; Tropical Park, 275 acres) in addition to installation of cameras on park buildings, camera locations will require the installation of poles to mount the cameras in the parking lots and other heavily used areas to ensure adequate coverage. Solar powered battery cameras and a wireless point-to-point or a wireless mesh system are more cost effective than installation of underground conduit for power and data lines for these locations.

- Implementation of the Security Plan will be done in phases concurrent with establishing a viable funding source. The estimated total cost for all three phases is \$3.2 million.
  - **Phase I** of the implementation will be the installation of cameras and the recording infrastructure at each Regional Park's office, along with cameras providing coverage to the park office buildings using conventional wired cameras to the recording devices. The Phase I cost is approximately \$180,000 for the installation of 45 cameras and recording infrastructure in the Regional Park offices and other high value park buildings.
  - **Phase II** will be the installation of additional cameras throughout the Regional Parks, concentrating on monitoring parking lot areas and other high use areas in the parks. The Phase II cost is approximately \$760,000 for 207 cameras to provide coverage of high value and high park patron activity areas throughout the 13 Regional Parks totaling 4,060 acres.
  - **Phase III** will provide staffing for monitoring and complete camera coverage. The phase III cost is approximately \$2,300,000 for the additional camera installation and 24 hour monitoring. ISD Security Management alarm unit staff will facilitate the positioning of the cameras for optimum coverage. Phase III is for full-time 24 hour camera coverage and monitoring by PROS staff and an additional 200 cameras for complete coverage at the 13 Regional Parks. PROS staff would continuously monitor the security cameras.
- Potential Funding Sources are grants, the Law Enforcement Trust Fund, and other sources such as the Building Better Communities General Obligation Bond (GOB) funding. If funding allows, a provision for installation of security cameras may be added as a component of selected GOB funded projects.

Miami-Dade Police Department (MDPD) in Parks

- MDPD has police officers in the Marine Patrol Units stationed at Matheson Hammock Marina, Pelican Harbor Marina, and Black Point Marina. The MDPD provides officers and staff support for special events and park events such as the Miami International Agriculture, Horse and Cattle Show and Santa's Enchanted Forest at Tropical Park, and the Love-In at Greynolds Park. MDPD has Mobile Operations Center (MOC) vehicles, police stations on wheels used to provide police services at various locations within the community; these are used at Tropical Park as well. Also, Neighborhood Resource Officers, plain clothes officers and gang unit officers patrol parks. The MDPD provides PROS with reports of crimes that have occurred in County Parks. Some of the most frequent crimes in Regional Parks reported in the monthly Parks Report are vehicle burglary and petty theft.
- MDPD regularly sends PROS a report of crimes and arrests committed in parks listed by category. The majority of crimes involve vehicle break-ins. These reports are very useful to help identify hot spots so that MDPD and PROS can deploy the right resources and plan with MDPD for enforcement activity.

Park Security Division

- In addition to Security Cameras, PROS has a Park Security Division, charged with oversight of all security operations in PROS. The Park Security Division has 17 security personnel total: 12 Park Enforcement Specialists, 4 Park Security Supervisors, and the Park Security Chief. This division oversees the security for all county parks. Park Enforcement Specialists patrol 86 facilities on a nightly basis.

- PROS also has guard positions at fixed sites who work at night and receive supervision from the Park Security Officers. There are 12 full-time and 17 part-time guard positions at Amelia Earhart Park, Crandon Park, Haulover Park, Greynolds Park, Matheson Hammock Park, Tropical Park, Larry & Penny Thompson Park, and Homestead Bayfront Park.

#### Park Watch Program

- PROS also has Park Watch, a crime prevention program for PROS parks that was created pursuant to Board resolution R-556-97, adopted on May 20, 1997. Like a neighborhood crime watch, it helps provide youths, adults and senior citizens with information to eradicate crime, drugs and gangs from the parks. Citizens can create a Park Watch in their neighborhood park; volunteers can adopt their park and can serve as the eyes and ears for PROS and the Miami-Dade Police Department. Signage is posted in parks and training for neighborhood park watch members is available through PROS' Security Division.

### DISCUSSION REGARDING SECURITY CAMERAS IN MIAMI-DADE PARKS

Carvalho, issued the *Joint Roundtable on Youth Safety Community Action Plan (Action Plan)* on March 13, 2013. ## ATTACHMENT C

### Miami-Dade County, Florida Code of Ordinances Chapter 26, Park and Recreation Department Rules and Regulations

#### Rule 13. Closing of Parks

- (a) No person shall be or remain in any part of any park that is fenced in or provided with gates between the closing of the gates at night and their reopening on the following day; nor shall any person be or remain in any park not fenced in or provided with gates, between sunset and sunrise or as specifically posted, except in areas designated as twenty-four-hour boat launching areas, except in well-lit areas designated for use until 11:00 p.m. when in the discretion of the Department Director and upon consultation with the neighboring community or the Commissioner of the affected district and the applicable police department, and except that persons and vehicles may pass through such parks without stopping, on the most direct walk or driveway leading from their point of entrance to the exit nearest to their point of destination. The provisions of this section shall not apply to police officers or department employees while in the discharge of their duties nor to persons having a permit in writing issued by the department to be or remain in any part of the parks between such hours. The Department Director has the authority to establish exceptions to the closing hours as set forth above when it is in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare and such exceptions shall be posted.

- (b) No person shall enter upon any part of any park, which is in an unfinished state or under construction or withheld from general public usage in the interest of public safety, health and/or welfare unless specifically permitted by the department Director.
