Annual Report Relating to the Wage Theft Program

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 10-16, enacted by the Board of County Commissioners (Board) on February 18, 2010 to establish the Wage Theft Program, the following is the annual report which includes quarterly statistical data about the number of inquiries, number of petitions for hearings, number of hearings scheduled, the cost of the hearings, and the results of the hearings. This annual report covers the period from January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017.

There were several enhancements to the program in 2017 as a result of the amendments to the Ordinance adopted by the Board. During this reporting period, the program began working with the World Languages Department at Miami Dade College to secure volunteer student translator services by request for wage theft hearings. Moving forward these enhancements will help victims recover wages they are owed.

Attached for the 2017 period are two separate exhibits:

- Exhibit A provides information on Wage Theft complaints that went before a hearing examiner in each guarter.
- Exhibit B provides broader information that tracks outcomes of all complaints received during the quarter.
