

August is almost over and with the Labor Day weekend just a few days away, we mark the traditional end of Summer.

Thankfully, we here in South Florida can still look forward to several more weeks of warm weather, and that brings with it lots of boating activity in our beaches and waterways.

This summer has also brought to our attention an increased need for raising awareness from the boating and general public about water safety and the dangers of mixing boating and alcohol.

Having spent most of my early career as a firefighter, we were always taught and trained on **prevention**, taking the necessary steps to avoid dangerous situations.

The best way to avoid an accident is to try and **prevent** one before it happens.

This is why it's so important that before you go and enjoy boating on our waterways, that we all take the necessary steps to prevent accidents by avoiding boating under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

We all know that drinking and driving never mix...

Drinking and boating don't mix either.

DUI and BUI are both illegal, and they make a very dangerous and sometimes even lethal combination.

Our police chiefs throughout the County have all redoubled our efforts at patrolling our waters and enforcing BUI laws.

This is a personal matter for Chief Press from Key Biscayne, who knows firsthand that boating accidents can happen at any time.

Chief Press is a veteran of law enforcement and when he became President of the Miami-Dade Chiefs last May, he made sure that part of his agenda was to bring together a multi-jurisdictional use of marine and land assets to increase enforcement and bring greater safety to our waters.

All the chiefs agreed that this is a great opportunity for cooperation and the BUI task force was born, with shared water and land assets working together.

This effort leads up to Labor Day weekend when the Task Force will be out on the water reminding folks that while it's ok to have fun, we need to take all steps possible to prevent fun turning into a tragedy.

Today, I am further announcing that we have brought together several agencies that are responsible for water safety enforcement – these include the U.S Coast Guard, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission, the Cities of Miami and Miami Beach, Aventura, Bal Harbor, Key Biscayne – and we have formed an inter-agency working group so we can find more ways to work together to promote water safety.

We are all looking at ways to maximize our shared resources, including looking into cross utilization of trained staff, so that all maritime laws are enforced, and our waterways are safe for everyone to enjoy.

Let me remind everyone that it is a violation of Florida law to operate a boat while impaired by alcohol.

Anyone operating a boat that is suspected of being under the influence must submit to sobriety tests to determine blood or breath alcohol content.

And as with driving a car, in Florida a boater is presumed to be under the influence if their blood or breath alcohol level is at or above .08.

Also, anyone under 21 years of age who is found to have a breath-alcohol level of .02 or higher while operating a boat is in violation of Florida law.

The Miami-Dade Police Department and all the agencies represented here are fully committed to ensure that everyone who enjoys our waterways does so in the safest way possible...

And that by following all water safety laws, we can avoid boating accidents and tragedies, so that enjoying our beaches and water remains a fun and safe family activity.
