The Leisure Access Foundation: Changing the world, one athlete at a time



The Leisure Access Foundation (LAF) is 501 (c)(3) not -forprofit agency. It was created in 1991 to improve opportunities for persons with disabilities to participate in sports programs. Running a sports program can be very expensive. Many of these programs require special instruction as well as wheelchairs and other equipment. Because of the expense that comes with participating in these programs, many athletes are not able to do so. LAF funds many of these expenses. Leisure Access Services currently runs three

programs that are mostly funded through the Foundation. These programs include Wheelchair Basketball, Wheelchair Tennis, and Goalball (a sport for people

with visual impairments). LAF also funds Adapted Sports Clinics. These clinics take place with Miami Dade County Public Schools to allow Recreational Therapists to teach Special Education Students how to use adaptive equipment and how to play adapted sports. The goals of LAF are:

1) Provide additional quality recreation/sports programs for persons with disabilities, 2) Work with Leisure Access Services, Miami-Dade Parks, and other organizations serving persons with disabilities to hold events and create programs, 3) Fund special adaptive equipment needs for these programs,



4) Train volunteers to assist in implementing events and programs, and 5) Hold annual fundraising



events to fund activities. The foundation runs solely on donations. If you would like to help, there are three ways to do so: 1) volunteer at one of the events or programs, 2) In-kind donations of sports/recreation equipment, t-shirts, food for events, etc., or 3) Monetary donations. Every day, these students go to the Zoo four hours a day to learn about different job positions available there. Project BRIDGE is similar to Victory. It serves the same purpose, except this project primarily focuses on outdoor or recreation jobs. For the last three months, students that are involved in this project attended different parks in Miami Dade. During these visits, the staff at the sites gave the students a brief orientation on what their job is like. They visited The Deering Estate, Pelican Harbor Marina, Matheson Hammock, Country Club of Miami, and AD Barnes Pool & Nature Center. Growing up with Cerebral Palsy and Aphasia, Trishell has a special connection with the children she works with. Due to the obstacles she faced when she was a child, she understands what the children face and she feels that recreation is very important for a person with a disability. Trishell always knew she wanted to help children make the most of their lives. That is why she chose to volunteer for this program. She enjoys LAS because she gets a chance to work with a variety of recreational activities as well as varying exceptionalities. Trishell likes to tell the children she works with to never let their disability get in the way of what they want to do. She says "Some people

told me I wasn't a candidate to drive, but I received my driver's license anyways. Some people told me I wasn't college material, but I received my Bachelor's Degree in Recreational Therapy and I was on the Dean's list. As for sports, I haven't let anything get in my way. I have gone surfing, sit down water skiing, scuba diving, and rock climbing. I've learned that children with disabilities can do more with a little encouragement and determination, so I want to be the one to give the children the encouragement they need to be more able". In the Spotlight: Jody Cox



Jody Cox, CTRS, is a Recreation Therapist II for Leisure Access Services (LAS). She is currently one of the therapists in charge of the Disability Sports programs. Jody has been employed by Miami-Dade County Parks and Recreation since April 2004. She graduated from Florida International University in December 1995 with a B.S. in Parks and Recreation Management with an emphasis in Therapeutic Recreation and has been a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist since May 1996. Jody's first experience with LAS was when she completed an internship rotation in the summer of 1994. Upon graduating from FIU, she was offered a position as a Recreational Therapist at Baptist HealthSouth where she primarily worked the pediatric, spinal cord injury and brain injury populations. After 10 years in the clinical setting, Jody made the decision to transition to community Recreational Therapy because she felt

she had reached a point in her career where she wanted to do something new and totally different. Two weeks after making this decision, she saw an ad in the paper for Miami Dade Parks LAS. Some major accomplishments she has made since being employed by MD Parks include starting an after school program in Westwind Lakes Park and taking the initiative and lead in having MD Parks become recognized as a BlazeSports America Club and a US Paralympic Club. Jody is also responsible for opening two programs for individuals with physical disabilities: the Jr. Wheelchair Sports Club and a Power Soccer program. One of Jody's dreams has always been to dedicate most of her attention to the development of wheelchair sports. We are happy she is able to fulfill this dream here at Miami Dade Parks.

Paralympic Partners Progress

Paralympic Partners, a group of local organizations dedicated to improving participation in sports and recreation by persons with physical and/or visual disabilities had its third meeting in November. At the first three meetings, the Partners have clarified the group's mission and focused on several specific goals. To this end, three committees have been created. The Transportation Committee is working on the challenge of getting both adult and children participants to events, programs and competitions. The Event Committee is working on establishing two annual events; one water-based and one land-based. The Registration Committee is developing a process to create, store and maintain a database of persons with physical and/or visual disabilities who are interested in participating in sports and recreation. All Partner organizations should try to have a member on at least one committee. The Committee Chairs and their contact information are below.
