

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The Art of Recreation

MIAMI-DADE PARKS ENCOURAGING THE BENEFITS OF AN ARTS EDUCATION

rts education plays a vital role in preparing our children for the future. It helps them develop skills such as reading, writing, speaking, and listening. The arts encourage divergent thinking and problem-solving skills, and enable students to think creatively.

Current research has shown an education in the arts plays a critical role in a child's academic and social development. They experience greater meaning, excitement and depth in what they learn, and go on to achieve higher levels of academic success in college.

According to a study conducted by the College Entrance Examination Board in 1995, students who studied the arts for more than four years scored higher on the verbal and

math sections of the SAT than students with no coursework or experience in the arts.

Well-designed and executed art education leads to overall improved academic performance, builds skills necessary for workplace success, and has a positive influence on the lives of students. According to research by Professor Shirley Brice Heath of Stanford University, young people who practice the arts are:

- Four times more likely to win an academic award;
- Eight times more likely to receive a community service award;
- Three times more likely to win a school attendance award; and

 Four times more likely to participate in a math or science fair.

The arts also serve as a catalyst for reaching and engaging disenfranchised youth. Young people who are disengaged from schools and other community institutions are at the greatest risk of failure or harm. The arts can provide a reason, and sometimes the only reason, for being engaged with school or other organizations. Research and evaluation of successful arts programs have demonstrated how access to and participation in the arts helps decrease and prevent negative behavior by at-risk youth.

However, learning in and through the arts is not limited to the confines of a classroom or the school day. As schools have become increasingly focused on high-stakes testing, there has been a narrowing of curriculum. In some circumstances, the arts have been 'squeezed out' of the school day. Some organizations and service providers have combated this trend by offering high-quality arts programming during non-school hours. Arts programs that operate outside the school day can keep children and teens engaged in constructive learning environments.

> Miami-Dade Parks operates two

facilities dedicated to providing quality out-of-school arts education: African Heritage Cultural Arts Center (AHCAC) and Raices Hispanic Cultural Arts Center (Raices). Each facility focuses its curriculum on providing wellrounded, year-round experiences

> that include the visual and performing arts. Furthermore, these programs provide students the chance to connect to their heritage through the arts.

Located in Liberty City and originally called the Model City Arts Center, the AHCAC was founded in 1975 to serve as the nesting ground for emerging talent in the performing and visual arts, providing inspiration and encouragement to young people in the community. For over 30 years the AHCAC has provided the means for youth to discover and develop their

creative potential and artistic talents.

Children ages 6 – 16 participate in the artsbased after-school and summer programs. They are taught by a dedicated

staff of arts professionals and learn the fundamentals of creating whether painting, drawing, acting, dancing, singing, or playing an instrument. The goal of the AHCAC is to expand our children's horizons and provide for the cultural enrichment of the community. Most recently, the Voices of Heritage Vocal Ensemble, a resident company comprised of AHCAC students, sang the National Anthem at the 2005 NASDAQ 100 Men's Finals to a nationallytelevised audience.

The AHCAC also serves as a resource to the surrounding area. Throughout the year, community members attend theater performances, participate in classes, workshops and lectures, visit the latest exhibition, enroll in the arts-based after-school program or summer arts camp, and utilize the facility for community projects and programs. Arts in the Parks includes after-school and summer arts instruction for youth in the visual and performing arts, health, ness, dance, senior programs, and workshops. Outreach projects de a community stage at the Miami-Dade County Fair, coordination of ertainment for various festivals in Miami-Dade parks and other County events such as the Employee Appreciation Picnic and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration. contemporary Hispanic dance, music and visual arts at Raices. Through training and encouragement, Raices provides an opportunity for its students to excel in the arts through instruction by staff of seasoned arts professionals in the summer and after-school programs. Throughout the year, Raices hosts open houses that offer parents and grandparents the chance to see what their children are learning during their time in the arts program.

Located in the setting of beautiful Miller Drive Park in Southwest Miami-Dade County, Raices is one of the best-kept secrets of the Parks Department. The main building serves as a gallery, multi-purpose room and houses the administrative offices. Although the buildings are somewhat nondescript on the outside, inside they are full of unexpected and breathtaking beauty and creativity. A fully-outfitted black box puppet theater, a dance studio, an arts and crafts workshop, and a theater room make up the campus of Raices along with the recreational amenities of a tot lot, tennis and basketball courts.

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Recitals

As part of the arts education programming at Raices Hispanic Cultural Arts Center, African Heritage Cultural Arts Center and Arts in the Parks, recitals by students are presented to showcase the skills they have learned while in summer arts camp. These high-energy performances are the culmination of a long summer and the ideal opportunity for students to show off what they have learned. Many hours are spent learning choreography, mastering a piece of music or performing a monologue in front of a mirror. However, the recitals are more than performances for families and friends; they help reinforce self-esteem, build confidence and teach the backstage skills required to present a performance.

For many students performing in front of an audience is not appealing, so technical skills such as stage management, lighting and sound, set and costume design are also taught. Ultimately, the unique program enables students to discover what it would be like to be a professional in the arts, whether on stage or behind the scenes. By Roger L. Hammer

CRENULATE LEADPLANT

The Crenulate Leadplant (*Amorpha herbacea var. crenulata*) is a member of the Pea Family (Fabaceae). It is a federal-listed endangered species because its entire global range is restricted to a relatively small portion of Miami-Dade County. Historically, it was present from Little River to the town of Cutler, but much of its historic habitat has been lost to development.

The Crenulate Leadplant is an attractive shrub about four feet tall, producing small gray-green leaves with crenulate (scalloped) margins and long spikes of small, but showy, white flowers, which attract butterflies, bees, wasps, and other insects.

Eminent botanist John Kunkel Small (1869-1938) first discovered it in 1904 in hammocks between Coconut Grove and Cutler. Although it was described as a distinct species (Amorpha crenulata), it was later determined to be a variety of the more common and widespread Amorpha herbacea.

Its preferred habitat is along the narrow interface between wet marl prairies and either pine rockland or rockland hammocks. Lowering of the water table through drainage and extensive clearing of prairies and pine rocklands for development and agriculture has all but eliminated this habitat in Miami-Dade County outside Everglades National Park. Today, the largest Crenulate Leadplant populations can be found at A. D. Doug Barnes Park at SW 34 Street and 72 Avenue in the Bird Drive Basin, and at the Deering Estate at Cutler at SW 167 Street and 72 Avenue adjacent to Biscayne Bay.

Because it is easy to cultivate. Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden, in cooperation with Miami-Dade Park & Recreation Department biologists, reintroduced 108 plants into the pine rockland at the Deering Estate, where it was historically present. Following a recent wildfire and prescribed burn through part of the reintroduction area. the burned plants have rebounded vigorously, exemplifying how fire is beneficial to native pine rockland plants.



Miami-Dade Park & Recreation Department continues to be a responsible steward of rare and endangered plants and animals that reside in our public parks and preserves, and you can help by volunteering. To do so, contact Miami-Dade Parks' Natural Areas Management Division at (305) 257-0933, extension 228, and inquire about their volunteer workdays. It will prove to be a worthwhile activity.

On any given weekday you can walk into the gallery and studios of Raices Hispanic Cultural Arts Center (Raices) and feel the energy of children as they dance, sing, paint, act, and play. Each child is focused on the task at hand and enjoying every minute of it, while instructors guide them

in creating their work of art. At the center of all this creative energy, serving as the director of the scene, is Vivian Greer-Digon, manager of Raices.

Impeccably dressed, Ms. Vivian, as the children call her, listens to their stories, provides encouragement and keeps the activity moving. Born in the United States and raised in Cuba, Greer-Digon has always had a passion for the arts. A life-long dancer, the arts taught her focus, discipline and provided a vehicle for self-expression. It is these lessons she hopes to pass on to her students.

After a successful career as the owner and director of one of the most celebrated dance schools in South Florida, L'Ecole de Ballet Art Studio, Greer-Digon joined the staff of the Miami-Dade Parks Department two and a half years ago. "It was time for a change, but I wanted to keep a career in the arts and I knew I wanted to work with children," said Greer-Digon. "When the position as manager of Raices became available, it was a perfect fit."

Twelve years ago, Raices was founded as a resource for the community to connect to its culture and for children to learn about the arts of their heritage. Currently, Raices serves as the only complete arts program in south Miami-Dade, offering

visual and performing arts, that does just that. "My favorite quote by Carter Hodding, Jr. says exactly what Raices does, 'There are two lasting bequests we can give our children, one is roots; the other is wings.' Raices provides the connection to their heritage and the means for them to fly away prepared to take on the world," Greer-Digon stated.

For Greer-Digon, the goals of Raices are simple. "Each day children have a safe place to sample a taste of the arts," she said. "But even more, I want people to know Raices is open to people of all ages and walks of life to experience the arts...to fill the theater, gallery and classrooms with sounds, colors, and languages of Hispanic culture...a place where stories can be told, true to its history. A place to keep 'cultura' alive."

Almost 60 Years of Stellar Entertainment

In 1949, plans for and construction of a 2,498-seat public auditorium began with the idea of providing the community a hall for civic lectures, political rallies and occasional entertainment. The Art Deco-revival building that was named the Miami-Dade County Auditorium (MDCA) was originally built as a state-ofthe-art facility with nine "star" dressing rooms and two 40-person chorus rooms, a kitchen for backstage service and two loading platforms leading directly onto the stage which was 100 feet by 55 feet with a large center turntable and hydraulic orchestra pit like that of Radio City Music Hall. Though not vet a science in auditorium construction, the acoustics were of the highest quality allowing the Miami Opera Guild, now the Florida Grand Opera, to perform without microphones and augmented sound.

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On February 21, 1951, the Dade County Auditorium hosted its first event, a production of "Carmen" by the Miami Opera Guild, to a sold-out house. The idea that entertainment would sell in the hall was born. Since then, the opera company was a primary tenant, using the facility for rehearsals and performances of their five annually scheduled productions. Opera's finest stars have played MDCA over the years, including the American stage debut of Luciano Pavarotti in a 1965 production of "Lucia De Lammermoor" starring Joan Sutherland.

Along with the opera season, MDCA continued to host many civic events, high school and college graduations, and four U.S. presidential rallies for Dwight Eisenhower, Richard Nixon, Ronald Reagan, and Pat Robertson. And each year the Dade County Commission would hold its public budget hearings at the facility until the new commission chambers were built in 1988.

The auditorium has been host to every conceivable type of entertainment including wrestling, body building, country western music performances, pop and rock-and-roll concerts, and theatre productions such as "Hello, Dolly!" with Carol Channing and "Fiddler on the Roof." The great orchestras of the world have played in this hall through the auspices of the Concert Association of Florida, guided by Judith Drucker

of Florida, guided by Judith Drucker who began her Premier Series in the early 1970s.

Soon after the immigration from Cuba in the early 1960s, the surrounding neighborhood became known as Little Havana and the auditorium took on a Latin flavor. Sociedad Pro Arte Grateli, a Sunday salon group from the island, began producing monthly programs for South Floridians presenting revues of popular music from Cuba, Spanish language translations of hit Broadway musicals, and lavish "zarzuelas." Ballet Folklorico de Mexico, balladeer Raphael, Montserrat Caballé, Mara y Orlando and composer Rene Touzet (of "Louie, Louie" fame) played regular engagements here.

Looking to future programming with a strong multi-cultural influence, MDCA continues to attract new promoters and develop programs of film, theatre and dance bringing new audiences to the facility. MDCA has established itself as a home for the ever-increasing arts scene in Miami-Dade County.

Today, the auditorium is undergoing major renovations to receive new



state-of-the-art sound and lighting systems. There will be upgrades to its electrical service, new projection equipment that will allow for realtime streaming video, state-of-the-art sound and light booths, WiFi broadband throughout the building, as well as other upgrades to the facility including new storage rooms, modernizing the auditorium into one of the County's premier and highly competitive performing arts facilities.

"These days, shows can be multisensory productions, so you need state-of-the-art technology to satisfy producers and provide the audience with an unforgettable experience," said Orlando Castellano, manager of MDCA. "The completion of this project will allow us to compete with new performing arts centers being built."

With funding from the General Obligation Bonds and other resources, future plans for the auditorium include a black box theatre/rehearsal space, renovated dressing rooms, a larger main lobby area and refurbishment of the theatre seating.

MDCA, with its rich history, impressive improvements and expanded orchestra, is an ideal home for the ever-increasing arts scene in Miami-Dade County, easily accommodating large touring Broadway shows and concerts, as well as intimate presentations, such as chamber music ensembles.

An Oasis Within an Urban Landscape

Like its sister auditorium the MDCA, the Joseph Caleb Auditorium has a colorful history of its own. In the 1970s, there were plans by the Model City Program to build a comprehensive community center that would serve the residents living in the Model City area. The Model City Advisory Board set policy for the federally funded program that addressed the needs of a blighted neighborhood that included parts of Liberty City and Brownsville.

After a long delay in the project, Model City Board Chairman and



President of Laborer's Union No. 478 Joseph Caleb began urging County Commissioners for their support of the project. Joseph Caleb was a powerful union leader and widely known and respected by business and political leaders. Although he didn't live to see the completion of the center which he so diligently lobbied for, the community wanted to name the site after the man who worked so hard to get the project completed. The center was named the Joseph Caleb Center, which houses the Joseph Caleb Auditorium, a library, a multi-purpose educational center, and various other services.

The Joseph Caleb Auditorium, which is the main site within the center, is a 991-seat auditorium featuring a 2,300-square-foot stage, loading dock and three dressing rooms.

The auditorium has had famous politicians, comedians and musicians grace its stage, including Bill and Hillary Clinton, The Temptations, Vicky Winans, Cicely Tyson, Danny Glover, Ruby and Ozzie Davis, Steve Harvey, and many more. It has featured everything from elaborate touring musical productions to local

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community meetings, forums, high school graduations, and other community gatherings.

Kai Green, manager of the Joseph Caleb Auditorium, works very closely with the community. "The Caleb Auditorium is a central point that ties the community together," said Green.

The Caleb Auditorium is being upgraded with the same state-ofthe-art technology equipment as the MDCA, making it a viable local and national competitor to other performing arts centers. The project is expected to be completed by the end of 2008.

As Green boasts, "The Joseph Caleb Auditorium is the best deal in town with rental at less than a dollar per seat, and allowing local and national promoters and artists to bring a wide variety of arts to Miami."







A BEAUTY by the BAY

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1986, the Deering Estate at Cutler is a 444-acre cultural oasis located in southern Miami-Dade County. Many area residents have come to know the estate as summer campers and have discovered its archaeological records that date back more than 100,000 years. Others appreciate walking tours through the estate's protected natural areas and our globally endangered pine rockland habitat, among the largest blocks of this ecosystem remaining in the United States. And, still, others remember growing up here as neighbors of the Deerings. But few know the full story of the ancestral portraits that can be found on this wondrous land that hugs Biscayne Bay. A day, even an hour, at the estate is an experience unlike any other in South Florida. The Deering Estate at Cutler represents an island in the midst of the sea of suburbia where rustling palms, the song of birds and the splash of the bay water take the visitor back to a simpler time.

In 1913, Charles Deering, a wealthy industrialist and patron of the arts from Chicago, who was the first chairman of International Harvester and recognized as an environmentalist, purchased the original 320 acres of the estate to establish his winter home in South Florida. Born in South Paris, Maine, on July 31, 1852, Deering was the first son of William Deering and Abby Reed Deering. He spent a total of 12 years in the Navy and traveled extensively throughout Europe and the Orient. He spent eight years in France and Spain where he befriended many artists and collected much of his artwork and furnishings.

Deering began collecting artwork while still a man of modest income. Initially, he purchased only a few pieces from friends. Swedish master artist Anders Zorn, American portraitist John Singer Sargent and Spanish Modernista painter and postermaker Ramon Casas y Carbo were among his closest associates. He continued his collecting and added works by contemporary artists and masters such as Giovanni Boldini, Edgar Degas, Francisco Goya, El Greco, Winslow Homer, Vincent Lopez, Lucas Padilla, Augustus St. Gaudens, J. Sustermans, and J.M. Whistler to name a few. Deering represented the epitome of early American art collectors and patrons. In total, he amassed more than 4,000 pieces of art and one of the largest collections of tapestries and art in the United States. In 1922, his art collection was appraised at an astounding \$60 million.


Much of his vast art collection is on permanent exhibition at the Art Institute of Chicago, Northwestern University and held with various family members. His 1866 oil-on-canvas painting "Procesión de Miércoles de Cenizas en Barcelona" by Ramon Casas y Carbo is on display at the Deering Estate's Stone House. Other pieces at the estate include an early 20th century Hispanic Gothic Revival 12-light bronze chandelier; Ramon Casas y Carbo's 1908 oil-on-canvas painting of Richard Flint Howe and William Deering Howe; his 1917 pastel of James Deering and his 1920 portrait of Barbara Deering; a 1907 watercolor of Sitges by M. Crusal; and of course Deering's own creation, an 1894 oil-on-canvas painting of General William Denison Whipple (his father-in-law) and another of his stepmother Mrs. William Deering (Clara Cummings Hamilton). Deering's passion for the arts and artists is preserved in our Artist Village, a present-day collection of historic buildings that serves as a hub for collaborative cultural arts programming that includes Art on Loan, "open" Artist in Residence Studios, literary Artists in Residence, Creative Art Camps, Visiting Artist Outreach Programs available to schools, our Living Artist Concert Series, Master classes, adult and family education programs and SeminArt lectures in partnership with LegalArt. There is much to do to stimulate the mind and the heart on the estate.

Deering was just as passionate about the environment as he was for the arts. He had tremendous foresight in selecting our "hammock" – the natural areas of the estate – to be protected from development, and thus preserving Florida's natural beginnings. Long before his time or when the neighboring area became a bustling community in South Dade, the Deering Estate at Cutler was home to many cultures inhabiting the land over thousands of years. Paleo-Indians, Tequestas, Seminoles, African-Bahamians, and others built bay-side communities on these "hunting grounds" until the 1700s, and in the 1890s, one of Miami's early pioneer townships – the Town of Cutler – was platted here. The estate is indeed a "living classroom" offering ancestral portraits and educational partnerships for the entire

community to learn about its own past and present, as well as point to its future.

With some of the highest quality and most diverse natural and archaeological resources remaining in Miami-Dade County, this living classroom also educates our community about preserving our biodiversity through environmental stewardship, environmental sustainability and overall resource management. Our Eco-Brigade – the Deering Estate at Cutler's education and interpretive staff – provides eco-tours, natural area adventures, camp-ins, camp and scouting programs, outreach to schools and community groups, hands-on learning, field study opportunities, teacher workshops, and much more. The possibilities for PLAY – Preservation, Learning, Adventure, Year-round – are endless at the Deering Estate at Cutler. The journey that led to the establishment of Miami's cultural jewel - Vizcaya -one of the most celebrated estates in America, is an intriguing story. International Harvester Vice President James Deering (1859–1925) built Vizcaya, his winter home, between 1914 and 1922. Now known as Vizcaya Museum and Gardens, the extraordinary estate, located just minutes from downtown Miami, is accredited by the American Association of Museums and is a United States National Historic Landmark owned and operated by Miami-Dade County. The institution's mission is to preserve Vizcaya in order to engage visitors in learning through the arts, history and the environment.

Most people wonder about the meaning of the name "Vizcaya," and there are several theories about its origin. The estate's name-like Biscayne Bay, on which it sits-dates back to the northern Spanish province known as Vizcaya or Biskaia, suggesting the project's significant European inspiration. In a 1915 letter, Deering stated his desire to perpetuate a myth that Vizcaya was named after an explorer, further imbuing the project with associations of foreign discovery and exchange.

Deering's Mediterranean-inspired main house and formal gardens are picturesquely sited between the sparkling waters of Biscayne Bay and a lush hardwood forest or hammock. These same natural elements were pivotal in Deering's selection of the site nearly 100 years ago. The main house is distinguished for its architecture and its lavishly designed interiors filled with European, Asian and American artifacts spanning two millennia. Unlike many other house museums from this era. Vizcava still possesses almost all its original furnishings, further anchoring its great historic integrity. The gardens are notable for introducing a European design to a subtropical context - a daring premise that resulted in early and ongoing experiments to identify appropriate plant specimens. While Vizcaya's style evokes faraway places, local stone, soil and plants reflect Deering's desire to showcase Miami and its natural beauty.

Originally, the 180-acre estate included a lagoon dotted with manmade islands to the south of its manicured gardens and a village on the west side of South Miami Avenue, with fields for grazing livestock and growing produce. Deering built the village with the intent of making Vizcaya virtually self-sufficient. This idea evoked he spirit of European precedents

while compensating for the limited services and commodities available in early 20th-century Miami. The village's buildings housed staff quarters, an automobile garage, workshops, and an array of barns for domesticated animals. Fortunately, the village survives, and its splendid collection of buildings is in the process of being restored for public enjoyment.

Vizcaya's Origins

In 1913, 53-year-old Deering began to plan his Miami home on Biscayne Bay with designer Paul Chalfin and architect F. Burrall Hoffman. Jr., who collectively decided to build a magnificent Mediterranean-inspired villa, comprising a house, formal gardens and a village. The plan to create such a complex and sophisticated place in the middle of the subtropical wilderness was ambitious. No private residence of this scale had been attempted in Florida, and the technological and human challenges of creating a highly ordered and complex series of settings for the display and enjoyment of rare and fragile artworks, both indoors and outdoors, seemed exceptionally daunting - if not impossible.

Life at Vizcava

When Deering was in residence, he hosted elaborate parties, often at lunchtime, for visiting luminaries, such as film stars Lillian Gish and Marion Davies, politician and orator William Jennings Bryan, inventor Thomas Edison, and President Warren G. Harding, as well as family and less famous friends. Deering presented Hollywood films to entertain his guests and especially favored the films of Charlie Chaplin.

The village, located across what is now South Miami Avenue, was built to house staff and support the main house. A greenhouse supplied fresh flowers, fruit and vegetables for Deering, his guests and staff. A herd of cows provided milk, and chickens furnished a ready supply of fresh eggs. A farm stand sold surplus eggs and produce, although the income generated was surely negligible. On the precious bay-front property, Deering and Chalfin set aside an area for staff members to use as their own private beach. A simple dance platform encouraged recreation after a day's hard work.

Vizcaya Becomes a Public Museum

In 1925, Deering died onboard an ocean liner returning to the United States from France. In 1952, his heirs conveyed the main house with its collections and furnishings, the village, and the grounds to Dade County, and Vizcaya has been a public museum ever since. Throughout its history as such, Vizcaya has attracted millions of local residents and visitors from across the globe to enjoy the site, participate in events and programs, and commemorate special moments in their lives.

Vizcaya is a magnet for amateur and commercial photographers, and several major Hollywood films have featured the estate. Over the years, Vizcaya has also served as a diplomatic seat for Miami-Dade County, having hosted major international events such as the gathering of 34 heads of state attending the first Summit of the Americas in 1994. Among the numerous dignitaries who have graced the estate with their presence are Queen Elizabeth II. Pope John Paul II. Presidents Ronald Reagan and Bill Clinton, and King Juan Carlos I and Queen Sofia of Spain.

Youth Ballfield Complex at Ives Estate Park

Imagine playing baseball or walking a trail or picnicking in a grove all located on a huge pile of garbage. Well you need not imagine it since the Miami-Dade Park and Recreation Department just opened a new park located on a former garbage dump. Just recently, the Youth Ballfield Complex known as Ives Estate Park opened to the thunderous applause of the Ives Estate Optimist Club, which has played youth sports on the adjacent property for more than 40 years. The opening of the complex, composed of two baseball fields, one soccer field, a field center and parking, is the first evidence of success from the long and complex effort needed to transition this property into a fully usable public park.

The County's effort at Ives Estate Park is part of a larger national effort to take brownfield sites, under-utilized urban areas often containing hazardous properties, and convert them into greenfield sites, cleaned up properties providing broad public benefits. Conversions include former landfills, railroad yards, docks and decaying factory sites being changed into parks, marinas, mixed residential and festival market places. In fact, over 250 landfills nationwide have been converted into public parks alone at a time when severe urban space and resource constraints might prevent conventional parks from being developed.

In 1992, the 148-acre Ives Estate property was a landfill owned by the City of Miami Beach. Since the Department was looking for a larger parcel of land on which to construct a district park, respective staff began negotiating for its purchase. Since at the same time, the Solid Waste Department was attempting to better clean



up the former landfill, an interdepartmental effort began to take shape whereby the Parks Department would purchase the land and the Solid Waste Department would help clean up and properly close the land, all in an effort to transition the dump to a park.

From 1993 to 1995, the County completed analysis of the landfill and determined that it could safely be cleaned up and used as a public park. In learning of these results, the School Board sought to purchase a portion of the property as a high school. The Department agreed to allow the School Board to purchase 54-acres of land for the school. In 1995, the Department and School Board executed purchase agreements for the 94-acre and 54-acre parcels from Miami Beach for \$72,000 per acre. The lower per acre cost of land was based on the premise that additional landfill closure costs would be necessary before the land could be fully developed.

Between 1996 and 1999, the Department completed cleanup and closure activities on the property. These activities benefited from a partnership of County, state and federal regulatory interests who were entirely supportive of the landfill transition. At the same time as the County was cleaning up its site, the School Board was cleaning up its site. A second collaborative process, between the Department and the School Board to prepare a site plan for the park and high school brought about a unique open campus where certain improvements of the park were constructed by the School Board so that they could use them during the day and park users could use them evenings and

weekends. Inclusive of design, mitigation and storm water management of the former landfill, the County invested approximately \$11,800,000. While this work was funded by a utility service tax specifically designed to close landfills throughout the County, the Department used Impact Fees to complete the park's general plan and begin facility design projects.

The General Plan for the Park includes youth ballfield complex, soccer and softball complexes, aquatic complex, court complex, large recreation center, picnic and trail area and maintenance yard. Each complex typically includes fields or courts, a staffed building for programming activities, parking, and related infrastructure.

In 2002, the department began the detailed design for the Youth Ballfield Complex. In 2005, construction had commenced but the project was later halted due to a finding that methane gas from the former landfill was accumulating around the new field-center at dangerous levels. A gas mitigation project was then completed at considerable expense, allowing construction to commence again in late 2007. By mid-2008, the facility was completed to great public acclaim. The almost \$6 million cost of the facility was funded by a combination of Impact Fees, Safe Neighborhood Park, Capital Outlay Reserve, and General Obligation Bond funds.

FEATURED PARK ACQUISITION Miami-Dade County Regional Soccer Complex

Soccer is among the fastest growing recreational league sports in the United States, particularly in South Florida. Since 1995, the Park and Recreation Department has not been able to keep up with demand for construction of new fields within our parks. More importantly, the department has not been able to provide sufficient parks with the number and caliber of playing fields suitable for youth and adult state and national tournaments. In 2004, the Department began looking for tournament soccer facilities. Staff quickly identified the Kendall Wellfield as one area of sufficient size and excellent location for a tournament soccer park. An interdepartmental agreement with the Water and Sewer Department enabled a five-field facility to later be planned and two fields constructed. Staff also identified the 660-acre 58 Street Landfill as a second potential site, especially the area along SW 58 Street that had already been cleaned up and closed.

After completing additional environmental testing and a feasibility study on the property, the Department entered into an interdepartmental agreement to purchase 37-acres, at a cost of \$80,000 per acre, and use an additional 10 acres for event parking at no cost. Conceptually, the 47-acre property would allow for up to 15 mid- and full-sized tournament-caliber soccer fields, a field house, a stadium field, and parking.

While the number of fields and caliber of fields is excellent, it is the location of the property that is most advantageous. First, the property is located between the Palmetto Expressway and Florida Turnpike, making it very easy for tournament visitors to reach. Second, the property is accessed via two section-line roads – NW 58 Street on the south and NW 87 Avenue on the east. Third, the property is surrounded by governmental uses that will not be inconvenienced by high noise, high lights and high traffic volumes created by larger tournament events. Fourth, there is additional overflow parking available for very large events. And fifth, there are many lodging facilities in the area to house players and visitors engaged in larger tournaments.

This soccer complex will finally position the County to entertain the largest of all national tournaments in a setting where there is sufficient lodging, parking and lack of adjacent impacts.
