This agency shall be called the Homestead Economic and Rebuilding Organization and shall be commonly referred to as HERO.

^(**) On June 7, 1994, the Board approved the establishment of the Agency when it adopted the Agency's Community Redevelopment Plan (Plan) pursuant to Resolution R-915-94 and the funding of the Plan when it enacted Ordinance No. 94-125 (Trust Fund). An Interlocal Agreement between Miami-Dade County the Agency was approved by the Board on June 7, 1994, and was later amended on July 27, 2004, to include a Community Policing Program.

Sunset Note: The CRA Plan p.46 states: "All redevelopment activities of a contractual, financial, and programmatic nature shall have a maximum duration, or commitment of up to, but not exceeding, thirty (30) years from the date of adoption by the City Council of Homestead and the Board of County Commissioners." (2024)

The Mayor's Memorandum, February 4, 2014 p.2, states: "The County will continue to make annual payments to the Agency, based on each respective year's growth of ad valorem revenues over the base year, through 2028, which is when the Agency will sunset." However, OMB has stated that the correct sunset date is 2024, which is consistent with R-915-94 and the CRA Plan.
