Overview

This report is presented by the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (also known as the Transportation Trust) with information pertaining to the oversight of the Charter County and Regional Transportation System Surtax Funds (surtax) and implementation of the People's Transportation Plan (PTP) for the period October 1, 2021 – September 30, 2022.

The Transportation Trust works closely with members of the Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners (BCC), Miami-Dade County's administration and staff, and municipal officials to ensure PTP funds are properly invested in local transportation projects.

Transportation Trust Updates



Transportation Trust Meetings

The Transportation Trust meets on a regular basis to fulfill its statutory responsibility to "monitor, oversee, review, audit and investigate" the implementation of the People's Transportation Plan (PTP).

First Quarter:

During the First Quarter of FY 2021-22, the Full Trust met 2 times, and there were no committee meetings.

Municipal Presentations

Two presentations were done by the City of Miami.





Second Quarter:

During the Second Quarter of FY 2021-22, the Full Trust met 3 times, while there were no committee meetings.

Municipal Presentations

There were no municipal presentations.

Third Quarter:

During the Third Quarter of FY 2021-22, the Full Trust met 3 times, while there were no committee meetings.

Municipal Presentations

There were two municipal presentations: One by the City of Doral and the other by City of Florida City.

Fourth Quarter:

During the Fourth Quarter of FY 2021-22, the Full Trust met 2 times, while there were no committee meetings.

PTP Achievements

During Fiscal Year 2021-22, these were among some of the PTP achievements:

In October 2021, the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust approved a Resolution to invest approximately \$4.9 million towards providing ongoing maintenance and operational support services for Miami-Dade County's traffic signals at approximately 2,900 intersections.

This maintenance effort will be provided while the County transitions to new hardware and software technology being installed by the German company Siemens.

With the new Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS), these 'smart' traffic signals will be able to rapidly adjust their timing according to traffic conditions and speeds.

According to Siemens, data will be collected in real-time from a wide array of new sources at intersections and roadway zones/corridors, which will then optimize the signal timings at each intersection in a network. This will create an integrated system designed to counteract impending critical situations quickly and efficiently, as well as unpredictable traffic overloads and congestion.

Siemens anticipates that once the new system is in place, County residents will spend 15 percent less time sitting in traffic.

With this project, the County will also complete one of the original goals outlined in the People's Transportation Plan.

Additionally, in an effort to maximize funding opportunities to implement local transit projects, the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (CITT) commissioned its strategic consultant, IMG Rebel Advisory, Inc., to conduct a deep-dive analysis of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) of 2021 bill.


In its analysis of the \$1.2 trillion bill, the CITT and IMG Rebel found that the bill significantly expands federal funding for transit, through such things as the Capital Investment Grants (CIG) Small Starts program. This could potentially provide millions of additional dollars for transit projects, such as the ones outlined in the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan.








\$1 trillion (T) Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) of 2021 proposes \$550B of new spending





Further, the bill also increases the federal share provided through the Small Starts program from \$100 million to \$150 million, and it increases the threshold for projects to be eligible for this expedited program from \$300 million to \$400 million.

The Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust also continues to fund and monitor projects found in the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan. One of these projects is the South Corridor, which will have 14 Metrobus stations along the South Corridor, as well information on a Park & Ride facility at SW 168th Street and the South Dade TransitWay, plans for Transit Oriented Developments (TODs) and other projects

along Station canopies have already been erected at the Marlin and Civic Center stations.

At the Park and Ride facility at SW 168th Street, the public will find approximately 645 parking spaces, a bicycle storage area, electric vehicle charging, and more.

Due to a shortage in materials, including fiber strains needed



for system communications, completion of the South Corridor has been extended to spring 2024.

Contracts Approved by the Transportation Trust during FY 2020-21

A major responsibility of the Transportation Trust is to review contracts requesting Transportation surtax funding for projects listed in the Five-Year Implementation Plan of the People's Transportation Plan (Five Year Plan). The Trust also reviews contracts over \$1 million regardless of the funding source as allowed in the amended PTP ordinance. These contracts are initiated by the Miami-Dade Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW) and are reviewed by staff at the Office of the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (OCITT) before they are voted on by the Transportation Trust members. Major Highway and Road Improvement Projects

The Miami-Dade Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW) is also responsible for implementing the surtax funded roadway improvements listed in the Five-Year Implementation Plan of the People's Transportation Plan.

Neighborhood Improvement Projects

DTPW continues to coordinate the Neighborhood Improvement Projects with County Commissioners' offices. Improvements in this category include roadway resurfacing, sidewalks, ADA ramps and connectors, drainage, guardrails, striping, traffic signals, and traffic calming.

DTPW takes advantage of contracting mechanisms, such as the County's Miscellaneous Construction Contract (MCC) Program to accelerate implementation of projects. It is an open competitive process which allows

for an expedited procurement. The MCC program provides contractors countywide with a fair opportunity to compete for work on County construction projects, and has a direct beneficial impact to the County by accelerating construction projects.

PTP Municipal Update

Approximately 23 percent (23%) of surtax proceeds are allocated to 33 municipalities eligible to receive People's Transportation Plan (PTP) funds. Each city receives a pro rata share of funds based on population which are used to develop or enhance the city's public transit and transportation systems. Twenty-seven (27) municipalities provide bus shuttle service to 29 cities funded by the surtax. The municipal shuttles jointly transported 9,058,082 passengers during Fiscal Year 2021-22.

During FY 2021-22, the Village of Biscayne Park officially launched its new on-demand service in partnership with Freebee.

The new free on-demand service is funded by way of Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) District Six state dollars and the Village's share of People's Transportation Plan (PTP) Surtax funds.

Approximately 23% of all Surtax funds are allocated to 33 municipalities that are eligible to receive PTP funds.

Many municipalities use their Surtax funds to provide transit services via circulators and on-demand services, such as Freebee, or a combination of both.



The on-demand service provided by the Village of Biscayne Park aims to connect residents to key destinations and services, and will provide an important first/last mile link to the future Northeast Corridor of the SMART Plan.





PTP Audits

The Trust audits Miami-Dade County and the municipalities receiving surtax funds as part of its management of the program. The audits are conducted by the Miami-Dade Audit and Management Services Department on a regular basis to document compliance with the requirements of the PTP and to ensure that the County and cities are using the funds in an approved manner. 






Quarterly Surtax Uses






Quarterly Surtax Uses


