The Office of the Commission Auditor (OCA), in response to a request made by Miami-Dade County Commissioner Danielle Cohen Higgins, District 8, identified the vehicle model age limits for taxicabs of jurisdictions across the State of Florida and the country. OCA's methodology for this research consisted of identifying the regulations that govern taxicab requirements of the following jurisdictions: (1) comparable jurisdictions in the State of Florida, (2) the most populous counties in the United States (US) according to the 2022 US Census Bureau, and (3) additional metropolitan cities across the US. OCA identified regulations for a total of 20 jurisdictions.

**Table 1** below summarizes the regulations on vehicle model age limits for the jurisdictions. Out of the 20 jurisdictions, two have age limits of 15 years for all taxicab vehicles, two have age limits of 15 years for qualifying vehicle types, four have age limits of 10 years or lower, and 12 have no age limits.

<sup>\*</sup>The City of Seattle Code of Ordinances stipulates that a taxicab vehicle model year can be no more than ten-years old. However, the city has temporarily suspended the ten-year vehicle age limitation while it works with King County on proposed legislation to extend the age limit for taxicabs to 15 years. According to the City of Seattle Medallion Renewal Process, the City and County aim to have the new age limit in place before December 31, 2023.

#### **RESEARCH FINDINGS**

Pursuant to Resolution No. R-129-22, adopted on February 1, 2022, and the new requirements per Implementing Order (I.O.) 8-4, the Office of the Commission Auditor (OCA) is directed to independently and simultaneously review and comment on the proposed leasing and conveyance of County property prior to the submission of an agenda item to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC). The OCA is providing this report as a Supplement to BCC Agenda File Item No. 231851.

#### **Commission Auditor's Observations:**

The OCA completed a comprehensive review of the intended recipient of the lease agreement, "British Airways PLC Corporation." This review extended to the entity's shareholders, International Consolidated Airlines Group S.A. and Law Debenture Corporation PLC, and the key personnel of the lease recipient. The results yielded the following:

- A. Background research performed on British Airways PLC Corporation, the entity's shareholders, and key personnel yielded no material findings. The scope of this review was limited because the company and its key personnel reside in the United Kingdom. At this time, a comprehensive review of international records is not available. The OCA will continue identifying options to enhance our international background research capabilities.
- B. British Airways PLC Corporation, the entity's principals, and key personnel were not previously leased or conveyed County properties for Infill, Affordable, or Workforce Housing, as authorized through BCC resolution.

#### **Scope of Review:**

The OCA's review of the subject lease agreement is based on information provided by the Miami-Dade County Aviation Department (MDAD), which includes the documents listed under the *Source Documents* section below.

As part of OCA's due diligence procedures, OCA identifies all entities and persons having a disclosed or observed interest in the BCC approval of the lease, such as the recipient, principals, and key personnel of the recipient entity (see Exhibit 1).

#### Methodology:

OCA's review of the individuals and entities listed included the following procedures:

A. A review of Board-approved conveyances to external parties for Infill, Affordable, and Workforce Housing as authorized through BCC resolution.

- B. A search of the Miami-Dade Property Appraiser's records to ascertain any evidence of risk factors, including entities with a history of previously conveyed or leased County-owned property that was later the subject of an involuntary reverter or lease termination by the County.
- C. A search of the Miami-Dade County Commission Legislation and Miami-Dade Clerk of the Courts (COC) database for previous leases and sales.
- D. A search of Miami-Dade County internal procurement applications and past County contracts for the lease recipient and principals.
- E. Background research into corporate records, business affiliations, and registrations.
