Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Agency FY 2020-21 Budget **Subject:**

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) consider the attached resolution approving the Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Agency's (Agency) Fiscal Year 2020-21 budget for the Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Area (area). The Agency's budget includes revenues and expenditures in the amount of \$1,807,130.

The Interlocal Cooperation Agreement (interlocal) between Miami-Dade County (County), the City of Opa-Locka (City) and the Agency requires the Agency to submit an annual budget prior to expending any funding for the implementation of the Community Redevelopment Plan (plan).

Scope of Agenda Item

The area lies within County Commission Districts 1 and 2, which are represented by Vice-Chairman Oliver G. Gilbert, III and Commissioner Jean Monestime, respectively.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The Agency's revenue source is the incremental growth of ad valorem revenues beyond an established base year, tax increment financing (TIF), as defined in section 163.387, Florida Statutes. The FY 2020-21 budget includes \$334,355 in revenue sources of County TIF and \$712,555 in City TIF, and 760,220 in carryover from the prior year.

As required by the interlocal, the County will make annual payments to the Agency and the area based on each respective year's growth of ad valorem revenues over the base year through 2033 when the Agency will sunset.

Track Record / Monitor

This item does not provide for contracting with any specific entity and only approves the Agency's FY 2020-21 budget.

Background

On October 1, 2013, the Board adopted Resolution No. R-795-13 which approved the creation of the Agency, adopted the Agency's plan and approved the interlocal agreement between the County, the City and the Agency. The Board funded the plan when it adopted Ordinance No. 13-94, which established the Agency's trust fund. The interlocal, which was executed on December 4, 2013, requires the Agency to submit its annual budget for review and approval by the Board.

Fiscal Year 2020-21 Budget

It is recommended that the Board consider the Agency's FY 2020-21 budget of \$1,807,130, which was approved by the Agency on September 9, 2020, through Resolution No. 2020-06, (Attachment A to this memorandum). The City adopted the Agency's budget through Ordinance No. 2020-23 on December 9, 2020, (Attachment B to this memorandum). The budget includes \$334,355 in County TIF, \$712,555 in City TIF and \$760,220 in carryover from the previous year.

Administrative expenditures total \$76,153, exclusive of the County's administrative fee of \$5,015, and include \$29,772 for administrative support provided by the City's Planning and Community Development Department, \$29,000 for professional services and audits, \$5,782 for the City's general fund administrative fee, \$1,790 for information technology support, \$5,659 for risk management for Agency personnel and \$4,150 for rent. The expenses also include \$150 state fee.

Operating expenditures total \$695,000 and include \$200,000 for a façade improvement program, \$195,000 for a redevelopment plan update to extend the life of the Agency, \$250,000 for a streetscape project for several neighborhoods in the, and \$50,000 for a parks master plan for parks located in the area. All expenditures are detailed in Exhibit 1 to the attached resolution.

WHEREAS, the Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Agency ("OCRA") is responsible for carrying out community redevelopment activities and projects within its Redevelopment Area in accordance with the Opa-Locka Redevelopment Plan ("Redevelopment Plan"); and

WHEREAS, as a prerequisite to carrying out redevelopment activities for the fiscal year commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30, 2021 ("FY 2020-2021"), the Redevelopment Plan requires that the OCRA's Board and the City Commission to approve and adopt the annual General Operating and Tax Increment Fund Budget ("Budget"), attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, on September 9, 2020, by Resolution # 2020-06, the OCRA Board of Directors approved the OCRA's Proposed General Operating and Tax Increment Fund Budget for the Fiscal Year Commencing October 1, 2020 and Ending September 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Interlocal Agreement between the City and Miami-Dade County, a copy of the Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Agency's budget is required to be transmitted to Miami-Dade County; and

WHEREAS, all the expenses included in the Budget are in accordance with state law, the Interlocal Agreement and the Agency's Redevelopment Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Opa-Locka Code of Ordinances, Article II, Section 2.61 (c) states: "When action to be taken by resolution or ordinance. All actions of the commission may be taken by resolution or ordinance except that any action of the commission which provides for raising revenue, appropriating funds or incurring indebtedness, or which provide a penalty or establishes a rule or regulation for the violation of which a penalty is imposed, shall be by ordinance, and except that approval of purely administrative matters may be accomplished by motion duly adopted and recorded in the minutes of the meeting. Whenever action cannot be taken because the vote of the commission has resulted in a tie, the status quo shall continue in effect and the proposed ordinance, resolution or motion that produced the tie vote shall be removed from the agenda without prejudice to its reintroduction on a de novo basis at a later time"; and

WHEREAS, Opa-Locka Code of Ordinances, Article IV, Section 4.5(B) provides, in relevant part, that "The Commission shall by ordinance adopt the annual budget on or before the thirtieth (30th) day of September of each year; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Opa-Locka desires to approve and adopt the Opa-Locka Community Redevelopment Agency's Budget for FY 2020-2021 as set forth in Exhibit "A".

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OPA-LOCKA, FLORIDA:

Staff Summary:

The Opa-locka Community Redevelopment Agency is responsible for authorizing community redevelopment activities and projects within its Redevelopment Area in accordance with the Opa-locka Redevelopment Plan. The Opa-locka Community Redevelopment Agency is also responsible for approving and adopting its annual General Operating and Tax Increment Fund Budget, a copy of this legislation has been included. All of the expenses included in the Budget are in accordance with state law, the Interlocal Agreement, and the Community Redevelopment Agency's Redevelopment Plan. Pursuant to the Interlocal Agreement a copy of the Opa-locka Community Redevelopment Agency's budget is required to be transmitted to Miami-Dade County. The Miami-Dade County, Office of Budget is also requiring that the Opa-locka City Commission provide legislation approving and adopting the Community Redevelopment Agency's annual General Operating and Tax Increment Fund Budget.

Background

The City Commission has approved and adopted the City Budgets for fiscal year commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30, 2021. This is a formal request for the City Commission to approve and adopt the annual General Operating and Tax Increment Fund Budget of the Opa-locka Community Redevelopment Agency, attached and incorporated as Exhibit "A", for the fiscal year commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30, 2021.

Also in accordance with City of Opa-locka Code of Ordinance, Section 2.61 (c) "When action to be taken by resolution or ordinance". Opa-locka Community Redevelopment Agency [CRA] FY 2021 Project Narrative

- Facade Improvements Program <u>CRA Staff has engage OLCDC to manage the façade program as part of their business assistance initiative. The CRA Board approved CRA Staff proposal and staff is working with OLCDC regarding the criteria for the façade program which is to commence by August 1st 2020. Five [5] sites have been identified and approved. Second phase is proposed to be begin Summer 2021.

- Opa-locka 2021 Downtown Master Plan As one of the goals and objective of the OCRA, the creation of a downtown master plan is a key document needed to market to the real estate and development professions what the future desire is for this City's central business district to look like. The City seeks to increase the density of the area with mixed use development with a Moorish-Arabian Architectural Style to be built as high as 8 stories with internal parking garages, paseos, loggias, and plazas for patrons and pedestrian use. This master plan will require the CRA Board securing the services for a planning/architectural consultant. A RFP Downtown Masterplan Workshop was held on November 13th, 2019. The CRA Board approved staff proceeding with the RFP for consultant service. The RFP was released in January and due date for submission on February 10th, 2020. Budget for plan is \$130K. On May 22, the OCRA BOD approved Stantec Consulting as the consultant for the 2020 Downtown Master Plan. The contract for the consultant service has been finalized. Work commence on September 1st, 2020. Meetings with OCRA BOD, stakeholders and property owners have been held. A Downtown Design Charrette/workshop is planned for March 2021. The Downtown Master Plan is expected to be completed by Summer/Fall 2021.
- Historic City Hall Restoration To demonstrate that the OCRA is active and doing work in the community, the OCRA Board approved resolution to assist in funding the completion of the restoration of Historic City Hall at a cost of \$175,000 to supplement the \$525,000 being funded by the City of Opa-locka for a total of \$700,000 to complete the restoration of the most significant structure in the City of Opa-locka and the CRA Area. <u>Due the previous contractor choosing to not continue on the project, the project will need to be rebid which may result in an inquiry for a larger allocation for CRA TIF funding. An assessment of the work completed and remains to be done needs to be completed. City Staff is awaiting the CAO to execute the contract for the GC conducting the assessment. The assessment is expected to be done by Summer 2021 with the restoration work is anticipated to begin Fall 2021 and hopefully be completed by Fall 2022 [just in time for Art Basel].</u>
- Opa-locka CRA Redevelopment Plan Update The Opa-locka Redevelopment Plan was commissioned in 2008, drafted in 2009 and was completed and approved by the City of Opa-locka in 2011. Since that time the needs for the plan to address have changed and the level of slum and blight have increased and expanded to other area of the City. Also in 2019, the State of Florida passed legislation to sunset all CRAs by 2039. The Opa-locka Redevelopment Plan needs to be amended to 1] extent the lifespan of the OCRA from ending in October 2033 to October 2039, 2] add new projects and programs to address and remove slum and blight, and 3] adjust the boundaries of the OCRA to include both sides of NW 22 Avenue from SR-9 to NW Opa-locka Boulevard, 27th Avenue from SR-9 to NW 135th Street, and potentially to include the Opa-locka Flea Market site. The expansion of the OCRA boundaries will require a new Finding of Necessity [FON] to address the new areas to be added to the OCRA. All pending or proposed amendment to the redevelopment plan require approval from the Opa-locka CRA, City of Opa-locka Commission, and Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners. The RFP for consultant services is anticipated to be release in the Fall 2021.
- Streetscape Street beautification is a primary way of removing slum and blight. There are several roadway in the OCRA area that are in need of major infrastructural improvements. The City of Opa-locka was designed as a Tree City USA in 2014. Planning of trees within the neighborhoods and along the street in the commercial and industrial areas is needed. Magnolia North, Magnolia Gardens, Opa-locka North Industrial District and the Downtown/TownCenter are the areas being targeted for streetscape improvements to supplement the infrastructure improvements and remove slum and blight. This work schedule is yet TBD.
- Parks Master Plan and Amenities/Improvements for Parks in the OCRA area [Sherbondy, Butterfly, Kaboom and Ingram Park] As one of the goals and objective of the OCRA, the creation of a park master plan is a key document needed to plan and create the recreational amenities and activities for the future desire for the citizens, residents and business employees of this City. There are 8 parks in the City of Opa-locka, four parks are in the OCRA. OCRA Staff is working with the City Administration to consider support up to 50% of the master plan and improvements for Sherbondy, Ingram, Butterfly, and KaBoom/CET Park. The RFP for consultant services is to be release very soon.
