RESOLUTION NO.

RESOLUTION CODESIGNATING THAT PORTION OF SW 37TH AVENUE (DOUGLAS ROAD) FROM GRAND AVENUE TO CHARLES TERRACE AS "VERNON HAWTHORNE CLARK, SR. WAY"; URGING THE CITY OF MIAMI TO JOIN IN THIS CODESIGNATION

WHEREAS, trailblazer and activist Vernon Hawthorne Clark, Sr., a Civil Rights pioneer whose indelible mark is etched into the fabric of the Coconut Grove community, died on November 18, 2020 at the age of 82; and

WHEREAS, born to Bahamian parents who migrated to the Coconut Grove area of Miami, Florida in the 1920s, Mr. Clark quickly developed an earnest commitment to bettering the community around him at an early age; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Clark's strong spiritual foundation under the tutelage of social and political powerhouses Reverend Canon Theodore Gibson and wife Thelma Vernal Gibson as a member of Coconut Grove's Christ Episcopal Church, similarly played an integral role in cultivating his social and educational ideologies and strong spirit of activism; and

WHEREAS, although the prevalence of segregation and the unfathomable ills that surrounded the Jim Crow South unsuccessfully sought to stifle Mr. Clark's growth and productivity, he emerged as an unstoppable leader in his own right, advocating tirelessly for improved living and educational standards for the affected residents of Coconut Grove and beyond; and WHEREAS, Mr. Clark continued to take his rightful place on the frontlines of the Civil Rights Movement by both demonstrating and advocating for the desegregation of Miami's beaches and leading to the establishment of the historic Virginia Key Beach, fair and improved housing conditions such as the establishment of an effective indoor plumbing system for Coconut Grove's Black residents through the Coconut Grove Committee for Slum Clearance, and the desegregation of Miami's public bus services; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Clark was a firm believer in worthwhile connections and community, and made sure that the wellbeing of the residents of Coconut Grove remained at the forefront of his plight; and

WHEREAS, he reflected favorably on his life and his ability to see the "fruits of his labor" personified through Miami's desegregation efforts and continued push for collective positive change; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Clark was also a political powerhouse who both challenged and encouraged aspiring political leaders to eradicate and eliminate the racial and socio-economic divide and to cultivate growth in Coconut Grove, Miami-Dade County and beyond; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of his immeasurable contributions to the fabric of Coconut Grove and the greater Miami-Dade County community, this Board seeks to honor the memory, legacy, and tenacity of Mr. Vernon Hawthorne Clark, Sr., and pay homage to a life dedicated to causes greater than his own by codesignating that portion of SW 37th Avenue (Douglas Road) from Grand Avenue to Charles Terrace as "Vernon Hawthorne Clark, Sr. Way"; and

WHEREAS, it is only fitting that this distinct Miami-Dade County road located in Coconut Grove be codesignated to reflect the matchless legacy of Mr. Vernon Hawthorne Clark, Sr., a true testament to Miami-Dade County's rich and diverse history; and

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WHEREAS, that portion of SW 37th Avenue (Douglas Road) from Grand Avenue to Charles Terrace is a County-maintained road located in the City of Miami; and

WHEREAS, this proposed codesignation is located in County Commission District 7,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Having considered this matter at a public hearing, codesignates that portion of SW 37th Avenue (Douglas Road) from Grand Avenue to Charles Terrace as "Vernon Hawthorne Clark, Sr. Way."

Section 2. Urges the City of Miami to join in this codesignation.

Section 3. Directs the Clerk of the Board to send certified copies of this Resolution to the Mayor and City Commission of the City of Miami, the United States Postal Service, the Traffic Signals and Signs Division of the Department of Transportation and Public Works, the Development Services Division of the Regulatory and Economic Resources Department, the Miami-Dade Police Department, the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue Department, the City of Miami Police Department and the City of Miami Fire-Rescue Department.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Commissioner Raquel A. Regalado. It was offered by Commissioner , who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:
