Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) authorize the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to approve the attached resolution by retroactively approving the submittal of a grant application (Attachment A) to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs 2022 National Veterans Sports Programs for Project Victor (Veterans Integrated into The Community Through Outdoor Recreation) Adaptive Sports Program. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee to receive and expend funds and execute grant agreements, certain amendments, and other documents, as required by the grant agreement upon review and approval of the County Attorney's Office.

Scope

The project is county-wide and includes various County parks: Trail Glades, A.D. "Doug" Barnes Park, Amelia Earhart Park, Gwen Cherry Park, Marva Bannerman Park, Camp Matecumbe, Matheson Hammock Park, Crandon Park, Tamiami Park, Goulds Park and Greynolds Park.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

Project VICTOR is a multi-sport outdoor adaptive sports program at County parks servicing disabled veterans in the South Florida area. The total cost of the project is \$141,701.33. If awarded, the Adaptive Sports Grant Program (ASG) will provide funds of \$102,462.63. The ASG Program has no requirement for matching funds. However, in-kind contributions, supported by the Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces Department (PROS) for \$39,238.70 were included to demonstrate resources related to the project. There will be no fiscal impact to the Department if the grant is awarded. The part-time positions listed as "TBA" in the grant application are accounted for in the Department's budget; however, these positions rotate among sites and therefore will be utilized from a pool of existing staff.

Delegation of Authority

The Board authorizes the County Mayor or Mayor's designee to accept and expend funds and execute contracts, amendments, and other documents as required by the grant, upon review and final approval of the County Attorney's Office. The County Mayor or Mayor's designee shall be required to seek Board approval for any approvals, consents, actions, events or undertakings that would create a financial obligation, cost or expense to the County beyond those specifically identified and set forth in the Agreement.

Track Record/Monitor

The proposed grant will be administered by PROS Grants Supervisor, Dorothy Mills-Mayers. The grant funded project will be implemented by PROS Therapeutic Recreation & Inclusion Division.

Background

The ASG Program is administered through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The ASG Program is designated for veterans with disabilities and members of the armed forces, and provides grant funding to organizations to increase and expand the quantity and quality of adaptive sport activities for veterans and service members with disabilities, including those with mental health issues, to participate with their home communities, as well as more advanced Paralympic and adaptive sport programs at the regional and national levels. Originally authorized as the U.S. Paralympics Integrated Adaptive Sports Program in December 2013, Public Law 113-59 amended U.S.C. 521A and designated the VA's Office of National Veterans Sports Programs and Special Events (NVSP&SE) to directly manage the ASG Program.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Adaptive Sports Grant Program has awarded \$305,681.01 in grants to PROS since 2012. The project is expected to be completed within the term of the grant. The application deadline was March 31, 2022; however, there was insufficient time from the opportunity announcement to the grant deadline to obtain a resolution. An adopted resolution was not required by the funding agency for the application submittal. It is recommended that the Board approve this grant application in order for PROS to continue providing recreational services to veterans.

Abstract

The 2022 Miami-Dade Parks VICTOR Adaptive Sports Program is a multi-sport program that will provide Disabled Veterans with the opportunity to engage in various sports to promote the overall quality of life for individuals by emphasizing the importance of physical fitness and well-being, decreasing social isolation, and providing education on the value and use of recreation as a means to cope with trauma, stress, and to develop a sense of identity. The sports that will be offered include: Archery, Boccia, Cycling, Paddlesports, Pickleball, Swimming, Trap Shooting, Waterskiing, Wheelchair Basketball, and Wheelchair Softball. This program also seeks to provide Disabled Veterans progressing along the athletic pipeline with access to competitive-level quality equipment for training and competing. The primary disability populations that will be served through this program include: Spinal Cord Injury, diseases and disorders affecting the central nervous system such as, Multiple Sclerosis and Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, amputations, range of motion limitations due to disease or injury, Traumatic head injury, stroke, visual impairments, and those affected by Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

I. Program Details and Specifics

The 2022-23 VICTOR Adapted Sports Program is a multi-sport program that provides extensive sport training and education leading into competitive opportunities in 11 different adapted sports to veterans living with physical disabilities, those affected by illness or disease, and those affected by PTSD and other mental health issues. Activities are coordinated and supervised by a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist who plans schedules in collaboration with staff from the Bruce Carter VAMC, Wounded Warrior Project, and Paralyzed Veterans Association of Florida. Activities will be scheduled throughout the week, ongoing throughout the year.

All program components will provide training opportunities and competitions. The activities will be offered to veterans and will consist of (but not be limited to): 1. Rules of the sport and how to play, 2. Adapted equipment for the sport (types, use, and care of), 3. Exercises and techniques to improve performance in the sport, and 4. Safety. All activity sessions will typically have a duration of 2-3 hours, while some clinics may have a duration of 2-8 hours depending on the sport and the frequency of clinic offerings.

In order to serve the growing varieties of skills, the following sports will be elevated to comprise both recreational and competitive levels: Archery, Boccia, Fishing, Cycling, Trap Shooting, Swimming, and Wheelchair Basketball.

The program components are as follows:

- <u>Archery</u> (local/introductory/competitive/community event) will include a minimum of 30 weekly sessions on the fundamentals of archery and the use of adapted equipment, 3 competitive skill sessions, 2 in-house tournaments, and 1 culminating invitational tournament for program participants. Use of adaptive equipment such as the DrawLoc, bow release aids, stools, finger tabs, quad gloves, and more available for wheelchair users or other disabilities. Archers classified according to USA Archery standards (ST, W2, W1, and NE) and program run by USA Archery certified coaches. Veterans to be served: 15
- 2. <u>Boccia</u> (local/introductory/competitive/community event) will include 8 intro sessions to provide instruction on the rules of the adapted sport boccia, the fundamentals of play, strategy, and drills to improve technique., 11 competitive skills sessions and 1 culminating tournament in the Spring. Use of adaptive aids such as ramps and personal assistants available. Veterans to be served: 15
- 3. <u>Cycling</u> (local/introductory) will include 12 handcycling and tandem cycling clinics for veterans with physical or visual disabilities on the fundamentals of handcycling, caring for equipment, and safety education, 2 local timed races, and 1 culminating race. Veterans to be served: 12

- 4. <u>Fishing</u> (local/introductory/competitive) 10 fishing excursions in Biscayne Bay, on a WC accessible vessel which can accommodate up to 15 participants, to include education on fundamentals of fishing, fishing regulations in Florida, adapted equipment, conservation, and fishing sustainability, and how to filet and prepare fish for a healthy meal. Several of these outings will foster the format of a fishing tournament. Adaptive equipment for anglers available includes StrongArms, electric reels, knot tying kit. Boat ramp used for chair access from dock. Veterans to be served: 30
- 5. <u>Paddlesports (kayaking and stand-up paddleboards)</u> will include 10 inperson kayaking/paddleboarding clinics and excursions throughout Miami-Dade County in partnership with our ECO Adventures division, on the fundamentals of kayaking/paddling. Kayaks are adaptable for a wide variety of individuals with various disabilities. Includes foot-pedal tandem kayak, outboard balanced kayaks for stability, high back chairs, adapted oar grips, beach access mats, and beach wheelchairs available for transfer. Veterans to be served: 18
- <u>Pickleball</u> (local/introductory/community competition) will included a minimum of 8 introductory clinics to aging Veterans and Veterans who use wheelchairs to include instruction on the fundamentals of play, the rules of the sport, and exercises to improve balance and coordination while playing. 10 competitive skills sessions, and 1 culminating tournament. Adaptive equipment available includes tennis wheelchairs. Follows regulations of Para-pickleball when needed. Veterans to be served: 12
- 7. <u>Swimming</u> (local/introductory/community competition) will include 4 introductory clinics, 12 competitive swimming sessions, and 2 swim meets to include instruction and coaching on techniques to improve swim stroke and efficiency with a former Paralympic swim coach. Location includes heated pool, wheelchair access, and lift. Veterans to be served: 10
- Trap Shooting (local/introductory/community competition) will include a minimum of 10 introductory sessions on trap and skeet lessons which will include the fundamentals of the sport, improving performance, and safety, 21 competitive training sessions, 3 in-house tournaments, and one SoFL clay event participation in the community. Follow American Trapshooting Association (ATA) regulations and National Skeet Shooting (NSSA) regulations. Range is WC accessible. Veterans to be served: 25
- <u>Waterskiing</u> (local/introductory) one two-day clinic will be provided in partnership with Ann's Angels Adapted Waterski Foundation to help train those veterans who will be participating in skiing at seasonal Sports Clinics. Access mats installed for WC users to transfer into adapted ski apparatus. Veterans to be served: 15

- 10. <u>Wheelchair Basketball</u> (local/introductory/community competition/national competition) will include 3 introductory clinics, and an option to continue training with weekly practices and competing with the Miami HEAT Wheels wheelchair basketball team/program which will offer a minimum of 20 additional practices throughout the year. Sport chairs available on loan for veterans who do not have their own. Veterans to be served: 5
- 11. <u>Wheelchair Softball</u> (local/introductory) 7 introductory clinics_will be provided on the fundamentals, rules, and drills to improve performance. Location is WC accessible and has rubber padded field. Veterans served: 10

The goals and objectives this program will seek to achieve are:

- A. To promote the lifelong health of disabled veterans and disabled members of the Armed Forces through regular participation in physical activity and sports.
 - 1. Provide multiple program opportunities for disabled veterans and disabled members of the Armed Forces within the following disability types: spinal cord injury, individuals with multiple sclerosis, amputees, traumatic head injury, PTSD, visual disabilities, and those disabled through either disease or by the aging process which foster:
 - a. A therapeutic environment in which Veterans can learn to develop alternative personal strategies to cope with, manage, and/or improve the effects of disabling conditions.
 - b. An awareness of the benefits of participation in sports.
 - c. Sporting experiences with specific adaptations that meet the needs of our participatory populations.
 - 2. Provide multiple clinics for Veterans with disabilities to gain introductory sporting experience where they will be educated in
 - a. The official rules and regulations to a variety of different sports.
 - b. Proper use of adaptive equipment used in sports to decrease limitations.
 - c. Methods to improve physical performance through individualized activities that promote achievement of performance goals, progressive physical challenges, and skills acquisition.
 - 3. Provide opportunities for Veterans with disabilities to develop personal growth and self-fulfillment while advancing to higher competitive levels in their respective sports by
 - a. Taking part in competitive team practices where participants will receive a pre- and post- evaluation with their skill growth being maintained or improved.
 - b. Taking part in competitions and tournaments.
 - c. Learning to maintain individualized sports equipment.

- B. To increase participation of disabled veterans and disabled members of the Armed Forces in adapted sports.
 - 1. Provide a minimum of 150 recreation and sports training and opportunities throughout the South Florida region at multiple locations, days of the week, and at various times throughout the year to maximize the number of unique veterans served through the program.
 - 2. Provide the opportunity for disabled veterans to engage in adapted sports programming at no cost.
 - 3. Expand the outreach of programming through partnership organizations which will draw in disabled veterans from other areas within the state and nationally.

//.Implementation Plan and Environment

The proposed program is designed to be primarily operated out of Miami-Dade County through the already existing resources of MDPROS. The activities will take place at various MDPROS facilities so that there is little to no turnover time in planning and scheduling of activities.

Activity schedules and dates will be coordinated among MDPROS staff, VA therapists, and collaborating organizations. Master schedules will be disseminated amongst all interested parties and all disabled veterans already in the Miami-Dade Parks database as well as available online for veterans to schedule themselves for the programs they would like to participate in. Programs will be offered throughout the week on various days and at various times. Some activities will only be scheduled during certain operating quarters taking the South Florida climate into consideration.

Funding for the program will go to the cost of purchasing any additional supplies needed to operate the program, operational expenses for running the program which include but are not limited to fees at the shooting range, charter boats for fishing, snorkeling, ECO Adventure activities, specialized instructor fees, training for staff, and personnel operations to cover the cost of park staff implementing programs and working directly with disabled veterans during programs.

Supplies being purchased for the program will be used to enhance already existing programs or to begin new ones, to replace supplies that have already been used up either as a consumable product or through normal wear and tear. Additional resources that will be provided by MDPROS include already allocated resources from previous grant cycles such as archery supplies, boccia supplies, sports wheelchairs, handcycles, and shotguns, indoor and outdoor facilities including gym space, shooting range, beach areas, pool space, and vehicles to transport supplies from one park to another

Upon conclusion of the award period, it is intended that the following deliverables be achieved:

1. That a minimum of 150 unique disabled veterans be served through the program,

2. That a minimum of 150 days of programming be offered through the program,

3. That a minimum of 20 disabled veterans will participate in either a competition of one of the sports being offered or will move into a high-performance training program for a sport they have participated in through the program.

4. That the average overall satisfaction rate among participants with the program will average 4.3 or higher on a Likert scale.

5. That the overall outcomes and success of the program will be shared by other professionals at a state or national conference.

Most of the activities can be implemented immediately as many of the resources are already in place. Planning and preliminary scheduling have already begun amongst interested entities to implement the program effective October 1st, 2022.

III. Impact

The proposed program has the potential to significantly impact the number of adapted sports being offered through the region by drawing awareness to the lack of recreational opportunities due to disability-related issues and to the benefits of adapted sports.

Furthermore, the outreach and programming efforts within activities, such as, boccia and pickleball, will also extend to the aging population which may have an impact on the overall awareness of aging veterans who can compete at the Golden Age Games, and increase participation. Providing adaptive sporting opportunities for non-ambulatory veterans will positively impact the health and wellness of these individuals and increase their participation in the community and awareness of more events, such as, the Wheelchair Games. The implementation of these activities has the potential to improve the overall level of health and quality of life of veterans who have been homebound or deemed high-risk because of the COVID pandemic. Finally, as part of the effort to document outcomes achieved through the program and raise awareness about the benefits of adapted sports programming for disabled veterans, it is expected that more opportunities will arise in the community through possible partners for further programming in the future.

IV. **Program Sustainability**

Programs and access to each of the sports being offered already exist through the PROS system. During each sport activity, program participants will be provided a leisure education component that includes education on the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle through ongoing participation. Program participants will be provided with resources they can connect with to continue pursuing their interests and will be encouraged to do so independently.

At the end of the program, veterans will continue to be provided with the opportunity to engage in the following programs at no cost: Archery, boccia, wheelchair basketball, pickleball and cycling. Fishing, cycling, trap shooting, and archery equipment will be made available at no cost for use by VA hospital therapists as well as equipment for local and out of state competition. Disabled Veterans will also have priority access to the use of equipment during ongoing programs with prior notification at no cost.

V. Budget Narrative and Details

The costs for personnel include fringe and benefits calculated into the hourly rate. These individuals are necessary to ensure the safety of the participants attending the program to provide any needed assistance and transferring of individuals in/out of equipment. Operational expenses include the rate of the cost of rounds and ammunition for trap shooting, the cost of nature-based interpretive programs, the cost of operating a water ski clinic with a partnership organization and chartering a boat for fishing excursions. The costs for supplies were based on online searches and through current vendor prices which will include:

• Archery supplies to replace used supplies that has been damaged through regular use or that have reached the end of its lifecycle and supplies for maintaining current inventory of bows.

• Fishing supplies to replace items that have been used up or have reached the end of its lifecycle.

• Additional adapted cycles (1 tandem trike and 2 foot-pedaled recumbent cycles) to accommodate those with different types of physical/visual disabilities.

• Two additional basketball wheelchairs to accommodate veterans of different sizes.

• One additional foot-pedaled tandem kayak to accommodate veterans with MS, TBI, hemiparesis, and those with upper limb limitations and high-back seats for standard kayaks to provide additional support to veterans who may have back issues or who cannot tolerate sitting on kayaks unsupported for extended periods of time.

In kind contributions supported by MDPROS include partial operational expenses for 9 full-time staff inclusive of Recreational Therapists, Disability Program Specialists, and Recreational Specialists in the amount of \$39,238.70. Additional in-kind contributions for

events and activities include funding for meals during some activities and events by the Leisure Access Foundation, the National Parks Conservation Association, and the Wounded Warrior Project.

Key Personnel

Christina Perez, CTRS (Recreation Therapist II): Perform all program development and planning, scheduling of activities, and perform administrative tasks related to the grant including writing quarterly reports. Mrs. Perez will provide direct oversight and implementation of the program with other staff working in conjunction with her. She is the primary person responsible for communication with VA staff and other partner organizations, planning, marketing, and coordinating all activities and schedules, monitoring staff hours worked in the program, researching, and ordering equipment, and tracking all invoices and expenditures. She has a B.S. degree in Therapeutic Recreation, 6 years' experience in the field, and holds certification as a Water Safety Instructor, and CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross. Certified as a Therapeutic Recreation Specialist through the National Council on Therapeutic Recreation Certification.

Belinda Phillips, M.S., CTRS (Recreation Therapist II): Provide direct supervision and activity instruction. Coordinate swimming activities with VA personnel and pool staff. Ms. Phillips has a B.S. and an M.S. Degree in Education. She has over 33 years of experience working in the field. Certified as a Therapeutic Recreation Specialist through the National Council on Therapeutic Recreation Certification. She is a Water Safety Instructor Trainer and holds certification in CPR/First Aid. Ms. Phillips coached the Jamaican Paralympic Swim team during the 1988 Summer Paralympic Games in Seoul, Korea. She will lead in swimming activities.

Randall Flagler, M.S., CTRS, CPRP (Disability Program Specialist): Will work under the remote supervision of RT in the implementation of activities. Mr. Flagler will lead facilitation of archery, trap shooting, fishing, and wheelchair basketball. He has an M.S. Degree in Sport Management and a B.S. Degree in Sports and Recreation Management and 5+ years' experience working in various adapted sports programs and is certified as a Therapeutic Recreation Specialist through the National Council on Therapeutic Recreation Certification, NWBA coach, Archery Level I Instructor through USA Archery, Certified Parks and Recreation Professional through the National Recreation and Parks Association, and holds certification in CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross.

Eric Cooper, B.S. (Disability Program Specialist): Will work under the remote supervision of RT in the implementation of activities. Mr. Cooper will lead facilitation of Boccia, Paddlesports, and Pickleball. He has a B.S. degree in Recreation Therapy and Sports Management, 3 years' experience working directly with Disabled Veterans, and holds certification as a Water Safety Instructor, and CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross.

Arlene Bouza-Jou (Recreation Specialist I): Provide direct supervision and activity instruction. She has over 25 years working in various adapted sports programs. She will be assisting in activity instruction and supervision and will lead in handcycling

activities. She is certified as a Water Safety Instructor and as an Archery Level I Instructor and holds certification in CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross.

Camila Carvacho, B.S., (Disability Program Specialist): Will work under the supervision of Recreation Therapists and Specialists in providing direct service delivery to program participants. She has a B.S. Degree in Therapeutic Recreation and is certified as a NWBA coach, Water Safety Instructor and holds certification in CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross, Archery level I instructor and has 9 years' experience in working with individuals with disabilities.

Charmaigne Crosby (Disability Program Specialist): Will work under the supervision of Recreation Therapists and Specialists in providing direct service delivery to program participants. She has 18 years' experience working with individuals with disabilities and is a certified NWBA coach and Water Safety Instructor and holds certification in CPR/First Aid through the American Red Cross.

Dario Figueroa (Disability Program Specialist): Will work under the supervision of Recreation Therapists and Specialist in providing direct service delivery to program participants. Will lead implementation of Wheelchair Softball. Holds A.A. in Psychology, seeking B.S. in psychology. He has 4 years' experience working with individuals with disabilities.

TBA (Recreation Leader): Will work directly under the supervision of Recreational Therapists and Disability Program Specialists in the implementation of activities. These individuals will come from a pool of part-time staff who already work within the TRI division and a full-time staff, both of which have a minimum of 1 year of experience working with individuals with disabilities.

Partnerships

The primary collaborating partner for the MDPROS Veteran's Adapted Sports Program is the Bruce W. Carter VA Medical Center. Currently, MDPROS Therapeutic Recreation and Inclusion staff is working with several key therapists at the Bruce W. Carter VA Medical Center to plan programs with the disabled veterans in mind. The key staff from the Bruce W. Carter VA Medical Center includes: Alexander Maitre, CTRS, who works with the SCI and amputee populations, Tabitha Aragon, CTRS from the Outpatient OEF/OIF Program, and Christina Dugrot, CTRS and Zuleika Smith, CTRS from the Psychosocial Unit. Additional major collaborating partners include the Paralyzed Veterans Association of Florida, the Leisure Access Foundation, Biscayne National Park, the National Parks Conservation Association, Florida International University Recreation Therapy Program, The Wounded Warrior Project, Miami-Dade County ECO Adventures, the Miami Vet Center, and the Veteran's Services Coalition of Miami-Dade County.
