RESOLUTION NO. R-891-22

RESOLUTION CODESIGNATING THAT PORTION OF
NORTHWEST 22ND AVENUE BETWEEN STATE ROAD 112
AND NORTHWEST 79TH STREET AS “DR. BARBARA
CAREY-SHULER BOULEVARD”

WHEREAS, born Barbara Jean McCollough in Fernandina Beach, Florida, Dr. Barbara Carey-Shuler (“Dr. Carey-Shuler”) has established herself as an iconic public servant who has made significant and lasting contributions to Miami-Dade County; and

WHEREAS, after graduating as valedictorian from Peck High School in 1957, Dr. Carey-Shuler obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in speech from Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University in 1961, and a Master of Arts in speech and communications from Ohio State University in 1962; and

WHEREAS, while working as a public-school teacher, and later as an administrator for the Miami-Dade County Public Schools, Dr. Carey-Shuler earned a Master of Education in guidance from the University of Miami in 1969; and

WHEREAS, in 1978, Dr. Carey-Shuler earned a Doctorate in Educational Supervision and Administration from the University of Florida; and

WHEREAS, after commencing a life in public service in this County in 1970, Dr. Carey-Shuler began her political career, when on December 10, 1979, Governor Daniel Robert “Bob” Graham announced that he was appointing Dr. Carey-Shuler to sit as a Commissioner on the Metropolitan Dade (now Miami-Dade) County Board of County Commissioners (“Board”); and

WHEREAS, with this appointment, Dr. Carey-Shuler became the first African American woman to sit as a Commissioner on this Board; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler was elected to this Board in 1982, and was re-elected in 1986, 1996, 2000, and 2004; and

WHEREAS, from 2002 to 2004, Dr. Carey-Shuler served as Chairwoman of the Board, becoming the first African American woman to hold this position, and also the first elected official to lead the 13-member Board through its inaugural session exercising the greater legislative powers as approved by the voters of Miami-Dade County in September 2002; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler's district included much of the City of Miami, including the communities of Liberty City, Little Haiti, Overtown, the Upper East Side, Allapattah, Wynwood, Miami Shores, and Brownsville; and

WHEREAS, during her tenure on this Board, Dr. Carey-Shuler contributed to the adoption of many significant pieces of progressive legislation; and

WHEREAS, in the wake of the "McDuffie Riots" in May 1980, which followed the acquittal by an all-white jury of four Metro-Dade Police Officers in the killing of Author McDuffie, an African American insurance salesman and U.S. Marine Corp. lance corporal, Dr. Carey-Shuler, among other things, advanced a series of legislative responses, including legislation requiring psychological evaluations of police officers, sensitivity training for police officers, and a push for more diversity in the upper ranks of the police department; and

WHEREAS, in 1981, Dr. Carey-Shuler spearheaded efforts for the recognition of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday as an official County holiday, five-years before this holiday was celebrated for the first time on the federal level in 1986; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler spearheaded legislation establishing a 15-mile per hour school zone speed limit in this County, which was subsequently adopted statewide by the Florida Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler's efforts also led to the adoption of set-aside law and an affirmative action policy, which was argued all the way to the United States Supreme Court, that has been heralded for creating a massive expansion in jobs and opportunities for women and minorities; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler was a strong advocate for low-income and working-class families, and sponsored at the local level, the State's creation of the Affordable Housing Surtax Program, which by 2017, had resulted in over 10,000 single-family homeowners and exceeded 15,000 affordable rental units throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Carey-Shuler achieved further success in securing funding for planning, construction, and renovation of some of the County's most precious cultural and historical assets, including the Virginia Key Beach Park Civil Rights Museum and Cultural Center, The Historic Lyric Theatre, the Historic Hampton House Hotel, and her leadership aided in brining financial stability, viability and world-renowned credibility to the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts; and

WHEREAS, after more than 20 years of service on this Board, Dr. Carey-Shuler resigned from the Board on December 6, 2005; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of her life of public service and indelible contributions to the development of this County, this Board wishes to codesignate that at portion of Northwest 22nd Avenue between State Road 112 and Northwest 79th Street as "Dr. Barbara Carey-Shuler Boulevard"; and

WHEREAS, that portion of Northwest 22nd Avenue between State Road 112 and Northwest 79th Street is a County maintained road located in Commission Districts 2 and 3; and

WHEREAS, Rule 9.02(d) of the Board's Rules of Procedure provides that the Commission may, by a three-fifths vote of Board members present, name a County road, facility or property after a living individual who has not served as an elected official within the past five years and who "has made a direct, significant lifetime contribution to this community,"

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

Section 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby incorporated into this resolution and this Board finds that Dr. Barbara Carey-Shuler has made a direct, significant lifetime contribution to this community pursuant to Rule 9.02(d).

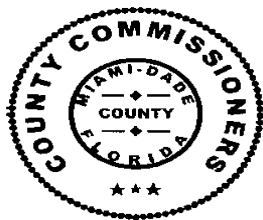
Section 2. Having considered this matter at a public hearing and by a three-fifths vote of Board members present, this Board codesignates that portion of Northwest 22nd Avenue between State Road 112 and Northwest 79th Street as "Dr. Barbara Carey-Shuler Boulevard".

Section 3. This Board directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the United States Postal Service, the Traffic Signals and Signs Division of the Department of Transportation and Public Works, the Development Services Division of the Regulatory and Economic Resources Department, the Miami-Dade Police Department, and the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue Department.

The Co-Prime Sponsors of the foregoing resolution are Commissioner Keon Hardemon and Commissioner Jean Monestime, and the Co-Sponsors are Chairman Jose "Pepe" Diaz, Senator René García, Vice-Chairman Oliver G. Gilbert, III, Commissioner Sally A. Heyman, Commissioner Kionne L. McGhee, Commissioner Rebeca Sosa, and Commissioner Javier D. Souto. It was offered by Commissioner **Keon Hardemon**, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner **Jean Monestime** and upon being put to a vote, the vote was follows:
