Subject: Ordinance Relating to the Miami-Dade County Youth Crime Task Force Advisory Board; Waiving Term Limit Restriction for and Accepting the County Mayor's Recommendation to Reappoint Michael Nozile to serve as a Community Representative Member on the Miami-Dade County Youth Crime Task Force Advisory Board

Executive Summary

This ordinance requests the Board of County Commissioners (Board) waive the term limit restriction of section 2-11.38.2 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida ("Code"), and accept the County Mayor's recommendation to reappoint Michael Nozile to serve as a Community Representative member on the Miami-Dade County Youth Crime Task Force Advisory Board (YCTF). The YCTF is a multi-disciplinary entity dedicated to reducing juvenile delinquency and recidivism.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board adopt the attached ordinance waiving the term limit restriction of section 2-11.38.2 of the Code and accepting the County Mayor's recommendation to reappoint Michael Nozile to serve as a Community Representative member on the YCTF.

Scope

The YCTF advises the Board on matters related to youth crime, youth weapons violence and youth crime prevention as well as addresses the unmet needs and gaps in services for arrested and at-risk youth countywide.

Delegation of Authority

This ordinance does not delegate any authority to the County Mayor or County Mayor's designee.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

This ordinance has no fiscal impact on Miami-Dade County.

Track Record/Monitor

The Clerk of the Board monitors appointments and the Juvenile Services Department provides staff assistance to the YCTF.

Background

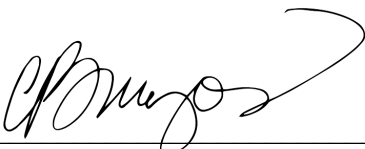
The Dade County Juvenile Crime Task Force, the YCTF's predecessor was established by this Board through Resolution No. R-223-97. Thereafter, the Board adopted Resolution No.

R-355-00 and created the YCTF to address youth crime and violence programming needs in the County. From its inception in 1997 through January 2002, the Board reauthorized the YCTF by resolution annually. On July 23, 2002, the Board adopted Ordinance No. 02-131, which codified the YCTF in article XCVIII of the Code.

The YCTF is an advisory board to the Board, for the countywide coordination of juvenile justice activities, which is composed of a maximum of 31 voting members, including, but not limited to, elected officials, educators, criminal and juvenile justice professionals, human service practitioners and community leaders, who have demonstrated expertise and involvement in the fight against crime and violence.

Section 2-1432(t) of the Code provides for the appointment of Community Representative members to the YCTF. Such members must work for or serve on the board of directors of organizations that work with youth and/or crime prevention and be recommended by the County Mayor for such appointment by the Board. Members of the YCTF are knowledgeable of and interested in matters related to youth crime, youth weapons violence and youth crime prevention and advises this Board on such matters. Pursuant to the YCTF's bylaws, Community Representative members are appointed for a term of two years and must be reappointed to continue serving.

The YCTF unanimously recommended the re-appointment of Michael Nozile. Mr. Nozile has served as a Community Representative member on the YCTF since 2019. A waiver of section 2-11.38.2's four-year term limit restriction is necessary to authorize Mr. Nozile to serve an additional two-year term on the YTCF. Mr. Nozile's resume, which summarizes his experience and qualifications, is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

ORDINANCE NO. 24-110

ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE YOUTH CRIME TASK FORCE; WAIVING TERM LIMIT RESTRICTION OF SECTION 2-11.38.2 OF THE CODE OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA; ACCEPTING THE COUNTY MAYOR’S RECOMMENDATION AND REAPPOINTING MICHAEL NOZILE TO SERVE AS A COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVE MEMBER ON THE MIAMI-DADE COUNTY YOUTH CRIME TASK FORCE FOR AN ADDITIONAL TWO-YEAR TERM; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY, EXCLUSION FROM THE CODE, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, this Board desires to accomplish the purposes outlined in the accompanying memorandum, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. The foregoing recital is incorporated herein by reference.

Section 2. This Board waives the four-year term limit restriction in section 2-11.38.2 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida (“Code”) applicable to Michael Nozile as a member of the Miami-Dade County Youth Crime Task Force.

Section 3. Pursuant to section 2-1432(t) of the Code, this Board accepts the County Mayor’s recommendation and reappoints Michael Nozile, to serve as a Community Representative Member on the Miami-Dade County Youth Crime Task Force for a two-year term.

Section 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or provision of this ordinance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected by such invalidity.

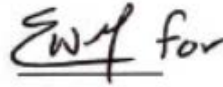
Section 5. It is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners, and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this ordinance shall be excluded from the Code of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

Section 6. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after the date of enactment unless vetoed by the Mayor, and if vetoed, shall become effective only upon an override by this Board.
