Resolution No. R-968-25

Subject: Recommendation to Award Contracts, including a Non-Competitive Designated Purchase for Certain Groups for Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Waste Services

Summary

This item will allow multiple County departments to continue purchasing hazardous and non-hazardous waste services to ensure compliance with federal, state, and local environmental regulations of the County's facilities. The contracts will provide recycling and disposal services for hazardous (liquids, solids, gases, sludge) and non-hazardous (harmless items that do not pose a risk to human health) materials in accordance with applicable laws, ordinances and regulations. The awarded vendors will provide labor, transportation, supervision, equipment, and materials, such as drums, necessary to perform these services. The services are required to comply with the County's Environmental Protection Ordinance as stated in Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances and the regulations, guidelines, standards, and permits issued by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP).

The solicitation was divided into seven groups for the recycling and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous materials as follows: Group 1 – Waste Petroleum and Associated Products; Group 2 – Paint and Household Hazardous Waste; Group 3 – Waste Batteries and Bulbs; Group 4 – Hazmat Response and Cleaning; Group 5 – Hazardous Waste for Miami-Dade Medical Examiner's Office (ME); Group 6 – Hazardous/Non-Hazardous Waste for the Water and Sewer Department (WASD); and Group 7 – Hazmat Emergency Response for WASD. After reviewing the bids received, the County is seeking approval to award contracts for Groups 1 through 6. No bids were received for Group 7.

Approval of a designated purchase is also being requested for Groups 1 and 4, as the bids for these groups were deemed non-responsive by the County Attorney's Office (CAO) due to a material deviation from standard County terms and conditions. Specifically, the bidder conditioned its pricing. The bidder agreed to remove all additional terms included with their bid and will provide the services in accordance with all terms and conditions of the contract for Groups 1 and 4. Awarding Group 1 as designated purchase is in the County's best interest of the County, as the price from the next lowest bidder is 145% higher. For Group 4, the County received only one bid.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve competitive contract awards, *Contract No. EVN0023256, Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Waste Services*, Groups 3, 5, and 6 to Miami Quick Cleaning, LLC in the amount of \$922,996, and Group 2 to US Ecology Tampa, Inc. in the amount of \$5,545,768. Additionally, it is recommended that the Board approve a non-competitive designated purchase pursuant to Section 2-8.1(b)(3) of the Code of Miami-Dade County (Code), by a two-thirds vote of the Board members present, and award Groups 1 and 4 to Triumvirate Environmental Services, LLC (Triumvirate) in the amount of \$5,354,717. The total combined amount is \$11,823,481 for a five-year term for multiple County departments. No bids were received for Group 7. These contracts will replace *Contract No. FB-01180* approved by the Board on May 19, 2020, via Resolution No. R-470-20, and *FB-01513*, approved by the Board on October 6, 2020, via Resolution No. R-952-20.

Background

An Invitation to Bid was issued under full and open competition on February 10, 2025, for hazardous and non-hazardous waste services. On the closing date of March 12, 2025, the County received five bids, including two from local firms. A total of 803 vendors, including incumbent vendors, were notified

upon advertisement of the solicitation. Prior to issuing the solicitation, the Strategic Procurement Department (SPD) conducted outreach and market research to identify potential vendors capable of providing the required services. The research revealed a limited number of local vendors, including eight certified Small Business Enterprise (SBE) firms identified under the applicable commodity codes. However, none of the SBE firms indicated their ability to meet the project requirements, and none submitted bids.

The services are required to comply with the County's Environmental Protection Ordinance, Chapter 24 of the Miami-Dade County Code of Ordinances, and applicable FDEP regulations, including Chapters 62-730 ("Hazardous Waste") and 62-710 ("Used Oil Management") of the Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.). Additional compliance is required with relevant federal regulations under Chapter I of Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published guidelines and standards.

During the bid evaluation period, staff noticed that the bid submittal from the apparent lowest bidder for Groups 2 and 6, US National Highway Patrol Corporation (USNHP), did not include any of the mandatory bidder requirements documentation, including permits, forms, and references, as requested in the solicitation. Although the solicitation permits the County, at its sole discretion, to request missing information during the evaluation period, multiple attempts to obtain the required documents from USNHP were unsuccessful. On May 2, 2025, USNHP was deemed as non-responsible for Groups 2 and 6 due to failure to provide the information necessary for a responsibility determination.

In addition, staff also found potential responsiveness issues from Triumvirate's bid and requested a legal review on May 27, 2025. On July 9, 2025, the County Attorney's Office ("CAO") determined that the bid from Triumvirate was non-responsive due to the exceptions taken to the bid (opinion attached).

No bids were received for Group 7, and only one bid was received for Group 4. To address this, SPD conducted a follow-up survey of 15 vendors identified during market research or who viewed the solicitation but did not bid. Four vendors responded: one indicated they do not offer these services, another was willing to provide time-and-materials pricing, a third expressed no interest, and the fourth expressed a willingness to quote under the replacement contract. SPD and WASD will continue researching potential vendors and will issue a separate solicitation for Group 7, or explore adding these services to an existing contract through negotiations.

This item recommends the award of Groups 1 through 6. Approval of Groups 1 and 4, as designated purchases, is requested, as it is in the best interest of the County to proceed with an award rather than re-advertise to ensure continuity of services to meet the departments' operational needs. Although Triumvirate's bid included exceptions, the firm has since agreed to withdraw those conditions and comply fully with the County's terms and conditions. Moreover, Triumvirate's pricing for Group 1 is highly competitive. For example, for Group 1, the next lowest bidder's negotiated pricing after multiple attempts is still more than 145% higher than Triumvirate's offer. Approval of these contracts will ensure that County departments remain in full compliance with environmental regulations and maintain their ability to manage emergency responses, such as oil spills, chemical cleanups, and household hazardous waste collection events, in a safe and efficient manner.

Scope

The scope of this item is countywide in nature.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

The fiscal impact for the five-year term is \$11,823,481. One of the current contracts, *FB-01513*, is valued at \$3,568,604 for a five-year and two-month term and expires on December 31, 2025. The other contract, *FB-01180*, is valued at \$4,820,161 for a five-year and six-month term and expires on November 30,

2025. The annualized allocation under the proposed contract is higher than the combined value of current contracts, due to additional items that were added, and an increase in pricing associated with the commodity.

Due Diligence

Pursuant to Resolution No. R-187-12, due diligence was conducted in accordance with SPD's Procurement Guidelines to determine vendor responsibility, including verifying corporate status and that

there are no performance and compliance issues through various vendor responsibility lists and a keyword internet search. The lists that were referenced included convicted vendors, debarred vendors, delinquent contractors, suspended vendors, and federal excluded parties. There were no adverse findings relating to vendor responsibility.

Pursuant to Resolution No. R-140-15, prior to re-procurement, a full review of the scope of services was conducted to ensure the replacement contract reflects the County's current needs. The review included conducting market research, posting a draft solicitation for industry comments, and holding meetings and drafting sessions with the user departments. As a result, three new groups, Groups 5, 6, and 7, were added, and several line items were updated or revised within the scope.

Pursuant to Resolution No. R-252-25, efforts were made to identify any potential piggybacking opportunities prior to issuance of a competitive solicitation. No contracts were identified for accessing.

Applicability of Ordinances and Contract Measures

- The User Access Program applies where permitted by funding source.
- The SBE Bid Preference and Local Preference applied where permitted by funding source.
- The Living Wage Ordinance does not apply.

RFP No. EVN0023256 – Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Waste Services

You have asked this office if the bids submitted by Triumvirate Environmental Services, LLC (“Triumvirate”) and US National Highway Patrol (“UNHP”), listed in the Request for Proposal No.: EVN0023256 (“Solicitation”), are responsive. We rely on the information provided in your June 3, 2025 email which attached the Solicitation at issue and the referenced bids.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of the Solicitation is to establish contracts for the purchase of Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Waste Services, as specified herein, from sources of supply that will give prompt and efficient service in conjunction with the County’s needs, on an as needed, when needed basis. Award of this contract is to be made to the lowest priced responsive, responsible Bidder on a group-by-group basis. Bidders may bid on any or all 7 Groups. Items provided to the County at no cost must show a zero in the price line in INFORMS. If a Bidder fails to submit an offer for all items within the group, its offer for that specific group may be rejected.

DISCUSSION

The Solicitation opened on February 10, 2025. At its close on March 12, 2025, five bids were received. Triumvirate was the lowest bidder for Group 1, the second lowest bidder for Group 2, and the only bidder for Group 4. You advise that although Triumvirate acknowledged and certified that its quote would be valid for 180 days, elsewhere in its proposal, Triumvirate made an exception by stating that “its proposal shall remain valid for 60 days.” Also, Triumvirate signed the “Waiver of Confidentiality” clause in the Solicitation, yet titled pages 83 through 92 of its proposal “Confidential Information.”

UNHP was the lowest bidder for Groups 2 and 6. You indicate that UNHP failed to include in its submittals any mandatory Bidder requirements, such as permits, forms, and references.

- A. *Triumvirate’s exception to the required period of validity for its quote renders its bid nonresponsive.*

The Waiver of Confidentiality clause states:

WAIVER OF CONFIDENTIALITY AND TRADE SECRET TREATMENT OF PROPOSAL

The Proposer acknowledges and agrees that the submittal of the Proposal is governed by Florida's Government in the Sunshine Laws and Public Records Laws as set forth in Florida Statutes Section 286.011 and Florida Statutes Chapter 119. As such, all material submitted as part of, or in support of, the Proposal will be available for public inspection after opening of proposals and may be considered by the County or a selection committee in public.

By submitting a Proposal pursuant to this Solicitation, Proposer agrees that all such materials may be considered to be public records. The Proposer shall not submit any information in response to this Solicitation which the Proposer considers to be a trade secret, proprietary or confidential.

In the event that the Proposal contains a claim that all or a portion of the Proposal submitted contains confidential, proprietary or trade secret information, the Proposer, **by signing below**, knowingly and expressly waives all claims made that the Proposal, or any part thereof no matter how indicated, is confidential, proprietary or a trade secret and authorizes the County to release such information to the public for any reason.

While Triumvirate included language in its proposal asserting that portions of its bid are considered confidential, Triumvirate knowingly and expressly waived all claims that portions of its proposal were confidential. Therefore, Triumvirate's confidentiality designations do not raise issues of responsiveness as such confidentiality claims was expressly waived.

However, Triumvirate's May 12, 2025 correspondence, which contradicts its acknowledgment that its quoted prices will remain fixed for 180 days from the date the Solicitation is due, renders its bid non-responsive. In its correspondence, Triumvirate affirmatively states that prices in its proposal shall remain valid for 60 days following its submission. Unlike the issue of confidentiality, Triumvirate does not expressly waive the 60-day period that is in conflict with the solicitation's mandatory 180-day period. This stipulation is materially different from what the Solicitation requires and thus Triumvirate is non-responsive.

B. UNHP failed to submit required forms.

Per Section 2, Paragraph 2.4, Method of Award, and Paragraph 2.6, Bidder Requirements, bidders must satisfy specific criteria to qualify for award consideration. These include, but are not limited to, references to demonstrate sufficient experience, expertise, copies of required permits, and contact information for the Project Manager. The Solicitation states in pertinent part

Bidders shall provide all the information, documents and/or attachments listed above to be considered for award. All information, documents, and/or attachments are due with the Bid by the solicitation's end time and date. The County may, at its sole discretion and in its best interest, allow the Bidder to complete, supplement or supply the required information,

documents and/or attachments during the bid evaluation period. Failure to provide all the required information, documents and/or attachments with the Bid or, if allowed, as

requested by the County during the Bid evaluation period, may result in the Bidder being declared non-responsive or non-responsible.

Solicitation at 8. Section 4, paragraph 4.2, also states in pertinent part, "Refer to Section 2, Paragraph 2.4, Method of Award, and Paragraph 2.6, Bidder Requirements, to ensure that Bidder's responses and attachments comply with the Solicitation's requirements." Solicitation at 32.

UNHP failed to complete 13 affidavits, provide its Certificate of Corporation, W-9 Form, preprinted form identifying its business name and EIN issued by the IRS and notarized Summary package. Between March 25 and April 7, the Department followed up with UNHP multiple times in attempts to obtain the required information. Still UNHP failed to provide the required information.

Bidder "[r]esponsibility deals with whether the bidder or proposer can perform as provided in the solicitation. In general, solicitation requirements for information relating to a bidder or proposer's financial condition, capability, experience, and past performance pertain to responsibility." Miami-Dade Implementing Order (IO) 2-13. The required forms that UNHP failed to submit are issues of bidder responsibility, not responsiveness.

"A bidder or proposer need not demonstrate compliance with solicitation requirements pertaining to its responsibility in order for its bid or proposal to be deemed responsive and evaluated. Information regarding a bidder or proposer's responsibility may be furnished up to the time of award. Determinations of bidder or proposal responsibility are ultimately made by the Board of County Commissioners, or in those instances of delegated authority, by the County Mayor or Mayor's designee, with the advice of the County's professional staff and/or selection and negotiation committees. Issues of responsibility are fundamentally ones of business judgment and policy and should not be covered in responsiveness determinations of the County Attorney's Office." UNHP's continuing failure to submit the required forms, affidavits and other required documents provides a basis for the County to determine that UNHP is not responsible and ineligible for award. However, the documents pertain to issues of bidder responsibility and not responsiveness.

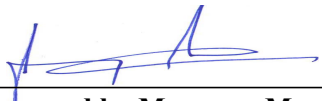

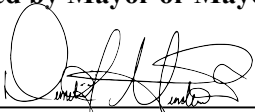

IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,545,768.00; APPROVING A NON-COMPETITIVE DESIGNATED PURCHASE PURSUANT TO SECTION 2-8.1(B)(3) OF THE CODE OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, BY A TWO-THIRDS VOTE OF THE BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT FOR GROUPS 1 AND 4 TO TRIUMVIRATE ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES, LLC IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,354,717.00, FOR A TOTAL COMBINED AMOUNT OF \$11,823,481.00 FOR HAZARDOUS AND NON-HAZARDOUS WASTE SERVICES FOR A FIVE-YEAR TERM FOR MULTIPLE COUNTY DEPARTMENTS; AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY MAYOR OR COUNTY MAYOR'S DESIGNEE TO GIVE NOTICE OF THIS AWARD TO THE RECOMMENDED VENDORS, ISSUE THE APPROPRIATE PURCHASE ORDERS TO GIVE EFFECT TO SAME, AND EXERCISE ALL PROVISIONS OF THE CONTRACTS, INCLUDING ANY CANCELLATION OR EXTENSIONS, PURSUANT TO SECTION 2-8.1 OF THE CODE OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA AND IMPLEMENTING ORDER 3-38

WHEREAS, this Board desires to accomplish the purposes outlined in the accompanying memorandum, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

Section 1. This Board approves award of Contract No. EVN0023256, for Groups 3, 5 and 6, to Miami Quick Cleaning, LLC in the amount of \$922,996.00, and Group 2 to US Ecology Tampa, Inc. in the amount of \$5,545,768.00.

Section 2. This Board finds that it is in the best interest of the County and approves a non-competitive designated purchase pursuant to section 2-8.1(b)(3) of the Code of Miami-Dade County (Code), by a two-thirds vote of the Board members present, in the award of Contract No. EVN0023256, for Groups 1 and 4, to Triumvirate Environmental Services, LLC in the amount of \$5,354,717.00.

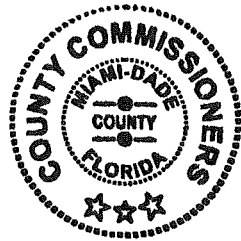
