CONTENT PRESENTATION

- **Definition of Advocacy**: The act of supporting, recommending, or speaking on behalf of a cause or group to influence policies, programs, or societal norms.
- Types of Advocacy:
 - Direct Advocacy: Engaging directly with policymakers and decisionmakers.
 - Grassroots Advocacy: Mobilizing community members to create change.
 - Coalition Building: Partnering with organizations and stakeholders.

- Key Principles of Advocacy:
 - Passion and authenticity
 - Evidence-based messaging
 - Consistent follow-up
- Role of an Advocate:
 - Educate the public
 - Build relationships with stakeholders
 - Amplify marginalized voices

Understanding the Local Policy-Making Process (10 minutes)

- Step 1: Identifying the Issue
 - Recognizing community needs through data, personal experiences, and public concerns.
- Step 2: Policy Proposal Development
 - Who creates policies? (Local government officials, agencies, advocacy groups).
 - Crafting a policy solution: feasibility, funding, and impact analysis.
- Step 3: Public Input & Deliberation
 - Public hearings, stakeholder meetings, and citizen feedback.
 - Role of media and social platforms in shaping public opinion.
- Step 4: Approval & Implementation
 - The role of elected officials in voting on policies.
 - Execution by government agencies and potential challenges in enforcement.

Analyzing Effective Advocacy Strategies (10 minutes)

- Public Participation in Decision-Making
 - Attending city commission meetings, testifying at hearings.
- Contacting Elected Officials
 - Writing emails, making phone calls, and setting up meetings with policymakers.
- Community Organizing & Coalition Building
 - Mobilizing residents, forming alliances with organizations, and utilizing grassroots tactics.
- Media & Digital Advocacy
 - Using social media campaigns, opinion pieces, and petitions to raise awareness.

Interactive Activity - Case Study: Affordable Housing

Miami-Dade County has been grappling with an affordable housing crisis, characterized by soaring rents and a substantial shortage of affordable units. Between 2019 and June 2023, the median asking rent in Miami increased by 27%, positioning the Miami metropolitan area as the second most expensive rental market in the United States.

In response to escalating housing costs, activists and community organizations have actively advocated for increased funding for rent relief and affordable housing initiatives. Their efforts have led to several notable developments:

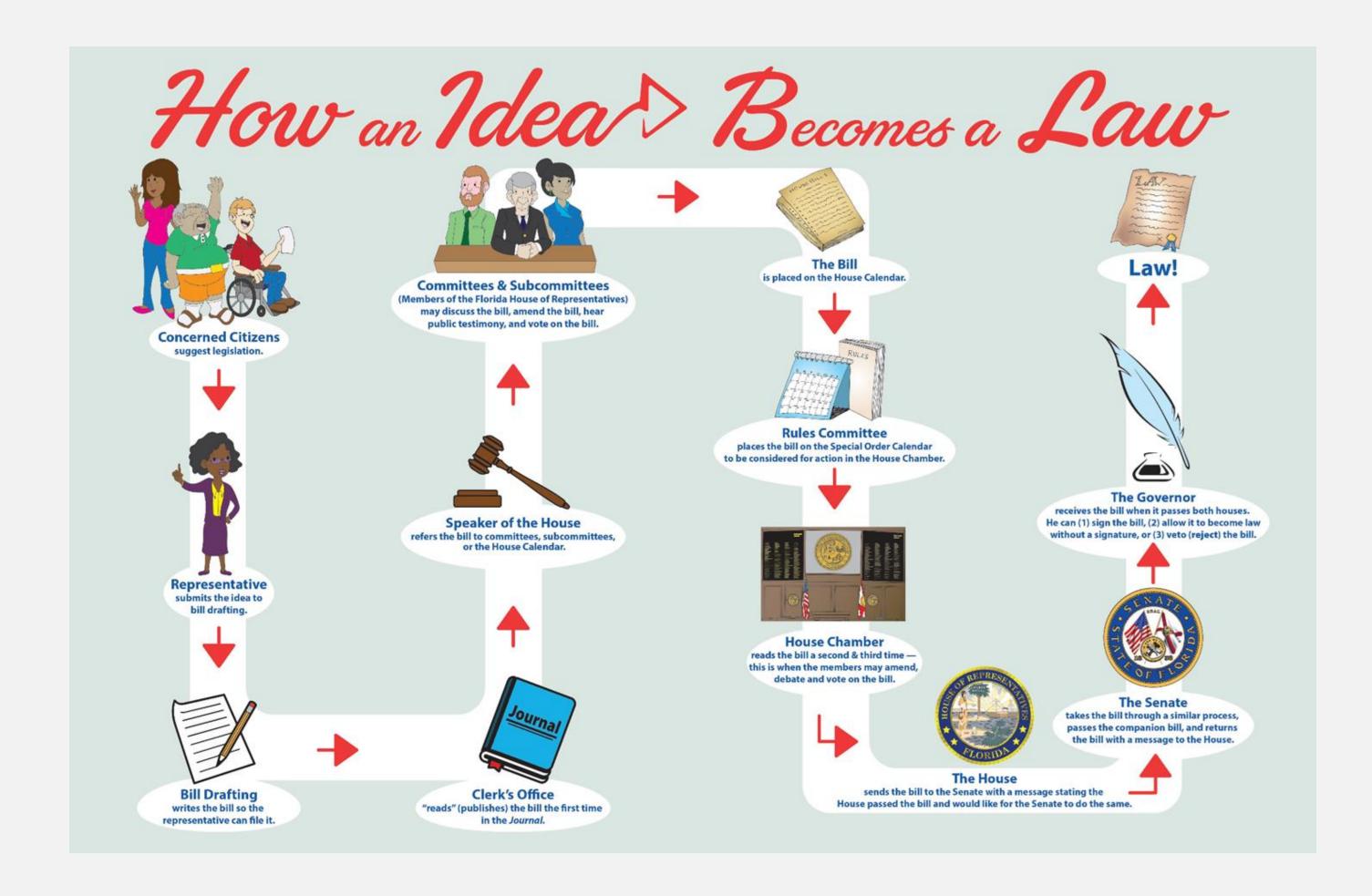
Interactive Activity - Case Study: Affordable Housing

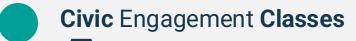
Emergency Rental Assistance: Miami-Dade County has distributed over \$110 million in emergency rental assistance, preventing the evictions of approximately 17,000 families. miamidade.gov

Policy Reforms: The county has implemented measures such as updating the Emergency Rental Assistance Program to help keep residents in their homes and adopting a Tenant Bill of Rights to enhance tenant awareness of their rights and available resources. miamidade.gov

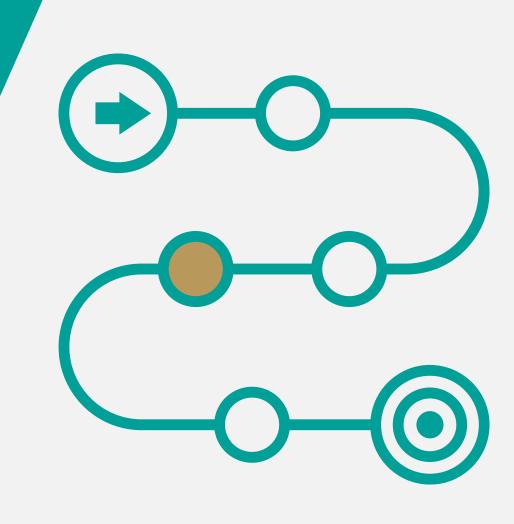
Affordable Housing Development: Currently, Miami-Dade is developing 14,000 affordable and workforce housing units to increase the housing supply.

What will happen if nothing is done to address the problem?

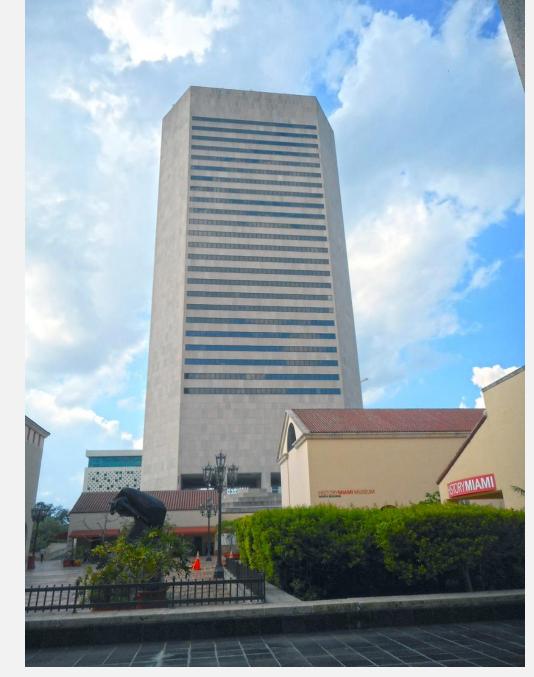
3. Your Proposal

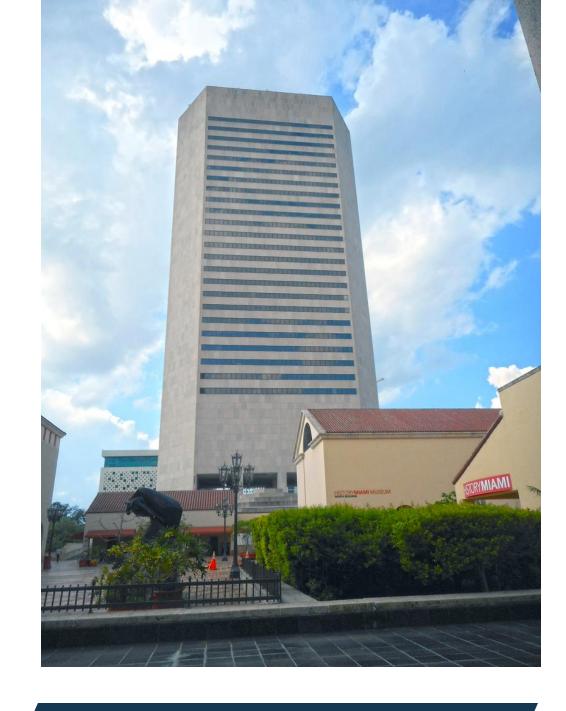

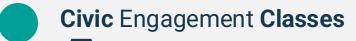
Practicing Your Story of Self & Us Complete the 1-minute story format example - Meeting with an Elected Official

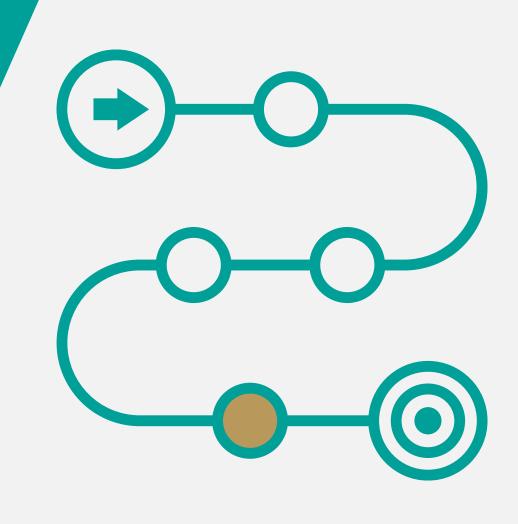
