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Survey Methodology

The Miami-Dade County Heritage at Risk Survey is the product of 18 months of mapping, research, reconnaissance, public meetings, conversations with individual community representatives, resource analysis and evaluation, and final production. Work was conducted by a team of two principal firms. Shulman + Associates led the team, and was responsible for assembling and evaluating all materials, and for developing context statements. Geo-Urban Consulting was responsible for public outreach, including public meetings, coordinating website development and acting a liaison among individual community representatives. The work of the team was facilitated by the Miami-Dade County Office of Historic Preservation, who provided valuable input and assisted in establishing priorities.

The initial goals of the survey were broad, covering a large number of potential resources in broad areas of the county. The team began by developing its own mapping tools, including layered maps created using Google Earth and GIS maps, in order to help identify and narrow areas of focus for further research. Still, the countywide "windshield survey" that followed the mapping stage yielded more than 7,800 potential resources. A final selection of 1,206 medium and high priority resources was the result of the team's comparative evaluation based on criteria established by the County.

The development of this survey also yielded investigation of important themes that helped direct evaluation work, and establish agendas for further research and designation under the Office of Historic Preservation. The themes are described in the both the general and geographical context statements later in this report. Based on the themes elicited, a list of recommendations has been provided.


Mapping

Mapping played a critical role in both the initial targeting of focus, and in the management of

the process. The Shulman + Associates team used mapping to identify focus areas based on criteria established by the Miami-Dade County in their Request for Proposal for the project. An initial priority identified in the criteria emphasized areas where heritage was at risk because they have been prioritized for redevelopment (SMART Corridors, Community Redevelopment Agencies and Urban Center Districts). The challenges in these areas included redevelopment pressures, gentrification, affordable housing, and climate resiliency. Another priority was to identify areas subject to flooding (as identified by FEMA flood zone maps). In establishing areas of focus, it was important to limit work to areas under the jurisdiction of the Miami-Dade County Office of Historic Preservation. The team used two mapping systems, Google Earth and GIS, to lay a digital framework for further work.

Google Earth was used for initial research, especially to establish areas of focus. Extents of the county's Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Corridors, Community Redevelopment Areas (CRA's), and Urban Center Districts (UCD) were determined using the county's map portal, and layered onto a general map of Miami-Dade County. Each component (SMART, CRA, UCD) was identified using different colors, and layered onto the map. This allowed an accurate tracing of the combined extent of the districts, and the development of collective focus areas. It also allowed an understanding of the specific fit of each area within the larger whole, and areas where a conjunction of criteria put resources at even greater risk. Flood Zones, identified using FEMA maps, were added as another layer. Areas within municipalities having their own preservation jurisdiction were eliminated from the control area. The maps generated by this process provided a first set of boundaries.

Next, in order to better understand neighborhood structure, as well as emergent urban patterns, platting in the project areas of focus was documented. Individual plats accessed via the subdivision layer of the Miami-Dade Property



Search app were consulted; these reveal the planning and intention behind subdivisions, and allowed the team to identify changes over time and recognize evolving patterns.

Sectional maps were created by overlaying plat boundaries onto Google Earth maps, showcasing the subdivision name and year built. Overlays on these maps identified prewar and postwar developments, and platting that had occurred since 1981, as well as those areas for which no data was available. Alongside these composite maps, individual plat maps were documented to allow further analysis and comparative study with existing conditions.

Once windshield surveys were initiated, GIS became the working platform for survey development. GIS maps were frequently updated with new findings, providing a platform for tracking current survey progress. The team also used the GIS system to identify existing entries in the Florida Master Site file.

In order to initiate windshield survey work, and to consider what information would be useful in later survey phases, a standard survey form was created for use during initial surveying. Individual survey findings were entered on ArcGIS Survey123, an intuitive form-centric data gathering platform that allows users to create, share, and analyze data. The data was initially collected using mobile devices during windshield surveys and later edited and evaluated.

Initially, the digital survey form was created to be location-aware so that it picked up accurate geolocation data during windshield surveys. However, the movement and placement of the team at the time of data entry allowed for inconsistencies in the map, so the team later manually entered location data.

The Survey123 platform allowed survey information to be entered efficiently during the windshield survey. The information could be appended and further edited once additional

research was gathered, and after analysis and evaluation. For instance, Miami-Dade Property Search was used to confirm address data, folio number, and date of construction.

As the survey entries were submitted and edited, the results were available to the team immediately on the Survey123 website. The platform could be used as a map but could also produce charts aiding interpretation and help make decisions. The Survey123 raw data was later used in ArcGIS pro, where the team layered further information, and exported reports in the form of Excel spreadsheets.

Research

Elements and themes identified through plats, windshield surveys, public outreach and consultations with individual community representatives, were further studied through targeted historic research. Historic research relied on journal and newspaper archives, academic sources, and various internet research. Tax jackets archived at Miami-Dade County formed a good resource of primary imagery. Relevant articles and images were archived for further investigation.

Windshield Surveys

Areas of focus identified through mapping were further explored through windshield surveys. In preparing for these surveys, the team prepared special-purpose maps that identified the target districts, displayed buildings according to date of construction, identified existing historic district and sites, and identified features already included in the Florida Master Site File.

Windshield surveys were used to explore neighborhoods, confirm or document resources identified through research and outreach, and to explore new possibilities. The survey team included three people: an architectural historian (who was also the driver), and two team members. During surveys, one person photographed potential resources while another input data in the survey platform using an iPad.

Project Marketing and Website Development

Parallel to the windshield surveys, in order to stimulate community outreach, the consultant team created a preliminary web site, flyers and survey response forms that were then vetted and modified to meet the standards of the Miami-Dade County Regulatory and Economic Resources Communication team. Hernan Guerrero Applewhite working with Karen Moore and Jarina Molokwu, part of the Geo-Urban Consulting team, developed a draft set of marketing materials intended to brand the Heritage at Risk Survey initiative to the general public. These materials included a one pager describing the initiative, flyers, survey questions and a draft website. Photoshop and Canva were used to develop the one pager and flyers. The website was created on Squarespace. The County RER communications team used these draft materials to create several pages dedicated to the County Historic Survey, on the newly developed County Historic Preservation Office website. The survey questions were incorporated in to the County communication protocol.

Community Outreach

In coordination with Office of Historic Preservation staff and the Department of Regulatory and Economic Resources marketing and community engagement team, the consultant team created an outreach plan that included a proposal to hold three meetings in person and three virtual meetings, to develop outreach materials and coordinate the individual community representatives meetings. After coordination with County RER Communications

and OHP, the consultant team decided to hold four meetings in person and four virtual meetings. Meetings were organized on both weekdays and weekends, and at both evening and daytimes, in order to reach the widest audience possible. The following in-person and Zoom meetings were held:

- North Dade Library, Wednesday 10/19/22, from 6-8 pm.
- · Westchester Health and Wellness Center, Wednesday 10/26/22, from 1-3 pm.
- Main Library, Saturday 11/12/22, from 10 am-12 pm.
- Dennis C Moss Cultural Center, Wednesday 1/11/23, from 1-3 pm.
- Zoom meeting, Monday 12/5/22 from 6-7:30 pm.
- Zoom meeting, Wednesday 12/14/22 from 1-2:30 pm.
- Zoom meeting, Monday 12/19/22 from 1-2:30 pm.

Public outreach meetings began with introductions by the Office of Historic Preservation's Sarah Cody or Adrienne Burke, outlining the purpose of the meeting and the main goals behind the survey. Following the introduction, Consultants Hernan Guerrero Applewhite and Allan Shulman gave an overview of how the work was being conducted, including how the team identified the areas to survey. and examples of the types of structures that have already been identified through on-going windshield surveys. The intent was to indicate scope and breadth of survey activities, to inspire public engagement, and stimulate interest in disseminating and filling out provided survey forms. As frequently stated, it is through the recollection of the public, including anecdotal information, that the team can fully make sense of a site's historical significance.

County Special Projects Director Alton Sears assisted in identifying individuals in the community that would be interested in attending public outreach events. Other participants attended in response to collective marketing efforts between the survey team and County. The typical attendance was low, with an average of eight participants per meeting. However, among those in attendance several were individuals who had an immense wealth of knowledge, and the ability to put the project team in communication with additional members of the community who could fill out one or more survey sheets. For example, residents like Gladys Lee Briscoe, who had a wealth of information about the history of Perrine, Goulds, and the South Dade area in general proved very informative.

Also at the South Dade event, Seth Bramson provided a wealth of information. Silvia Reed, who attended the event at the North Dade Library, is very knowledgeable about the history of North Dade, and Bunche Park in particular. She maintains a presence on social media where she posts about the history of Dade. At the Dennis C. Moss Center, the team met Michael Hiscano, who currently resides in the West Little River area of North Dade but significant knowledge and memories of places and communities throughout Miami-Dade including specifically events that celebrate Hispanic, African-American and LGBTQ+ history.

Individual community representatives also attended the meeting, helping to stimulate or guide discussion. Miami-Dade Mayor Daniella Levine Cava attended the event at the Downtown Library. She shared her commitment to the mission of the survey and engaged with several residents who were at the meeting.

Based on the public outreach events, there is a general interest from select members of Miami-Dade's diverse community to commemorate events and places. Many people were concerned about implementation, and next steps: A frequent question has arisen about how any information

gathered might be used or shared, beyond the stated purpose of the Historic Survey. As participants tell their stories, by filling out surveys and speaking up at events, anecdotal information is collected that helps elaborate context, and provide impetus for future designation, as well as storytelling. Meeting participants have understood that individual stories may not be appropriately commemorated in a written report. As a result, the team was asked at various meetings whether oral histories might be captured and exhibited in some way. This may be worthy of exploration for a future phase of this important project.

In addition to slated public outreach, the team attended a number of other cultural and community events. One such event was the 32nd Annual Asian Culture Festival on Saturday March 4, 2023, where team members were hosted by the Miami-Dade County Asian-American Advisory Board. Joshua Ho, program director for the Advisory Board, has connected the team with key individuals in the Asian-American community. On display were flavorful dishes from Bangladesh, China, India, Iran, Japan, Korea, Laos, Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam, as well as national dances from various Asian countries.

Individual Community Representatives

As part of the survey effort, the survey team convened a group of individual community representatives, making up civic, academic and political and faith leaders, historians, and individuals that work in the County administration. The creation of the group of individual community representatives was requested as part of this process by Office of Historic Preservation staff, a standard provision to ensure transparency and effectiveness of the overall project. At the outset of the project, a shortlist of individuals was developed and vetted with the County. The proposed individuals were selected for their knowledge of the County, professional experience tied to Historic preservation, and to

help represent the project mission of representing Miami-Dade's rich ethnic and cultural diversity. A kickoff meeting with the individual community representatives was held in November 2022, and the team requested their assistance in advertising the survey through their networks. These representatives were engaged individually throughout the 18-month project to solicit particular feedback on portions of the draft Heritage Survey. Drafts of this final report were issued to individual community representatives take a deeper dive in to the work, advise on priorities, correct any inaccuracies, and identify other resources the team may have missed.

Context Statements

As areas of focus were surveyed, and information received from public input and individual community representatives, the team's architectural historian began the development of written narratives that contextualize the identified resources within the history of the County, and within national history.

For the purpose of developing context statements, it was decided to divide the task into general and geographical themes. The general context statement encompassed the most resonant themes across the County, including its geographical identification, social context, planning, and housing development. The geographical area was then divided into four quadrants - South Dade, Southwest Dade, Northwest Dade, and Northeast Dade - based

on unifying narratives or characteristics. A context statement was then developed for each area.

While the focus of the current study is on postwar resources, each section develops a brief prewar context that establishes the early history of the area and helps set the stage. Other divisions within the context statements identify geographical areas or resonant themes, or focus on characteristic sites or architectural types.

Identification of Short List

From the over 7,800 group and individual resources initially surveyed and documented, the team narrowed, according to a priority evaluation, a final list of 1,206 sites for further research and possible designation. These are identified in a spreadsheet summary in later chapters.

A Note on Terms

In order to accurately reflect context, original or period names are used to identify names, groups, and resources. For example, "Dade County" is used instead of "Miami-Dade County," and "Dade Junior College" instead of "Miami-Dade College." Current names are generally provided in parentheses. Historical advertisements and quoted historic sources found within this report often use terms that have long since been discarded.

Survey Methodology



Survey area and extent: the team studied areas of the County not under other jurisdictions, focusing on previously underserved communities, and those under threat of redevelopment or climate change, within the timeframe of 1941-1981.


Research: extensive study was done through interviews, to understand historic context, identify themes and priorities. The team relied on journal and newspaper archives, academic sources, in person interviews and various online sources.

Windshield survey and identification: the team drove all over Miami-Dade County to gain an understanding of many thousand individual sites and potential resource groups. This exercise allowed the development of a shortlist for further study.

Documentation and analysis: Beyond the windshield surveys, the team relied on historic and contemporary research to document the project. Once all data was gathered, first priorities were considered.

Evaluation and determining level of significance: Cross referencing vulnerability and other data with cultural and architectural significance, the team assigned levels of significance (high, medium and low) to the sites and resource groups.


Synthesis: As a final step in the process, the team synthesized all findings into a final report and made a series of recommendations. These included suggestions related to existing historic districts, and suggestions for future studies of particular areas or groups..












Layered Parameters of the Study Area





Sample Study Area Combining Transit Corridors, CRAs, and Urban Centers






Sample Study Area Combining Transit Corridors, CRAs, and Urban Centers with FEMA Flood Zones


Initial Survey Entries: In all, the properties surveyed by the project team comprised 7,870 entries across the County through windshield surveys, research and community input.

Plat maps: In all, the area surveyed by the project team comprised of 2,656 plat maps across the County.

Drives: The team met biweekly for day-long drives across the County to develop windshield surveys for all 7,800+ buildings and sites.

Themes: The team developed 63 thematic categories to organize sites and subdivisions surveyed.

Styles: The team identified 47 architectural styles for all shortlisted buildings surveyed.










Liberty City Historic Plat Map, 1922



The team sought to capture building and sites important to previously excluded or underrepresented communities; places that have distinctive characteristics or reflect important aspects of history; places that served as gathering places over the years; places associated with historical events. important individuals, groups or organizations; places associated with people who have significantly shaped their communities; places important to social movements and the cultural evolution of Miami-Dade County; and lastly, historic buildings that are architecturally significant or unique.







(Resource groups vs individual entries)














Distribution of Priority Entries by Theme







