

CLERK'S SUMMARY AND OFFICIAL MINUTES

COMMUNITY RELATIONS BOARD

April 16, 2025

The Miami-Dade County Community Relations Board (CRB) convened its General Board meeting on April 16, 2025 at 2:00 p.m. at the Stephen P. Clark Government Center, Conference Room 18-4, 111 NW 1st Street, Miami, Florida 33128.

The following CRB members were present: Ms. Marjorie York, Mr. Joshua A. Sayles, Mr. Gabriel Paez, Ms. Jenni Person, Ms. Gizelle M. Ortiz-Velazquez, and Vice Chairman Eddy Gervais, and Chairman Rene Diaz. (Ms. Egglis Cepero, Ms. Juliette Fabien, Mr. Evers Ford, Ms. Yuleisy Mena, and Mr. Joseph R. Salzverg were absent).

In addition to the CRB members, the following staff members were present: Dr. Shirley Plantin, CRB Director, and Ms. Selena Brogdon, Deputy Clerk, Miami-Dade Clerk of the Board.

PUBLIC HEARING

Chairman Rene Diaz opened the public hearing and seeing no one appear wishing to speak.

Chairman Rene Diaz commented on Miami-Dade Mayor Levine Cava's decision to veto legislation related to fluoride in the County's water supply and voiced his concerns about potential federal interference. He emphasized that the CRB's role in reducing community tensions and fostering harmony among residents.

APPROVE CURRENT MEETING AGENDA

Chairman Rene Diaz announced the meeting agenda contained a scrivener's error and the date should be corrected to read April 16, 2025.

Ms. Gizelle M. Ortiz-Velazquez moved to approve today's CRB agenda, as corrected. This motion was seconded by Chairman Diaz, and upon being put to a vote, the motion passed 7-0. (Ms. Egglis Cepero, Ms. Juliette Fabien, Mr. Evers Ford, Ms. Yuleisy Mena, and Mr. Joseph R. Salzverg were absent).

Following the vote to approve the meeting agenda, Ms. Marie Jean-Pharuns joined the meeting.

CRB COMMITTEE MEETINGS AND DATES

Dr. Shirley Plantin advised that the upcoming Criminal Justice & Law Enforcement (CJLE) meeting had been rescheduled for Wednesday, April 30, 2025, with the venue set at the City of Miami Police Benevolent Association headquarters. Subsequently, she confirmed that all discussion items from the previously canceled March session would be incorporated into the rescheduled meeting's agenda.

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OLD BUSINESS

1. Challenges with Homeland Security Bureau (HSB) Partnership

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported that Miami-Dade Sheriff Rosie Cordero-Stutz made changes to the internal structure of Home Land Security Bureau (HSB) that included new personnel and existing staff in new positions.

Dr. Plantin indicated connections would have to be established with the new staff to keep the partnership between HSB and CRB intact. She made several attempts to contact the lieutenant and still awaited confirmation of the new sergeant.

Dr. Plantin stated her meeting to speak with the HSB Major was on the 28th to address this issue. Dr. Plantin pointed out the representation of partners was not equitable and needed to be illustrated in local communities because the ops were not approved, even for past events with established partners.

Chairman Diaz stated he no longer received alerts from 911 Assistant Dialer Notification which made it challenging for CRB to respond to community emergencies such as shootings. Dr. Plantin stated that she received notifications from a Police Major, not the system and assured Chairman Diaz that she would speak to him regarding his concern.

2. Update: Miami-Dade Tax Collector and FHP Partnership

Dr. Shirley Plantin, verified that the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) was running operations with the Department of Motor Vehicle Offices (DMV) within Miami-Dade County. She clarified the DMV was now administering tasks through the Miami-Dade Tax Collectors Office and not the State. Dr. Plantin explained the exception was the State handled special exceptions of licenses transferred to another state.

Dr. Plantin reported many immigrants from the community needed DMV services, but afraid to visit the office because deputized State Troopers were posted on site and granted federal authority to assist with deportations during the rise of recent Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raids.

Dr. Plantin stated because DMV appointments were booked people camped out overnight to secure a walk in spot, but robbed while waiting. She explained the legality of the DMV not having overnight security stemmed from Florida State Troopers not fully deployed because more training and personnel were needed to meet Florida Governor, Ron De Santis legislation requirements. She stated it was unfortunate that people were robbed, but the Florida Troopers were not assigned to patrol parking lots overnight. Dr. Plantin stated an update would be provided at the next CJLE meeting by the FHP Major.

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3. Update: Spring Break 2025 messaging

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported the Goodwill ambassadors were deployed. She acknowledged Reverend Eddy Gervais and Dr. Richardson for their support of CRB's observance of Miami Beach Spring Break activities. Dr. Plantin stated police presence was plentiful along with 65 city and county Goodwill Ambassadors, also present were the God's Squad. She later indicated the Deputy Sheriff's presence was smaller this year and 588 people were arrested, an increase from the prior year. Dr. Plantin also acknowledged the new City Manager for his hospitality. She reported the 14th, 15th, 16th, and the 21st through the 23rd were weekends with the highest impact.

Dr. Plantin indicated, although there were no shootings nor stampedes businesses were not supportive of Spring Break on Miami Beach.

Dr. Plantin reported the overflow of visitors into Miami Beach caused disruptions to traffic and became a nuisance to business owners and residents. She stated business owners complained about overcrowding and the inability to accommodate extra patrons. Dr. Plantin stated residents of Miami Beach complained they could not get home due to traffic jams. She pointed out the increase of arrests was concerning, specifically with white males and white females. Dr. Plantin explained the kick-off of Ultra Festival and people from Broward County could have attributed to the unexpected crowds and the increase of arrest in Miami Beach during four weekends.

Other CRB members provided their feedback regarding their observance and experience of Spring Break weekend.

Mr. Gabriel Paez indicated parking was also an issue, especially for visitors.

Ms. Marjorie York shared residential streets were much quieter.

Mr. Joshua A. Sayles agreed that parking was difficult, especially for visitors, but also quiet.

Vice Chairman Eddie Gervais agreed traffic on the causeway was jammed, particularly after 7 p.m. and the price for parking was high, but the experience was overall peaceful.

4. Update: Fear due to Presidential Executive Orders (Places of Worship, Schools, Travel, Deputization of Local Police Departments)

Dr. Shirley Plantin explained the individual and communal impacts Immigration and Customs Enforcement (I.C.E.) raids had on social structures.

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Dr. Shirley Plantin advised that she had received several calls from Haitian and Venezuelan churches requesting assistance regarding appropriate measures to take if I.C.E. went to their church. She stated the church community raised concern to retain their non-profit 501C3 tax status. Dr. Plantin indicated that she had been working with several working groups to assist with creating documentation informing immigrants of their rights without infringing the laws. Dr. Plantin received reports from several schools that students attendance have dropped drastically because parents were not taking children to school in fear of deportation due to the president's executive orders. She conveyed school attendance was now a high concern and the pressure to locate absent students had become the principal's burden. Dr. Plantin stated schools were requesting resources, seeking agencies and working groups that could perform wellness checks to assist with accounting for students. She stated even with wellness checks people were still afraid to open their door.

Dr. Plantin reported this issue had become wide spread and even affected documented travelers because people feared going through U.S. Customs and felt unprotected. She indicated the following municipalities have deputized, the Florida Sheriff, Coral Gables, and Hialeah; and Florida International University (F.I.U.). Dr. Plantin mentioned four other municipalities have been deputized and pending approval to perform I.C.E. raids.

Dr. Plantin shared actual events where people were taken into custody by I.C.E.

Dr. Plantin pointed out with the increase of I.C.E. raids, domestic violence had also risen, but the incidents were unreported because immigrants did not want to encounter law enforcement and/or I.C.E. at their homes. She mentioned making first responders aware of these situations was also part of their agenda. Dr. Plantin mentioned a Miami-Dade Deputy picked up a domestic violence recently. Dr. Plantin stated people raised concerns regarding the protection of children during summer recess and places where children frequented such as parks and summer camps. Other high concerns she noted were I.C.E. Officers were not wearing identifiable uniforms and making covert arrests.

Dr. Plantin noted the consensus of CRB was to gather the community's concerns to present to the Board to address community concerns.

A brief discussion ensued regarding actual I.C.E. raids that occurred across the United States with California having the most activity. Dr. Plantin emphasized people had to be mindful and vet the information they received. It was mentioned that the April 24th deadline from the Biden's Administration, a Federal Judge ruled to halt the legislation.

Dr. Plantin conveyed although Ms. Marie Jean-Pharuns and others knew a U.S. citizen traveling to Puerto Rico was not required to go through customs, Dr. Plantin accredited the passing of false information to social media such as Tik Tok and What's App that fueled public fear. She stated it was best to warn people to vet the source of information they received.

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In regards to former U.S. President Biden's April 24th deadline, Dr. Plantin informed Vice Chairman Eddie Gervais that a Federal Judge determined that President Trump illegally revoked immigrants' temporary legal status and the federal judge ruled to block President Trump's legislation revoking thousands of migrants' legal status for now.

Dr. Plantin informed Chairman Diaz that the legislation pertained to all immigrants including Haitians, Venezuelan, and the Cuban population. Chairman Diaz noted the legislation would impact 900,000 people.

Ms. Marie Jean-Pharuns shared an incident where a woman of Asian descent was on an approved Temporary Protected Status (TPS) Program, but was still deported from the United States.

A discussion ensued regarding reported incidents that people cannot return to the U.S. within 10 years if deported.

Dr. Plantin indicated attorneys were dissatisfied with clients that decided to self deport because migrants did not want to face the consequences of not being able to return to the U.S. within 10 years. She stated legal discussions surrounding this topic extended from guardianship to assets.

Ms. Gizelle Ortiz-Velasquez shared that people were receiving immigration letters via email and noted the importance to pay attention to those correspondence because court dates are enclosed.

Chairman Diaz indicated the misinformation was getting out of control and inquired whether governmental offices could manage/monitor this situation.

A discussion ensued regarding whether detainment was legal in private and public spaces such as the church. Dr. Plantin reported a gentlemen went to his citizenship appointment and was still deported. She indicated it was important to tell people your appointment date and time as a precaution to alert someone if you are detained.

Mr. Gabriel Paez shared a personal experience that a caregiver for one of his relatives self-deported. He conveyed that these circumstances impacted real people and also the medical and agricultural industries.

Dr. Plantin added besides landscapers, the health care field would probably be impacted the most.

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Discussions and Determinations

1. GVO Ride

Dr. Shirley Plantin announced that the Good Vibes Only (GVO) Ride were a group of bikers that drove All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV's) and expected to take over streets during Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK) weekend. She referenced the same group illegally took over State Road 836 last year. Dr. Plantin stated through CRB's partnership with Home Land Security, a task force was created to monitor the cyclists for three years which deterred cyclist from disrupting MLK weekend. She indicated the group choose a different day to invade streets, President's Day weekend and during Spring Break. Dr. Plantin reported the operation was successful, until this year when the task force operation was denied. She reported the group began their mischievous behavior by ransacking Deputy vehicles' in Broward County, and continued in Miami-Dade, to the City of Miami Gardens during the Tennis Tournament, North Side, and Liberty City.

Ms. Plantin stated she received calls from residents that questioned what happened to the peaceful comradery the cyclist had with the community. She later reported, the peace with GVO Riders lasted approximately 2 ½ to 3 years and the cyclist group from this year was smaller. She made several attempts to contact the Major, but her calls were returned much later and during the interim was forced to speak with Miami-Dade Chief Rosie Cordero-Stutz.

She conveyed that Maimi-Dade County Law Enforcement must show a strong presence to deter the motorist (GVO Riders) roguish conduct and indicated the riders were testing the system to gauge the number of officers on duty. She stated the riders were coming at different times, not posting their planned activities, and understood law enforcement tactics. Dr. Plantin reported at 3:00 p.m. the MLK parade and festivities were shut down at the MLK Memorial Park (6000 NW 32nd Court) due to the disruption of riders. She established that this item was placed on the agenda because community members raised concern regarding the disruptions that occurred in local communities.

2. Recent Rallies & Protest in Miami-Dade

Dr. Shirley Plantin announced CRB had been monitoring several protests, and chose two higher concerns, the Hands Off – National Day of Action - incident that involved 50 states took place on April 5th, and the incident regarding the poor housing conditions of detainees at Krome's Detention Center. Dr. Plantin mentioned there were claims of potential rallies regarding Fluoride in the water. She stated CRB was also monitoring activities for the Jewish community, but there were no concerns of high significance. Dr. Plantin referenced Miami-Dade Mayor Levine Cava vetoed Agenda Item, 11A10 on (4/1/2025) for Fluoride to remain in Miami-Dade County's drinking water and opined her decision calmed the majority of people that planned to

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protest. She stated the request for special event permits had increased in local cities for various rallies and was awaiting for additional details to confirm whether events were planned. Dr. Plantin indicated they were waiting on a flyer to see if and when an incidents would take place.

In response to Chairman Diaz inquiry, Ms. Shirley stated she was unaware if elected officials visited the Krome Detention Center and had no current update.

Mr. Gabriel Paez announced a rally was scheduled on Saturday, April 19th at the Freedom Towers, AKA "Ground Zero". Dr. Plantin indicated another rally was scheduled April 20th and gained traction along with rumors that President Trump Administration – Executive Order may declare Marshall Law, according to news/social media. Many community members stated the LGBTQ community (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer) and marginalized groups felt targeted and people planned to attend to support those communities.

Dr. Plantin informed CRB members that the protests usually began at the Freedom Tower (Ground Zero) or at Bayfront Park.

Mr. Gabriel Paez announced that the April 19th rally date was confirmed and informed CRB members that the information was posted on-line as a National Day of Action (Miami) from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Torch of Friendship, located at 301 Biscayne Boulevard.

Mr. Paez read the list of organizations that partnered for the rally.

A discussion ensued amongst CRB members regarding the current administration declaring Marshall Law on April 20th and people accepting social media posts as factual information when the information provided was potentially false.

Chairman Diaz stated it was important to stay proactive.

Dr. Plantin reminded CRB members regardless of the information source, CRB was created to monitor these activities because fear built tension.

Ms. Gizelle Ortiz-Velasquez provided clarity by reading an article from News Week that indicated the Executive Order was signed by President Trump on Inauguration Day, directed the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security to submit a report by April 20th assessing this situation at the Southern Boarder and determine whether to invoke the Insurrection Act of 1807 for the purposes of boarder enforcement. Ms. Jean-Pharuns stated the tension was based around the possible monitor wall for that boarder.

Mr. Paez mentioned generational differences were apparent the original immigrants were less receptive to other groups new to the United States. He noted the first generational immigrants to the U.S. benefited the most. He gave an example of a local Venezuelan LGBTQ community member was in the U.S. legally, but still deported and taken to a jail in Salvador despite their order not to deport.

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Ms. Gizelle Ortiz-Velasquez mentioned under former President Carter's Administration it was easier for immigrants to come into the U.S. and gain access to work permits and other services to help establish citizenship. She also commented when immigrants are allowed into the U.S. the government should have requirements to complete.

A discussion ensued between Chairman Diaz and Ms. Velasquez regarding what requirements should be established to obtain U.S. citizenship, which ethnic groups experienced the most disparities of deportation, and the fairness of immigration laws.

Chairman Diaz shared the diversity of this CRB panel was vital. Ms. Velasquez pointed out time was needed to go through the process to have the paper work processed.

Ms. Susan Khoury mentioned that Miami-Dade Sheriff Rosie Cordero-Stutz would be adding CRB relations to her campaign/platform.

In regards to Ms. Susan Khoury's suggestion for CRB members to participate in this year's Dade Days in Tallahassee to speak with State Representatives to influence policies on immigration and other social issues, Ms. Gizelle Ortiz-Velasquez cautioned CRB members to remain aligned with the goal and mission of CRB and indicated any activity outside the body of operation would be considered an action taken by a private citizen.

DMV Appointment Scalpers-Real ID-May 7, 2025

Ms. Shirely Plantin indicated the deadline to have the Florida issued REAL ID issued was May 7th. She indicated the ID must have the star (at the upper right corner of the ID) was required for domestic air travel/and had other travel restrictions, unless travelers chose to drive. Should pointed out that the Driver and Motor Vehicle Office/Operations (DMV) was now governed by the Constitutional Offices of the Tax Collector and caused an upsurge of booked appointments. She stated driving school agencies booked 300 to 400 DMV appointments and then sold (scalped) at \$25 to \$250 each. Subsequently, the Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners are in the process of legislating to classify this misconduct as a misdemeanor with penalties of a \$500 fine and imprisonment from 30 to 60 days by request of the Tax Collector. With the urgency of people eager to get a walk-in appointment for the REAL ID, Dr. Plantin reported people camped out and were robbed at gun point while they waited overnight.

Unfortunately, the Troopers were not assigned to patrol/secure the DMV overnight, leaving campers vulnerable and easy targets for criminals. Dr. Plantin stated she would make the CJLE Committee aware of this issue that was occurring in both Miami-Dade and Broward Counties.

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Mr. Gabriel Paez indicated when attempting to book an appointment on-line for the month of May, appointments were very few with no local availability.

A discussions ensued between Dr. Plantin and Chairman Diaz regarding whether the DMV was a county or state operated office. Dr. Plantin explained to Chairman Diaz that the DMV was now managed by and provided services through the County. Chairman Diaz stated the Tax Collector's Office was now part of the Constitutional Offices. State but provided services through the County.

4. Miami Beach – Memorial Day Activation

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported that the CRB and the Goodwill Ambassadors were activated for Memorial Day Weekend on South Beach. She reported a request was made for 50 Goodwill Ambassadors with fewer police presence because a different crowd was expected for the Hyundai Air and Sea Show but was still waiting on the plan. She indicated the Goodwill Ambassadors would be utilized from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Dr. Plantin stated that she would be present and advised CRB members that wish to attend to observe must provide advance notice and a signed waiver to participate.

5. Religious Holidays (Passover & Easter)

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported there were concerns regarding law enforcement representation that was needed for the Jewish Community to ensure the sheriff and police officers offered on watch services to ensure protection during sacred holidays.

Vice Chairman Eddie Gervais reported a meeting was held with Miami Beach and the County were working together to protect synagogues in Miami-Dade County to ensure the Jewish Community had a successful Passover Holiday.

6. National Crime Victims Right Week – First responders Roundtable

Dr. Shirley Plantin announced last week was National Crime Victims Right Week. She reported Miami-Dade Commissioner Raquel Regalado attended the first responders' roundtable discussions that addressed what to recognize, understand, and how to respond when faced with a domestic violence call or when a DV victim was encountered. She indicated many victims did not want to be identified and highlighted the importance to meet people where they are. Dr. Plantin noted also in attendance were the Department of Corrections, Social Workers, a Miami-

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Dade Sheriff's Office Representative, Barbie Brewer, Victim Advocate Manager was the moderator, and other organizations that provide victim advocate services.

Mr. Gabriel Paez commented that the general public did not trust public offices/law enforcement and pointed out transgender were still being arrested at high rates. He stated that he worked closely with the law enforcement from the Miami-Dade LGBTQ Community and suggested that law enforcement needed to be trained.

7. CRB Representation at Several Community Events

Dr. Shirley Plantin announced that she participated as a panelist of a live show, a Town Hall regarding Immigration, hosted by the largest Haitian Church, Tabernacle of Glory with 8,000 local and 64,000 national members. She indicated a live show was held that discussed immigration issues, addressed misinformation, and provided viewers the importance to provide law enforcement truthful information when stopped. Dr. Plantin stated many immigrants feared automatic detainment if encountered by law enforcement.

Dr. Plantin noted the She represented CRB with Marlon Hill to determine what is to be done with the CRB.

Chairman Diaz announced the next CRB Board meeting will be held Wednesday, May 21, 2025 at 2:00 p.m.

Hotspots

1.Uptick in Domestic Violence Cases Locally

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported Miami-Dade Sheriff Rosie Cordero-Stutz spoke on the most current Deputy involved shooting that has increased locally and nationally. She mentioned personnel from the Juvenile Center have noticed that reported there were more tensions. One of the African American leaders had asked Dr. Plantin to place this item on the agenda as a Hot Spot for monitoring. She mentioned people have remained silent for various reasons.

Chairman Diaz inquired whether the Board agreed to invite Ilena Gonzalez from the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to provide a briefing/status on laws implemented from Tallahassee to inform the community through social media to make the information easier for the public to comprehend. He clarified his request for CRB to receive alerts regarding topics that were related to CRB concerns, such as education and immigration because new laws were not widely broadcast/publicized to reach the masses. Chairman Diaz indicated to put a list together for Dr. Plantin to provide CRB on updates. He asked that the CRB be alerted of what occurred and the

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upcoming laws/bills waiting for review. Chairman Diaz indicated to put topics of concern together to give to Dr. Plantin.

Chairman Diaz inquired how CRB could gain access to upcoming or newly released legislation from Tallahassee and release to the public on social media to make laws easier for the public to comprehend. In addition, he suggested next year to compile a list of CRB priorities and give to Dr. Plantin to forward to Ms. Gonzalez to establish whether CRB priorities were listed or could be included in Miami-Dade's Legislative package for Tallahassee.

Dr. Plantin explained this year's legislation session was coming to a close. She suggested that Mr. Joseph Salvador could serve as an in-house contact.

Chairman Diaz indicated in June the Board of Miami-Dade County Commissioners prepared the legislative priorities package to forward to Tallahassee's as priorities from Miami-Dade.

Mr. Paez volunteered to provide Chairman Diaz a status on protecting democracy, criminal justice, health, education, and LGBTQ equality. Mr. Paez it was too late to add legislative priorities this year, but to prepare CRB's legislative priorities for next year.

It was noted by Ms. Rahel Weldeyesus, Senior Advisor, Community Action and Human Services (CAHSD), Office of the Mayor, Chief of Staff Office, Miami-Dade Mayor Daniella Levine Cava that Assistant County Attorney Jess McCarty distributed the request for priorities ballots throughout the County and streamlined issues that were more important to Miami-Dade County and that CRB could choose from that list.

Ms. Susan Khoury announced that the State had authorized all municipalities and the Sheriff's office to work with I.C.E. and raised concern because there were not federal or state funded and people coming in needed proper training.

Mr. Paez announced the Miami Herald posted police at Florida University were being deputized for immigration enforcement.

Chairman Diaz requested Dr. Plantin to place this issue on CRB's Meeting Agenda and invite County Attorney Jesse McCarty to join the next CRB meeting to clarify these issues.

After, Mr. Joshua A. Sayles cautioned this body of voicing their political opinions could have an adverse impact on CRB's mission, Chairman decided to table this issue.

Announcements

1. Financial Disclosure Forms by July 1, 2025

Dr. Shirley Plantin reported the financial disclosures were not yet received. She reminded CRB members the deadline to submit the financial disclosure was July 1st. Dr. Plantin indicated the

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financial disclosure would come from the Department of Elections. She announced two members were removed from the list this morning.

After a discussion amongst CRB members inquiring how to obtain the financial disclosure form, Dr. Plantin announced the form was usually mailed by the Department of Elections, but she would locate the form and provide the link for CRB members to download and submit through the proper chain.

Other announcements included the following event(s):

Ms. Marjorie York announced Earth Day (4/22) at Botanical Gardens was cancelled.

In addition, she announced the Alliance for Aging, Inc. was hosting The New Face of Aging

Prior to adjournment, Dr. Plantin clarified the driver's license process was mainly handled by the State while the Tax Collectors Office also provided DMV functions. She explained driver license transfers from other states was related to the State of Florida.

Dr. Plantin announced the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (CITT) was asked to provide a presentation for County Boards. She would clarify if the CITT would provide their presentation to CRB members in May or June. Dr. Plantin reported in an upcoming meeting CITT would provide a presentation to address/analyze transportation issues within Miami-Dade County and ways transportation has been and could continue to be improved with the mayor's implementations and community feedback.

Ms. Rahel stated the Community Action and Human Services has partnered with the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles and noted the Florida Licensing on Wheels (FLOW) was scheduled for its next mobile stop on Tuesday, May 27th from 10:00 a.m. to 2 p.m. at 3750 south Dixie Highway by appointments only. She reported mobile units were scheduled for other locations throughout Miami-Dade.

Mr. Paez announced that he would be absence from the next CRB meeting.
