# DON'T BE A VICTIM OF IMMIGRATION FRAUD



If you need immigration legal advice, only go to a lawyer or someone who is accredited by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) or an organization recognized by the DOJ. You can find the list of accredited and recognized providers at <u>www.justice.gov/eoir/recognition--accreditation-roster-reports</u>

**Immigration law is complicated.** Beware of fraudulent immigration providers who may indicate otherwise and make false promises.

## WATCH OUT FOR FALSE PROMISES, SUCH AS:

- An **easy** way to obtain a green card
- A way to get a work permit or visa **immediately**
- Statements indicating that there are **no risks or consequences**
- Claims of **special influence** with immigration authorities

## WHAT NOT TO DO:

- Do not pay for government application forms forms are free and can be downloaded online at <u>www.uscis.gov/forms</u>
- Do not give original documents give copies instead
- Do not sign any blank or incomplete forms
- **Do not** sign papers, immigration forms, or contracts that you do not fully understand



## WHAT TO DO:

- Always ask questions even if the provider was recommended by a family member or friend; you should feel confident about the provider
- Ask for proof that provider is a licensed attorney or accredited/ recognized by the DOJ
- Get a second opinion
- Only go to providers that have a physical location
- Ask for a written agreement of services to be provided that is signed by provider – read the agreement before signing it, and keep the signed copy for your records
- Get copies of documents prepared for you
- Ask for a written receipt that includes the name and address of the provider
