




# 1 NORTH ECT STUDY AREA Legend

### **Project History**

Selected as one of the six SMART
 Plan Rapid Transit Corridors

- Major East-West Connection
- High levels of traffic congestion
- Serve major regional economic engines





### **PD&E Study Process**







### **Purpose and Need**

- To increase the person-throughput to the Beach Corridor's major origins and destinations via a rapid transit technology.
- The need is based upon:
  - extensive population growth
  - increased traffic congestion
  - demand for enhanced access



# **Project Goals**

- Provide direct, convenient, and comfortable rapidtransit service to existing and future land uses
- Improve connections with transit services
- Promote pedestrian and bicycle friendly solutions



### **Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA)**

On January 30, 2020, the Miami-Dade County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) unanimously selected the Recommended Alternative as the Locally Preferred Alternative. Specifically, the TPO recommended:

- An Automated People Mover (APM) or Monorail along the Bay Crossing /Trunkline
- An extension of the existing Metromover system north along North Miami Avenue; and
- Dedicated bus/trolley lanes within the existing right-of-way of Washington Avenue





### **Bay Crossing/Trunkline LPA**



Fixed guideway and automated rubber tire transit like Automated People Mover and Monorail have lower impacts.

# Bay Crossing/Trunkline Environmental Assessment (EA) Development

- Miami-Dade County
- Lead NEPA and Permitting Agency
  - United States Coast Guard (USCG)
- Coordination with Cooperating Agencies/Other Permitting Agencies
  - Federal Transit Administration (FTA)
  - Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT)
  - United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)
  - National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS)
  - South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD)
  - Two rounds of reviews of the EA have been completed by lead and cooperating agencies
  - Conceptual Environmental Resource Permit (ERP) coordinated and received from SFWMD



# Bay Crossing/Trunkline Next Steps P3 Contract Processes

- Following an open competitive process, an Interim Agreement was awarded to a P3 Concessionaire by the Board of County Commissioners in October 2020 to provide various predevelopment work and due diligence activities
- Contract negotiations for a long-term Design, Build, Finance,
   Operate, Maintain (DBFOM) Project Agreement are ongoing
- The P3 Concessionaire has been directed to explore additional opportunities for cost optimization to achieve an affordable price for the project
- A recommendation regarding the Project Agreement is expected to be presented to the Board of County Commissioners in 2023





### Miami/Design District Extension LPA



APM is the preferred Alternative because it provides better travel time and ridership with more resilient infrastructure, and less construction impact.



\*\*Class of Action is assumed based on analysis to date. County has not initiated NEPA coordination with FTA to confirm COA








### Miami Beach Convention Center Extension- Next Steps

- Existing outside lanes for dedicated transit/bicycles along Washington Avenue from 5<sup>th</sup> Street to Convention Center
- Detailed traffic analysis completed by 2022
- Typical section within existing right-of-way: no environmental impacts
- Final Design to commence in 2023
- Approval by City of Miami Beach
